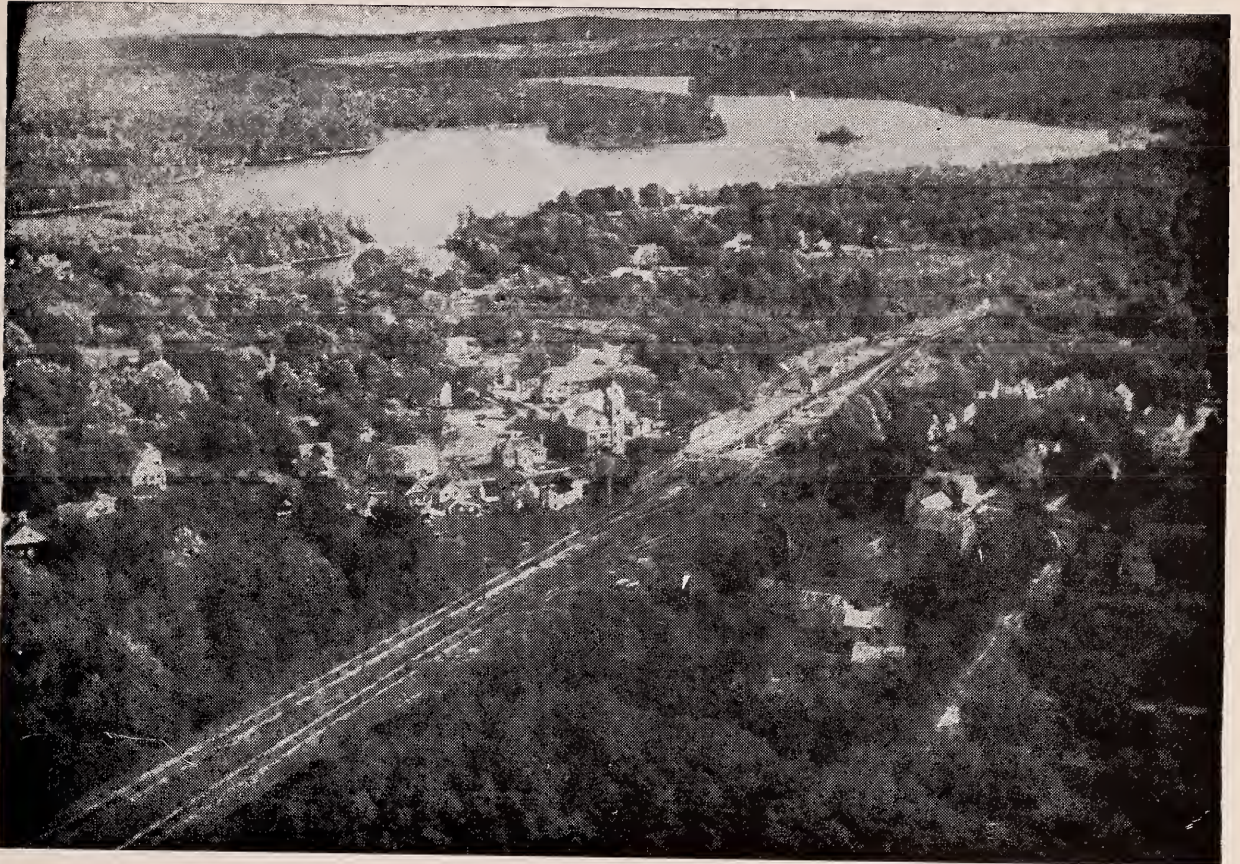

VITAL STATISTICS FOR 1955

The picture on the cover is Wakefield. The Town of Wakefield was settled in 1774 and its beautiful white church built in 1816, with its copy of a Christopher Wren spire, is perhaps one of the most photographed in the State. Many of the older inhabitants remember the stagecoach inns, now lovely homes, at Wakefield Corner.

Sanbornville, formerly Wolfeboro Junction, a village in the Town of Wakefield, was named after John W. Sanborn, one of Wakefield's famous men. The village of North Wakefield is just over the hill on the way to the White Mountains and that hill is the highest point of land on Route 16 between Boston and North Conway. To the east of North Wakefield lie East Wakefield and Woodman and these communities border Pine River Pond and Belch Pond which are well known to all fishermen.

It is no wonder that, with so many advantages bestowed by nature, people from everywhere are coming for vacations in their own camps, in the cabin colonies, and many are settling in permanent homes. Wakefield welcomes them with open arms and **certainly there is** no better shopping district for their needs than the Village of Sanbornville affords.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,622.92 to defray Town charges, as submitted by the Town Budget Committee for the ensuing year as follows:

5. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the sums of \$3880.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund, and to transfer said amount to the general fund for the purchase of new equipment, i. e., a tractor with loader.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 to oil Cemetery Road, so-called.

