REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1892.

To the district and town of Chesterfield:

The past year has been one of general prosperity in the several schools.

It has been the endeavor of your board, so far as possible, to secure teachers of moral and mental worth, and having obtained them to retain their services.

Most of the teachers have been workers, and it should be understood by all that the school room is a place for work, constant, earnest and unremitting. A lazy teacher will have lazy, shiftless pupils, and in a short time make of the best material for a school, drones and rogues. But the teacher who is always busy and alert will be full of expedients, and detecting any one tiring of study will ring a change, start the pupil on a new track and stir the laggard to energetic and successful efforts.

Sickness has interfered to quite a degree in some of the schools, greatly reducing the average attendance.

The schools in the eastern section of the district have been uniformly prosperous. No. 7 has had the instruction of the same teacher during the last three years and has some of the finest scholars in town of their age. The second term of the year had a total of eleven different pupils registered, of whom five were present every half day without being tardy, two were absent one half day each, and one was absent one day. In fact nearly all absences in this school were from unavoidable causes. Owing to sickness the teacher was unable to finish the winter term.

In No. 13, primary, the same teacher has taught three consecutive terms, and the roll of honor shows the attendance to have been laudable, but like all schools of any considerable number of scholars there have been a few whose parents have as little interest in learning as their children, who prefer street education, and from such sources irregular attendance is expected.

No. 13, grammar, had an excellent teacher of tact and experience the first two terms, but as her services could no longer be secured, another was installed in her place, who was to a good degree successful and who taught as one with head and heart for the work.

By reference to statistical table No. 1 you will see that the per cent. of daily attendance in the three above named schools is worthy of especial notice, averaging ninety-six per cent. for the year.

The schools in the western section of the district have been generally prosperous, and the teachers have labored zealously for the welfare of the schools. One or two instances where the discipline was relaxed showed the evil effects of such a course.

School No. 9 is still in session, having been interrupted by the sickness of the teacher, who has been retained through the year. She found, however, a competent substitute for a while during the fall term in Miss Clara Stoddard.

The No. 10 school was closed before the end of the term on account of the sickness of the scholars. It is a small school at best and several of the pupils were unable to attend.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Chesterfield, in county of Cheshire, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, viz :

ARTICLE 1.—To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.

ART. 2.—To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3.—To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 4.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools in addition to what is required by law, or act thereon.

ART. 5.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray town charges.

ART. 6.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to be worked out on the highways, or act thereon.

ART. 7.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen not to appoint an agent for the sale of spirituous liquors the ensuing year.

ART. 8.—To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

ART. 9.—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of forty dollars (\$40) to be expended memorial day, or act thereon.

ART. 10.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for payment for the new road, or act thereon.

ART. 11.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to sell one or all of the old school houses not in use, or act thereon.

ART. 12.—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road beginning at an intersection of roads west of the “Wilds” place, so-called, to the house owned and occupied by Warner Kathan, or act thereon.

ART. 13.—To see if the town will vote to accept in trust from the estate of George Chamberlain, deceased, and others, a sum of money not exceeding two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) the interest only of which said sum is to be expended for the care and maintenance of the Chesterfield West Cemetery, or act thereon.
