## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Temple on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing, and make appropriations for same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways for summer period.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal and maintenance of highways for winter period.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling roads.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Road Machinery repair and maintenance.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the improvement of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$625.49 and the State will contribute \$4,169.93.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day, said sum to be handled under the auspices of the Day-Quinn-Blood Ex-Servicemens' Association.
9. To hear the report of the Fire Engineer's and to take any action relating thereto.
10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Temple Volunteer Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary funds for the purchase of a Two-Way Mobile unit for the Temple Volunteer Fire Department.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary and expenses of Police Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road by the Clara Hadley place, known as Fiske Hill Road, and to accept the road running from East Road southerly to the Fetzer Place (formerly Colburn Farm), built by the Road Agent and paid for by Maurice Stone who will furnish a deed to the Town, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$93.60 ( 1/100 of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes not exceeding the sum of \$20,000.00.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Civil Defense Organization.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be expended in cooperation with New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to be used in co-operation with the State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.

21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan ballot system for the election of Town officers required to be elected by ballot and also the Tax Collector, as allowed by sect. 73 of Chapter 59 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated (1955) as amended, or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to change the hour of holding the annual Town Meeting, or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To vote on the question of amending existing regulations respecting the supervision of cemeteries of the Town of Temple, by adoption of the following:

Voted, that all rules and regulations heretofore passed and adopted by the Town of Temple, N. H. at any regular or Special Town Meeting, with respect to the care and maintenance of cemeteries of the Town be and the same are hereby rescinded and that the following statement of the 'Duties of Cemetery Trustees' and "Rules and Regulations" for the guidance of the Cemetery Trustees be and the same are hereby approved and adopted.

### Cemetery Trustees

The Board of Trustees of Cemeteries of the Town of Temple, shall consist of three members, one of who shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen, one to be a member of the Trustees of Trust Funds, (these two members to be appointed by their respective Boards) and the third member to be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Town Meeting.

The Cemetery Trustees shall have charge of all cemetery work and they are authorized to expend such sums of money as become available for the care and improvement of the Cemeteries of the Town.

They shall establish such rules and regulations as are, reasonable and necessary, for each and all Cemeteries of the Town, and such rules and regulations shall become effective and binding after being presented to, and approved by any regular or Special Town Meeting.

All monies for care and maintenance of Cemeteries shall be paid into the Town Treasury. All expenditures shall be made from the Town Treasury after approval by the Cemetery Trustees.

### Rules and Regulations

1. In order to maintain as near the natural grade as possible, all gradelines will be established by the Cemetery Trustees.
2. All monuments and markers shall be located and set subject to approval of Cemetery Trustees.
3. **Charge for Miller Cemetery Lots.** Single lots may be assigned by the Cemetery Trustees to legal residents of the Town at no charge. For each additional lot requested and assigned a charge of \$10.00 will be made, payable to the Town at time of assignment.



4. **Interments.** All interments shall be made under the direction of Cemetery Trustees and the following fees shall be paid:  
Summer Fee, Regular \$30.00  
Winter Fee, Regular \$40.00

5. **Provision for care of Cemetery Lots.** Residents who have made no provision for perpetual care of their lots, may, through the Cemetery Trustees, arrange for such care by depositing with the Trustees of Trust Funds (Cemetery Lots Perpetual Care Fund) the sum of \$100.00 for each lot to be cared for.

Where perpetual care has not been provided, arrangements may be made through the Cemetery Trustees for annual care. This will be accomplished by payment to the Town Treasurer, on or before April 1 of each year, the sum of \$4.00 for each lot to be cared for. For record purposes the Town Treasurer will issue a receipt for each payment and send a copy to the Cemetery Trustees for their information and guidance.

6. **Non-Residents.** Non-residents who own property in Temple may be assigned a lot in Miller Cemetery upon payment of \$50.00 to the Town of Temple for the lot plus a payment of \$100.00 to the Trustees of Trust Funds for Perpetual Care of said lot.

Non-residents owning no property in Temple may, upon request to the Trustees, be considered for the assignment of a lot in Miller Cemetery upon payment of \$200.00 to the Town of Temple for the Lot plus a payment of \$100.00 to the Trustees of Trust Funds for perpetual care of said lot.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing a certain tract of land adjoining the present Town Barn, or take any other action relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to take any action relative to the plowing of private driveways.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of building a new Town Barn; Said sum to be obtained by the issuance of serial bonds or notes in accordance with the terms of chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated (1955) as amended, which serial bonds or notes shall be paid off over a five year period, or take any other action relating thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing new road equipment or take any other action relating thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for road machinery.

