


THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:-

You are hereby notified to meet at the Elementary School Auditorium in said Pembroke on Tuesday the 9th day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (.20) cents on and after December 1, 1965 on all unpaid poll taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of nonpayment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take on the following question, "Shall the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board be adopted for this Town?"
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in Trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the Cemetery lots indicated:
 - (A) The Rufus George Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the George lot in Evergreen Cemetery.

- (B) The Edwin M. Annis Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Annis lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- (C) The Evans Clark Fund of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Clark lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that section of the Old Sheep Davis Road beginning at a point opposite the southwest bound of the property of Robert C. Baxter and running parallel to new Sheep Davis Road (N.H. Route #106) approximately 890 feet to a point opposite the property of William S. Wolfe. This section of road is replaced by said new Sheep Davis Road.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as open highways and make subject to gates and bars, as provided by RSA 238.2, the following highways.
 - (A) That section of road beginning at the 7th Range Road and running north-easterly to the Pembroke Epsom Town line, known as Martin Hill Road.
 - (B) That section of road beginning at the 7th Range Road and running northeasterly to the Pembroke Epsom line, known as Jug City Road.

Both of said Roads are unnecessary and hazardous to travel.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to meet with the Selectmen of Allenstown to investigate the feasibility of combining the operation of some phases of the government of the two Towns, in order to provide better services on a more economical basis and to report their findings and recommendations at the next Town Meeting.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Gerard Martel to a strip of land forty feet in width beginning at the northerly end of High Street and extending in a northerly direction to land of Loso. Said strip of land to be reserved for a future connecting street and access area for utilities and fire alarm system.

(This article is approved by the Budget Committee)

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend its Ordinance relative to Mobile Home Park licenses as follows:
 - (A) Amend section 2 of said Ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following new sentence, "It shall be a condition of such license that the Mobile Home Park operator shall be responsible for property taxes levied against trailers or mobile homes, which are removed from the Park before taxes legally assessed against them are paid."

- (B) Amend section 3 of said Ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following new sentence, "Applicants for license shall furnish, with such applications, such agreements as the Selectmen may require to insure compliance with the provisions of section 2."
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the old rubbish packer to the best advantage of the Town and pay the proceeds of said sale into the Town's Capital Reserve Fund for Equipment.

 (This article is approved by the Budget Committee)
- 15. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to make a study of the Village Business Area with a view to creating Parking Facilities; to ascertain the amount of damages that would be involved in the acquisition of property for this purpose; and to report the results of this study, together with their recommendations to the 1966 Town Meeting.
- (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Ordinance relative to Dogs:

DOG ORDINANCE

- INNOCULATION: Every owner or keeper of a dog within the Town of Pembroke shall have such animal innoculated against Rabies.
- 2. RESTRAINT: All dogs shall be restrained from running at large within the limits of the Town, except when they are on the owner's, or keeper's, property, or being used for hunting or training purposes.
- 3. PENALTY: Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than ten dollars for each such offense.
 - 17. (By Petition) If the preceeding article is passed, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Dog Officer to enforce the Town's Dog Ordinance, and to raise and appropriate the necessary money to defray the expenses of said Officer.
 (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee, since funds have been made available in the Police Department Budget.)
- 18. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road a strip of land formerly used by the Concord Electric Railroad as a road bed graveled and graded running in a westerly direction from Route *3 and parallel to the Garvin's Falls road, so called, to a point 100 feet northwesterly past the entrance to Plausawa Valley Country Club; To authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town, a deed or deeds from any persons or corporations owning, or claiming to own, any portion of said strip of land as it presently exists and who

are willing to give such a deed or deeds to the Town; particularly the third parcel described in deed from Boston and Maine Railroad to Laurence F. Whittemore recorded in Merrimack Registry of Deeds in Book 828, Page 189, and also shown on Map No. 1555 recorded in said Registry.

(This article is approved by the Budget Committee on the condition that necessary funds for paving and otherwise complying with the Town's Subdivision Ordinance, are placed in escrow with the Town by the proponents of the proposed street before its acceptance.)

19. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Ordinance relative to building permits:

BUILDING PERMITS

- 1. PROHIBITION: No person or persons, firm or corporation shall, after the date of the passage of this ordinance, construct any new building of any type, or add to or after the exterior of any existing building without obtaining a building permit, as provided herein, before starting such construction, addition or alteration. No building permit shall be required in cases where such construction, addition or alteration No building permit shall be required in cases where such construction addition or alteration shall cost less than \$300.00; including the cost of labor, or estimated value of labor if the work is performed by the owner or occupant, and the cost of materials.
- 2. APPLICATION: Any person or persons, firm or corporation required to obtain a permit under section No. 1 shall make application to the Board of Selectmen for a building permit on such forms as the Selectmen shall approve, showing the name of the owner of the premises, and the occupant, if different from the owner; the location of the premises; the nature of the work to be done; the results of a perculation test made by a qualified registered engineer, with the approximate dates construction will start. Each such petition shall be accompanied by a sketch showing the boundary lines of the lot upon which the building is to be done, the existing buildings, if any, on the lot and the location of the new construction for which the permit is sought. Such sketch shall also show distances from lot lines and street lines to the buildings both existing and to be constructed, together with the size of the buildings, the lot, and any other information the Selectmen might require.
- 3. PERMITS: The Board of Selectmen shall issue a permit for the construction described in the application and accompanying sketch after they have examined the premises or otherwise satisfied themselves that the proposed construction is in conformity with the ordinance of the Town. The permit so issued shall cover the construction described therein and shall be void at the expiration of six months from the date of issue unless construction is begun within that time.

- 4. PENALTY: Every person, or persons, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance, shall be fined not more than ten dollars for each day such violation shall exist.
 - 20. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Ordinance relative to sewer permits:

SEWER PERMITS

- PROHIBITION: No person or persons, firm or corporation shall, after the
 the date of the passage of this ordinance, make any new connection
 or change or renew any existing connection to any Town sewer in the
 Town of Pembroke, without first obtaining a permit from the Board of
 Selectmen and notifying the Road Agent of the Town of the time and
 place such connection or renewal will be made.
- 2. APPLICATION: Any person or persons, firm or corporation required to obtain a permit under Section 1, above, shall make application to the Board of Selectmen, for a permit to connect to the Town sewer system on such forms as the Selectmen may approve, showing the name of the owner of the premises, and the occupant, if different from the owner; the location of the premises and the approximate date when such connection will be made. Each such application shall be accompanied by a sketch showing the size and location of the Town sewer, the building which is to be connected to the sewer and the exact location of such connection in relation to permanent land marks and the size of connecting pipe.
- PERMITS: The Selectmen shall issue a permit for the sewer connection described therein, retaining a copy of said permit in the Selectmen's Office and forwarding a copy thereof to the Road Agent.
- 4. INSPECTION: The permit holder shall notify the Road Agent of the time and place such connection shall be made while the Road Agent or his representative is present to inspect the work, which shall be done under his supervisors.
- 5. FEES: The fees for such permits shall be \$5.00.
 - To hear the reports of the auditors, agents and committees or of officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
 - 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ABSTRACT OF ACTION ON ARTICLES IN WARRANT MARCH 10, 1964

Meeting was called to order by Moderator, Gedeon N. Petit, Jr. at nine o'clock in the forenoon. It was moved and seconded and voted by those present to adjourn the balance of the meeting until 7:00 p.m. to allow time to vote. Invocation was given by the Rev. Mr. Batton.

- 1. Votes were cast choosing all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
 - 2. Votes were cast choosing Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Moderator, Gedeon N. Petit, Jr. reconvened the meeting and called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

- 3. Voted to raise such sums of money found to be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, with appropriations of the same.
- 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. Voted to charge twenty (.20) cents on and after December 1, 1964 on all unpaid poll taxes.
- 6. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may acquire by deed as a result on non-payment of taxes, and authorized the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
- 7. It was voted to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the revised-Statutes annotated relative to playing games of Beano in Pembroke.
- 8. It was voted to continue the existing municipal court so long as its present Judge shall remain in office, as provided in R.S.A. 502-A:35.
- 9. It was voted to allow "Sweepstake Tickets To Be Sold In Town" as provided in R.S.A. 284: 21-K.
- 10. Voted to accept and maintain the 1956 Ford Tanker, SER *F556H58386 donated by the Fire Department.
- 11. Voted as amended "that the packer be used as a packer only and not as a snow plow" to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new rubbish packer for the Town for a sum of money not to exceed fifteen thousand (\$15,000.) dollars, and authorized the Selectmen to expend from the Town Capital Reserve Fund the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.) dollars in part payment thereof: It was further voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town, the balance of the cost of said vehicle, not to exceed ten thousand

