Town Warrant.

State of New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the town of Claremont, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the lower assembly room of the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools the ensuing year.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Stevens High School.
4. To choose a committee for the Stevens High School for the ensuing year.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year, and determine how it shall be paid.
6. To raise by vote the necessary amount of money to pay legal expenses of the town for the ensuing year.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the debts of the town.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Fiske Free Library.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay firemen.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay for the use of hydrants.
12. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting the streets and raise and appropriate money therefor.
13. To determine the rate of discount the town will allow persons paying their taxes within such period as the town may designate.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the expenses of Memorial Day.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the benefit of the American Band.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Board of Education.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate in aid of the Claremont Cottage Hospital.

18. To see if the town will vote to engage a suitable person to arrange and index the town records and to raise and appropriate a suitable sum for that purpose.

19. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting its streets with electricity and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To see what action the town will take in regard to securing a proper site and erecting a suitable building for a lobby and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

21. To see what action the town will take in regard to disposing of the town histories.

22. To see what action the town will take in regard to its trust funds and in regard to any real estate, or mortgages held by it on account of such funds.

23. To see what action the town will take in regard to making repairs on the High School building and also in regard to heating, ventilating and drainage for the same, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

24. To see what action the town will take in regard to completing and arranging the Wheeler cemetery; also to see what plan they will adopt in the disposal of the lots and in the removal of buildings and raise and appropriate money therefor.

25. To see what action the town will take in regard to housing the horse hose carriage and drawing the same, and engine and hook and ladder truck to fires.

26. To hear the report of Ira Colby and Hosea W. Parker, attorneys and agents of the town, to receive and receipt in the name of the town in the sum of \$60,000 and take a conveyance to the town of the Fiske place at the corner of Broad and Summer streets, on account of the Stevens legacy.

27. To see what action the town will take in regard to the investment of the fund to be received from the Stevens legacy, and to appoint trustees to invest and manage the same and to pass any vote relating thereto.

28. To see if the town will vote to divide the town by the river into two highway districts and choose two road agents, one each, for said districts, to take effect at the next annual town meeting.

29. To see if the town will vote to go back to the old system in the management of its highways and bridges and pass any vote relating thereto.

30. To see what action the town will take in regard to paying for the men and teams used in moving the school house, known as old No. 5, to its present location near Ralph Ainsworth's.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FISKE FUND.

At the beginning of the fiscal year there was in the hands of the treasurer, as income from the Fiske fund, the sum of \$257.95. There has been received during the year from this fund an income of \$19.90. There has also been received a 15 per cent dividend from a deposit of \$1.20 in the Sullivan Savings Institution, amounting to \$0.18. This makes a total of \$278.03 which has been in charge of the treasurer. There has been expended for books for the library the sum of \$183.15. A balance is thus left in the treasury of \$94.88.

The fund of \$5,000, given by the late Samuel P. Fiske, was invested by J. L. Farwell in western lands. The selectmen have charge of this fund.

During the year ending February 15, 1898, there were seven alarms of fire, viz :

November 26. Holt & Osgood's house, East Pleasant street.

February 4. F. G. Winn's house, Mulberry street.

No damage was done at any of these fires, except the one at Claremont Junction, which was totally destroyed. and the Holt & Osgood buildings, which were nearly all burned except the barn and shed.

No hydrants have been set during the year, and should there be none set during the coming year, the rental will be \$1 995.00.

The Fire Department takes this opportunity to thank the voters of the town for the appropriation made at the last annual meeting, of \$400.00 for the purpose of buying a hose wagon. The wagon has been purchased and is first-class in every respect. Total cost including traveling expenses, etc., about \$395.00. There has also been purchased a pair of regulation fire department harness and hangers, to be used in connection with the hose wagon.

It is my belief that the best arrangement has been made for handling all the apparatus that can be had until we have a central station. This improvement will increase the expense of the department about four hundred dollars a year. which I trust the town will be willing to meet when they consider the excellent service they receive

The Town School District.

