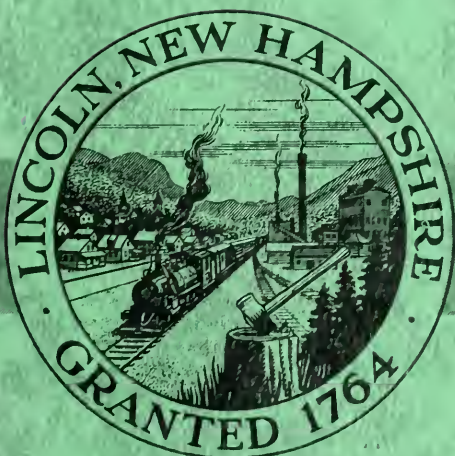

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**ANNUAL TOWN MEETING — LINCOLN, N. H.**  
**MARCH 7, 1972**

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7 O'Clock P. M.  
Lin-Wood High School Auditorium

The meeting was opened by Moderator George McGee, Sr., and then recessed until Town votes were counted in order that those newly elected officials could take their oaths of office and assume their new positions.

At 7:35 Mr. McGee reconvened the meeting, stating that a quorum of selectmen was not at the table and asked for a motion to officially begin the meeting. Robert Corum made such a motion, and it was seconded by Paul Asselin. Passed by a majority vote, Robert J. Alger asked to be recorded as a "NO" vote.

Mr. Branscombe offered a motion to dispense with the reading of the Warrant, and the Articles to be read separately with the exception of the Preamble. This was seconded by Mr. Strickland and the motion was unanimously carried.

Mr. McGee read the Heading and Preamble and presented Article 1 regarding the tabulation of votes and inviting a challenge from the floor. With none forthcoming, the meeting continued.

The Moderator stated that he will recognize the Chairman of the Budget Committee for the purpose of its recommendations on each Article that must have its recommendation stated for the record.

ARTICLE 2 — "To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same." A motion was made by Mr. Gionet to raise the sum of \$19,750, which includes \$6,200 for an administrative assistant. (The Town Report indicates only \$13,550.) Seconded by James Moody, the motion carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 3 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for District Court Expenses.” Motion offered by Mr. Strickland to raise \$4,700. for the District Court Expenses, seconded by Robert Leclair, and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 4 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for operation of the Lincoln Garage Building.” Lester Gulley offered a motion that the recommendation of the Budget Committee to raise \$2,000 for this purpose be accepted. It was seconded by Mr. Branscombe, and unanimously adopted.

ARTICLE 5 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Employees Retirement and Social Security Taxes.” Mr. Gionet moved that the sum of \$2,500. be raised as recommended by the Budget Committee, for the above mentioned taxes, and it was seconded by Mrs. May Tardiff. Some discussion was held, and the motion was carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 6 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for a Contingency Fund.” A motion was offered by Mr. Robertson and seconded by Roger Thompson to accept the recommendation of the Budget Committee to raise \$1,000 for this Fund. Unanimous vote carried the motion.

ARTICLE 7 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Police Department.” Mr. Corum made a motion to discuss this Article before it was presented. Upon seconding, the Chair allowed this as proper. Mr. Robertson asked that if this motion were defeated would the discussion of the Article be closed. Answer in this case, NO. Verbal vote was taken twice as the Chair was in doubt, but then the discussion was given on the motion. Several spoke, including Mr. Corum; Mr. Weeden, who made it clear that he would do what the people wanted done; and Les Gulley. Motion was made by Roland Bourassa to raise \$25,325, as recommended by the Budget Committee, and seconded by James Custeau. The motion carried with a majority vote.

ARTICLE 8 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Fire Department.” Mr. Joe McGinnis offered a motion to raise \$5,000 as recommended by the Budget Committee for the Fire Department. This motion was seconded by Mr. Dauphine, and unanimously adopted.

ARTICLE 9 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to cover payment of premiums for all forms of insurance.” Mr. Gionet offered a motion that the sum of \$6,500 be raised for payment of premiums for all forms of insurance, as recommended by the Budget Committee. The motion was seconded by Mr. Strickland, and passed by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 10 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Civil Defense.” After some discussion of this Article and an explanation of what the money hopefully would be used for — an air compressor, Mr. Gionet moved that the recommendation of the Budget Committee of \$300 for this purpose be accepted. Mr. Strickland seconded the motion, and it was carried by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 11 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Health Department. Following the recommendation of the Budget Committee of a sum of \$3,500, questions, mainly of why last year it was necessary to vote about \$6,700, were raised. Roger Stewart explained that we are now working in a combined effort with other towns and can share expenses. He also stated, however, that this may not continue due to distance, etc., and that we may have to go back to our original plans. A motion was offered by Roger Stewart to accept the recommendation as given, seconded by Mr. Ward, and carried unanimously

ARTICLE 12 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for operation of the ambulance.” Mr. Gionet offered a motion that the sum of \$1,500 be raised, as recommended by the Budget Committee, for the operation of the ambulance. Mr. Dauphine seconded the motion, and it was carried unanimously.



