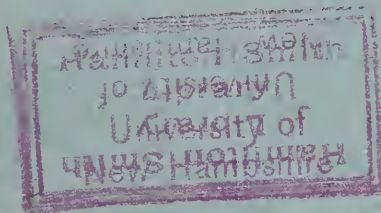

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, on the twelfth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Slectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the year ensuing, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, and two auditors for the year ensuing.

2. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and the Republican parties to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice president of the United States.

3. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the School and Parsonage Fund interest for the year ensuing.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the year ensuing.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 and appropriate the same for the use of Laconia Hospital Association.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the care of Cemeteries.

7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$229.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in co-operation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151.71 to procure Town Road Aid from the State. The State to contribute the sum of \$606.82.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

11. To see if the Town will allow a discount on early paid taxes.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents for the past year.

14. To choose any other officers or agents for the year ensuing.

15. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

This group numbered thirty-seven. This was the largest group of local students to graduate in any Tilton School class. Both honors of the class for high scholastic attainment were won by members of this group. The first honor was awarded to Parker Mitton, and the second honor to Arlene Carter.

For more than ninety years Tilton School has furnished high school privileges to the boys and girls of this community, and for the last twenty years it has been definitely our high school. In each graduating class there has been a group of local boys and girls. There will not be another such group.

The severing of these happy relations of so long standing is no small thing. There is great satisfaction, however, in knowing that the parting is in a spirit of mutual good will. We all wish for Tilton School and Tilton Junior College continued prosperity and larger usefulness.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

During the year the children of Lochmere, Oak Hill and Union Schools have been inspected twice by Dr. Huckins assisted by the nurse, and the children of the new Junior and Senior High School have been inspected once. The nurse has tested the vision of 574 children and they have all been weighed and measured. Parents have been notified of all defects that were found and a record has been kept of them in the various schools. In general it would seem that there have been fewer cases of communicable diseases than usual and there have been no real epidemics.

Thanks to the funds contributed by the local chapter of the American Red Cross, the Rotary Club and the Tilton Trust Fund, and to the direct relief agencies, it has been possible to have 11 tonsillectomies done and to have the eyes of 15 children examined and fitted to glasses.

The school nurse is deeply appreciative of the cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, the Board of Education, the staff of teachers and of the parents of the children.

HIGH SCHOOL

Unforeseen delays in construction made it impossible to occupy the building as early as had been anticipated. School opened Monday, September 25. In spite of the lack of equipment, preparation had been so carefully made by the Headmaster that there was little friction and little confusion during the opening days. TEACHERS

Mrs. Ethel S. Worthen, who for more than thirty years had charge of the vocal music in the public schools in this community, completed her work in June. This long period of faithful and deeply interested service was a real and lasting contribution to the life of this community.

Miss Ruth F. Sawyer of Webster succeeded Mrs. Worthen. Miss Sawyer is a graduate of Carlton College, majoring in music, and had two years experience in public school music work in Minnesota. She has charge of the vocal and instrumental music in both the elementary school and the high school. Miss Sawyer is also a member of the high school faculty.

In the selection of Mr. Willard H. Smith for headmaster of the high school the school board chose wisely. Mr. Smith is a graduate of Dartmouth College and has a Master's Degree from the University of New Hampshire. For four years he was a member of the faculty of the Laconia High School, and served as submaster. Mr. Smith has won the high respect and confidence of the pupils, his associates in the work of the school, and the public in general.

The school board was no less fortunate in its selection of the other members of the high school faculty.

Mr. Ernest Peltonen, Submaster, is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and had been headmaster of Twin Mountain High School for several years.

Miss Alice M. Upton, also a graduate of Keene came to us from New London High School. Miss Upton has had summer school work both at Middlebury and the University of New Hampshire.

Mr. S. Gordon Smith, a graduate of Wesleyan University, was for two years a member of the faculty at Tilton School.

Miss Margaret Gibbons, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College, came to us from the Lincoln High School where she had had several years experience.

Miss Alice Solana was graduated from the Salem Teachers' College. She had been Dean of Women at Tilton School.

Mr. James Duggan was graduated from St. Anselm's College, Mr. Paul Perkins from the Keene Teachers' College, and Miss Ann Donovan from Mount St. Mary's College. These three members of the faculty were without previous teaching experience.

Miss F. Marjorie Cross, Miss Margaret Thompson, Miss Beatrice Pelletier, and Mr. Carl Johnson were transferred from the Union School to the High School.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To Channing T. Sanborn, Superintendent of Schools:

I am pleased to submit to you this report covering the first six months of Tilton-Northfield High School.

