#### **Town Warrant**

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, and for necessary charges arising within the town.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote the use of the town hall to the different societies in said town for expenses.
- Art. 4. To see what discount, if any, the town will vote to make on all taxes paid on or before July 15, 1915.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to deliver the inventory blanks at the time of taking the inventory.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session, 1905.
- Art. 7. To see what action the town will take in regard to licensing a junk dealer.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for the purpose of repairing the highway leading from the crossing near the North Charlestown depot to the City bridge.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars with which to purchase a chemical engine for the use of the fire department.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars in trust, the interest to be expended annually for the care of the Edward Harlow lot in Forest Hill Cemetery.

- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept one hundred dollars in trust, the interest to be expended annually for the care of the Sarah A. Rogers lot in Forest Hill Cemetery.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept seventy-five dollars in trust, the interest to be expended annually for the care of the Maria L. Frost lot in Hope Hill Cemetery.
- Art. 13. To see what action the town will take toward securing additional cemetery grounds and what sum of money it will raise and appropriate therefor.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to widen the cemetery gates at least three feet and to connect the fountain with the town main.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Water Commissioners to furnish the Selectmen water for the purpose of flushing the sewers as needed.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to install a catch basin on East street near the high school building, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- Art. 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to the drainage system at the lower end of Main street which is not in use.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to take from the road agents district section of the River Road, so called, between Charlestown and the Walpole town line, and between Charlestown and the Claremont town line, and instruct the Selectmen to arrange with the State Highway Department to maintain said section of road under the state patrol system and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of three hundred and twenty-five dollars for the road south of Charlestown, and the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars for the road north of Charlestown, for this purpose.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the building and maintaining sidewalks in said town.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to adopt an act passed by the N. H. Legislature of 1915, "To establish a Municipal Court" in said town.

- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on notes on the credit of the town such sums of money as may be needed to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preservation and renewing of the shade trees of the village street.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of the village streets by the use of Tarvia or other material.
- Art. 24. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of the Town Fair and for the proper observance of Old Home Day.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to redecorate the walls and ceilings of the town hall and adjoining rooms.
- Art. 26. Fo see if the town will vote to release all guarantors of the extensions of the water mains from furthur assessment under said guaranty.
- Art. 27. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of rebuilding the dry bridge near the G. G. Bowen's Sons' mill, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 28. To see what action the town will take in regard to rebuilding the City bridge at North Chorlestown, and raise and appropriate money therefor.
- Art. 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# Report State Tax Commission 1914

#### INCREASE IN PUBLIC EXPENDITURES

No power has constituted the members of the tax commission guardians of the public in respect to expenditures for the support of government, and they have no disposition to assume that role. Nevertheless, "economy being a most essential virtue in all states," and it being "the duty of legislators and magistrates \* \* to countenance and inculcate the principles of \* economy," all as set forth in the constitution of this state, the commissioners believe themselves to be amply justified in urging, as they have so often urged before, the importance of this subject upon the voters of the state. public revenue, state and municipal, is the voters' business and they are responsible, directly or indirectly, for every extravagance affecting it from the inception to the termination of the fund.

Every compulsory contribution levied by public authority upon people or property is in the broad sense of the term a tax, nor is it made less obnoxious or burdensome if called a fee or a fine. In the figures that follow therefore all fees, fines, and other exactions, if any, are included with the taxes upon polls and estates. To illustrate the comparative importance of the two classes, it may be said that

the taxes npon polls and estates represent about 95% and all other income about 5% of the total revenue of the state, and of the counties, cities, towns, districts and precincts therein.

Taxes as defined above have increased by leaps and bounds in recent years. In 1903 the sum of all the taxes assessed by and within the state of New Hampshire was \$5,373,420.22; in 1913 it was \$8,765,039.07, an increase of \$3,391,618.85, or 63% in ten years. But these figures do not adequately represent the velocity the upward movement has now attained. To show that, it is necessary to divide the ten-year period: The levy in 1908 was \$924,388.79, or 17% greater than in 1903, while that in 1913 was \$2.467.230.06, or 39% greater than in 1908. so much did the advance in the last half of said period exceed that in the first half. These figures will be the more alarming if it is remembered that while taxes already sufficiently heavy were advancing 63%, the population of the state increased only about 41/2%, and while the one was advancing 39%, the other increased only about  $2\frac{1}{2}$ %.