ARTICLE 13 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to operate and maintain the Sewer System.” Mr. Waldo stated that at the Town Meeting an amendment might have to be made to the original Article 13, in which the Budget Committee recommends that the sum of \$5,000 be raised.

Mr. McGee stepped down from the position of moderator to speak. Because of the urgency of the matter he felt the necessity for bringing this matter to the attention of the voters. Regarding the hearing of the past week, a stipulation was put on the mill that another secondary treatment plant would have to be installed and operational within one year. Mr. McGee said that this is impossible in all ways. The present facilities are municipally owned; therefore, we should be eligible for Federal grants and funds. Right now preliminary reports to go with applications for funds are being prepared in Boston and should be back within a few days. We are talking somewhere in the neighborhood of 1-1.5 million dollars. So, some monies are needed for legal fees, engineering fees, etc. Discussion followed Mr. McGee’s remarks. One question raised was “How much money would be required?” The answer given was “\$1,000.” The amount would then read \$6,000 instead of the \$5,000 for the Article.

Mr. Gionet moved that Article 13 be amended to read that the sum of \$6,000 be hereby appropriated for this purpose, seconded by Mr. Beaudin, and carried by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 14 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to maintain the Town Dump.” A sum of \$2,200 was recommended by the Budget Committee to cover this Article. After discussion, Mr. Gionet offered a motion to accept the Committee’s recommendation, it was seconded by Roger Thompson, and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 15 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Town Maintenance.” Mr. Gionet offered a motion that the sum of \$30,000 be raised as

per the recommendation of the Budget Committee, for Town Maintenance. Mr. Beaudin seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 16 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Street Lighting.” The Budget Committee recommended a sum of \$9,000 be raised for street lighting. Mr. Larue offered a motion that Article 16 be accepted as stated; it was seconded by Mr. Dauphine, and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 17 — “To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$106.09, the State to contribute \$707.23 for Town Road Aid.” Mr. Donald Ciareglo moved that the sum of \$106.09 be raised for town road aid, as recommended by the Budget Committee; Mr. Bourassa seconded it, and it was adopted unanimously.

ARTICLE 18 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Public Library.” Roger Stewart moved that the sum of \$4,801 be raised as recommended by the Budget Committee for the Library. The motion was seconded by Mr. Woodward and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 19 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Town Poor.” A motion was made by Mr. Gilman to accept the recommendation of \$5,000 from the Budget Committee, it was seconded by Mr. Dauphine and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 20 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance.” Following the recommendation of the Budget Committee that \$1,500 be raised for this purpose, Mr. Ciareglo offered a motion to accept the recommendation. Seconded by Mr. Beaudin and adopted unanimously.

ARTICLE 21 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Lincoln-Woodstock Day Camp and the Kancamagus Ski Club.” The Budget Committee recommended the sum of \$3,500 for the

use of these two groups. A motion was made by Mr. Bourassa to accept the proposed sum of \$3,500 for use by the Lincoln-Woodstock Day Camp and the Kancamagus Ski Club, and seconded by Mr. Leclair.

Discussion of this motion was held, in which James Beaudin asked for an amended motion to read that an addition of \$500 be added to that sum for use only of plowing a piece of land for use of snowmobiles. His motion was seconded by Mr. Ledger. Questions were asked as to what specific areas were being considered, how large an area was indicated, etc., Mr. Beaudin offered a couple of suggestions, one being that a strip along the side of the airport could be used, and as far as size was concerned, "whatever the \$500 would bear."

A suggestion was made that this question could possibly be taken up under the last Article of the Warrant. With no further discussion, the amended motion was voted upon, but lost. Back to the original motion of \$3,500; it was passed unanimously.

At this point a recess was declared by the Chair to announce the Town vote results and swearing in by Judge Parker. The results were as follows:

ARTICLE 22 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to operate and maintain the Water Systems.” The Budget Committee recommended that the sum of \$5,000 be raised under this Article. A motion was offered by Mr. Larue and seconded by Mr. Gionet to accept as recommended by the Budget Committee the raising of \$5,000 to maintain water systems. Discussion followed, requesting information as to why the money was necessary. Mr. Gionet gave one explanation that this was for maintenance of the reservoir; another comment was that the Town does no longer own any electrical system; Mr. Bowlan offered that the Town does still have to maintain its own fire alarm wire in some parts of Lincoln. With no more questions, the motion was carried unannimously.

