

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

The farm and almshouse, have been under the care of Mr. Isaac K. George and wife, who have performed their difficult and perplexing duties to the entire satisfaction of the Commissioners, and to the people of the county, so far as we know. The help in their employ have also fulfilled their duties in a very satisfactory manner.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

ACUTE DISEASE.—There have been but few cases of acute disease. One patient died of an obscure inflammatory disease. There have been three cases of Erysipelas; one of mild continued fever; one of pneumonia contracted away from the farm; a few cases of simple sore throat; and one of hemorrhage from the lungs. All these cases have recovered. There have been no cases of diphtheria, scarlatina, measles, or other contagious or malignant disease. Cases of diarrhee have been few and easily managed.

CHRONIC DISEASE.—There have been the usual number of chronic cases. All these were contracted before the patients entered the institution. We have had consumption, rheumatism, heart disease, dropsy, eczema, and secondary and tertiary syphilis. The number of deaths from this form of disease and old age have been less than last year. From May to September there was no death.

INSANE.—We have had 22 cases of insanity of various forms. I have recommended little direct medical treatment. Some cases have been much improved and a few have fully recovered by the rest, nutritious diet, and the firm, yet most kind treatment obtained here.

SURGERY.—I have performed the operation of tapping the abdomen four times; and have amputated the great toe once.

I have made thirty-six visits during the year; and have visited no patient more than four times for the same sickness—and this only in one case.

SANITARY CONDITION.—The sanitary condition of the buildings and grounds is excellent. This is indicated by the entire absence of all malignant diseasc. The location is elevated and dry; the drainage, both artificial and natural, is perfect; while those in 9

charge give constant and intelligent personal attention to this matter. They believe that "eternal vigilance is the price of" health.

The insane have commodious and safe quarters in a cottage separate from the main building. However I would recommend that the enclosure for exercise be enlarged if possible. They only need more sunlight and a broader view of the beautiful valley so near them.

The diet of the inmates is plain, nutritious and healthful. Proper delicacies are furnished for the sick, and pure medicines are ordered from a careful and experienced druggist. The water supply is good and the steam heating apparatus supplies an uniform and easily controlled temperature to every room.

It is but just to say that the Commissioners, the Superintendent and Matron, endeavor to render the inmates healthful, comfortable and happy : and I believe their efforts are duly appreciated.

*In 1868, paupers were first received on County Farm, and in the same year the law was passed abolishing town settlements gained previous to 1840, by which the liabilities of the County were largely increased, +In 1875 an act was passed abolishing all town settlements gained prior to Jany. 1, 1860, making the number of County paupers nearly twice as many as before,

For finishing Insane House including steam heating and high fence; moving and finishing hog house, work shop, and shed; eave troughs and conductors on almshouse and superintendent's house; building reservoir (on the hill,) and lead pipe for supplying water for the almshouse, water closets, etc.; building depot house at station; lead, oil and labor for painting new buildings, and building and painting new fence, \$3,557 28 as follows:

It will be seen by the foregoing statement that the expense of completing the new buildings is more than the estimate for this work made in our last report.

In order to heat the Insane ward with steam it was necessary to raise the building four feet and we made a substantial basement under the same, which is used for lock ups and storage. A substantial high fence was made around this ward, making a yard for these inmates. The former supply of water for the institution was insufficient and a good reservoir, $5 \ge 20 \ge 20$ feet, and connected with the buildings with a suitable lead pipe was thought very necessary.

The above work and many minor matters were not taken into account in making the estimate of last year.