It is instructive to study the subject from another angle. In the ten years from 1904 to 1914, both inclusive, the annual increase in all taxes defined and limited as above was as follows:

The average yearly increase for the whole period was \$336,561.85. The upward trend is more plainly shown, however, by dividing, as before, the ten-year period in the middle and considering the halves separately. For the first five years the average annual increase was \$184,877.76; for the last five years it was \$493,446.01. It is surely pertinent to consider how long the little state of New Hampshire, almost stationary in wealth, can sustain a tax already burdensome and increasing at the rate of practically half a million dollars a year without crippling her industries and impoverishing her people. Plainly it is a condition not calculated to attract capital from without the state or to encourage business within the same.

From the per capita standpoint the situation is not In 1903 there were assessed \$12.88 in less disturbing. taxes for each man, woman and child in the state. years later there were assessed \$14.75 for each individual, and in five years more \$20.09. If in 1913 taxes had been equally distributed among all the people it would have meant a burden of \$100 for each family of five members. Though in reality there was little such equality in the assessment there was much in the payment. The fact is that those who occupy, use or consume property, no matter who owns it are those who in the analysis pay most, if not all of the taxes thereon. If the wage earner or the man of limited means understood he was in reality paying something like \$100 a year in state and municipal and half as much more in federal taxes for the government of himself, his wife and three children his influence and his vote would more frequently make for economy in appropriations and expenditures than heretofore.

No statistics for the year 1914 appear in the above paragraphs for the reason that they are not yet at hand except in part.

# Report of Engineer

Board of Selectmen,

Charlestown, N. H.

Gentlemen:—At your last annual town meeting the sum of \$3,000 was appropriated for the completion of the Charlestown Sewer System. In addition to this sum you had, available for this purpose, some six or seven thousand feet of pipe of various sizes. (See Report on Sewers for 1913.) In addition to this, 1170 feet of eight inch pipe was purchased of Mr. Hamlin for \$190.62.

Specification and contract for this years work were prepared, the work was advertised in April and seven proposals were received. The work was let to E. J. Blanchfield of Northampton, Mass., he being the lowest bidder.

Most of the pipe laid was six and eight inch, the contract price for laying the different sizes being the same but varying with the depth at which laid.

This work was distributed as follows:-

East Street, from Sullivan Street southerly 1050 feet of sewer and three manholes, \$247.60.

East Street, from School Street northerly 384 feet of sewer and one manhole, \$78.79.

East Street, from Breakneck Hill southerly 475 feet of drain and one catch basin, \$95.69.

Breakneck Hill, 226 feet of sewer, \$33.90.

Olcott Lane, 890 feet of sewer and two manholes, \$176.50. Box Shop extension, 104 feet of sewer, \$15.60.

Short Street, northerly from Sullivan Street, 250 feet of sewer and one manhole, \$58.95.

West and Willard Streets, 1460 feet of sewer and four manholes, \$394.36.

Fairbrother Avenue and Baldwin Court, 700 feet of sewer and one manhole, \$154.84.

Water Street, easterly from north West Street, 180 feet of sewer, \$33.80.

Water Street, westerly from south West Street, 200 feet of sewer \$30.80.

Paris Avenue, 1011 feet of sewer and two manholes, \$206.20.

## Report of Secretary

The \$1500.00 voted at the town meeting March 10, 1914 to be raised for the purchase of the Bert Cross place was paid directly to Mr. Cross by the selectmen and therefore does not appear upon the records of the water commissioners.

\$2000.00 was paid for this property and \$479.25 was realized by the sale of the pasture and buildings, necessating the payment of \$21.75 from the income of the water system.

There has been little complaint about the condition of the water excepting when the resevoir was drawn off once by mistake during the flushing of the sewer system. The mains get more or less sediment which can only be cleaned by opening them up and flushing them out frequently. This roils the water for a short time.

Both the North Charlestown and the village systems are in good condition now.

#### TOWN SPRINGS

- 1. "Brigg's spring," near Olen Stearns'. In use.
- 2. Farrow's pasture spring North Charlestown, formerly supplied water for trough near iron bridge. Unused at present.
- 3. Metcalf cemetery spring North Charlestown. Not used at present. Located in the Inez A. Cass pasture.

- 4. Charles Bradford spring in rear of Geer Hill. Unused and of no value.
  - 5. Bert Cross spring near upper resevoir. Not used.
- 6. Geer spring in G. L. Richardson's pasture. Formerly supplied stone trough near Charles Ensworth's. Unused.
- 7. One-fourth of Spring in rear of Forest Hill Cemetery. Remaining three-fourths owned by Mary A Forsythe. Town's share used at fountain in said cemetery in connection with another spring located nearby and owned by the town.