29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.

30. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

31. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

32. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

33. To transact any further business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mansfield Public Library would like to pay tribute to the late Mrs. Carolyn B. Hill, noted author of many children's books, and winner of the Newbury Award in 1947. She was a resident of this town for many years and a constant support to our library. The library received \$20.00 from Mrs. Eula J. Davies, librarian at Southern Connecticut State College, in memory of Mrs. Hill, and her friend Mrs. Helen Fay, sent ten new children's books in her honor.

We gained by gifts or purchase 163 new books, 93 adult's and 70 children's. Our gift books this year were contributed by: Mrs. Marjorie Bowen, Mrs. Mary Walker, & Mrs. Charles Randall, Mrs. Rickland, Patricia Holt, Florence Davidson, Mrs. Priscilla Weston, Mr. Seth Baraclough, Mrs. Alice Donald, and Mrs. Alberta Hagar. Mr. & Mrs. Harry Stratton have again given the much appreciated gift subscription of the American Heritage magazine, and Mrs. Ruth Quinn the magazine Country Beautiful.

Circulation of books this year was 3998. Adult Non Fiction circulated 479 books and 669 Fiction, while Children's were 624 Non Fiction and 2226 books of Fiction.

The library held a program in observance of National Library Week, with the assistance of the 7th and 8th grade teacher Mrs. Jeannette Collins. The school children gave talks on our New Hampshire authors, book reviews, poetry and readings. Also an excellent original puppet show was done by Kristen and Jon Pearson. The librarian had a large exhibit of books displayed with the wonderful posters done by the children, and the evening closed with refreshments served by the trustees.

There has been eight book displays in the library this year. One with the teacher Mr. Letourneau, coordinating library books with the new readers for the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades. ## CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

To the Citizens of Temple:

Civil Defense, at the present time, is a matter of each home being self-sufficient for an indefinite period of time. The question of a shelter is still a matter of family concern inasmuch as Temple has no buildings suitable for public shelter. Shelter for the individual, in my opinion, comes within the public domain. That is, the local, state and federal governments should be building shelters on a cooperative basis.

There has been some work done under the Army Engineers to designate certain buildings as public shelters. However, some of the buildings are of dubious value as fall-out shelters. To be truly effective, any device used as a shelter should be built and equipped as a shelter and then, for reasons of economy, it could be used for other purposes. This might be municipal offices, public hall, etc.

Until such time as this action is taken, the individual will have to be as self-sufficient as possible.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

To the Citizens of Temple:

At the 1962 Annual Meeting, the Town voted a sum of money for the purpose of converting a surplus military vehicle to Fire Department use. Three builders were asked to bid on this work and it was awarded to the Moody Company of Nashua. The Fire Engineers and Department Officers feel that the materials and workmanship were of the highest order. Without exception, this truck has won the approval of other fire service officials, both State and Municipal, who have seen it. That we were able to stay so closely to the sum appropriated can be accredited to the devotion and hard work of Department Officers and especially Carl Hedman and Charles Willard.

In this year's Warrant, there is an article relating to the Town employing a private answering service for emergency calls. Wilton and Lyndeborough have used this service for several years and have found it to be very satisfactory. The sum asked for this service is small and would be a worthwhile expenditure.

We had two house fires this year; both houses were totally destroyed. In each instance the fire had gained a great deal of headway before being discovered. One fire was of incendiary origin and with an assist from the Greenville Police Department, Chief Harling was able to take two juveniles and an older boy into court and obtain judgments against them.

We had no requests for Mutual Aid during 1962 and on only one occasion did Temple call for Mutual Aid Assistance. This was at the Pearson fire and both Wilton Fire and Police departments responded and did their usual excellent job.

Thanks to the efforts of many townspeople, the Fire House was painted on Town Improvement Day. It should receive another coat this year to complete the job.

Items that should be purchased within the next few years are: a warning device, two-way radio in at least one of the trucks, and a tone-activated radio receiver in the fire station and in the homes of at least two of the key men in the Department. We were fortunate in getting the new truck at a very low price and with the proper diligence on the part of Department Officials we could do the same on at least some of the items mentioned above.

Missing from last year's Town Report was the annual statement from the Department Treasurer. At the annual meeting Mr. Mervin Willard informed us that he had misplaced the financial records, a town check for \$161.65 and a sum of cash, (\$90.00 from the Fourth of July Fund and \$20.00-\$30.00 of Department funds). Failing to find these items, Mr. Willard has since made reimbursement for \$150.00.

