
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

SCHOOL REPORT.

FELLOW CITIZENS:

The results of the school year just closed, though far from perfectly satisfactory, have been as good as could reasonably be expected, under the existing circumstances. A faithful and impartial performance of our duties, has been our earnest endeavor. The services of the best teachers have been enlisted that could be obtained with the means at our command, without diminishing the number of weeks schooling. Owing to this we have been obliged to employ a few inexperienced teachers, some of whom performed their labors in a highly commendable manner, while others failed to give perfect satisfaction, yet we believe that all have tried to the best of ability possessed to make our schools a success. Still to every thoughtful mind it must be evident that a good teacher is not the only requisite to a good school. The most needed and judicious efforts of an able, faithful and conscientious teacher may essentially be counteracted and neutralized by adverse outward influences. The adverse criticisms of teachers in some localities have been sufficient cause to stagnate, yea, to crush entirely out of existence for a time, all the interest for study the school may have ever acquired. Within a short period of time, some of the best and most experienced teachers have made nearly perfect failures. Why is it thus? Simply because it is impossible for any teacher who is compelled to labor under a most galling voke of unfavorable criticism to concentrate and fasten her undivided attention on the subjects embraced within the schoolroom. Again, under such circumstances, scholars almost invariably lose their interest in study, that faith and trust in the teacher is shattered, which combined are the prime essentials to rapid and thorough progress of young scholars. The usefulness of our schools would be greatly increased, and the task of the teacher much lighter, if while striving to promote the interest and welfare of all intrusted to her care, one half the energy were expended in endeavoring to assist, support and sustain the teacher, as is many times exerted to exhibit a questionable knowledge of methods superior to those employed.

This tendency to unfavorable criticism is extremely disastrous. Parents are too ready to speak of fancied failings of the teacher in the presence of scholars. An ill chosen remark may leave an unfavorable impression that cannot be overcome

by the teacher during the whole year.

Irregularity of attendance is another prime factor to the cause of unsuccessful schools. Parents are at fault in allowing this pernicious evil to exist in such enormous proportions. When the scholar neglects his school without the very best of reasons, he not only refutes the educational advantages placed within his grasp by a generous tax-paying public, and the more generous donators of our pernanent school fund, but ignores the inestimable privileges from which he should garner the greatest blessings of his whole life. How long must this evil exist?

This problem must be solved and answered by the people of our town, either to the permanent good or everlasting detriment of its rising citizens and population. Our school law enforcing attendance, reads well enough, but in practical effect it is the merest farce and we all know it. The public has no moral right or reason to anticipate proficiency in a child, whose attendance has been irregular and fragmentary. This is a most grievous wrong, and is not only a detriment to the scholar in question, but breaks up the regular order and impedes the progress of the whole school. If parents would see the highest possible, attainable results accrued from our annual school expenditures, it is imminent that each shall contribute his full share of carnest support by endeavoring to stimulate and encourage good habits, constant attendance, stringent application to studies and rules, and to perpetuate a proper appreciation of the useful advantages of our public schools, and be ever mindful that "The boy is the father of the man, and the children of today are the society of tomorlow. We see in our infant sons the coming voters and in our girls the mothers of our next generation of sovereign citizens, and that policy that governs our schools will presently control the government of the nation." The richest endowment that we can bequeath to our sons and daughters is to prepare them with sufficiently adequate qualifications fulfill faithfully the duties and obligations incident to such a life, both public and private as the constant change and steady advancement of a quarter of a century may bring about in so rich, powerful and progressive a country, as ours, the future foundation of which is now being built in our public

schools. There have been 23 weeks schooling for all, for the teaching of which was paid \$6.43, the average salary per week including board, with the following exceptions. The J. D. Philbrick school was increased 3 weeks by its permanent fund. There were 2 weeks additional taught at the Birches on account of last year's shortage, occasioned by uninhabitable condition of school house in extreme cold weather. There were 2 weeks shortage at the Parade on account of absence of teacher during the fall term. The number of scholars in Coffeetown division was deemed inadequate to warrant the support of a school in No. 12 school house, and while it resulted in quite a saving of finances, we believe the arrangement is equally as advantageous to the pupils in that division as it is economical to the town district. The high school was found upon examination to have made a proper use of its appropriation, showing a good degree of interest, ambition and appreciation of the earnest endeavors of its teachers, whose energies have been fraught with zealous frugality. The total number of scholars belonging to schools is 232. The number returned by the selectmen 180, 90 boys and 90 girls. The rate per cent. of taxation for support of schools was .002S4. In addition to the table of statistics 4 scholars pursued the study of geometery and 6 civil government in the high school.


