Town Warrant, 1926

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, qualified to vote in Town Affairs. You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March next, at Nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- Section A Town Officers' salaries.
B Town Officers' expenses.
C Election and Registration.
D Town Hall and office expense.
E Police department.
F Fire department including forest fires.
G Health department.
H Vital statistics.
I Trunk line maintenance.
J Town maintenance, including general highways, permanent improvements by law, lighting, water and general expense.
K Libraries.
L Town poor.
M Memorial Day.
N Interest.

- O Breaking roads.
- P Tarvia maintenance.
- Q Choate Brook bridge.
- R State tax.
- S County tax.

ART. 3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town, the sum of \$40,000, if needed.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State aid for the permanent improvement of the highways, as provided by law.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a bequest under the will of Emma P. Atkinson, late of Tamworth, deceased, as tendered by the executor of said will, of the sum of one hundred dollars, to be held by the town as a trust fund, the income thereof to be expended in maintaining and upkeep of the "Deering Cemetery," so-called, situated on westerly side of highway leading from Conway Village to Glen on the west side of Saco river in said Town, under the provisions of the third clause of the codicil to the will of said Emma P. Atkinson.

ART. 8. To see what action the Town will take for providing a watchman during the winter months to guard the unoccupied cottages in South Conway.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to offer a

reward for evidence leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons breaking and entering any unoccupied buildings in the Town of Conway.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the two flashing beacons and two danger reflectors now operating on trial, and raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay for the same.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to prepare and tarvia the roads from near Charles Lowd to Morrill Corner, so-called, and from near the Perkins' Homestead to Maine line and hire a sufficient sum of money not to exceed \$8,000, upon the credit of the Town, for the same, agreeably to suggestion of Budget Committee.

ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing a road roller for use upon its highways.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to form a fourth Highway District, to include all the roads from the junction of the East Conway and Redstone Roads, to the town lines of Chatham and Fryeburg.

ART. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to replacing the Smith Bridge sign post, which was destroyed last year.

ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred dollars to be used for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

ART. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to celebrate Old Home Day in Conway this year.

ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept for a Public Park that parcel of land in Conway Village, lying near the site of the former Chair Factory

and now used for a Park; and will appropriate each year the sum of twenty-five dollars for a trust fund for its upkeep and improvement, this money to be expended, as needed by three trustees, one of which shall be appointed each year for a term of three years by the Selectmen. Should hereafter this land cease to be used as a Public Park then to revert to the grantor or their heirs.

ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred dollars to be paid annually as the salary of the Justices of the Municipal Court of Conway.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, to extend the present street draining system on the southerly side of Chase Ave., in the village of Conway, in said Town of Conway, three hundred and eighty feet easterly, installing in said extension three drains or catch basins, at efficient points. Agreeably to a petition signed by James F. Drown and others.

ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for means to control the surface water on Chase Ave., in the village of Conway in said town, occasioned by rains and melting snow, and which now, during certain seasons flows from said Chase Ave., onto and across land of the Eastman Company and adjoining lands, resulting in damage to the owners thereof. Agreeably to a petition signed by James F. Drown and others.

ART. 21. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Board of Trustees:

I have the honor of submitting this, my twelfth annual report, of the activities of the library.

In preparing the statistical statement attached hereto, a comparison with former reports shows a slow but steady growth during the last five years, as evidenced by a larger number of books and periodicals issued, a larger number of active borrowers and an increasing demand for reference material.

I must again call attention to the fact that we are handicapped by an inadequate appropriation, this year's budget making no provision for the purchase of necessary books. This failure was in part remedied by the generous response of the community to the call for funds, enough being subscribed to purchase 62 volumes for the juvenile department, which was further benefitted by the gift of a set of the Book of Knowledge from the Conway Woman's Club, 25 volumes from Miss Marion Goulding and three from Mr. Felch.

The Duplicate Pay System, which is increasingly popular, provides for fiction, but no non-fiction which is after all the main part of any library, could be purchased.

Children's Book Week was successfully observed by story hours, poster contests, etc. Mrs. Rachel Baker and Mrs. Ruth Horne each very kindly gave an afternoon's entertainment to the children, more than 100 of whom received Book Week souvenirs.

