SCHOOL REPORT.

THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE respectfully submit the following as his annual report of the schools of the town of Wolfeborough for the year ending March 1, 1883.

DISTRICT No. 1. A summer term of thirteen weeks taught by Miss S. Ada Phillips. Miss Phillips has had a long and varied experience; her success was good. The winter term of 16 weeks was under the instruction of Miss M. A. Brown; the teacher manifested a good degree of interest in the school room and the improvement was good.

DISTRICT No. 2 A marked improvement has been observable in the schools in this district during the past year. The Grammar School taught by Miss Sadie O. Mason, of Tamworth, had three terms of ten, eight and nine weeks respectively. Miss Mason brings to her aid, experience, tact, and method, and has a happy faculty of obtaining and retaining the attention and good will of her pupils in a marked degree. It seems a pleasure to them to do as she desires they should do. Promptness, close attention and order required. The number of scholars attending each term respectively, 29, 31, 31; Average attendance, 26, 28, 27. Number of pupils not absent, 11, 13, 11. Number of persons visiting, committee and others, 27, 17, 22.

THE PRIMARY DEPARTMENT was taught by Miss Hattie E. Parker. The school made fair improvement. The order was good; the teacher patient and persevering. Good progress was made in readings and spelling, and in arithmetic in a less degree. No other branches are taught in this department

The first and perhaps the most difficult thing to be acquired, is a habit of application. This the pupils of this school are accomplishing in a good degree.

No. of scholars attending each term respectively, was 22, 23, 17; average attendance, 21, 22, 17; no. not absent, 6, 5, 7; no of persons visiting including members of the board, 32, 28, 16. This school needs a better room, and the district need a little more money to make the school terms as long as would be profitable.

FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

DISTRICT No 3. Summer term 10 weeks in length taught by Miss. Cora E. Wiggin. A Winter term of 11 weeks by Miss Etta Rust. The Committee was well pleased with the appearance of the school during each term.

DISTRICT No 4. A spring term of nine weeks taught by Mrs. Louisa Tutt, Summer term of nine weeks taught by Miss. Clara A. Bassett and a Winter term of ten weeks by Miss. Hattie A. Brown. Improvement good each term.

DISTRICT No 5. A Spring term of eight weeks and Summer eight weeks taught by Miss. Mary S. Wentworth. Improvement fair the first term, order deficient the second, Winter term of thirteen weeks by Mr. George A. Haines. Good improvement in the various branches pursued.

DISTRICT No 6. Three terms six, six and thirteen weeks respectively all taught by Mr. C. F. Young. Commendable improvement was made each term.

DISTRICT No 7. As there were no scholars attending from Wolfeborough no Register returned. Miss Abbie Cate teacher.

DISTRICT No 8. A spring term of eight weeks Miss. A. L. Horne. The teacher well sustained her reputation.

DISTRICT No 9. One term of twelve weeks by Miss. M. A. Brown. See No 1.

DISTRICT No. 11. One term of eight weeks by

Miss E. Brackett, the teacher did as well as might be expected with such a small school.

DISTRICT No 13. The spring term of eight and one half weeks, summer nine weeks and a winter term of nine weeks. All under the instruction of Mr. Walter H. Foss. The improvement was commendable.

DISTRICT No 15. Summer term of — weeks by Miss Annab M. Cotton. A winter term of — weeks taught mostly by Miss Marion Wiggin finished by Miss. Annah M. Cotton, both of these terms proved to be profitable. No Register returned.

DISTRICT No 17. The following is a report of the schools of this district. Whole number of teachers engaged four. There has been but one change in our corps of teachers, Miss Georgie Lynch being succeeded in the Grammar school by Miss. M. Stephens. The whole number of pupils attending the schools more than two weeks have averaged per term, for the year 138.

During the year the Board has promoted from grade to grade upon the merits of written examination and recommendation of teachers.

The Primary school under charge of Miss S. E. Haley, has had an average term; attendance for the year 49 pupils; 10 children have been promoted from this to the next grade.

THE INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL has had an average attendance of 37, under charge of Miss. M. E. Avery; 11 pupils have been promoted from this grade.

Miss. M. Stephen commenced work in the Grammar school with the Fall term, an attendance of 27 pupils with 8 promotions during year.

HIGH SCHOOL. Mr. Joyce, Principal, has had charge of the High school averaging 25 in number, from which a class; Emma Davis and Samual Avery have graduated.

The Board consider this to be a very satisfactory, school year. The present teachers have been faithful and made constant improvement in their

methods of school work. The pupils, with a few exceptions, have shown a greater desire to maintain a good class standing, as it is only upon the merits of their work that they can receive promotion.