Facts covering the enrollment of our school will be found in Table I.

Table II gives an outline of our program of studies. Sufficient academic courses in science, mathematics, English, social science and foreign languages are provided so that any pupil desiring to go to college may meet the most exacting requirements of any of the major colleges or universities in the country. It is intended that such pupils will be held rigidly to a high standard of scholarship by the faculty so that the transition from the senior class of our high school to the freshman year of college will not prove too difficult.

It is expected that only a small percentage of our graduates will go on to college. For the great majority of our pupils whose formal education will end with their high school graduation, we have provided a variety of courses in shop work, home economics and commerce. In this varied work lies the great advantage of the public high school: the ability to provide a suitable education for the non-college pupil.

Another advantage of our curriculum is the great amount of freedom allowed the pupils in choosing their courses. Only English, Civics and

United States History are required courses which all pupils must take.

Our school day consists of seven periods of classes or study periods. Each pupil has from one to three study periods per day depending on the courses he is taking, thus allowing him to prepare many of his outside assignments in school. An eighth period is provided for pupil-teacher conferences for help and make-up work, for assemblies and for extra-curricular activities.

A school library for reference and supplementary reading is being built up at one end of our large study room under the able direction of Miss Cross.

Half the school goes to lunch at 11:30 and the other half at 12:10. The lunch periods are forty minutes in length. After lunches are eaten, pupils are allowed to go outdoors or to the auditorium where, under pupil and faculty supervision, dancing and group games are enjoyed.

In our cafeteria each noon, milk and one hot dish, prepared by girls in the cooking class, are sold at cost to those pupils who desire them.

As an aid in promoting mutual understanding between faculty and pupils, a Student Council, consisting of two representatives of each class, two faculty members and the Headmaster, has been formed. Principal duties undertaken by this Council so far have been the planning of assembly programs, planning suitable programs for the lunch periods and the formation of a traffic squad.

In addition to its scholastic program, the modern high school provides a varied program of extra-curricular activities. Keeping a sane balance between the two fields of activity is a necessary administrative responsibility. Certain scholastic requirements must of necessity be established and enforced.

To be eligible to participate in extra curricular activities, a pupil in the high school must be doing passing work in at least three unit courses for the previous marking period and the previous half year. A pupil in the junior high school cannot participate in extra-curricular activities if he is failing in more than one of his courses.

Our extra-curricular activities are financed by the purchase of activities tickets by the pupils on the installment plan. The contribution of one dime a week per pupil entitles the pupil to attend all athletic and non-athletic events of the school, and to receive a copy of each issue of the school paper. A portion of this income goes into the class treasury and should eliminate the assessment of class dues. It should be added that this is an entirely voluntary plan with from 60 to 70 per cent of our student body contributing at present.

The financial accounts of all student organizations are supervised by a faculty treasurer who keeps all funds in one checking account.

Our athletic program consisted of intra-mural soft-ball for boys and girls in the fall, basketball for high school boys and girls and for junior high

school boys during the winter. In March and April interclass basketball and volley ball will be played. Boys baseball and an intra-mural program for girls will follow. The possibility of playing six-man football next fall is being considered. Our athletic program is in the capable hands of Athletic Director S. Gordon Smith and Assistant Coaches Donovan and Perkins.

For those journalistically inclined, our school paper, "The Tattler" provides valuable experience. A large staff of student editors is under the able supervision of Mr. Duggan.

Under Miss Sawyer's skillful leadership, our musical organizations are making real progress. A school orchestra and a girls glee club have been formed, and it is hoped that a mixed chorus may be added later.

Those interested in dramatics will be given an opportunity to use their talents in a recently-formed Dramatic Club. A highly successful senior play "Don't Darken My Door" was given under Miss Upton's direction. A distinct accomplishment was the manufacture of a complete set of permanent interior scenery, produced by the shop classes under the direction of Mr. Perkins and Mr. Johnson.

Many of our pupils have learned to dance on Wednesday afternoon in the social dancing classes under Miss Solana's competent instruction. A Christmas party and the Dedication Dance were two fine social events so far this year.

In closing, may I express my appreciation to you for your untiring assistance and wise leadership, to the faculty for its fine cooperation, to the pupils for their patience and helpfulness in a difficult period of transition, and to the citizens of Tilton and Northfield for making possible our excellent building and equipment.