The secretary of the water board would be glad of any additional information concerning these or any other springs that belong to the town.

## Report of Trustees

The extension of library service begun last year by weekly shipment of books to North Charlestown, has been continued with gratifying results. The number of books circulated there this year was 2343, as against 2039 the year before. The increase indicates a community of intelligent, regular readers whose best interests require that the service be continued.

Encouraged by the showing at North Charlestown, and acting also upon requests of citizens, your trustees have this year established a similar service at South Charlestown, Mr. S. S. Wright kindly acting as distributing agent, and 583 books have been distributed there. One of the rural free delivery routes has also been utilized, and a service established, with the home of Mr. Gilbert Spencer as distributing point. Several families are served here, and 446 books have been taken out by them.

The total circulation outside the village for the year was 3372; in the village, 8079; total books circulated, 11,451. When it is considered that our population is but

1500, this use of the library will appear in an especially good light.

The library property is being well cared for at reasonable cost.

The trustees feel that the community cannot make too liberal use of the library, and they urge the cultivation of the reading habit upon all. Visit the library, take home the books, read the periodicals and use the reference works in the reading rooms. Every person in town can, if they will, receive benefit from the library.

The trustees recommend the usual appropriation of \$500.00.

The past year has been an uneventful one. There have been less contagious illnesses than for several years.

One severe sporadic (origin not known) case of diphtheria occurred early in the year. The liberal use of antotoxin doubtless prevented the spread of the disease. The patient recovered.

A method has recently been instituted by the State Board of Health whereby diphtheria antitoxin can be obtained at about one-fourth the cost that the retail trade is obliged to ask for it. In this state only one such agency exists, viz., at Concord. This method is made possible only by the dealers not being obliged to keep a surplus stock to be exchanged after its potency is doubtful.

It is worthy of note that the State Board of Health gives the following interpretation to the law relative to aid to quarantined persons: "That any expense incident to the care of the case or to those dependent upon the support of a quarantined person, shall be taken care of under "incidental expenses" in the town accounts, if deemed proper by the local Board of Health. But that no bills whatsoever shall be paid unless ordered by and o k'd by said Board of Health."

At the time of writing this a bill is pending in the present legislature, which, if passed, will appropriate \$10,000 for free antitoxin in this state. This sum would doubtless be more than actually needed, but no money could be better invested than in this way, for by the

liberal use of antitoxin the mortality rate is only about 2% to 4% when formerly without it the mortality was 25%.

Less complaint has occured this year than ever before regarding hygenic conditions. This is due to the satisfactory working of the water system, and the gradual adoption by villagers of connection with the sewer system. A few unsanitary and unsightly places have been cleaned up and still there are opportunities for more of the same work. One of the most annoying conditions prevalent during the spring and fall cleaning is the smudging bonfire with a smoke of vast proportions that is bound to go into some of neighbors and perhaps the owner's windows. The small cost of carting away refuse not easily inflamable would seem to be reason enough for not producing a distressing smudge

Pure Ice. The United States Public Health Service Publication prints the following: "We may illiminate all danger by avoiding the handling of ice with dirty hands, by washing the ice with pure water and by using only CLEAR ice.

A bill to repeal the present compulsory vaccination law—vaccination of public school pupils—was introduced into our present legislature and defeated by about two to one majority. A custom that has been practiced more or less for many years of a doctor going to a school house and vaccinating scholars who have neglected to have it done out of school, is unpleasant for both scholars and doctor. If parents would attend to this during the summer vacation the result would be much more satisfactory to all concerned.

The last quarterly bulletin of the State Board of Health prints the following from the distinguished Dr.

#### Osler:

DR. OSLER'S CHALLENGE TO THE UNVACCINATED.

Dr, Osler, one of the greatest living medical authorities, takes occasion to lay down the strongest challenge to the unvaccinated we have seen for some time. Those timid ones who are afraid of a sore arm or those ignoramnses who do not know the protecting power of vaccination will do well to read Dr. Osler's challenge.