ARTICLE 23 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.” Mr. Beaudin offered a motion that the sum of \$1,500 as recommended by the Budget Committee be accepted, seconded by Mr. Dauphine, and adopted unanimously.

ARTICLE 24 — “To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Advertising and Regional Associations.”



The Budget Committee recommended the following for Article 24:

A motion was offered by Mr. Woodward to accept the Budget Committee's recommendation, it was seconded by Mr. O'Rourke, and carried by a majority vote. Mr. Roland Goodbout wished to be recorded as a "NO" vote.

ARTICLE 25 — "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes or other anticipated revenues." Les Gulley moved that Article 25 be voted as read, authorizing the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes or other anticipated revenues. Mr. Bourassa seconded the motion, and with no discussion it carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 26 — "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend on the projects and/or debt retirement schedules voted in this warrant that may develop from monies paid to the Town by the State or Federal Government." Hammond Robertson, Jr., made a motion that the Selectmen be authorized to expend on the projects, and/or debt retirement schedules voted in this warrant that may develop from monies paid to the Town by the State or Federal Government. Seconded by James Beaudin, the motion was passed by majority vote. Mr. Ledger wished to be recorded as a "NO" vote.

ARTICLE 27 — "To see if the Town will vote to prohibit dogs from running at large within the limits of the Town of Lincoln; to authorize the impounding of dogs running at large, whether licensed or unlicensed; to authorize the redemption of impounded

dogs; and to provide a penalty." Motion favoring the restraining of dogs was offered by John MacDonald and seconded by Mr. Strickland. After some lengthy discussion, during which John Weeden took the stand to submit an ordinance used by the City of Manchester, New Hampshire, as an example, plus answering numerous questions, he stressed again, that he only wanted to do what the people wanted him to do. He did state that he had had many complaints about dogs bothering young children and the property of others. Following the discussion the vote was lost.

ARTICLE 28 — "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate obtained by Tax Collector's deed and to execute any deed or deeds therefor in the name of the Town." A motion was offered by Mr. Beaudin and seconded by Mr. Savoy that the Selectmen be authorized to convey any real estate obtained by Tax Collector's deed and to execute any deed or deeds therefor in the name of the Town. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 29 — "To see if the Town will vote to regulate the operation of self-propelled snow traveling vehicles in the following manner:

1. Hours of operation.

All operation of self-propelled snow travelling vehicles shall cease between the hours of 9:00 P. M. and 7:00 A. M. within the following area in the town: bounded on the southerly side by the Lincoln-Woodstock town line from the East Branch of the Pemigewasset River to U. S. Route 3; on the west-erly side of U. S. Route 3 northerly to the intersec-tion of U. S. Route 3 with Pollard Road; on the northerly side by Pollard Road to the intersection of Pollard Road with Main Street near the Charles Lynch residence by an imaginary straight line run-ning at right angles from said intersection (Main Street) to the East Branch of the Pemigewasset River.

Between the hours of 9:00 P. M. and 7:00 A. M. no self-propelled snow travelling vehicle shall be operated closer than three hundred feet to any private residence anywhere in the Town of Lincoln.

## 2. Areas of Operation Limited.

At no time shall any self-propelled snow travelling vehicle be operated within the limits of the town cemetery, the municipal airport or the Kancamagus Ski Slope, so-called, nor upon any sidewalk or roadway unless it is engaged in the process of lawfully crossing said sidewalk or roadway.

No self-propelled snow travelling vehicle shall be operated at any time upon either Lin-Wood High School or Lincoln Grammar School grounds.

No person shall operate a self-propelled snow travelling vehicle upon the private lawn or property of another without express written permission from the owner or lessee thereof to do so.

## 3. Any person upon conviction of any provision of the foregoing by-laws shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, for each offense. (RSA 31:39)."

This Article drew much discussion, and again John Weeden came to the podium to answer questions. No one made a motion on the Article as it was stated, but James Beaudin offered a motion that the White Mountain Snowmobile Association work with the Chief of Police in the immediate future to set up some type of system whereby everybody would be satisfied. This is to include getting permits to cross lands, policing themselves, etc. The motion was seconded by Mr. Gionet, and carried by a majority vote.

ARTICLE 30 — "To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the payment of principal and interest on long-term notes coming due during the ensuing year." A motion was made by Hammond Robertson, Jr., to raise the sum of \$323,760.25 as recommended by the Budget Committee, for the payment of



principal and interest on long-term notes coming due during the ensuing year. Seconded by Mr. Branscombe, the motion carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 31 — “To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,100 for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser, said sum previously authorized for the purchase of land from the State of New Hampshire.” After a short discussion regarding cost of repairs, etc., for the present cruiser, Mr. Corbeil offered a motion that the recommendation of the Budget Committee to raise a sum of \$3,100 be accepted. Mr. Branscombe seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 32 — “To see if the Town will vote to approve the sale of land in the Town of Lincoln to the U. S. Forest Service.” In reference to the sale of land to the National Forest Service, Mr. Gionet offered the following resolution in the form of a motion:

“Whereas the future economic development of this community is desirable and in the public interest. RESOLVED: that the voters of Lincoln assembled in Town Meeting this 7th day of March, 1972, go on record as opposing any acquisition of lands in the Town of Lincoln, by the U. S. Government as it would not be desirable or of the best interest to the Town.”



