#### NORTH BENNINGTON.

FIRST TERM.

Henry J. Colby.

In accordance with the provisions of the statute, your School Board present the following report. The design of a School report is to give the citizens of a town information respecting the condition of their Schools, and their management during the last year.

#### PRIMARY SCHOOL.

MISS RICKER, Teacher.—We cannot say too much in praise of this teacher and her scholars. During the Spring and Summer terms their improvement was in the highest degree satisfactory, and in the Winter term, nearly finished, their interest does not flag in the least. It seems to be their delight to please their teacher, and well it may, for if there is any good will in a scholar, she is sure to find it; she is surely the right one in the right place. If you do not understand why we speak so highly of this teacher and her scholars, visit their school and you will know.

#### GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

MISS ROGERS, Teacher.—This teacher worked with untiring zeal to make her School successful, but during the last part of the Summer term was tormented by extreme ugliness in a very few of her scholars. She seemed to believe mostly in moral suasion. Surely, that is good as far as it will go, but we are given to understand by undoubted authority, that "Judgments are prepared for scorners, and stripes for the backs of fools." The records show that in the early part of this century the most essential quality in a teacher was his flegging power, but since those days, civilization has greatly improved our common schools, yet, in this christian land, in the last days of this enlightened nineteeth century, that power is liable to be called for.

#### WINTER TERM.

Taught by MISS NESMITH, a teacher of great experience, a sovereign in her School, but never a tyrant. At the commencement there seemed to be signs of war; but after a few slight skirmishes peace reigned within, and the greatest improvement has been made in every way.

#### NORTH BENNINGTON.

Spring Term-MISS COBURN, Teacher.-She seemed to be very much interested in her School, and her pupils made much improvement. In this School we found the best scholar in Bennington, considering her age. No Summer term. The scholars were conveyed to South Antrim, giving them the advantages of city school.

#### REMARKS.

Your School Board would recommend that parents and others visit the Schools more frequently than they do. Be sure and be present the last day of every term. If your scholars know that their parents will be there to hear them recite, they will look forward and try to do their best. It will be to them a great event. Parents seem to be much more interested in the Primary than in the Grammar School. The Summer term of both schools closed the same day, the Grammar in the forenoon and the Primary in the afternoon. One lonely mother was the only visitor in the Grammar, while there were more than forty in the Primary. Parents, do not forsake the picture before it is finished. You send your children to the Primary School; they are like the canvas on which the artist paints a picture; only in this case the beauty of the picture depends upon the quality of the canvas, but you expect the artist to do her best. Day after day she works upon that canvas, laying the foundation of your picture, but before it is half finished it is taken from that artist. and given to another. Follow the picture and let the next artist know that you are as much interested in the finishing as you were in laying the foundation. Your presence will inspirit her, which will help her to give you a living picture painted for everlasting life.

We think, we know, that the welfare of your Schools are to a great extent in your hands. Who can do so much to encourage scholars and teacher as you can, or who can do so much to discourage both? Let your children know by your words and works that you consider their education of more value than all else you can give them. Send them to School every day, send them early. Scholars cannot make much improvement unless they are in School constantly while it is in session.
