To the inhabitants of the Town of Alstead qualified to vote in town affairs. You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

2nd. To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

3rd. To choose one Selectman for the ensuing three years.

4th. To choose one or more road agents for the ensuing year.

5th. To choose overseers of the poor, one or more constables, collector of taxes, fence viewers, sealer of weights and measures, measurers of wood, surveyors of lumber, library trustees, trustees of trust funds, and such other officers of the town as the voters may direct.

6th. To raise money for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, to build and repair highways and bridges, for the ordinary town charges, interest on road bonds and other necessary expenses.

7th. To see if the town will vote to raise \$950.00 for state aid maintenance \$850.00 for trunk line maintenance, \$1,170.00 for state aid construction and call for state aid.

8th. To see if the town will vote to raise money for payment of road bond due July 1st.

9th. To see if the town will vote to raise \$750.00 to build a bridge north of Mrs. Campbell's and call for state aid.

10th. To see if the town will vote to accept Trust funds for \$100.00 from Charlotte L. Partridge and \$100.00 from Elizabeth Rogers.

11th. To see if the town will vote to raise money to observe Old Home Day.

12th. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 for Pine Blister Rust Control.

13th. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the support of Town Library and for Cemetery.

14th. To see if the town will vote to raise money for street lights.

15th. To see if the town will vote to provide suitable approaches to the river for the Fire Engine and raise money therefor.

16th. To act on any accounts that may be presented.

17th. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead :

I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools this to cover a period of twenty weeks .

On taking up the work left by your former superintendent Mr. English, I found things well planned for the coming year and it has been my endeavor to carry out his policies.

REPAIRS

During the summer of 1925 the school house at Alstead Center was renovated. The walls and ceiling were covered with metal sheathing, three new windows were cut in the west side of the building, new blackboards were installed and the schoolroom was painted. The cost of these repairs was approximately \$400.00. The building is now in good shape.

We may however look forward to sheathing the front hall with metal, to installing chemical toilets, a jacketed stove and sanitary drinking and washing facilities.

I would like very much to see this school house made into a suitable community gathering place and I see no reason why with the co-operation of the people of Alstead Center this should not be accomplished.

The toilets at Alstead Village were repaired and painted during the summer.

All buildings are in fairly good shape with the exception of the building at Forristall.

HEALTH

The instruction of the children in health knowledge and health habits seems to be excellent in so far as it goes but is

entirely inadequate. It is planned to do more along this line another year. Likewise, the conditions under which the children attend school are often far from healthy. Sanitary drinking and washing facilities ought to be provided, also chemical toilets and jacketed stoves. The question of sufficient light for the children on dark winter afternoons is a serious one.

The well at East Alstead was thoroughly cleaned in the fall and the water sent to Concord to be tested. The report showed that the water was excellent for drinking purposes.

There are 14 children in the schools at present who have not been vaccinated. This ought to be attended to in the spring.

It has been the custom to have a trained nurse come a few weeks in the year to examine the school children and report to the teachers and the parents any defects needing attention. Such a nurse has been secured for this spring. I would recommend that Alstead with the other towns in this Union join with the Charleston Union and hire a school nurse. The cost would be entirely refunded by the State and much more could be done for the children.

FINANCES

There have been some unexpected and unavoidable increases in costs during the past year. High school tuition and transportation (statutory obligations) both have advanced considerably. These facts together with a decrease in State Aid and a few old bills have caused a deficit of \$1600. This should be taken care of in the district meeting. These advanced costs will continue through another year therefore it will be necessary to raise more money than usual for current expenses besides the \$1600 to meet the deficit. The facts should be kept in mind that an increase in the equalized valuation of the town automatically augments the amount of the five dollar tax and consequently lowers the State Aid the district may expect.

TEACHERS

We have four new teachers in the system this year and all are doing good work. We have been fortunate in having three excellent cadet teachers at the Mica Mine school. The children have been enthusiastic and the teachers have obtained good results. It has been necessary to find a boarding place in Gilsum for the teacher and furnish transportation each day.