"A great deal of literature has been distributed casting discredit upon the value of vaccination in the prevention of smallpox. I do not see how any one who has gone through epidemics as I have, or who is familiar with the history of the subject, and who has any capacity left for clear judgment, can doubt its value. Some months ago I was twitted by the editor of the Journal of the Antivaccination League for 'a curious silence' on this subject. I would like to issue a Mount-Camel-like challenge to any ten unvaccinated priests of Baal. I will go into the next severe epidemic with ten selected, vaccinated persons and ten selected unvaccinated persons-I should prefer choose the latter-three members of Parliament. three anti-vaccination doctors, if they could be found, and four anti-vaccination propagandists. And I will make this promise-neither to jeer nor jibe when they catch the disease, but to look after them as brothers, and for the four or five who are certain to die. I will try to arrange the funerals with all the pomp and ceremony of an antivaccination demonstration."—American Magazine.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board:-

I submit herewith my second annual report together with reports of the Principal of the High School, Domestic Arts teacher, and Supervisors of Music and Drawing.

Changes in the teaching force are inevitable and yet we have been fortunate in the past year in retaining nearly all of our teachers. Miss Dorothy Jones resigned in the summer to accept a position in the Keene Normal School. She was succeeded by Miss Phebe A. Tyler, a graduate of Plymouth Normal, 1913. Miss Alice Jarvis resigned in June to be married. Her place is filled by Miss Blanche A. Bacon of Keene Normal, 1914. Miss Fannie Willard resigned from South Charlestown school to take a course at Keene. Miss Marion Weeks was promoted from Hemlock to South Charlestown school after taking a partial summer course at Plymouth. Miss Hrrriet Whitcomb continues at Snumshire after a similar course. Miss Adelaide Gay, a graduate of Tilton Seminary, is teaching the Hemlock school.

#### THE HIGH SCHOOL

It was very important in this department to retain the services of Principal Mitchell and his assistant, Miss Varrell. This was done thru a substantial increase of the salaries of these teachers. This action of the Board has

been amply justified by the unbroken progress of the courses undertaken in September 1913. The election of Miss Alice Jeffords to the grammar room leaves the High School teachers free to give all their time to the Freshman and Sophmore classes. A detailed account of this work is given in the high school teachers' reports.

During the summer the basements were remodelled to accommodate the Domestic Arts and Manual Training classes. Though far from ideal these rooms have been comfortable and fairly satisfactory.

With the entrance of the new class in September 1915 it will be absolutely necessary to have another room.

#### THE SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Last summer the interior of the North Charlestown building was refinished and the desks were stained. Two improvements are still necessary. Slate blackboards should be installed and the desks in the grammar room should be turned so as to allow the light to come from the back and left of the pupils.

Minor repairing was done at South Charlestown. Another year this building should be furnished a supply of running water, lavatory and drinking fountains. For some reason these school premises always seem to me dusty, dirty, and unsanitary. This school is one of the most difficult propositions in the district and everything should be done next year to put it in first class condition. The attendance has been poor and the parents have not been careful enough about keeping their children in school.

The surroundings of the Hemlock School were vastly improved last summer through the faithful efforts of Mr. Fred Hill who, being employed by the School Board, re-

moved the out house, trimmed the underbrush and relaid the stone wall in excellent shape. In spite of its unfavorable location this building is now much pleasanter.

The Snumshire building is in very satisfactory condition. If the enrolment were larger the school would be a better paying proposition.

#### ATTENDANCE

There has been a little increase in the percent. of attendance, 91.5 as compared with 89.8 the preceding year. The number of tardinesses has increased. This is a situation which the teacher cannot handle unaided. If the parents do not insist on punctual and regular attendance of their children a great injustice is done to the child and to the school. Oftentimes the people who object most to raising money for school improvement are the ones who are most careless about getting their money's worth. A child who has 80% attendance will hardly have 100% efficiency. If the general per cent. is 91.5% when it might be 95 or 96 per cent., it is easy to see that a certain amount of tax money has been wasted. Roughly speaking, about \$500 of last year's appropriation was wasted because of absence and tardiness.

#### THE HOME AND THE SCHOOL

These two agencies play the chief part in the education of children. This is the best reason why the parent and the teacher should work together constantly. The only means of communication between the home and the school is the child and the report card but it is impossible for the parent and the teacher to understand one another perfectly thru these agencies.

Many parents never visit school to see what their children are doing. Some feel that they do not under-

stand the work sufficiently and therefore stay away. wish the fathers and mothers might realize how much it means to their own child when they give the teacher their co-operation and support. There should be a strong body of public opinion behind the teachers in the interests of good discipline. The authority of the school must be upheld by the parents as well as by the teachers. This is what teaches boys and girls to be law-abiding; the absence of it means later on lawlessness and crime. While I am not in favor of multiplying organizations in any town, I do feel that an organization of parents, teachers, and interested citizens with the welfare of the schools as their chief object, would be a benefit to the community life of Charlestown.