Report of the School Board for the Year Ending February 15th, 1898.

The Claremont Town School Board respectfully submits the following report for the school years 1897-'98:

In recapitulating the work of the Board for the year, the Committee desire to say that at the beginning of the spring term a vacancy existed in the corps of teachers in the grammar school, Miss Ida M. Mason of the B class having resigned at the close of the winter term. The two remaining assistants, Miss Josephine M. Bailey and Mrs. J. D. Alexander, were respectively promoted to the B and C classes; and Miss Lavinia C. Cairns was transferred from the Draper Corner school to fill the vacancy in the D class. A second D class was formed at the beginning of the fall term, with Miss Amy L. McQuaid in charge, who was transferred from the Bluff Intermediate school. This new class, as is well known, could not be accommodated in the grammar school building, but a room in Hunton's block, Pleasant street, was leased and prepared for its use. Miss Stella E. Putnam succeeded Miss Amy L. McQuaid as teacher in the Bluff Intermediate school; and Miss M. A. Jenney was elected to the Puckershire school at the beginning of the spring term.

The school in the Bartlett Division was closed at the end of the winter term, and the teacher, Miss Carrie M. Hooper, was transferred to the Bible Hill school, succeeding Miss Effie M. McQuaid, who in turn was transferred to Draper Corner. Miss Hooper is now in charge of the Puckershire school, having relieved Miss M. A. Jenney during the winter term. Miss Ava A. Stewart was promoted from the Grannis Division to the Bluff Primary school, beginning her labors there in September, and Miss Bertha M. Fletcher was elected to fill the vacancy occasioned by Miss Stewart's transfer. A school was opened in the Slab City District in September, but was discontinued at the close of the term, and the teacher, Miss Nina E. Messer, was transferred to the Bible Hill school. The scholars in the Slab City District now attend the village schools.

The attention of those interested is called to the accompanying tabular statement, which is a part of this report. It gives the names

of the different teachers, their assignments, and the weekly compensation paid them, with the number of pupils enrolled for the year in each school.

At the last school meeting a committee was raised, charged with the removal of the school-house in old District No. 5 to Claremont Junction. The building now stands on land deeded the district by Mr. George I. Ainsworth, with the understanding that whenever it ceases to be used for school purposes the lot reverts to his estate. The opening of this school removed the necessity of continuing that in the Long Division, which was closed at the end of the spring term, and the teacher, Miss Catherine F. Eaton, began her labors at the Junction school with the fall term.

Miss A. M. G. Walker, teacher of Music and Drawing, includes in her work the village schools, and those at West Claremont and Puckershire.

At the coming annual school meeting the voters of the district will be asked again to dispose of the unoccupied school houses in the outlying divisions. These buildings are of small value, of no use to the town, and, in fact, will be of less value the longer they cumber the ground. At present the town is charged with keeping these houses insured, and in one instance the town district is paying a small annual rental for use of the ground on which the structure stands. It cannot be urged that these buildings will be used in the future for school purposes. Under the provisions of the present school law, whatever their merits or demerits, the tendency is strongly towards centralization in all school effort. The friends of the law emphasize this feature of it, and your Committee recognize the force of their claims. It is contended that in the future we shall not multiply the number of school-houses, but on the contrary they will be reduced to a minimum, when, under conditions possible even in this town, the best work can be accomplished at a cost of less money and effort than under existing conditions.

Your Committee, as well as other citizens of Claremont, recognize the imperative demand for additional school privileges in the compact part of the town. At present two of our schools are housed in a public block in one of the busiest streets in the village. Some parents will not allow their children to attend such schools because of their location. With the beginning of the next school year a new 7th grade class will be organized in the grammar school, requiring not only an additional teacher, but a room in which to put her and her pupils.