The coming year will mark the quarter century period for the Conway Public Library and we hope to make it the most successful year of its history.

I take pleasure in presenting my report of the condition of our schools.

The teachers on the whole have been well chosen, and have had good preparation for their work. But I feel that I cannot too strongly urge that a salary scale be adopted which will hold good teachers year after year. There is a too frequent change of teachers. In the United States last year more than one sixth of the teachers left the profession. We have a still larger overturn usually. Because of this we are forced to accept more than our share of young teachers, and as soon as these teachers get experience they look for positions in other places where the salary seems to be larger, or for some other reason. If we get a superior teacher someone offers her a larger salary to go to some other place. We are too apt to think of the primary grades as less important, and turn the little children over to inexperienced teachers to experiment on. It is in the first grades that habits are formed that will hold through life. If habits of idleness or failure are formed at this time they will persist. I urge you to adopt some plan to hold our good teachers, and encourage them to become superior teachers. Such teachers should be trained to think of Conway as a place they can call "Home," and where they may be an asset to the school and desirable citizens of the town.

The attendance upon school duties is not yet as regular as it should be. When pupils are allowed to be irregular in attendance, or to be tardy it is cultivating habits that will be a handicap to them through life; and I urge parents to use every effort to have their pupils at school every session, and on time.

An outbreak of diphtheria in the primary school

at Conway, last year resulted in a number of deaths. The cases were all from one room, so the Board of Health ordered all of the books and apparatus to be burned, and the room to be painted. This has been done and a complete outfit for this room has been purchased. No new cases have appeared since the room has been renovated.

SCHOOL NURSE

I wish again to urge the importance of employing a competent school nurse. We have had abundant evidence of the value of such a nurse trained for special work with the children in the schools, and in the homes, as a visiting nurse. By combining with other towns this important work can be done without a large outlay.

KENNETT HIGH SCHOOL

There has been an enrollment of 170 pupils this year. It is very probable that there will be a larger number next year. There are not teachers enough to properly handle the number of pupils we now have, and I recommend that another teacher be employed. The building is now taxed to its capacity, and an addition to the present building will become a necessity in the near future. The rooms for science and mathematics are too small for the numbers we now have, and the assembly hall has to be used as a recitation room most of the time. This does not allow any room to be devoted to study; and it is very desirable to have such a room with a teacher in charge for supervised study.

GRADUATION

There were eighteen pupils graduated from the regular courses last June, and of these, nine have entered higher institutions of learning. Sixty-eight pupils were promoted from the eighth grade last June, and sixty-one entered Kennett High School.

The School Board decided that not enough pupils were taking the Household Arts course, and it has been discontinued until there is a demand for it that will warrant its being again offered. There are 51 taking the College course, 38 taking the Commercial course, and 91 taking the Business course.

A large loving cup has been placed in the Memorial room on which is engraved each year the name of the pupil who, by scholarship and general influence has been the greatest help in building up the character of the school. A smaller duplicate of this cup is presented to one pupil each year who in the opinion of the faculty merits it. The cups so awarded have been won by Robert Garland for the 1924 class, and by David Kellam of the class of 1925.

THE LORA KENNETT SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Woman's Club of Conway are raising a fund of three thousand dollars, the income of which is to be given to the graduate of Kennett High School who attends some institution of University or College grade under conditions prescribed by the Club.

TRANSPORTATION

A number of people on the West Side have expressed a desire to have their children conveyed to the

Conway schools. This would result in better teaching and discipline, and in many ways would be of advantage. The pupils from Kearsarge could also be conveyed to North Conway, with advantage in many ways. I recommend that citizens living in these places consult with the School Board and express their views on this subject. Much would depend of course on a proper conveyance.

REPAIRS

The North Conway and Kearsarge school houses have been painted; and the Conway grade building, and the West Side house have been shingled. This, together with the work made necessary on the primary room at Conway, has taken more money than was appropriated at the last district meeting. The school houses are now in very good repair and a small sum this year will do all that is necessary.
