REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Superintending School Committee of Allentown respectfully submits the following report for the year ending March, 1880:

DISTRICT No. 1.

Prudential committee, Frank D. Jenness.

Summer Term. Miss Sarah L. Kenison of Allentown, teacher. Length of term, 12 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 17; average attendance, 14. Wages per month, \$24.

Winter Term. Miss Hattie F. Ring of Derry, teacher. Length of term, 16 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 19; average attendance, 18. Wages per month, \$30.

This district was very fortunate in securing the services of two such teachers. Miss Kenison and Miss Ring, being faithful and experienced, and with these qualifications and the hearty co-operation of the parents, great improvement was made. The names of Walter P. Batchelder and Carrie Marden, were on the roll of honor.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Prudential committee, William B. Cate.

Summer Term. Miss Belle Davis of Pembroke, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 6. Wages of teacher per month, \$20.

Winter Term. Mr. C. E. Hall of Pembroke, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 9; average attendance, 8. Wages of teacher per month, \$24.

This was Miss Davis' first attempt at teaching, usually hard enough for any young teacher; but doubly so in a district where there is so much trouble about school matters, as there

is in this. Miss Davis did her part toward having a good school, and those scholars that attended were much benefitted.

Mr. Hall, the teacher of the winter term, is also a young teacher; but by earnest work, he succeeded in having a very good school. The name of Nellie J. Cate was on the roll of honor.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Prudential committee, Thomas M. Cofran.

Summer Term. Miss Carrie E. Ames, teacher. Length of term, 20 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 10; average attendance, 8. Wages of teachers per month, \$20.

Winter Term. Miss Adah B. Cochran, teacher. Length of term, 10 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 10; average attendance, 9. Wages of teacher per month, \$20.

Miss Ames and Miss Cochran are good teachers, and therefore had good schools, giving satisfaction to all.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Prudential Committee, Amos Hoyt.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

The first term was taught by Miss Susie A. Crosby, of Manchester. Length of term, 12 weeks. Whole number of scholars, 18; average attendance, 18. Wages of teacher per month, \$36.

The second and third terms were taught by Mr. John P. Brown, of Bow. Length of term, 12 weeks each. Whole number of scholars the second term, 19; average attendance, 16. Third term, whole number, 22; average attendance, 21. Wages, second term per month, \$35; third term, \$38.

Miss Crosby came to this school well recommended by the Superintendent of Schools at Manchester, and her management of the school proved conclusively that the testimonials were well deserved.

Mr. Brown, the teacher of the second and third terms, is a gentleman of considerable experience in teaching, and kept a good school, ruling his scholars kindly, but firmly. He se-

cured their good will, and also the good will and confidence of the people of the district. The improvement of his pupils in their studies, and the good order in the school-room, speak in highest terms of his faithfulness as a teacher.

INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL.

This school has had three terms of twelve weeks each. Whole number of scholars, 39; average attendance, 30. Wages per month, first term, \$28; second term, \$25; third term, \$26.

Miss Jennie Haseltine, of Allenstown, was teacher of the first term. I was well pleased with Miss Haseltine's management. Good order prevailed, and great improvement in the lessons was the result.

Miss Adah Bartlett, of Allenstown, taught the second and third terms. Miss Bartlett is a young lady of decided ability as a teacher. She labored faithfully with her pupils, and the examination showed that it had been a very profitable school.

PRIMARY SCHOOL.

This school has had three terms of twelve weeks each. Whole number of scholars, 50; average attendance, 32. Wages of teacher per month, \$26.

Mrs. Etta M. Stearns, of Allenstown, taught the first and third terms, and fully sustained her high reputation as a teacher. Miss Annie B. Whittemore, taught the second term, giving perfect satisfaction to all.

There has been great improvement in our schools the past year, due principally to the fact that the several prudential committees have exercised great care in their selection of teachers. Much credit is due them for thus doing. Hire good teachers if it does cost more, and you will have good schools.
