THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

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TOWN WARRANT.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from Mrs. Annie Downes Bradley, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the John H. Downes lot in Contoocook cemetery.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from S. O. Wade, the income, subject to provision enacted at annual meeting of March, 1925, in relation to Trust Funds; to be used for the care of his burial lot in Contoocook cemetery.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from M. Etta Goodwin, the income, subject to provision enacted at annual meeting of March 1925, in relation to Trust Funds; to be used for the care of the George Crowell and Charles Boynton burial lots in Hopkinton new cemetery.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from the estate of George Everett Kelley, the income subject to provision enacted at annual meeting of March, 1925, in relation to Trust Funds; to be used for the care of the burial lot of Cynthia Kelley and John F. Kelley in Hopkinton cemetery.

7. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from the estate of Clara C. Rogers for the purpose of keeping the John Rogers lot in the New Cemetery at Hopkinton in repair in accordance with the vote of March, 1925.

8. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from the estate of Maria C. Ager, the income from same to be expended for the care of the burial lots of Walter C. Ager and Phineas Clough in the Contoocook cemetery, subject to provision enacted at annual meeting of March, 1925.

9. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from the estate of Sarah Nichols for the purpose of keeping two burial lots, one in the new and one in the old cemeteries known as the Palmer lots, in repair, subject to provision enacted at annual meeting of March, 1925.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept a tablet to be erected in honor of the boys from Hopkinton, who served in the World War.

11. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and the money for the same.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the improvement of that part of the cemetery at Contoocook facing the street.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the pay of the firemen while on duty at fires.



14. To see if the town will vote to accept a certain tract of land situated on the road from Contoocook to Clements Hill, from Robert T. and Mary M. Gould, to be known as the Gould Forest Reservation.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to build permanent road on the Contoocook Valley Trunk Line so-called.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,561.90 for the Trunk Line Maintenance.

18. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1, of the revised Statutes on a section of the Contoocook Valley Road, so-called, and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work, the sum of \$350 for this purpose.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Highway Agent to keep the State Highway known as route No. 103, passable for automobiles during the winter.

20. To see if the town will vote to buy a tractor and snow plow for use in clearing the highways from snow and for care of highways and raise and appropriate the money for same.

21. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase an automobile for the use of the District Nurse in her work caring for the sick and looking after the health of the town people and raise and appropriate the money for the same.

22. To see what action the town will take toward the adoption of a policy of planting shade trees along its highways for the purpose of preserving as well as beauti-

fyng them and the appointment of a committee of three citizens to formulate such a policy and present the same at the next annual town meeting.

23. To see what action the town will take toward advertising Hopkinton; the selection of an advertising committee; the issuing of literature and raise and appropriate the money for the same.

24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Hopkinton Free Public Library and appropriate the same.

25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day and appropriate the same.

26. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of the white pine blister rust.

27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the employment of a District Nurse and appropriate the same.

28. To see if the town will vote to allow 2% discount on all taxes paid on or before July 15th, 1926.

29. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks not earlier than April 1st.

30. To see if the town will vote to buy the three beacon lights now situated in Hopkinton and Contoocook villages and appropriate the money for same.

31. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees and Committees.

32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and road agents to remove stone walls and erect fences in places thereof, when in their judgment, it will prevent the snow drifting on the highway.

33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase and install a set of scales in Hopkinton Village and appropriate money for the same.

34. To hear and transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

I herewith submit my fourth annual report. The statistical tables are arranged to show the general standing of the different schools and groups of schools in the District.

It can readily be seen that the pupils of the six village elementary schools greatly outnumber those in the five rural schools. For the school year 1925-1926 the village schools averaged 26 pupils each while those in the rural sections averaged only 11. This year we were able to secure normal school graduates for two of the rural schools. They are on the same salary scale as the village teachers. Therefore the per capita expense is more than double that of the village schools.

Under the present organization further consolidation in the villages is out of the question; all village schools have as many pupils as they can accommodate without overcrowding.

If then we desire efficient administration of all our schools the one way out is consolidation of the rural schools. This problem, I believe to be worthy of careful consideration and study, especially by those most intimately concerned.