(By petition of 13 Voters)

This Article NOT APPROVED by Budget Committee with recommendation that the need be investigated.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1800.00 for the construction and tarring the Piper Road so-called, running from the Kimball Place to the inter-section of the Willey Road.

(By petition of 14 Voters)

This Article NOT APPROVED by Budget Committee but suggested as future T. R. A. Project.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to cut Brush along Town highways.

(By petition of 11 Voters)

This Article NOT APPROVED by Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to designate the Ballard's Ridge Road, so-called, as that section of the Town Roads which the T. R. A. Funds for the year 1956 is to be expended.

(By petition of 43 Voters)

This Article Not Recommended by the Budget Committee.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000.00 for Parks, Playgrounds and Recre-

ation. Agreeable to the petition of the Recreation Commission.

(By petition of 42 Voters)

Budget Committee Recommends \$350.00 under the Article.

11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partism Ballot system as provided in Chapters 112-125 inclusive Chapter 34 of the Revised Laws as shown on pages 50-53 inclusive New Hampshire Election and Primary Laws of 1954.

(By petition of 35 Voters)

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Proposed Ordinance as set forth by the Planning Board and Zoning Commission.

13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the appointment of the Road Agent by the Selectmen and elect the Road Agent each year by paper ballot. This Article to take effect upon its passage.

(By petition of 41 Voters)

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF WAKEFIELD, N. H.

In pursuance of authority conferred by Chapter 51, Sections 50-71, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942 as amended by Chapters 110 and 278 of the Laws of New Hampshire 1949, and as may be amended by subsequent legislation, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity, convenience or general welfare as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development of the Town of Wakefield, N. H. by securing safety from fire, by preserving the rural charm now attached to our town, the promotion of good civic design and arrangements the following zoning suggestions are offered. The suggestions are simple and few, for a zoning ordinance for any community must be workable and flexible. A zoning ordinance is a protective measure against the exception and is an aid to good, sound development.

Zoning: Scope

1. Regulate the erection, construction, re-construction, alteration and use of all structures or use of any land by the following code.

Zoning: Administration

1. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen to appoint a Zoning Board. The Zoning Board to consist of four members and one Selectman serving ex-officio.

2. The Zoning Board to meet as often as necessary, and issue building permits (printed form).

3. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen to maintain an up-to-date town map.

4. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen upon any well founded information that the zoning ordinance is being violated to take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of the ordinance by seeking an injunction

by any legal means. Conviction imposes a fine not exceeding \$5.00 per day for each day of violation.

Zoning: Enforcement

1. Without a permit it shall be unlawful to erect any building or altar the bulk of any building or relocate any building in any district.

2. Without a permit no remodeling or repairing can be done where the total cost of such work including materials exceeds \$300.00.

3. No building can be erected unless it will present a reasonable appearance and in keeping with the neighborhood.

4. No permit will be issued without a sketch showing front and side elevations and floor plan and sewage disposal, with approximate cost. Sketch to be permanently attached to Town's copy of permit. To what use the building will be put must also be stated.

5. The type and construction of all septic tanks and drainage fields or outside toilets must be approved by the Town Health Officer.

6. All requests for building permits must be in writing and become the property of the Zoning Board.

7. All temporary houses used in building operations must be removed within two years.

8. All refuse from building operations, including "slashings", must be removed.

9. Permits are issued for a six months period and shall become void unless operations are commenced within the date of approval.

10. A fee of \$1.00 shall be paid for all permits issued.

11. All monies received from permits shall be forwarded to the Town Treasurer and allocated for use in the purchase or maintenance of town signs.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Wakefield which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, which provides in part as follows:

“Audit on Motion of Commission. The Commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such audit.”

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, and the period from January 1st to October 31, 1955. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in three sections as follows:

SECTION I —Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1954
SECTION II —Period January 1st to October 31, 1955
SECTION III—Ten Year Statement of Indebtedness,
Valuation and Taxes.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the

accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets. December 31, 1953— December 31, 1954: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1953 and December 31, 1954, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Surplus decreased by \$5,-395.97 during 1954

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year 1954 is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$2,803.74, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,163.90, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,639.84.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of October 31, 1955, is indicated in Exhibit E.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes:

Table I presents a ten year statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes, covering the fiscal years of 1944 to 1954, inclusive.

It is noted that there were no outstanding long term notes or bonds at the beginning or the end of

this period. The Surplus increased from \$1,075.92 to \$19,376.86 during the period.

The assessed valuation of taxable property increased by \$714,725, or 54%, while the amount of the annual tax levy increased from \$42,842.00 to \$90,861.00, or 112%.