I hope the time is not far distant when a strong, helpful Parent-Teacher's Association may be formed in town.

# Report of Principal of High School

To the Superintendent of Schools:-

Herewith is submitted the second annual report of the new High School. The work has progressed more successfully this year as a result of the extra space provided by partitioning off two rooms in the basement. One is fitted out with a stove, sink, cupboards, desk, chairs and table, and is used for English, French, Sewing, and Cooking. One part is screened off for a dining room when the girls wish to serve a breakfast, luncheon or dinner. The other room is used for Manual Training, Mechanical Drawing, and as a laboratory for the different experiments in

agriculture. The main drawback has been the lack of an adequate study room.

The work in Manual Training has been of a very practical nature. The boys put up the partitions for the new rooms in the basement; set up the sink, and built the cupboards in the Domestic Science room; placed a blackboard on one of the walls in each of the new rooms: covered the ceiling with beaver board in the west basement, and painted the new partitions and cupboards. screens were built for the basement windows to prevent the breaking of the glass by the ice and snow which falls from the roof. Swing standards have been erected in the school vard and a cold-frame set in the ground in which radishes, lettuce, and tomato plants were grown. flag-pole was painted two coats, supplied with a new rope and reset. A good substantial sand table was built for the primary room and a cupboard for one of the upstairs rooms. Besides other smaller articles for the school, the boys have made many things for themselves as tool-boxes. plant stands, book-cases, small tables, whiffle-trees. tabourets, necktie holders and so forth.

First year Agriculture has consisted of text-book work, experiments in the laboratory and field. A corn testing project was carried on very successfully for the State Department but owing to the late season last spring, the corn did not thoroughly mature.

This spring we plan to conduct a fertilizer experiment with potatoes and hay, which I hope will be both interesting and beneficial. The second year boys have begun the study of Animal Husbandry. Here, the aim is to establish the difference between a good and poor animal, the impotance of proper care and how to obtain the best results along all lines.

Advanced Arithmetic and Algebra thus far have been all text book work, but this spring we expect to do some field work in surveying.

The girls have done good work in Demestic Science.

Miss Varrell will report their work along these lines.

The work in all studies has been as laid out by the State Department and as required for approved high schools. The following is the program of studies:

First year-Girls: Advanced Arithmetic, English, French,

Sewing and Cooking.

Boys: Advanced Arithmetic, English, Agriculture, Mechanical Drawing and Manual Training.

Second year—Girls: Algebra and Geometry, English, French, Sewing and Cooking.

Boys: Algebra and Geometry, English, Agriculture, Mechanical Drawing and Manual Training.

The attendance has been excellent, being above 96

per cent, for the year.

Although improvement has been made in every branch of work, there is always a chance for betterment. We hope that these higher standards may be attained.

# Report of Domestic Science Teacher

To the Superintendent of Schools:-

SEWING

There have been this year, two classes in sewing, the girls in the 7th and 8th grades making up the beginner's class and those of the High School the advanced class.

In the beginner's class, which comes every Friday

morning, bags have been made by each girl, then aprons either for cooking or sewing, and by the end of the year, each girl will have made by hand some simple article of underwear.

In the advanced class, the girls have sewing twice a week and a recitation once. They have made one article of underwear, a shirt waist, and by the end of the year, will have cut and made a simple school dress. The long seams are done on the machine, and as we have none, the girls are allowed to take them home for that purpose. In connection with their recitation work, they have started a sample book in which the different kinds of cloth and their prices are shown.

#### COOKING

Conditions this year are certainly much improved and our kitchen in the basement is convenient; all the closets and cupboards being made by the boys of the Manual Training class. The equipment is very good for a beginning and the new Glenwood range most satisfactory.

To make up for last year, double periods, three afternoons a week, are given to the actual cooking and one period to recitation.

The following is briefly the plan of the work to be covered this year.

I. Starch and Sugar Cookery.

October Making of jelly. November Cereals and soups.

December Biscuits, gingerbread, candy.

January Pudding, sauces, cookies, muffins.

February Pastry, doughnuts, bread.

II. Protein Cookery.

March Salads, salad dressing, fish.

April Eggs, custards, meat.

May Cake, gelatine.

June Ice creams, sherbert.

Three meals are to be served a term, four have already been prepared, two breakfasts, one luncheon, and one dinner. Each girl is hostess once and waitress twice during the year. The cost of each per capita is estimated by the girls.

