General Remarks.

The schools in Nos. 1, 5 and 13 were assigned to the care of Mrs. H. M. Bullock, and visited by her at the commencement of the summer terms. On account of illness she requested me to take charge of them at the close.

NO. 1.

The summer school was taught by Miss Sadie B. Bunker. This school contained several large scholars that have evidently well improved their school privileges. Their readiness in answering questions and solving problems was alike creditable to to themselves and their teacher. The school seemed to be a very pleasant one.

NO. 2.

Miss Ethel A. Martin, Teacher. This school is small and although the average attendance was seven, there were only five present at the last visit. Good order was maintained, and the progress made was satisfactory.

No. 3.

Both terms were taught by Miss Ada B. Tinkham. The discipline was excellent. Miss Tinkham aimed at thoroughness in instruction, laboring earnestly for the advancement of her pupils, and her labors were well rewarded. Rapid promotion from small books to large ones and from one class to another, is regarded by many parents and scholars as the test of real progress. Hence it is that we sometimes find scholars studying books far beyond their ability to understand. Only seven instances of tardiness are reported for the year—a result gained only by care on the part of parents, pupils and teacher.

NO. 4.

The summer term was taught by Miss Sadie L. Hackett. Miss Hackett has a charming faculty of imparting knowledge to smaller pupils, and of gaining the respect of her scholars, which is so necessary to success. All the classes exhibited thorough training. The long list of visitors noted in the Register show an interest in the school by the parents, that is very commendable.

The good work so well begun in the Summer was continued in the Fall under the care of Miss Belle M. Rollins. Excellent order prevailed and good improvement was made in all the branches of study. A vertical system of penmanship was almost exclusively adopted in this district at the beginning of the Summer term. The legibility of the writing and the neat appearance of nearly all the books examined, is ample proof of the success of the experiment.

NO. 5.

Frank A. Tinkham, Teacher. At the closing visit the school appeared well. We were unable to judge how much progress had been made, but found some pupils well advanced in their studies, and the members of several classes deserve much credit for their promptness and accuracy in recitation.

NO. 6.

The summer school was taught by Miss Belle M. Rollins. The school contained many small pupils whose restlessness was, in a measure, unavoidable. Miss Rollins possesses much energy and perseverance, and worked hard for the welfare of her scholars. We noticed especially the good progress made by the smaller pupils in writing and spelling.

The Fall term was taught by Miss Sadie B. Bunker, who controlled with success the active spirits committed to her care. The teacher imparted instruction in a clear and faithful manner and the result was very satisfactory. It is gratifying to note in the Register a manifestation of interest in the school by some of the parents.

NO. 13.

The Summer school was in session four weeks under the care of George F. Pettingill, whose labors, as we understand, were satisfactory to both scholars and parents. He then left the school to accept a better paid position elsewhere. Mr. A. G. Bugbee was employed to finish the term. Good order prevailed. At the closing visit the pupils were studious and attentive. We think Mr. Bugbee a good instructor.

In concluding my report of the schools with which I have been connected for the past year, I am gratified to say that the improvement made in nearly all of them has been quite satisfactory. Although the Roll of Honor contains as many or more names than in previous years, it is desirable to have a much longer list. Deficiency in attendance is a very serious drawback upon the usefulness of our schools. The habit of tardiness, especially if once established, generally remains through life, and the injurious effects which it produces cannot be overestimated.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 6 of Chapter 77 of the Session Laws of 1899, the town of Grafton received \$257.23 from the state treasury, which sum must be applied to the support of its public schools. The law is calculated to supplement the efforts of the town to advance the educational standard. Friends of education throughout the state are anxiously watching the towns that receive a share of this appropriation to see whether they honestly use it to supplement their own efforts. No town shall receive any benefit under this act nor any portion of the literary fund unless its schools have been maintained at least twenty weeks during the school year. We earnestly urge the co-operation of parents in securing perfect attendance.