(\$10,000) dollars, by the issue of serial notes, and to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof. (This Article had been approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 12. Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take the following action with respect to the recommendations made by Morgenroth and Associates in their "Report of Proposed Interceptors, Sewer Extensions and Sewage Treatment Facilities for the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire."
- A. In the event the Town of Allenstown shall vote at its 1964 Annual Meeting to join the Town of Pembroke in the joint use of a sewage treatment plant for the two Towns, to proceed with plans for sewerage facilities for the Town on the basis of such joint sewage treatment plant, as contained in alternate *3 in the said Morgenroth Report: and to conduct such negotiations, make such agreements with the Town of Allenstown and procure such options on land as shall be necessary for this purpose.
- B. In the event the Town of Allenstown shall vote not to join with Pembroke as provided in (A) above, to proceed with plans for sewerage facilities for the Town on the basis of a conventional sewage treatment plant for this Town alone, as contained in Alternate *I in the said Morgenroth Report: And to procure such options on land as shall be necessary for this purpose.
- 13. Voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else shall be required for an advance in an amount not to exceed forty-six thousand (\$46,000) dollars, to be made by the United States to the Town of Pembroke to finance the cost of engineering, surveying, design and plans for construction drawings and specifications for sewers, interceptors, sewage disposal facilities and appurtenant works as laid out in the "Report of the Proposed Interceptors, Sewer Extensions and Sewage Treatment Facilities for the Town of Pembroke, New Hampshire," and to furnish the United States with such other documents and information and to take such other action as may be required for this purpose.

(This Article was approved by the Budget Committee.)

14. Voted to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to make necessary repairs and improvements to its well field and pumping equipment and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum of money, not to exceed sixty thousand (\$60,000) dollars for this purpose, by the issue of bonds or serial notes as provided in R.S.A. 33 and to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof.

(This Article was approved by the Budget Committee.)

15. Voted to discontinue that section of the old 8th Range Road extending from its intersection with the present 8th range road to the center of the Old

Soucook River Bridge which is no longer in use, due to the construction of the the Whittemore Bridge just South thereof.

- 16. Voted to dismiss Article 16. Whereby the selection of the Road Agent would be by appointment of the Board of Selectmen, rather than by election of the Annual Town Meeting.
- 17. Voted to accept the provisions of R.S.A. 80-52 A authorizing prepayment of taxes by payments in sums of not less than ten dollars (\$10) or in any sum divisible by ten dollars (\$10).
- 18. Article 18 was amended and it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred (\$300.) to be donated as follows:

\$100. Notre Dame Hospital

100. Concord Hospital

75. Elliott Hospital

25. Sacred Heart Hospital

19. Voted, as amended "to include Road Agent" to have the financial books and records of the Selectmen, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, Fire Department, and Treasurer audited by the Auditors of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission instead of our local Auditors, at a cost to the Town of two hundred and fifty (\$250.) dollars and the amount was appropriated. The Article took effect upon passage and shall remain in force until rescinded.

(This Article was approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 20. Reports of Auditors, Agents and Committees and of Officers heretofore chosen were accepted as given.
- 21. Additional business prior to conclusion of the meeting:
 - (A) There was a tribute to and a moment of silence for Frank Petit led by Charles Whittemore.
 - (B) The Moderator, Gedeon N. Petit, Jr. spoke on the effort, cooperation, and progress of the Supervisors of the Checklist.
 - (C) Gedeon N. Petit, Jr., Moderator, praised Pembroke Representatives to the General Court: Joseph Robinson and Robert Plourde for having attained 100% attendance at the last session of the General Court.
 - (D) Mr. Henry Munroe expressed the feelings of the people of Pembroke-for the fine way in which Moderator Petit conducts the Town Meeting.

There being no further business to come before said meeting, upon motion duly made to the Moderator, the Town Meeting of March 10, 1964 was declared adjourned at 9:10 P. M.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

To the Board of Selectmen and citizens of Pembroke:

This past year was potentially the most dangerous fire-wise in past memory. For the second year in a row the state went through a disastrous drought. As the season progressed, this department was called upon to combat a series of deliberately set fires. Each one a potential conflagration. Due to the dry ground the cost of controlling these fires was high because of the depth to which they burned.

