## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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*To the inhabitants of the Town of Gilsum, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :*

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

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To the School Board and Citizens of Gilsum :

I herein submit my second annual report as superintendent of your schools. On it, I shall make a brief survey of some of the accomplishments, needs and objectives of the past year.

Throughout the extent of our republic from Atlantic to the Pacific, from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico, school officers and interested citizens have asked themselves what vehicle or connecting link has brought us as a nation from the "Yesterdays," the time when we rode in wagons, plowed with oxen, harvested with the sickle or cradle, threshed with the flail, read by candle light, to the luxuries and modernized activities of the "Todays," when we ride in automobiles and aeroplanes, upheave the fields with tractors; harvest and thresh with the same operation, read and acquire knowledge by electric light and radio.

Out of the dark shadows of the past comes the answer, yet wearing the scars of struggle, and the stripes of toil, but bearing in triumph the wisdom of all ages. We call her education, the torch that enlightens the world, fires the imagination of man and gives wings to the visions of youth, saturates the dreams of the aged and renders might to hand and brain.

We, having confidence in this parent of progress, creator of culture and moulder of destiny, look forward with assurance to the "Tomorrows" of our Democracy, believing that education will provide for us the founda-

tions of our future progress, that she will give the youth of our land the backbone of morale. Indeed, we trust our system of free education will become the conservator of the American home, the essential of citizenship and the inspiration for living.

The school is our workshop. Here we must stir the ambitious, stimulate ideals and forge the keys that open the door of opportunity to our children.

### HEALTH ACTIVITIES.

Dr. H. G. Williams, medical examiner for the Gilsum schools, submits the following results of his examinations given last October.

Number of cases of defective vision .....	3
Number of cases of defective hearing .....	1

Number of cases of defective teeth .....	48
Number of cases of hyperphoid tonsils .....	57
Number of cases of adenoids .....	32

On looking over reports for several years, I note too few corrections from year to year. Herein we fail to realize the greatest benefits from our medical inspection.

Either parents should consider themselves responsible to see that defects reported to them by the physician were corrected or a school nurse employed who would attend to the follow up work if we are to enjoy the full blessing of medical advice.

If arrangements could be made to unite a sufficient number of towns for the purpose of employing a full time nurse, a compensation of \$1.50 per pupil would be paid by the state.

Medical inspection in the schools serves a two-fold function. First, to find out the physical defects of the children and as far as possible to secure such treatment as will remedy the defects. This is the curative part of medical inspection.

The second function is positive. It seeks not only to cure but also to secure action and habitual practice in the rules which secure right and healthy living. It is not enough to cure physical weakness and disease. The boys and girls must be taught how to live in accordance with the principles of good health.

### SCHOOL WORK.

The Gilsum Grammar School completed a very successful year under the instructions of Mrs. Etta B. Rowell as teacher.

The parts were well written and delivered in a pleasing manner to an appreciative audience of parents and citizens.

Rachel Adams and Carl Wright are continuing their studies at the Keene High School. Tyyne Dickley is attending high school in Massachusetts.

Mrs. Rowell having resigned at the end of the school year, the school was assigned to Miss Marion Gee at the beginning of the present year.

Miss Mildred Pitcher continues her services as teacher of the Primary grades. Both teachers are giving excellent service to the children and community. Both are getting good results in school work.

Mrs. B. C. Carter was assigned to the West Gilsum School in September. Mrs. Carter has the school well organized and is getting much better work than was accomplished last year.

At the beginning of this school year, it became necessary to open the Belvedere School. This school was placed under cadet teachers from the Keene Normal. Although this arrangement necessitates a change of teachers every nine weeks, yet by having a critic teacher from the Normal visit them twice every month, the work is continued without interruptions caused by change of teachers. The system is working out to the mutual benefit of district and Normal School.

**OBJECTIVES.**

Of the seven objectives of education promulgated by the National Teachers' Association and broadcasted over the United States, we have placed emphasis particularly on the first, second, fourth and seventh, viz.: (1)

“Health,” (2) “Grasp of Fundamentals,” (3) “Good Citizenship,” (4) “Ethical Character.”

Reading, writing, arithmetic, English, geography, history and spelling comprise the backbone of our course of study. The efficiency with which these fundamental subjects are taught determines the strength or weakness of our schools.

During the year 1923-1924, the following standard tests were given to the pupils above second grade: Thorndike-McCall Reading, Ayres Spelling, Charter's Diagnostic Language, Gregory's American History, Gregory-Spencer Geography, and Stanford's Achievement Test.

The results obtained from all grades compared favorably with the standards established for the various grades.

From the statistics given in this report we note that in per cent of attendance, Gilsum has fallen below the standard maintained by the District and State. This was due largely to an epidemic of measles that prevailed during the Fall term. This is an unfortunate feature of the year's work. Punctuality and regular attendance are habits essential to the foundations of a successful life and have a direct bearing upon school progress and promotions. However, a much better rate of per cent has been maintained during the last five months of the present year, and if continued will place the per cent of attendance of Gilsum for year 1924-1925 ahead of the present rate of district or state. Certainly to accomplish this result is well worth your best efforts. On conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, teachers and citizens for their co-operation and support.