The local average tax rate increased from \$3.16 to \$4.42 per hundred, compared to an increase in the average tax rate for the State during this period of \$3.07 to \$4.64.

State Head Tax and Yield Tax Accounts:

It has been the practice to keep separate records for the state head tax and the yield tax accounts, with separate bank accounts being maintained for each of these funds.

The usual procedure is for both of these accounts to be handled through the general fund account and all bank deposits credited to this account. This simplifies the accounting and eliminates the necessity of maintaining two separate bank accounts in addition to the regular Town Treasurer's account.

It is recommended that this procedure be followed and that the balances of the yield tax and head tax funds be transferred to the general fund account.

Town Treasurer:

The Town Treasurer should record all tax receipts in the cash book in accordance with the report which is submitted by the Tax Collector when remittances are made, indicating the "year of levy" and type of tax, i.e. — "property", "poll", "head tax", "yield tax",

“interest” and “penalties”. Redemptions from tax sales should likewise be identified as such.

A monthly report should be made by the Treasurer to the Board of Selectmen, indicating the cash balance at the beginning and end of the month, receipts in detail and total expenditures during the month. The prescribed form should be used for this purpose.

Tax Sale Procedure:

When the town buys property at a tax sale the Collector should receive a check immediately following the sale for the total amount of taxes, interest and costs due on the property.

It has been the practice in Wakefield to wait until the end of the year before paying the Collector for the sale, at which time the Collector has been given a check in an amount representing the difference between the total tax sale and the redemptions made from the sale up to the end of the fiscal year.

A complete record of all unredeemed taxes, as of October 31, 1955, has been made up and turned over to the Collector. Each item sold, together with subsequent years' taxes paid thereon, has been listed. Future tax sales should be recorded in this manner in the “Record of Tax Sales” looseleaf book.

In this connection we believe that it is better procedure to advertise and sell property each year rather than pay the subsequent years' taxes on property on which the town has acquired a lien by virtue of a previous tax sale.

Abatements:

No abatements of taxes should be allowed by the Collector until such abatements have been duly authorized by the Board of Selectmen.

Trust Funds:

It was found that in certain cases balances of income due individual trust fund accounts were included in the general income bank account—Wolfeboro National Bank—Account Number 2412. The transfers which should be made from this account to adjust the individual income fund balances are indicated in Exhibit M-2.

Closing Accounts:

The fiscal year of the town ends on December 31st. The books and accounts of all town officers should be closed as of this date and financial reports made on this basis.

The Town Treasurer should hold her accounts open for a few days after the date on which the fiscal year closes in order that all receipts of the Tax Collector, Town Clerk or other fiscal officers of the town, up to and including December 31st, may be remitted to the Treasurer and included in her accounts for the fiscal year.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that the summary of findings and recommendations of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. If this is not done the Tax Commission, at the expense of the Town, may cause the summary to be separately published and distributed or published in a newspaper having general circulation in the Town.

The inclusion of Exhibits in the published report is optional with the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town

of Wakefield for their assistance during the course of the audit.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

DANGER FROM FIRES IN WOODLANDS

Woodland litter, when dry, is highly inflammable and fires can quickly get out of control. We request your cooperation to control all fires so that lives and property may not be endangered or destroyed, and forests be kept green to furnish the natural beauty we all enjoy and to grow timber we will need.

WHAT IS "WOODLAND"?

The term "woodland" is defined by law to include, "cut-over land, slash and such other land as bears a sufficient amount of wood growth, wood, weeds, grass or other growth as to be likely to be burned over."

When in the woods, you are expected to exercise caution in the use of fire and to remember that

IT IS UNLAWFUL TO

Throw down lighted matches, cigarettes, or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.

Burn brush, rubbish, grass or other materials when the ground is not covered with snow, without written permission from the Forest Fire Warden.

Kindle a camp or cooking fire on land of another without permission from the owner or his agent.

Leave an open fire burning unattended.

Fail to report a forest or brush fire that is out of control.

VIOLATORS ARE SUBJECT TO THESE PENALTIES

Anyone letting a fire escape from control, whether or not he has a permit to kindle the fire, is liable for the costs of extinguishing the fire.

Anyone found guilty of dropping inflammable material in or near woodland shall be fined not more than \$25.

A person failing to report an uncontrolled brush or forest fire is liable to a fine of not more than \$10.

For kindling a fire in woodland of another without permission of the owner, or for kindling any fire without a permit when a permit is required, a person may be fined not more than \$200, or imprisoned 60 days.

DAMAGES

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay to the owner all damages done by such fire.

BE SURE—GET A PERMIT

Incinerators should be tight, with a close mesh screen, and be on clean ground.