While woods fires in the state averaged one acre, ours averaged five and one-half acres. Why did a town such as ours, with a well equipped and highly trained department, have such large fires? IncIndIarism! From investigation it appears that not only were most of our woods fires set, but several of our building fires were of a suspicious nature. I bring this serious matter to your attention with the hope that should this person or persons continue to set tires in 1965 our citizens will be alert to report any suspicious activity.

You will note from the fire-alarm figures enclosed that with ninety-two alarms this has been our busiest year in history. As Pembroke continues to grow and expand, we must expect the incidence of fire to increase. I should like to bring to the attention of our citizens that prior to making any installation of oll-burning equipment a permit must be secured from the Fire Chief.

As usual this department has continued its modernization program. This year we have concentrated on the fire-alarm system. The old system installed after the turn of the century was no longer adequate. It has been replaced with a modern transistorized system capable of handling our needs for many years to come. New wire has been run to Pembroke Academy with plans to reach the grammar school on Pembroke Hill this year. Future plans see fire alarm boxes up to Route 106 with branch lines extending into populated side districts.

Looking to the future we must soon retire our 1940 pumper. This truck, the oldest in the station, is in constant need of repair.

Pembroke is very fortunate in the makeup of its Fire Department. In the spirit so well stated by the late President Kennedy, who urged the nation to

serve instead of being served, the men of this department give faithfully of their time and effort to the protection of this town.

In closing I should like to thank the citizens of Pembroke for their splendid cooperation during this past trying year. So many volunteered their services in so many ways it is impossible to single out any one.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

To the Board of Selectmen and citizens of Pembroke:

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1953 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy – both industrial and recreational – is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area – 4,350,000 acres – is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with macthes; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

REMEMBER that prior to any burning a permit must be secured from the Fire Warden.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

By comparing the 1963 report with that of 1964, we found that there has been an increase in complaints received by the Department, from 468 in 1963 to 782 in 1964. This seems to correspond to the continuing trend — statewide and national — In this regard. An increase in juvenile problems has occurred but I have found cooperation from most of our young people.

Approximately 20,548 miles were traveled altogether, on patrol and In answering complaints, with the cruiser, not counting the use of the officers private cars when answering calls on off duty hours.


During the year, police officers donated their labor and redecorated Police Headquarters. Furniture for an additional office was donated to the Department, as were the new outside signs and lights.

It would appear from the above table that we have reached a plateau In school enrollments. Our school census would also Indicate no unusual growth in the next few years when compared with previous years. Thus, one would think, we can breathe easier. There are two factors which may change this. We have three sections of each grade in the lower grades, which is fine. As pupils ascend the grade level ladder, we must decide whether to continue three sections or drop back to two. With two sections, we would have some awkward numbers, in the 70's. Obviously, a few more here would necessitate three sections, which is educationally desirable anyway. With three sections continued, we are going to run out of classrooms again.

State Foundation Aid for the current year is \$63,336.23, compared to \$10,153 in 1960-61, a very significant increase. Sweepstakes fund Is \$17,767.62, with \$12,834.48 earmarked for tax reduction, and \$4,933.14 "unencumbered balance" at the moment. This makes over \$87,000 in state aid of one kind or another (building aid included). This is a significant amount, but with increasing costs even more state funds are necessary to maintain a stabilized tax rate.

Massachusetts passed a \$5,000 minimum salary last year. Don't think that New Hampshire teachers don't know this. Some of us are hoping to hire beginning teachers at \$4,500, but it may be difficult. The New Hampshire General Court will take action on a \$5,000 minimum and a salary schedule.

The estimated state average cost of high school education for 65-66 is \$489. The tuition rate at the Academy has been set at \$485. The Concord rate will be \$575.

In spite of its rapid growth and necessary costs, Pembroke has been able to offer a sound educational program, with capable and dedicated staff and leadership. At this time, we wish to thank the people of Pembroke for making this possible and can only hope for your continued understanding.

Here we estimate the enrollment will be considerably larger in the Freshmen class necessitating another teacher in that area where classes are full this year.

You will note that the numbers remain fairly constant for three years (223, 227, 222) and then go up about 20 to 242, 240, 236. Then the number jumps again another 30 per year for two years.

This seems to indicate a present level for Pembroke Academy of 480 "plus" pupils for the next three years.

Our present facilities can care for this number with plans for enlarging departments in Home Economics and Industrial Arts as well as more room for Art and Music.

