It is well known to many of the tax payers of this county, that west of the buildings on the county farm, was a piece of land covered with water for a large part of the season, making it unproductive for any kind of crop. To remedy this there has been a ditch dug eighty rods in length, fifty-eight rods from six

to ten feet deep, laid with stone on each side, with stone covering, then filled with dirt.

This ditch drains from three to four acres of the best land the farm contains, and being situated but a few rods from the buildings, it adds much to the value of the land. It has produced the present season two hundred and sixty bushels of potatoes and two thousand head of cabbages, although it was not all put under cultivation. A blind ditch forty rods in length and four feet deep has also been dug on the hill south of the buildings for the purpose of draining land which is too wet to cultivate in the Spring in season for raising crops.

Several years since a Hydraulic Ram was set to work to supply water for the buildings, but for some cause it did not do its work as expected. The pipe has all been taken up and re-laid three and a half feet deep, a large cistern built of brick, laid and plastered on the inside with cement, at the spring, giving twenty feet head and fall to operate the Hydraulic Ram, which at the present time, does its work full better than was anticipated, giving a plentiful supply of excellent water.

The spring is forty-five rods from the building. The water is raised one hundred feet into a large cistern in the main building, built of the same material as that at the spring. A Bakery has been built this season, which requires much less labor and fuel to do the baking than the old method with stoves and small ovens.

While repairing the bridge, fifty dollars worth of labor was done by the help on the farm, which is not included in the bill for its repairs. The above with other improvements, have been accomplished the past year, without any extra expense for labor on the farm, except the brick and carpenter work.

Much credit is due Mr. Frye, the Superintendent, for the interest manifested by him to improve the farm, and also, to Mrs. Frye for her untiring efforts to make the inmates of the household comfortable and happy.

We would again as in our last report, invite those interested to call and examine for themselves.
