


## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of Highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the oiling of streets.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for state aid construction, or town maintenance in cooperation with the state.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for expense of the District Nurse.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Emily Balch Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Band Concerts during the summer of 1941 by the Plymouth Community Band.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Plymouth Common.
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for issuance of printed matter in cooperation with other towns of the Lakes Region.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to establish and maintain suitable coasting and skating places in the town.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the control of White Pine Blister in cooperation with the state.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the construction of sidewalks.
17. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
18. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
20. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a municipal airport and what sum the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the same.
22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road which was laid out March 21, 1803, by the selectmen of Plymouth, recorded in Plymouth Town Records and accepted at Town Meeting held April 11, 1803, beginning at what was known as Coffrin's Ferry on the Pemigewasset River and extending Westwardly about eighteen (18) rods to North Main Street in the town of Plymouth.

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to issue and distribute circulars and other written and printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town.
24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

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### Wells and Water Supply

In the years up to 1938 the supply of water from wells on the water-shed which drains into the Reservoirs had produced from 60,000 to 70,000 gallons per day, making a total from the natural supply about 25,000,000 gallons per year without pumping.

The hurricane of 1938 destroyed the timber on this water-shed reducing the supply to about one-third of the former amounts and the quality of this water in the summertime was so poor that we were obliged to cut off this supply entirely which necessitated pumping all the water for the District from the Peg Mill well.

When we commenced to do this more trouble developed as it was found that the well could not supply the amount of water needed for almost constant pumping, which has to be done during the summer months, when the largest amount of water is used.

The Deisel engine at right speed pumps about 250 gallons per minute but as the well will not produce this amount for constant pumping it was necessary to set the pump for about 200 gallons per minute and so far we have had no trouble. What happens next summer remains to be seen.

For the past year we have been confronted with a rusty condition of the water, much more so than ever before but with assistance from the State Board of Health find that the Peg-mill well water contains more acid than previously (the reason for this we do not know and the State Board of Health admit that they do not know) but this condition is not unhealthy as shown by the State Board's analysis and samples of water are taken by them at regular periods: this condition however causes your water pipes and fixtures to show signs of rust and even brass pipes at the joints and fittings show the effect. However, with recom-

mendations from the State Board of Health we are now installing a machine that will overcome the greater part of this trouble.

The usual program of health inspection, weighing and instruction has been carried on through the school year with clinics to facilitate the correction of defects.

A Dental Clinic was conducted weekly from November through February for children from Plymouth and surrounding towns at which 53 Plymouth children were treated.

Four Tonsil Clinics were held at the Memorial hospital in June.

Examination and glasses were given to 7 children by the State Sight Conservation Department.

Milk was furnished by the Woman's Club to children needing it and many underweights and Tuberculosis contact attended the Chest Clinics. Skin tests and x-rays were given those when necessary for diagnosis.

All children above the second grade through two years of high school were tested by the audiometer for defective hearing.

319 school calls, 290 home calls and 167 business calls were made.

At the beginning of the school year 1940, the health inspection was again made.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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The fourth report of the Superintendent of Schools is herewith submitted and makes a part of the report of the School Board of the Plymouth Town School District.

### High School

The Headmaster's report has the full endorsement of the Superintendent of Schools. The Plymouth High School is approved by the State Board of Education and is fully accredited to certify students to the University of New Hampshire and a number of the best colleges in the country. Since the last report of this series there have been numerous changes in the teaching staff of the district. While the administration of the school often regrets the departure of excellent teachers, there are some compensating features in the entrance of other teachers with new backgrounds of education and experience.

It is the recommendation of the writer that two years of Spanish be offered. A teacher of foreign languages can handle both French and Spanish, as some of the present classes are small and can be combined. As one follows rapid current events it seems that social, economic, and political contacts are going to point southward. The study of Spanish is not only a question of personal success, but of national policy and hemispheric solidarity. The Federal Government is cultivating political and economic cooperation with nations below the border. It is fair to assume that there will be many opportunities, not only for those who wish to go to those countries as engineers, salesmen, clerks, etc., but for many at home for positions in foreign commerce. The Spanish language is not without its charming literature and poetry. A survey of languages shows a decrease in French and German and an increase in Spanish.

We are advised that the domestic arts teacher should devote her entire time to that department, owing to the increased size of the school. At present

she teaches biology. The school imperatively needs another teacher. The enrollment of the school has increased greatly, but the number of teachers has remained static. Another man could teach manual training, biology, and supervise the winter sports, which now have a place in our winter life.

The district has within the last two years solved important problems in its elementary schools and should now direct its attention to the high school. The academic and commercial courses are very satisfactory, but they do not fit the needs of a considerable number of the students. I believe that a careful survey should be made of the possibility of an agricultural course to be offered in the Model School Building. This would meet the needs and interests of boys on farms and rural homes. Manual training is an important part of this course and could be elected even by those not interested in agriculture. The building should for the present remain in the hands of the school district.

### Grade School

Since the last report of this series the Lower Intervale, Baker River, and Turnpike schools have been closed and the scholars transported to the Grade School Building. The Sargent school is the only rural school now in the district. The Plymouth Teachers College has appointed two new teachers to replace those leaving last June. They are Edna B. Little of the third grade and Dorothy McGeoch of the fifth grade. Rachel Hinkley is an additional teacher of the newly organized unclassified room. The school has a very able teaching staff. Although the schools of the district did not escape the epidemic of influenza at no time did it appear expedient to close, as in many places.

