

It will be seen by the above report, that there has been an advance of fifty nine cents per week in the price of board for each person maintained at the county farm.

As some property has depreciated in value, we have appraised it at a lower rate than usual, while the receipts from the farm have been less than in former years. Last year we received for board of prisoners, \$585.00,—this year, \$404. The amount received this year for board of town paupers is much less. Labor performed by inmates of the county home is some years a very important source of income, but was this year almost entirely expended upon the farm. The poor have been maintained at less than the average cost in the other counties of the State, as is shown by the various reports we have consulted. The Superintendent, Mr. Manson, is a faithful and efficient officer; to his zeal and fidelity is largely due the successful management of the county farm.

Again we call the attention of the Selectmen of the various towns to the fact there are ample provisions made at the County House, for all persons for whom the county is chargeable, and we request them in all cases where it is possible, when called upon for aid to county paupers, to remove them there immediately. We also refer them to the General Statutes, Chap. 75, Secs. 12 and 13, which provide that no county is liable to any town for the support or relief of any pauper until the officers of such town shall have established him or her as a county pauper by the proper affidavits.

We would state also that we have adopted the rule to al-

low no bills for more than thirty days prior to such establishment, and the selectmen of the several towns are required to present to the County Commissioners all claims against the county, and evidence sustaining the same, during the first week of each term of Court, as after that time they can not hear and allow such claims without a special order from the presiding Judge.

We take this occasion to state that all persons who shall furnish medical aid, board or supplies to paupers, will be required to present their accounts, specifically itemized with dates, in order to have them allowed.
