The sum \$1652.80 was expended the year for the support of schools. Length of schools 33 weeks, divided into three terms of 11 weeks each.

Our schools have been fairly prosperous and but for the unavoidable change of teachers their success would have been flattering to both teachers and scholars. Punctual attendance is necessary to reap the full benefit of the schools. One day absent, and a day is lost, the loss of which the student may sometime be sadly in need. Parents are largely responsible for the punctual attendance of their children.

Fall term.—Whole No. of pupils, 15; average attendance, 13; No. of weeks, 16; classed as follows: reading, 15; spelling, 15; writing, 15; arithmetic, 13; geography, 8; grammar, 2; composition, 11; drawing, 15; vocal music, 15. Teacher, Miss Mary Calley: wages, \$24 per month. Roll of Honor, 3.

STATISTICAL TABLE NO. 2.

Whole number of scholars not less than five years of age who have attended not less than two weeks, 29. Number of persons between fourteen and twenty-one years of age unable to read or write, none. Number of visitors, 24. Total number of weeks of school taught in town the past year, 47. Number of schools, 2. Average length, in weeks, per school, 23 1-2.

There is reason to be pleased with the general success of our schools for the past year: they have been well taught and good progress has been made in all the branches taught.

The scholars as a whole have been studious and manifested a desire to excel in their studies.

It would promote the welfare of our schools much, if parents would visit them oftener, and learn from personal observation what progress their children make in their studies; their presence in the schoolroom would stimulate teachers to a faithful discharge of their duties, and scholars to obedience and application.