Necessary repairs on school buildings have been gauged by the means at hand. During the summer vacation the roof of the Terrace school house was slated, and new floors were laid in the North street building (upper room), in the High street building (lower room) and in the Terrace school house. The cellar under the High street house, which had been flooded with water after heavy rains for several years, has been drained, thus removing any probability of a recurrence of the trouble. A portion of the roof of the Grammar school building is in a dilapidated state, and a similar condition exists at the Bluff school house. In the interests of economy these repairs should be made at an early date, if made at all, though the probability that the district may realize the urgent demand for the erection of a large and centrally located building would dispose of the question at once, as well as other grave questions of public interest.

The number of instances of truancy reported to the Committee shows a gratifying decrease from last year, but there appears to be no improvement over former years in the irregular attendance of pupils in our schools. This is one of the most serious troubles that confront the teacher. The evils following in its trail have not been magnified, for they are not only direct but far reaching in their results.

A mild form of diphtheria prevailed throughout the village during the fall term, which seriously interfered with the attendance in the schools. One teacher was stricken with the disease the second week in November, and her school, with the other in the same building, was closed for the remainder of the term. In December the village school-houses were thoroughly fumigated by the Board of Health.

In this connection it is of interest to note that of the total number of pupils enrolled in our public schools at the beginning of the school year 1885-'86, as given by the report for that year, 41 per cent. completed the grammar school course and entered the Stevens High School. Of this number 50 per cent. received diplomas from that institution. No statistics are available giving the number of scholars who entered the grammar school from the lower grades from 1886 to 1890.

This is an encouraging exhibit, and when compared with the showing of many localities in the state, it will be found that the percentage of pupils who complete the prescribed course in our schools is larger than the average. In some instances where the percentage of continuous attendance is relatively smaller, it is recommended that the course of study in the lower grades should be restricted to the rudiments, and that the scope of grammar school work should be

enlarged. Notwithstanding the fact of our creditable showing in this respect, like modifications of the course of study pursued in our schools would benefit all concerned.

New readers and supplementary helps, English Grammar and Language Lessons, have been added to the text-books in use in the 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th grades. Montgomery's History of the United States has been put into the 6th and 7th grades.

Stevens High School Report.

Stevens High School has completed another year of satisfactory work, during which the actual progress in methods and attainments is as marked as in any that have preceded it. While there has been no increase in the corps of teachers, and instruction in elocution has been temporarily dropped, all other departments have been strengthened. The work in mathematics, physics, chemistry and languages is excellent. The instructors all have special qualifications for their departments, and the response made by the pupils is very satisfactory. The school is now doing the best work it has ever been capable of. The instruction afforded is sound and practicable, whether the pupil is anticipating higher courses of study or not.

A great improvement has been begun in the department of physics by putting instruction on the basis of experimental work. All advanced schools prefer this method to the old way of teaching by text book. The value to the pupil is the same as accrues to anyone from personal experience rather than from reading of the experience of others. The improvement will, it is intended, be carried on until the department is entirely on the approved basis. Some necessary tables and apparatus have been added, and the apparatus will have to be still further increased in the next few years.

The condition of the school building calls for an immediate expenditure for repairs. Portions of the furnaces need renewing to ensure better and more economical heating. Repairs to the roof are also necessary, also another recitation room should be provided.

THE SCHOOL IN THE FUTURE.

Your committee, while attending to the present needs of the school, has taken some thought for the future. The course of study now demands five teachers, and but four recitation rooms are available. With the certainty that attendance will, in a few years, be largely increased, the insufficiency of present accommodations is evident. While it is possible to get along at present with no serious detriment, the time is close at hand when the necessity of a larger building will be apparent to all. It will be necessary for

the proper accommodation of pupils of the town, to say nothing of those from other towns, who pay tuition fees, and whose number is likely to increase as well. As it is always best to prepare ahead for emergencies, your committee would lay upon the town the need of consideration of these facts, and of preparation at no distant day, for enlarging the building by the addition of an annex, all with suitable ventilating and heating plants, and proper sanitary arrangements. That the expense will be considerable there is no denying. That the education of future citizens and their value to the community will depend upon such expenditure, is quite as evident. The value of a school to a town depends upon the town itself, particularly when, like Stevens High School, support comes principally from the citizens. In the past, the liberality of the citizens has kept pace with their ability. Now, with payment of the Stevens legacy probably close at hand, with the resultant income to be applied for the support of the school, it is not to be supposed that the interest of the town in this institution will flag. The burden of its support will undoubtedly be lessened, and the value of the school to the town will be increased.

