STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$150 from Robert T. Gould, the income, subject to such provisions as the town may impose, to be used in the care of the burial lots of Moses Hill, Thomas Hill and Capt. Moses Gould, all in the Hopkinton Village cemetery.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept trust funds for the care of cemetery lots, only on condition that a sum not to exceed ten per cent of the income, yearly, from said fund may be used for the administration of said fund, and that any balance remaining after the lot has been properly cared for, may be expended toward the general beautifying of the cemetery containing said lot.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100, the income from same to be expended for the care of the burial lot and approaches thereto of George C. Blaisdell and Ora M. Huntoon in Contoocook cemetery.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100, the income from same to be expended for the care of the burial lot and approaches thereto of Samuel Curtice in the Contoocook cemetery.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to rebuild or repair the old cemetery fence in Hopkinton Village, or take any vote relative thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.

9. To see if the town will vote to set aside the sum of \$100 from the road appropriations for the repair of sidewalks in Hopkinton Village.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,352.54 for trunk line maintenance.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for rebuilding trunk line between Concord and Contoocook.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to build permanent road on the Contoocook Valley Trunk Line, so called.

13. To see if the town will vote to instruct the road agents to keep the Trunk Line passable for automobiles in winter or pass any vote relative thereto.

14. To see if the town will vote to buy a tractor, weighing not less than five or six tons for use in clearing the highway of snow and for care of highways and raise and appropriate the money for same.

15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell the steam roller.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of the Hopkinton Free Public Libraries and appropriate the same.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day and appropriate the same.

18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of the white pine blister rust.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build one cement bridge in 1925.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500 for the purpose of establishing a permanent town forest.

21. To see if the town will vote to elect by ballot a committee of three legal voters of the town, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and one each year thereafter to procure suitable land, improve and care for the same for the establishment of a town forest.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the employment of a District Nurse, and appropriate the same.

23. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Contoocook Valley Road, so called, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work, the sum of \$350 for this purpose.

24. To see if the town will vote to allow 2% discount on all taxes paid on or before July 15th, 1925.

25. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks not earlier than April 1st.

26. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees and Committees.

27. To hear and transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hopkinton

I herewith submit my third annual report.

The school year ending June 30, 1924, was marked by good attendance and much progress in all school work. The High School made an exceptionally good record.

The total enrollment was a little above the average for the past four years.

The number of pupils entering the first grade at Contoocook, for the current year, is smaller. The second grade is also smaller, hence the primary room is able to accommodate them all without dividing the sessions and without serious overcrowding. This would indicate that the increased enrollment in these grades for the past three years was only temporary. We are unable at present to make a very accurate forecast regarding the number that will enter next September.

The problem for the next three years is to find room for the Junior and Senior High school. This year the Junior High, numbers 29, all of whom are crowded into a room designed for not over twenty pupils. We might get along without great difficulty for two or three years under these conditions. But if the present situation remains unchanged, the Junior High next year will number 45, an increase of fourteen. From the enrollment in the lower grades, it is safe to expect about the same number for the three following years. Therefore, whatever action is taken to relieve the present situation will have to continue for at least four years.

After next year the High School, which is now filling all available room, will be greatly overcrowded.

The total enrollment, for the current year, in the Contoocook building, is 130. Far more than the building or

playground can reasonably be expected to accommodate. At present it is impossible to let all of the children out for the recess period at one time, consequently, the classes that are in session, while the others are on the play ground, or passing through the halls, are disturbed and restless, by the noise that inevitably accompanies a recess period; and as a result much time and energy are wasted.

All signs indicate that, next year, we shall have to find places for at least one hundred eighty-five, probably more, hence if a way is found to rearrange rooms to accommodate the increased number in the Junior High, the larger problem remains unchanged.

The whole matter is a most serious one and should be very thoughtfully considered by every citizen.

The rural schools seem to be serving their respective communities with reasonable efficiency and without serious transportation problems. The greatest difficulty is to get well qualified teachers to remain in the more isolated schools.

Farrington Corner and the Main Road, for the current year, have a larger enrollment than usual. The other outlying schools have the average number of pupils. Hatfield school with an enrollment of seven is the smallest in the district.

The following named schools need kalsomine and paint on the walls, ceiling and interior wood work: Tyler, Main Road, Emerson Hill, West Hopkinton and Hatfield. It might also be well to paint the outside of the Emerson Hill and Main Road buildings.

In closing, I desire to express appreciation of the fine spirit of hearty cooperation of teachers, officials, parents and interested citizens, which has made the work so pleasant and successful.
