We have assessed \$300 for School District No. 2, for the purpose of uniting with School District No. 1, for High School purposes, which amount has not been called for.

We annex the Report of the Committee chosen by the town to pay the money appropriated for the aid of the families of volunteers. TO THE SELECTMEN OF EXETER : ---

The undersigned Committee for the aid of families of volunteers, beg leave to submit to you the following report of their doings : ---

The balance in the hands of the Committee on February 1, 1864, was \$400.00, they have received from the Selectmen from February 1, 1864, to February 1, 1865, \$8,804 00, and paid out in same time \$8,764.48, leaving a balance of \$439.52.

At the commencement of the year, eighty-four families were paid by the town, at an expense of about \$ 850.00 per month; at the present time sixty-three families are paid at an expense of about \$ 600.00 per month, and the number is growing less every month, by the expiration of the time of enlistment of our volunteers. The town is paying about seventy-five dollars per month to the families of deceased and discharged soldiers, for which they will receive no remuneration. Of the balance paid, two thirds will be refunded by the State.