At the same time, it is necessary to insist that the time is coming when the best interests of the school, and hence of the town, will require considerable expenditure. This should be made known, and anticipated with a view, when the time does arrive, of making the best and most economical expenditure possible.

Report of the Board of Health.

The present board of health was appointed by the selectmen on the first day of April, 1897, and were properly qualified and entered upon their duties at once.

George E. Parks was appointed chairman, and A. L. Marden secretary.

The rules and regulations of the board of this year are very nearly the same as those adopted by former boards, and for a time they were in part printed in both the local papers, and copies of them left at nearly every house and business place in the village. There have been the usual large number of complaints and in nearly every case we found, after a careful investigation, that there were good reasons for complaint. The same old trouble want of a proper system of town sewerage is still with us, and by far the greater number of complaints are caused by the want of proper drainage from sinks and from cesspools which would not be needed if we had good sewers in our streets. The board of health are often very much troubled to know what to do in some cases in order to do away with the cause of complaint. We have had some trouble in a few cases about the dumping of all kinds of rubbish in places not proper for such a purpose.

Now this is entirely unnecessary, as there is a suitable place furnished by the town, on land owned by Mr. Lawrence Tolles for the dumping and care of all waste material and refuse matter, and we feel it is for the interest of every one to make use of the place furnished by the town instead of dumping all sorts of old refuse in any place to get rid of it the most conveniently, and in that way endanger the public health. It is for the interest of every person in this town to keep their surroundings in as clean a manner as possible, and it is very discouraging for one to try and keep clean when those about him are allowed to throw old rubbish all about, and be obliged to breathe the bad atmosphere from decomposed organic and vegetable matter.

There have been thirty-one cases of diphtheria reported to the board, of which six died. We have had five cases of typhoid fever and six cases of scarlet fever, all of which recovered, but of the two

cases of membranous croup reported, both died. There were during the spring months about sixty-two cases of measles, but so far this winter there has but one case been reported. We have had no new case of diphtheria since about the first of January, and we sincerely hope there will be no return of that dreaded disease. When we consider the cases we have had have been widely scattered about the town, and that the towns all about us have had cases of it, we feel to congratulate ourselves that we have so few cases. Diphtheria has been quite prevalent to all through New England the past few months and in many places has prevailed to a much greater extent than here. We notice in the report of two years ago that seventeen cases of diphtheria were reported, and six of the number died. We now have thirty-one cases reported and the same number of deaths. Antitoxin is generally used in its treatment, as we believe with good results, if used in season, and we hope the time will soon come when we can be pretty sure of recovery in all cases which can have prompt and early treatment. All cases of communicable disease have been strictly quarantined, and in the event of recovery or death the room or house carefully fumigated.

We have obtained a Formaldehyde Regenerator for the use of Formaldehyde gas in fumigating. This is a great improvement on the old way of burning sulphur and we feel that this method of disinfection is quite sure to destroy all disease germs that may be about the house, bedding or the clothing. This method of fumigating has been in general use in the cities for some time, and is of late coming into common use in the larger towns throughout the country.

The duties of the health officers are not always pleasant, and very often quite disagreeable. It is very hard to be quarantined, and sometimes death comes to a family while they are in quarantine and the one who has died has to be taken away at once for burial without the presence and sympathy of friends. This is all very hard, and while it is the duty of the health officer to protect the general public, he should do all he can to make the situation as endurable as possible to those in trouble. We have endeavored to do this and we are very grateful to all those with whom we have had business, for the very courteous treatment we have received; we also wish to thank the physicians of the town for their kind and always helpful cooperation with us and for their promptness in reporting cases of disease to which they have been called.