This resolution was seconded by Robert Alger and carried by majority vote.

ARTICLE 33 — “To see what action the Town will take in regard to a subdivision of any lands in the Town of Lincoln. A motion was made by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Savoy, and carried unanimously to pass over this Article.

ARTICLE 34 — “To see what action the Town will take in regard to construction of water and sewer lines at the South End of Main Street.” The Budget Committee recommended a sum of \$2,500 be appropriated for this Article. Several spoke on the issue, including the Gilmans who had been slated for new lines in 1969 but passed by to date. Finally a motion was made by James Beaudin, seconded by Mr. O'Rourke, and adopted unanimously to raise the requested sum.

ARTICLE 35 — “To see what action the Town will take in regard to a reimbursement for water and sewer lines for the following developers:

Mr. Bowlan offered a motion that this Article be passed over and treated at a separate town meeting at a later date. Mr. Gionet said that he would like to see action now; that it had been put off before. After some amount of time and the point having been made that if this is passed, it is setting a precedent and that Loon for one will request similar treatment, a Resolution was incorporated into the record as follows:

“WHEREAS the Town of Lincoln has made it the practice in the past of making reasonable reimbursement of the costs of construction of access roads and

water and sewer pipelines to developers and builders of homes, thereby adding substantially to the tax base of the town and

WHEREAS Loon Mountain has defrayed the cost of roads and water and sewer pipelines which service the development known as Beechwood Acres and

WHEREAS this development has contributed substantially to the tax base of the town and will make further substantial contributions and

WHEREAS Loon Mountain is willing to postpone a request for such reimbursement at this time

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Town give consideration to a program of reimbursement on such terms and over such period of time as the Budget Committee may recommend at any future or Special Town Meeting in which such recommendation may be in order."

Amendments were made, amendments to amendments made, then all were retracted. Mr. Gionet offered a motion that the individuals listed in the Warrant be reimbursed for the stated amounts. It was seconded by Mr. Mulleavey and the vote on this motion was in the negative. Therefor the motion was lost.

ARTICLE 36 — "To see what action the Town will take in regard to the purchase of the Lincoln Garage Building at a cost of \$80,000."

The Budget Committee recommends that the purchase of the building be approved and further recommends that the sum of \$80,000 be raised and/or appropriated for this purpose. The recommended budget provides that \$8,000 be paid out of the current year tax levy and that the balance of \$72,000 be borrowed.

Ater extensive discussion pro and con, Murray Clark offered a motion, seconded by Mr. Alger, that a committee be formed to offer \$35,000 to Mr. Marca-

lus for the land and building, with a report being made back to the recessed town meeting within 30 days. (Mr. Waldo had already said that the price of \$80,000 was not negotiable.) A standing vote was needed, to which the count totaled 32 Yea's and 28 No's, and the motion carried.

Mr. Robertson suggested that the Selectmen solicit some appraisal figures in regard to the purchase of the so-called Town Building before the next meeting.

ARTICLE 37 — "To see if the Town will vote to have the New Hampshire State Tax Commission audit the Town Books." A motion was offered by Hammond Robertson, Jr., seconded by Edmond Gionet, and passed unanimously, to have the New Hampshire State Tax Commission audit the Town Books.

ARTICLE 38 — "To transact any other business that may have legally come before the meeting."

A. An announcement was read by the Moderator as follows:

RSA Chapter 69 — Section 26: There will be a verification of the checklist between April 1 and August 1, 1972. All eligible voters are to appear before the supervisors to register or re-register. Whenever a person is re-registered, his party designation, if any, on the checklist shall not be changed.

Change of party designation will be at a special sitting — 90 days before primary election.

Dates of registration will be advertised in newspapers and posted in town.

B. Mr. McGee as a selectman entered the following resolution as a motion:

The Selectmen are hereby authorized to apply, negotiate, and do all things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for construction of secondary treat-

ment, or such other treatment as may be required by State or Federal regulations.

This resolution was seconded by Mr. Gionet, and carried unanimously.

- C. Again in the capacity of selectman *Mr. McGee* read the following resolution in the form of a motion:

WHEREAS the need for additional physician services and facilities is becoming acute in the Lincoln-North Woodstock community and

WHEREAS a joint representative citizen group to alleviate such need is desirable and urgent and in general interest.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT The Town of Lincoln participate in this effort through the appointment of qualified representatives authorized to act jointly in committee with representatives similarly appointed by the Town of Woodstock.