GUIDANCE

Our new Guidance Counselor is Mr. James Raymond who came to us well equipped educationally and with a good varied background of Business, teaching and service in the Air Force as a pilot.

He has three children two of whom are attending Pembroke Academy.

He plans and administers the testing program for the school. He interviews and helps plan the courses for all students for their four years. He assists students in finding the right post secondary schools and helps them make their applications. He also finds time to help those having academic problems by adjusting courses or changing schedules. His office is always open.

SCHOLARSHIP

Pembroke Academy is attempting to help every student work at his level best. Classes are divided into three levels of ability in such courses as English and Civics. Students may be moved from a fast to a slow division or vice versa as their work indicates a need. College preparatory classes are, as a rule, in a group by themselves. Students may move from one curriculum to another with approval of the parent, the teacher, and the guidance counselor.

Evidence of our scholastic preparation is shown in the fact that our students have entered such colleges as M. I. T., Dartmouth, and Mt. Holyoke, as well as U. N. H., U. of Maine, Plymouth State College and Keene State College.

ALUMNI

The class of 1964 sent about 20% to four year colleges as shown as follows: Eight to the University of New Hampshire, two to Keene State College, two to St. Anselms, two to New England College, and one each to Mt. Holyoke, West Virginia Wesleyan, and Gordon College.

Five are attending the New Hampshire College of Accounting and Commerce, one is in Dean Junior College, one in Chandler School, one in Concord Commercial College and one in New Hampshire Technical Institute.

Five are training for nursing, thirty-two are employed; ten are in the Armed Services; and three are housewives.

Many activities are engaged in by our students. All activities are supervised by teachers as follows:

ATHLETICS

Under the coaching of former P. A. student Ronald Rush '59, our Soccer

team was most successful for they won the Central N. H. I. League Champion-ship. All home games were played on our new field adjacent to the school. At times it looked like the dust bowl and it was difficult to follow the ploy but with a year to grow our grass should be better next Fall.

We expect to use out new Baseball field this Spring also.

Our basketball season has been a good one this year and to date we have won 6 and lost 8 games.

The girls basketball team has won 7 and lost 2 so far this year.

Twenty five boys were on the soccer squad, thirty-five boys are on the basketball squad and 18 girls on the girls basketball squad – a total of 78 participants.

TEACHERS

We were able to retain most of our teachers. We lost Andrew Phelps to Franklin High School, Miss Mary Staniels to Winnacunnett High School, and Mr. Randolph Guyette to Massachusetts.

We added Mr. James Raymond - Guidance, Mr. Leon Frechette - Industrial Arts, Mr. Ronald Rush - Industrial Arts, and Mrs. Elizabeth Davidson - English.

Our estimate for next year indicates a need for one more teacher in a Math and Science combination freshman year. If our Home Economics continues to grow we will need a second teacher in that area.

We were able to give all our teachers a substantial raise last year and expect to do the same this year.

Our school year will be 185 days next year and teachers are being reimbursed for the extra time in the salaries for next year.

CONCLUSION

Pembroke Academy is beginning to show a stability in its faculty which augers well for its scholastic standards.

The cooperation of students, parents, and faculty has been excellent this year. The attendance of parents at our three Open House evenings has been very stimulating.

The cooperation of the Trustees in providing needed facilities and equipment has been most appreciated.

Being Headmaster of Pembroke Academy continues to be a delightful experience.

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
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BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

The vote of the Town authorizing the Board of Water Commissioners to make necessary repairs and improvements to Its well field and pumping equipment resulted in the addition of a new 18" gravel packed well with a capacity of nearly one million gallons of water per day. The well In our 2 pumphouse was completely reconditioned by the R. E. Chapman Co. of Clinton, Massachusetts, and was equipped with a new motor.

Because of the drought condition of the past years your Board of Commissioners deemed it advisable to retain the engineering firm of Camp, Dresser and McKee to carry out ground water explorations should it prove necessary in the future to put In an additional well. These tests are In process.

Your Board of Commissioners is looking into the possibility of Installing water meters for all water takers. It is felt that meters would result in a 40% savings in water consumption. In anticipation of meters a notice was sent advising all contractors and sub-contractors in the area that meter horns must be installed during construction of any building where water service is required.

On December 30, 1964 because of ill health the resignation of Supertendent William R. LeClair was accepted. A sincere thank you to Mr. LeClair for his devoted and faithful service to the department.