Open fireplaces used to burn rubbish are classed as incinerators.

Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent its spread.

Never burn in dry, windy weather.

Have incinerators inspected by the Forest Fire Warden and get his written permit.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Wakefield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the twentieth day of March 1956, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropria-

tion of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to transfer the Wakefield School Building and lot of land by deed to the Wakefield-Brookfield Historical Society for the sum of one dollar.

10. To see if the district will vote to adopt a teachers' salary schedule.

11. To see if the district will vote to build and equip additional rooms to the Paul School.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction, equipment, and furnishing of an addition to the Paul School a sum not to exceed seventy-five (\$75,000.00) thousand dollars; and whether the district will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, N. H. Revised Laws, Chapter 72, and any amendments thereto.

13. To see if the district will vote to appoint a building committee to be appointed by the moderator, to advise with the school board in the selection of school building plans and to assist in the supervision of con-

struction of said building, providing that the plans and specifications shall finally be approved by the school board acting alone as required by law, and to further authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction and equipping of said school.

14. To see if the district will vote to pay the transportation of high school pupils and whether the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed six thousand (\$6,500.00) five hundred dollars for the purchase of a suitable bus; and whether the district will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes and bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which such notes shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the Municipal Bonds Statute, N. H. Revised Laws, Chapter 72, and any amendments thereto.

15. If the above article is adopted to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed three thousand (\$3,500.00) five hundred dollars for the operation and maintenance of said bus.

16. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed three thousand (\$3,600.00) six hundred dollars for transportation of high school pupils by bus from Sanbornville to Rochester, and authorize the school board to execute a contract for such transportation for a period not to exceed three years.

17. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and accept

in the name of the school district for educational purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State or Federal government or any department or agency thereof, or any other source.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Wakefield:

During the year 1954-55 the teachers in the Sanbornville Schools were: — Miss Abbie F. Tuttle, grade 1; Mrs. Margaret Doe, grade 2; Mrs. Ethelyn Willett, grades 3 and 4; Mr. Charles Hemphill, Jr., grades 5 and 6; Mrs. Margaret Adams, grade 7 and 8. In the Union School were: — Mrs. Florence Gerrish, grades 1-4; and Mrs. Helen Abbott, grades 5-8. In the East Wakefield School, Mrs. Edith Horne, grades 1-8. Mr. Hemphill resigned at Christmas and was succeeded by Mrs. Mary Belliveau of Union. At the opening of the current year Mrs. Alma Gray, of New York was engaged to teach the first grade in Sanbornville, Miss Tuttle remained in the Paul School with the second grade, Mrs. Doe replaced Mrs. Willett in grades 3 and 4, and Mr. Gerard Belliveau succeeded Mrs. Adams in grades 7 and 8. Mr. Belliveau holds a Master's degree and has had several years teaching experience. The rest of the teaching staff for the district remains the same.

The total enrollment for 1954-55 was 194 pupils with an average daily membership of 184. The schools opened in September of the current year with an enrollment of 185. Of these 22 are in the eighth grade.

Wakefield high school pupils were enrolled as follows — Spaulding High School 16, Nute High School 19, Brewster Academy 4, and Dover High School 1. Enrollment for the current year is as follows: — Spaulding High School 21, Nute High School 20, Brewster Academy 4, Kennebunk High School 1. Tuition rates for the above school are respectively \$256.50, \$260.00, \$275.00, and \$321.00. Increases for 1956-57 will average about \$20.00. Of the 46 high school pupils enrolled this

year 12 are seniors. The present eighth grade will bring the total number of high school pupils in 1956-57 to about 54.

Mrs. Rebecca Sanborn, R.N., served most effectively as school nurse. At the opening of the current year this school district joined with Brookfield, Effingham, Freedom, and Madison to form a school Nurse Union with Mrs. Sanborn as school nurse for these districts. During the spring term the Salk Polio vaccine was made available to the pupils of the first two grades. Through the cooperation of several parents these pupils were transported to Wolfeboro where the two inoculations were administered on different dates. Preparations are under way to provide this vaccine to children, who have not previously received it, up to and including age fifteen. The organization and administration of this program has been made possible through the cooperation of the State Department of Health, local physicians, and the school nurses.

With the completion of the new Paul School on January 3, 1955, Miss Tuttle and 30 first grade pupils moved in. This room, with its excellent modern facilities and adequate space for learning activities provides many advantages for the pupils occupying it.

Wakefield received no state aid and none will be received this year. With the present formular for distribution and amount of state appropriation, Wakefield is not elegible for state aid.

The fine cooperation of the school board, teachers, parents, and pupils is gratefully acknowledged .