The name of the committee shall be "Joint Committee on Physician Services."

The duties of the committee shall be to devise and carry out such plans for improving the general health care of the people of these communities and provide for stable and reliable physician services as in its judgment will best serve the public interest, including but not limiting to procuring the services of a physician or physicians, devising ways and means of accommodating and facilitating such practice and otherwise encouraging the residency of such practitioners.

Consideration shall also be given to plans for a clinic building with such conveniences and facilities as the committee, in consultation with representatives of the medical profession, shall deem expedient.



Representatives from this Town shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen selected by the Board, the Chairman of the Budget Committee and the Chairman of the School Board, and, in addition, four other members appointed by the three ex-officio members aforesaid.

The committee through the members selected by this Town shall make a progress report at the next annual Town Meeting or, at its option, to any special town meeting in which such report may be in order. The members selected from this Town shall serve for one year until the next annual Town Meeting which shall terminate or extend its participation in this effort.

This resolution was seconded by Mr. Gionet and carried unanimously.

Mr. Thomas C. Ward, President of the Lin-Wood Home Health Agency, asked to have the following statement read as an endorsement to the last resolution read by the moderator, in the name of the Lin-Wood Home Health Agency:

March 3, 1972

To All Interested Parties:

There presently exists in the communities of Lincoln and Woodstock a dire need for physician services and medical facilities. At present, one medical doctor resides within the community. However, he is semi-retired and spends several months of each year travelling. In his absence, the residents of these communities must travel over twenty miles to either Plymouth or Littleton for the medical assistance they need. This condition places lives in this community in jeopardy, in cases of emergency.

The Lin-Wood Home Health Agency wishes to go on record as being in full support of the "Joint Committee on Physician Services," and the efforts

it undertakes to secure the necessary physician services and medical facilities for the Lincoln and Woodstock communities.

The Lin-Wood Home Health Agency will cooperate in working with the National Health Service Corps, or any other agency that the "Joint Committee on Physician Services" endorses for the purpose of improving medical services to the Lincoln and Woodstock communities.

- D. Mr. McGee asked that the Selectmen be authorized to prepare a suitable resolution for the permanent record in memory of Kenneth McInnis, a former fire chief, and to submit a copy of same to his family. This was passed by acclamation.
- E. A motion was offered by Dick Schlaefer, seconded by Ed Clark, Jr., and adopted unanimously to recess the meeting until Tuesday, April 11, at 7 p.m. for the purpose of further discussion of the building problems. This motion for recess was made at 12:15 a. m., seconded, and carried unanimously.

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The Special Town Meeting of March 30, 1972 was held at the Lin-Wood High School Auditorium. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, George McGee, Sr., at 7:30 P. M. Article 1 was read by the moderator to wit:

ARTICLE 1 — To see if the town will vote to issue notes in a sum not to exceed eighty-three thousand, three hundred six dollars and ninety-one cents (\$83,306.91) to the State of New Hampshire under and in compliance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 33 and all amendments thereto (Municipal Finance Act) and to authorize the selectmen to issue and negotiate such notes and determine the rate of interest thereon, and to do such other acts as may be necessary to effect the issuances, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes as shall be in the best interest of the town of Lincoln and pass any vote or votes relating thereto, all in accordance with House Bill 6, as amended and passed by the 1972 special session of the Legislature.

The motion was made by Henry Waldo to issue the notes as set forward in Article 1. The motion was seconded by Leslie Sargent.

At this time there was a discussion period and explanation of the Article and its intent and purpose.

The Article then was put to vote: All those in favor of passage of the Article as read, were asked to stand and be counted. Those voting in the affirmative 60, those opposed 2.

Henry Waldo made the motion that the petition documents, the Decree from the Superior Court and the Warrant, which were all posted prior to this meeting, be made a part of the permanent records of this

meeting. The motion was seconded by Roger Stewart. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2 — To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

This article was mainly held to discussion of the financial status of the town. No motions made and no votes taken on this article.

The motion was made by Frederick Branscombe and seconded by Robert Russell to adjourn the special meeting. The vote was in the affirmative. Meeting adjourned at 8:30 P. M.

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**RECESSED TOWN MEETING — APRIL 11, 1972**

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The recessed Town Meeting of March 7, 1972 was recalled to order April 11, 1972 at 7:00 P. M. at the Lin-Wood High School Auditorium by the Moderator, George McGee, Sr. The primary reason for the recessed meeting was for further study and discussion of Article 36 of the Town Warrant.

Parliamentary Procedure to be used at this meeting was explained by the moderator. Legality of the chair was challenged by Edmond Gionet.