An examination of "The Plymouth Reporter" edited monthly by the students of the Grade school, besides being a very creditable paper, gives an excellent picture of the numerous activities of the school outside the routine fundamental work. The students of the school gave "The Perfect Gift" at Christmas. The verse choir which participated in the drama consisted of about fifty people and the singing choir

which was backstage about twenty more. A large number of children took part in the processional and recessional. The children have had the opportunity of visual education by moving pictures as well as humorous amusement. A library of all new books has been started and there is excellent cooperation with the town library. The Auditorium is used for supervised play and tournaments. There are other pupils activities all serving to build up character and health.

### **Laboratory Room**

The laboratory room is under the direction of Rachel Hinkley and serves two distinct purposes. During the morning approximately twenty-six children come to this room for special help in arithmetic, reading and spelling. They are children who have difficulty in these subjects and need special instruction, sometimes only temporarily. Children who have been out sick or come in late may do rapid work at their own speed and resume their places in their own grades. All children in the laboratory keep their school grade. There are instances of marked improvement in scholarship since fall in this room.

In the afternoon many other children have the opportunity to use the laboratory for projects requiring more room than the ordinary classroom affords. The work of art with easels gives an opportunity for creative expression. The project of the town of Plymouth where the various buildings were represented is an example of this sort of thing, besides modeling soap, clay, and very simple manual arts. Every effort is made to supplement the class room with this laboratory work and there is constant contact between the laboratory teacher and teachers of the pupils coming to her. Miss Hinkley is doing an outstanding piece of work.

### **Kindergarten**

The School Board started a Kindergarten in the fall financing it out of current funds. Priscilla Emerson of this town, a graduate of the Leslie School of Boston, is in charge of the school. She is hired by

the district and under the supervision of the Teachers College.

The total enrollment is thirty-six but outside of the epidemic the average attendance is approximately twenty-five. Miss Emerson is especially trained for this kind of instruction and has organized and conducts a successful school. Those advocating kindergartens generally set forth the greater "reading readiness" and development of desirable social traits as objectives reached in this pre-first grade type of education.

Reports show that in this state kindergarten membership dropped from 1776 in 1926 to 928 in 1940, but it is fair to assume that this was in considerable measure due to economy rather than disparagement of kindergartens. It would appear that kindergartens are desirable, but not necessary.

#### **Adult Education Classes**

The W. P. A. Adult Education Classes have continued this year under the instruction of Mrs. Velna Hatch. Courses in Shorthand, Typewriting, Accounting and Business Arithmetic are offered. The average membership has been thirty-two. During the year considerable clerical work has been done for various people affording practical experience for the students.

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report as the Headmaster of Plymouth High School.

The graduation exercises were held in the New Auditorium on Tuesday, June 18, at 10:00 A. M. Superintendent Allan M. McCurdy in behalf of the Plymouth School Board presented diplomas to a class of sixty.

It certainly was a great treat to be able to hold the commencement activities in a school building with such favorable conditions.

Many of the Class enrolled in post secondary institutions or continued their work as post graduates.

### Enrollment

The enrollment for the years 1940-41 has been 162 boys and 218 girls, making a total of 380. There are 213 students from outside of Plymouth. These come by train, buses, and private cars. The establishment of additional bus routes this year has not only helped the transportation problem but also has solved the difficulties of parking around the school grounds.

The number of pupils leaving school has been smaller than usual, which could have been greatly reduced if the school had been equipped with a manual training department. The girls have their domestic arts but the boys have no way of developing their manual abilities.

The cooperation of the parents is needed in every way to accomplish the desired results in the education of the boys and girls. They can insist upon regular attendance, punctuality, and a reasonable amount of home study. Many parents confer with the Headmaster concerning the ambitions, the health, and possibilities of their children; this is a great help in plotting their course. Would that many more parents would do the same thing.

### Extra Curriculum Activities

The Fifteenth Annual Prize Speaking Contest under the supervision of the English Department was held on March 7, 1940. The prizes were awarded as follows:

The scholarship teams made a good showing at the Twelfth Annual Scholarship Day which was held at the Plymouth and Keene Teachers Colleges.

### Athletics

Football, baseball, basketball, and skiing for boys; basketball for girls. Mr. Dawson and Miss Marion Collins have done the coaching in a very excellent manner and have given a large number of pupils an opportunity not only to develop playing technique but also to acquire habits of good sportsmanship. The Headmaster is duly grateful for the valuable assistance of Mr. Oliver Cole and Mr. Roger Woodman with the ski team. A regular coach is needed to make this sport more valuable to the life of the school.

### **Assemblies**

The school has been particularly fortunate in having so many interesting and worthwhile speakers during the past year. The boys and girls have been given messages which should help in their preparation for life.

The school has cooperated with the American Legion by having a salute to the flag together with the singing of a patriotic song at each assembly.

### **Recommendations**

The school still needs one more teacher. The teacher of domestic arts also teaches biology but her regular department has grown so large in the last few years that it would be wise to have her devote all the time to her own department.

### **Conclusion**