A study of the map of the town gives a clear idea of the changes in centers of population. Seven abandoned rural schoolhouses in Hopkinton, speak far more eloquently of changes that have been going on than anything I can say regarding the matter. The small number of children in the five rural buildings now in use is abundant evidence that these changes are still going on. If reasonable combinations could be made whereby two schools could be eliminated, it would be possible to concentrate our

efforts on the three remaining schools and gradually build up three strong rural communities.

The problem of providing adequate room for the High and Junior High schools is the same as in the preceding two years. We have made it a little less acute by using very unprogressive methods. First we selected seven pupils from the seventh grade, gave them some extra training and double promotion to the High School. Fortunately all who entered the High School are doing fairly good work for the first half of this year. Secondly we kept five seventh grade pupils at West Hopkinton, thus making the enrollment there 28 pupils, distributed through seven grades. This makes too large a proposition for one teacher to handle. Next year with the possibility of eight grades and more pupils the West Hopkinton school will still be further handicapped.

If we continue these two plans the two schools directly concerned will have to work on a much lower standard, and that lower standard will in turn gradually be reflected in a much lower standard in the High School.

The large body of loyal progressive citizens, alumni of the Hopkinton High School, now residing in town, is a strong testimonial to the practical value of their High School training. In fact too valuable to permit of any permanent lowering of the standards. Since conditions have so changed that the building now occupied by the elementary, Junior High and High schools does not meet the educational and social needs of the community, I therefore repeat the recommendation formerly made, that definite action be taken regarding the construction of a new High School building.

The change, from a one session to a two session High School, put into effect last September is proving generally satisfactory. This change brings our school into line with practically all the other High Schools in the state.

Most of the school buildings are in good condition. No extensive repairs or alterations will be necessary this year. The Main Road and Hatfield buildings are in need of new paint and repairs on the walls and ceilings of the school rooms.

I recommend that the District consider the question of moving the Main Road School to one of the nearby side roads; preferably toward Farrington's Corner. It might be possible to relocate it in a place that would make one school serve these two sections of the district. The heavy, constant traffic on the main road not only distracts attention within the school room but is exceedingly dangerous to the children during the recess and noon periods. The fact that the yard in front of the building is narrow, and is about three feet higher than the road, adds a very large element of danger.

The music work under the efficient leadership of Miss Lena Conant has made good progress in all the elementary schools. The annual operetta, given at Contoocook is a fine tribute to the effectiveness of the work carried on during the year.

In closing I gratefully express appreciation of the loyal support of parents, pupils, teachers and officials without which success is impossible.

## REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

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Your committee, having made an investigation at the High School building, find a somewhat congested condition pending, and that some steps will undoubtedly have to be taken to relieve the situation temporarily, until something definite may be decided upon.

In our opinion, it would be better to separate the High school from the Grades, if, the voters should decide to build or purchase another school building. In as much as there are not adequate playgrounds for all at the present location, this would seem necessary to obtain results satisfactory to both teacher and pupil.

We believe in the proposition of the Farm Bureau Federation and the Dept. of Agriculture as follows:

The consolidation of Rural Schools to the end that a permanent school may be maintained in these rural sections with teachers equally as well qualified, and as well or better paid, as those employed in village schools. At the present time, it is a fact that the teachers of rural schools are not paid on a basis of equality with those in village schools.

If the proposed plan of rural consolidation could be brought about in this town, it appear that quite enough could be saved to cover the additional salary expenses.

On pages 90 and 91 of Commissioner Butterfield's Report of years 1921 and 1922. He says: "Trained teachers may be retained in rural schools, if provision is made for an end of the year addition to the teacher's salary, provided that she be a normal graduate with at least two years of experience, and is teaching a one-room rural school of not fewer than 15 pupils, at a salary not less than the average for teachers of similar qualifications.

I can see no other way to get competent trained teachers for our rural schools. We must increase the inducement. No amount of persuasion or plausible argument can permanently convince young girls that country teaching is more attractive than work in the village or city. We must then have country girls, accustomed to country life trained for rural schools and, in addition, we must pay them enough so that they will choose to remain in a rural school. This would mean that a large rural school must expect to pay at least \$100 more than a village school nearby of like size and importance.

I believe this is the only plan which will save our one-room country schools, and I believe they are worth the saving."

This proposed plan, in our opinion, should not be adopted until it has had a thorough discussion in all sections, and we would propose that a committee be appointed to cooperate with the Farm Bureau and that at their meetings this question be made a prominent topic for discussion.