The chair recognized Ronald Bowlan for the following motion:

Moved: That the town enter into a lease-purchase agreement with Green Acre Woodlands, Inc., for the lease of the Lincoln Town Building, so called, for the term of one year together with the option to purchase said building for a sum not exceeding Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00) upon such terms and conditions as the selectmen shall determine to be in the best interest of the town, the said lease-purchase agreement to incorporate the provision that any and all payments made under the terms of the lease shall be applied to the purchase price thereof, said sums to be raised on a year to year basis from taxes.

The motion was seconded by Joseph McInnis.

The result of an appraisal by Burt Reid of Littleton, N. H., a highly qualified appraiser hired by the selectmen, was read by the moderator.

Robert Alger took the floor in opposition to the motion, and proceeded to explain the plans for a new building. Mr. Alger then presented an amendment to the motion which is as follows:

“In lieu of the present news of the Franconia Mfg. Co. shut down and that the town funds would be strained at this time, that the Board of Selectmen

enter into negotiations for a concrete lease with the present owner of the town garage building for a period of not more than one year, in the event that a lease agreement can be made that the selectmen be authorized to fund the difference which was appropriated at the March 7th, 1972 Town Meeting, not to exceed \$6,000.00 per year expenditures, and that I also move that a committee be nominated and elected from the floor consisting of six (6) citizens and the Board of Selectmen from the Town of Lincoln, N. H., to evaluate and study the proposed alternatives, seek out possible land sites and request of other reputable contractors, invitations to participate in proposals for the construction of a new town municipal building.”

This amendment was seconded by Jimmie McLaughlin.

Various people spoke either pro or con on the original motion and on the amendment. It was noted that not sufficient monies were requested in the amendment. Mr. Roger Stewart then amended the amendment making the following change: “To substitute \$8,000.00 per year for the \$6,000.00 per year as stated in the amendment.” This was seconded by James Beaudin.

After discussion and classification of the motion and amendments on the floor, the amendment to the amendment was put to vote, the vote was unanimously in favor. The amendment as amended was put to vote and carried. The original motion was then put to vote and this carried.

The chair gave notice that it would entertain a motion to reconsider action on Article 7 pertaining to the police budget of \$25,325.00 passed at the March 7, 1972 session of the Town Meeting. Since that time the Department has applied for and will receive from the Federal Government \$1,500.00 for extra police. Authorization to use this money must be voted on. Mr. Robert Alger made the motion to amend the police

budget of \$25,325.00 and add to it \$1,500.00. The motion was seconded by Fred Branscombe. The vote was in the affirmative.

Under Article 38: A letter to the selectmen from the Forest Service pertaining to the TV cable permit for Russell Crag was read. There was nothing definite in the letter; it only updated the progress in the permit and lease negotiations.

Nominations were made as follows for the six member committee to evaluate and study alternatives, land sites and contractor proposals for the construction of a new town municipal building.

Jimmie McLaughlin nominated Robert Alger. Nomination seconded by Robert Welch.

Leo Savoy nominated Joseph McInnis. Nomination seconded by Donald Ciarleglio.

Lawrence Woodward nominated J. Stanton Hiliard. Nomination seconded by Winston LaRue.

Edmond Gionet nominated Edward Clark, Sr., Nomination seconded by James Beaudin.

Mrs. Robert Alger nominated J. Sanders Haas. Nomination seconded by Lawrence Woodward.

Edward Clark, Jr., nominated Winston LaRue. Nomination seconded by Robert Alger.

Roger Stewart moved that nominations be closed. Motion seconded by Fred Branscombe. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Lawrence Woodward made the motion to adjourn the town meeting. The motion was seconded by Robert Alger. The vote was in the affirmative.

**SPECIAL TOWN MEETING  
LIN-WOOD HIGH SCHOOL  
SEPTEMBER 11, 1972**

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The Special Town Meeting was called to order at 7:30 P. M. by the Moderator, George McGee, Sr. The Moderator read the petition which was presented to the Justices of the Superior Court stating the reasons for the petition and the articles to be acted upon at the special meeting. This was followed by the reading of the decree by the Presiding Justice of the Superior Court granting approval for the Special Town Meeting.

Robert Russell made the motion that the moderator dispense with the reading of the warrant; the motion was seconded by Donald Ciarleglio. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Article 1 — To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00) to purchase, repair, and maintain the building in which the Town Offices, Fire Station, and Municipal Court are now located; and in order to provide such sums as may be raised under this article, to authorize the selectmen to borrow the amount voted and to issue a note or notes in the name and on the credit of the town and to fix the time and place of payment, the rate of interest, terms, and maturity thereof.

In the absence of the chairman of the Budget Committee, Robert Russell, a member of the Budget Committee, stated the recommendation of the committee was for the purchase of the town building as set forth in the above article 1.