It has been suggested to the Selectmen that they stop payment on the original check from the town and issue a new one but to date this has not been done.

## PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Temple, I respectfully submit my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

### Staff and Instruction

The Temple School opened this year with two changes in staff. Mr. John Letourneau of Jaffrey, New Hampshire, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College with one year of teaching experience in Chesterfield, New Hampshire, was hired to teach grades four, five and six. Mrs. Florence Stiff of Nashua, New Hampshire was hired to replace Miss Ethelyn Edwards as Music Supervisor. This staff is working together very satisfactorily and excellent results are being achieved with the children of the school.

Two areas of instruction are being given considerable emphasis this year. The first is in the area of reading where a highly phonetic system called the Spalding System is being tried out in most of the towns of the Supervisory Union. The system requires the children learn all the ways in which the common sounds of the English language can be spelled and learn the rules for these spellings. As the children learn these spellings, they learn how to spell most words by the sounds and the use of spelling rules. Finally, this system requires that words be written as they are sounded and spelled, adding a third phase of writing to the overall program. It is definitely felt that the incorporation of this system into the school program during the coming school year will result in much better reading ability on the part of children.

Parents of first grade children should understand that before children read in this grade, they spend a lot of time learning the spellings of English language sounds. This means that they will not be as advanced in their reading during the first half of the year as they might with the traditional type of reading program. However, it is fully expected that by the end of the first year and each year thereafter, that they will be reading at a higher level with more understanding and more word solving skills, than they would have under the more traditional type reading system.

A second area of instruction being given considerable emphasis this year and which will continue to be emphasized in the future is in the area of mathematics. Books which are being used as a guide at the first and second grade level provide the teacher with a more modern approach to the entire subject of mathematics. This program will eventually be expanded to all grade levels. During the coming year it is expected that most publishing companies will have material available at the third and fourth grade levels. The

purpose of the modern math program is to tie together mathematics from grade one through twelve. This means that at the lower grade levels, basic concepts which are within the level of the ability of the youngsters will be presented in a simple fashion. If this is continued through each grade level, ultimately many of the basic concepts once first introduced at the high school level will have already been a part of the high school youngsters' background upon entrance. This will mean that it will be possible to spend less time in high school in the more traditional type of math program and more time in preparing children for the rigid requirements of college mathematics. This also means that non-college students who usually have not spent a great deal of their time in the mathematics area will be better prepared in basic math concepts and this will better prepare them for the kind of mathematical world which they are going to live in.

### **Building and Grounds**

Due to the well established program of doing some painting and maintenance within or outside of the building each year, the same amount of money only needs to be raised to continue this regular pattern. Provision has been made within the present school budget for some painting within the building and also some minor renovation of space within the building. The renovation revolves about the present supply room and teacher room areas where slight modifications are going to be made to better utilize these two spaces within the building. The proper painting of the fence which was erected by the children is too much for the youngsters to maintain alone and, therefore, some amount of money is being provided to make sure that this needed painting is done during the coming summer season.

### **Finance**

There are two primary areas of increase in the 1963-64 budget. The first lies in the area of Teachers' Salaries where an increase of approximately \$500. is reflected. This amount of money is necessary for increases in order to increase pay of teachers on a level which is comparable with those increases being offered in the immediate area and in the State in general. The average salary of teachers in Temple this year is some \$800. below the average elementary classroom teacher's salary in the State of New Hampshire. In spite of this fact, the quality of instruction is high. This means that for the amount of money being spent in this most vital area of the overall school program, Temple is receiving an excellent return on the money being expended.

The second area of increase lies in the area of Tuitions where an increase of approximately \$2300. is shown. This increase is due to an increase in the numbers of youngsters that are attending high school and also an increase of approximately \$10. per pupil for those youngsters going to the Peterborough High School.

These two increases make up practically all of the increase in this year's total amount required to meet the School Board's Budget \$45,592.92 over that which is currently being operated with, \$42,554.22. An estimated balance as of June 1963 of \$1,000. and an increase in Foundation Aid to \$4700. together provide for an overall estimate of approximately \$6700. in income to the district for the coming school year. This means that the total assessment required to meet the School Board's Budget is \$38,892.92 an increase of approximately \$859.85 over the present year's assessment.

### Conclusion

The cooperation which exists between the Temple School Board, school staff and the citizens of the town have made possible a very fine educational program for the children of Temple. The continuation of this spirit of cooperation, interest and helpfulness on the part of all groups will help to insure the continuation of the best kind of educational program for the children of the community.
