#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

#### (as known February 12)

- Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges, for the year ensuing and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf library; for the salary of the Librarian; for the maintenance of highways and bridges; for oiling our roads, and for lighting our streets for the year ensuing.
- Article 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day and to choose an agent to expend the same.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for state aid, and Trunk Line aid and maintenance, for our highways for the ensuing year; and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to allow a discount of 2% on early payments of taxes.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to eradicate the Pine Blister rust.

Scholars' supplies

Two years ago the District raised the sum of \$8,500. for all purposes. This was \$2000. less than had been raised the year before. The balance of \$796.10 on July 1, 1924 was reduced to a balance of \$162.37 on July 1, 1925. Last year we asked for \$9,000. This was cut to \$8,500. A cash balance on next July 1 is very doubtful. The difference between the budget for the next school year and the estimated income from sources other than taxation is approximately \$9,400. If the District raises the sum of \$9,000, the expenditures can be kept within the funds available only with the greatest economy.

We recommend that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000 for school purposes.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Franconia:

#### Curriculum

Your school system is divided into twelve grades, the first six of which are called the elementary school and the six higher grades the high school. The course of study in the elementary school is that outlined by the State Board of Education. The course of study in the high school has undergone several revisions during the past few years to meet changing conditions in secondary education. In order that all citizens may know just what is being taught in the high school the curriculum is printed below.

## Curriculum of Dow Academy, 1925-26

Year I: Grade Seven.

English, History and Civics, Commercial Arithmetic, Concrete Geometry, Elementary Science, Woodworking (boys), Cooking and Sewing (girls).

Year II: Grade Eight.

English, History and Civics, Arithmetic and Concrete Algebra, French, Elementary Science, Woodworking (boys), Cooking and Sewing (girls).

Year III: Grade Nine.

English, Ancient History, Algebra, French, Latin, Physiography, Domestic Arts.

Year IV: Grade Ten.

English, Medieval and Modern History, Geometry, French, Latin, Biology, Domestic Arts.

Year V: Grade Eleven.

English, Problems of Democracy, Advanced Algebra and Solid Geometry, French, Latin, Physics, Domestic Arts.

Year VI: Grade Twelve.

English, U. S. Constitutional History, Latin, Chemistry, Domestic Arts, Mathematics or French with Grade XI.

Note: In Grades Seven and Eight all subjects are required. In Grades Nine to Twelve four subjects are required each year. English is required of all pupils. History is required of all except those who need other subjects in its place for college preparation. This course of study provides preparation for practically all colleges.

# Supervision

It is my intent to visit your schools each week and to hold individual conferences with your teachers as the occasion demands. During the past year I have been much pleased with the character of the instruction and the morale of the school. I have never seen the teaching better and the interest of the pupils in the school stronger than at the present time. Standard educational tests given in many subjects during the past year show that your pupils are making the same progress in their work that pupils in city school systems are making. A special effort has been made "to keep alive the fundamentals": spelling, handwriting, the fundamental processes of arithmetic, place geography, silent reading and grammar. This has been done by frequent short drill periods and by tests provided by the State Board of Education.

You are fortunate in having several resident teachers of superior ability. The younger teachers are enthusiastic and thorough in their work. I am convinced that any official inspection will give Dow Academy a high rating among the high schools of the State. I am equally certain that your elementary teachers are unusually successful in their work. To maintain the present high grade of instruction should be your first consid-

eration. To retain the services of your present teachers in as many cases as possible should be your aim.

### Recommendations

In Franconia, as in other towns, the criticism is sometimes heard that the tax rate is high. Education is, of course, a considerable factor in determining the tax rate in any town. It has been interesting to me to determine the school tax in the seven school districts comprising this supervisory union. The figures given below are based on the appropriations for the school year of 1924-25, per \$1000 of equalized valuation. They are as follows:

Lisbon Special School District	\$11.60
Fanconia School District	9.04
Sugar Hill School District	8.85
Landaff School District	8.56
Lyman School District	8.00
Easton School District	7.60
Lisbon Town School District	7.44

The only district with which Franconia can be compared properly is the Lisbon Special School District because these two are the only ones maintaining high schools. The cost of high school education is big in comparison with elementary because of the more expensive equipment necessary for instruction in many courses and because of higher salaries demanded by high school teachers. The cost of instruction per pupil is generally higher in small systems than in large ones because much of the expense of operation exists in both. It is true that your pupils are getting practically the same opportunities that the pupils at Lisbon are getting, at a cost of \$2.56 less per \$1000 of property valuation to the tax-This is made possible by the fact that the Trustees of Dow Academy are able to pay for the upkeep of the building in which all of your pupils are housed. But few towns are so fortunate in being able to provide excellent educational opportunities at a comparatively low tax rate. Last year you appropriated \$8500 as a total sum for education. This year the school board is asking for \$9000. If you appropriate \$9000 your tax rate will be \$9.57. That is only 53 cents more for each \$1000 of taxable property and it is the lowest possible amount on which the schools can be operated without the danger of impairing their efficiency. I earnestly urge your consideration of this point.

As I stated in my report of last year, many school districts are doing definite work to promote better health among their school population. Among the aims education health is considered of first importance. Your pupils are being taught health habits in their program of school work. You have the usual number of pupils suffering from malnutrition and other handicaps to their best progress in school. Nothing concrete such as noon lunches and the distribution of milk has been done in your schools because the school board has not had the funds to finance it. A small appropriation for this purpose might be a wise move. Your pupils of today are vour citizens of the next generation. Good health is conducive to strong character and citizenship. ever you can do to promote health among your school pupils insures your future citizenry.

Your loyalty to your schools is unquestioned. Your interest and co-operation have helped make the past year a very pleasant one for me.