The chairman of the Building Committee, Robert Alger, gave the report and recommendation of his committee. The Building Committee, after exploring many avenues, were of the opinion that at this time



their recommendation would be to purchase the so-called town building.

After a discussion period the motion was made by Robert Alger to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$80,000.00 to purchase the so-called town building as stated in Article 1. This motion was seconded by James Beaudin. The motion passed and was unanimously adopted.

Article 2 — To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$17,500.00) as the local contribution to the cost of the construction and maintenance of a public medical facility to be located in Lincoln and operated by a public charitable corporation, said appropriation to be effective only if public funds from other sources shall have been made available equal to at least ninety percent (90%) of the cost of said facility, and to expend said funds through said public charitable corporation; and in order to provide such funds as may be raised by this Article, to authorize the selectmen to borrow the amount voted and to issue a note or notes in the name of the town and on the credit of the town and to fix the time and place of payment, the rate of interest, terms, and maturity thereof.

A resume and status report of the Lincoln and Woodstock joint committee on physician's services was read to the meeting by Thomas Ward, a copy of which is attached to the original copy of the minutes of this special town meeting. A considerable discussion was given to Article 2. At the end of the discussion period Ira Pollock made the motion the town accept Article 2 as written. The motion was seconded by Donald Ciarleglio. When put to vote the motion was adopted unanimously.

Article 3 — To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate for the sale of, to sell and sign any and all documents necessary to the sale of the industrial waste facility known as

the Copeland Process, and to give the Board of Selectmen authority to use their discretion in the accomplishment of the same; and to authorize the selectmen to expend all funds realized from the sale of said facility for the purpose of retiring the town indebtedness.

Article 3 is merely an authorization and self-explanatory. There was very little discussion on this article.

The motion was made by James Beaudin to pass this motion as written. The motion was seconded by Ira Pollock. The vote was passed unanimously and the article adopted.

The motion was made by James Beaudin to adjourn the Special Town Meeting. The motion was seconded by Donald Ciarleglio. By unanimous vote the motion was carried. The meeting adjourned at 9:30 P. M.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 23 of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the United States of America, acting through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, is authorized to provide financial assistance to local public housing agencies in providing low-rent housing by leasing dwelling units in privately owned structures; and

WHEREAS, said Section 23 provides that the provisions thereof shall not apply to any locality unless the governing body of the locality has by resolution approved the application of such provisions to such locality.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Town Meeting of the Town of Lincoln, New Hampshire, as follows:

That there is a need for a Local Housing Authority in the Town of Lincoln, and that the provisions of Section 23 of the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, may be applied to the Town of Lincoln.

This year we purchased 355 new books. Of this amount 90 were adult non-fiction, 125 adult fiction, 134 juvenile fiction and 6 juvenile non-fiction. At the same time we tried to keep up with current new titles for adult readers.

Mrs. Mary Marden was hired and worked on this until November when Mrs. Norma McLaren replaced her. Under these women, magazines, books, records, cassettes and other materials are taken directly from the library to the homes of those unable to get there. We wish to thank both women for their work.

At this time we would also like to thank the Trustees for their support, Mrs. Martha Patterson, our faithful bookkeeper and the many others who have helped us on the Bookmobile and other related library work.

## LINCOLN POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

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During 1972 the Lincoln Police Department presented 523 cases to the Lincoln District Court. These cases are as follows:

Many other investigations were made of various violations of the law, resulting in some cases being settled without recourse to court action. Other cases are still pending.

The Town of Lincoln has entered into a cooperative agreement with the United States Forestry Service whereby the federal government reimburses the Town of Lincoln for certain services performed by the Lincoln Police Department on White Mountain National Forest land. Because of this agreement the Police Department has been better able to protect the persons and property of those thousands of law abiding citizens who visit the White Mountain National Forest in Lincoln.

The Lincoln District Court will pay to the Town of Lincoln (as you may note elsewhere in this Town Report) more than \$19,000.00 for the year 1972. This is an increase of about 150% over 1970. The large majority of cases in the Lincoln District Court are

presented by the Lincoln Police Department. This gives some indication of the increase in criminal activity in this area since 1970 and the resultant demands upon the Police Department.

I am sure that most of those who read this have been made aware by radio, TV, newspapers, magazines, etc., of the problems facing law enforcement officers throughout the nation today, but I would beg your indulgence in allowing me to briefly explain my impression of these problems, insofar as the Town of Lincoln is concerned.

The Police Department is expected to protect, to the best of its ability, the persons and property of everyone within the limits of the town—this includes all of those thousands of people who briefly stay in or pass through Lincoln throughout the year. This means that the Police Department not only tries to prevent crimes against the person, such as assault, robbery, rape, etc., but also protects people by enforcing laws as varied as mistreatment of children, disorderly conduct, arson, drunkenness, larceny, forgery, indecent exposure, defrauding innkeepers, burglary, malicious damage, etc.