Great credit is due the girls for the interest and willingness with which they have done each piece of work. Both the girls and teacher appreciate any interest that is shown by the townspeople.

# Report of the Supervisor of Music

During this year much interest has been shown in the Music.

At North Charlestown, not only has there been part singing, but reading music has received its full share of attention.

Two concerts of a special character are planned to raise money to buy a record machine, and we believe enough money can be raised to accomplish this object.

At Charlestown, we have organized a chorus of the high school together with the upper grammar grades which gives us a large chorus. In the intermediate grades part singing has been taken up with enthusiasm and with excellent results. In the first and second grades, long tone singing has been the predominant feature to unify the voices and enable the children to sing their songs with enough beauty of tone to ensure them a real pleasure when they participate in the singing.

At South Charlestown, reading in the different keys together with the singing of the songs has been the aim of the teacher and the supervisor.

I wish to thank the teachers, high school principal, and superintendent for their cooperation, kindly suggestions, and especially for the aid received in the high school music in the efficient piano playing.

# Report of the Supervisor of Drawing.

To the Superintendent of Schools:-

I herewith submit my third annual report as supervisor of drawing for the Charlestown district.

The schools have all been visited every other week, with the exception of South Charlestown which is

occasionally omitted for the Hemlock district.

The work for the lower grades has been designed to increase their ability to see, and to help them express this knowledge. We have done some illustrative work with the upper grammar grades, for it is here that the pupil draws within his shell and finds it hard to give free expression to his ideas. For our object and perspective drawing in these grades we are designing the interior of a room with a small amount of furniture, and shall spend some time in studying good color schemes for house decoration before finishing the sheet.

At Christmas time the pupils in South Charlestown and in the fifth and sixth grades in Charlestown made doilies which they used for Christmas presents. With original designs, executed in oil crayon, the doilies made very acceptable gifts. The pupils enjoy this phase of the work very much, so we expect to train this faculty by introducing more manual work in the coming year.

The results in North Charlestown have been especially gratifying. This is due in a large measure to the excellent deportment which seems to be the first requisite for

good work in anything.

I wish to heartily thank the teachers and pupils who have been of such inestimable help in promoting the work in drawing.

# Report of Special Committee

Elected at the school meeting in April 1914, for "Making a study of the proper solution of the High School problem."

Present number of high school pupils, first and second years, is 16. Last year the first year class was 12. Possible number that may enter next year from the present 8th grade, 12. The 7th grade now has 13.

Present course is one teaching Agriculture and Manual Training for the boys as well as some of the sciences, and for the girls Domestic Science and something of the languages. English of course comes in each year's course for every pupil. For the future the course would depend upon the appropriation and the number of pupils. Both the Principal and Superintendent state that one more room would answer for some time.

A room from some other hall or building seems to be out of the question.

We find that the action taken by the school meeting of 1913 with reference to establishing a high school was as follows; "That it is the sense of this meeting that a one year course of an approved high school be established." No action has since been taken to further the maintenance of a high school. It proceeded last year automatically by the appropriation of the necessary money for the second year of the course. No other vote of any kind has been passed or even proposed looking to the establishment of a high school. It has never been ordered or even voted upon by the District, and the justification of that one year is only by implication. There has been no vote requiring it. If a resolution is adopted in the school meeting, this year appropriating the money for

more school room accommodations, a high school would proceed automatically without voting to establish such a school.

Hira R. Beckwith, an architect of established reputation, has inspected the school house and gives the following report:

February 4, 1914.

Dr. O. C. Young.

Dear Sir:—In relation to the school house additions, I would report as follows; If an addition is made to the building I would recomend that it be made at the West end. This would be about 22x40½ feet, two story with basement, with maple floors, blackboards etc., heated and all complete except seats. Extra windows to be placed on North side of present West rooms. This could be done so the rooms would be amply lighted. This addition can be done inside of \$2700.00.

There can be a room finished in West end of 3rd floor about 18x27 feet. This with stairs leading to same, with end and roof windows, maple floor, corridor to same, all complete, without seats, including heat, for inside of \$950.00. A similar room could be made at East end of 3rd floor if at any future time it should be needed.

We recommend that fire escapes be placed on the school house whether in its present condition or not.

Your committee who have been instructed to make a report upon this matter are of the unanimous opinion that either of Mr. Beckwith's propositions would be satisfactory, but we strongly recommend the plan for providing a room on the 3rd floor of the school house at an estimated cost \$950.00, believing that it will provide ample facilities for the present requirements.