The individual police officer is expected to understand and be able to enforce several hundred criminal laws as well as another several hundred motor vehicle rules and regulations. He also has to be trained in basic investigative procedure and the law of arrest. He must also be able to prepare and prosecute his arrest cases in District Court. In addition, the police officer is expected to know how to investigate motor vehicle accidents and complaints of all kinds, ranging from burglary to a kitten stuck up in a tree.

The police officer must be neat, courteous and as diplomatic as possible at all times, and, in effect, be a personal representative of the town.

He is on twenty-four hour call and is expected to answer all complaints regardless of what time of day

or night they are made, and he is not paid overtime for doing so.

Upon stopping a motor vehicle he never knows whether the operator may have just committed a crime and may be ready to kill him to avoid capture. He is expected to arrest and subdue (without brutality) drunks, drug addicts, mentally unbalanced persons and potential murderers with little or no help.

If he is beaten, shot or injured in any way while performing his duty his only recourse is usually workmen's compensation insurance.

He does his best to protect all of the members of the community and, unfortunately, in too many cases, for doing so receives a relatively low salary and sometimes very little thanks.

We are fortunate here in Lincoln, in that the large majority of citizens are intelligent and understand the problems which face not only the police but the community as a whole. These persons seem to be completely in favor of law enforcement to ensure the protection of the persons and property of everyone.

There is a very small minority, of course, as there is in most other communities throughout the nation, that seems to be either ignorant, prejudiced or confused, which looks at law enforcement as an infringement upon the "rights" of those who belong to this minority to do exactly as they please. Thank God they are in the minority—otherwise we would sink to anarchy.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

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In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

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Board of Selectmen  
Lincoln, New Hampshire  
Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of these audit reports must be given the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent records.

### Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Public Library, Trustees of Trust Funds and Lin-Wood Home Health Agency.

### Financial Statements

#### General Fund:

#### **Comparative Balance Sheets - As of December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971: (Exhibit A-1)**

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the financial condition of the General Fund - as of December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the Town decreased by \$11,768.42 from \$27,763.56 to \$15,995.14, during 1971.

#### **Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2. The



factor which caused the change was as follows:

As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$26,412.95, less a revenue surplus of \$14,644.53, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$11,768.42.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all Town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were

considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. The amount of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as stated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

#### **Overdraft of Appropriations and Application of Municipal Budget Law:**

Inasmuch as the Town of Lincoln has adopted the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, the Selectmen are prohibited from making expenditures or incurring liabilities in excess of the total amount appropriated for all purposes by the Town meeting, or for purposes for which money has not been appropriated. Provided, however, that when circumstances arise during the year which make it necessary to expend money in excess of Town appropriations, or for purposes for which appropriations have not been made, the Board of Selectmen with the approval of the Budget Committee, upon application to the Tax Commission, may be given authority to make such expenditures.

During 1971, budgetary expenditures subject to the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law resulted in a net overdraft of Town appropriations of \$25,731.75, as indicated herewith:

In connection with this overdraft, the records of the Tax Commission indicate that a request by the Board of Selectmen to exceed 1971 Town appropriations by \$15,000.00 was approved by the Tax Commission on October 28, 1971, pursuant to the provisions of Section 10-a of the Municipal Budget Law (R. S. A., Chapter 32). Inasmuch as the total appropriation overdraft amounted to \$25,731.75, unauthorized expenditures of \$10,731.75 (\$25,731.75 less \$15,000.00) were incurred. This resulted in a violation of Section 10 of the Municipal Budget Law.

Presented below is a schedule showing the amount of the net overdraft of budgetary appropriations for each of the past two fiscal years:

During this two year period, the current surplus of the Town decreased by \$31,141.37, from \$47,136.51 at December 31, 1969 to \$15,995.14 at December 31, 1971, due primarily to these appropriation overdrafts.

In view of the existing economic conditions in the Town of Lincoln, it is imperative that the Selectmen pursue accounting and business practices which will control expenditures and avoid budget overdrafts, thus preventing further deterioration of the Town's financial position. In this connection, it is noted that the Selectmen in 1972 appointed an administrative assistant who is responsible for all accounting functions. This action should correct the inadequacies in accounting and business procedures which were enumerated in our previous report.

#### **Uncollected Leasehold Rents — \$148,56.14:**

The above amount is due the Town from the Franconia Paper Corporation at December 31, 1971, according to the Town's records. However, inasmuch as this matter is the subject of litigation pending in the



Grafton County Superior Court, we are unable to express an opinion as to the value of this asset at December 31, 1971.

**Conclusion:**

The provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27-a, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.
