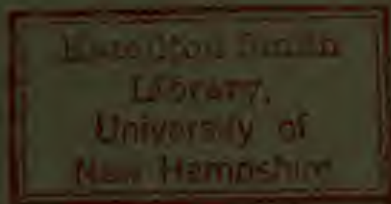

Town Meeting Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 12th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for a term of three years, in place of Lydia D. Jackson, Stella B. Farr and Jane T. Robinson, two Highway Agents, and three Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the Town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 4. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for highways in

this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the State, approved February 24, 1905, and any amendments thereto, to raise and appropriate such sums of money as many be deemed advisable and to make suitable appropriation under said acts.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars for a free hospital bed at the Littleton Hospital for a period of one year.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, for the purchase of a portable stone crusher.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in cooperation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take relative to discontinuing the highway leading from Carleton Street, near the upper electric light station, to the Whitefield road.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will take relative to discontinuing the old highway leading from the Ferne J. Foster farm to the Albion G. Peavey farm.

Article 10. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 11. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to

carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF TREASURER

On account of the following letter from the State Department of Public Instruction, making our school year end August 31, 1918, no detailed report is given herewith, but will be published in accordance with our usual custom in 1919.

New Hampshire Department of Public Instruction Division of Statistics and Accounts.

Concord, Jan. 2, 1918.

To School Boards and Superintendents:

The attention of school officers is called to an amendment to the Public Statutes by the last General Court.

“The fiscal year of town and special school districts beginning February 16, 1917 shall end August 31, 1918, and thereafter the fiscal and the scholastic year shall end August 31, annually.”

This change was approved by the Governor on April 4, 1917. Practically all school meetings had been held and in few instances would the appropriations be sufficient to carry on the schools for the extra six months. Your attention is called to this matter so that there may be sufficient appropriations made at the coming school meetings to support the schools until August, 1919.

SCHOOL MEETING.

It was advised that the report of the school board concerning conditions of schools of the district be made to the district at the annual meeting. This may well include a report of the finances to date of meeting but it is to be noted that as the year does not close until August 31, the annual financial report cannot be made before that date.

This annual financial report should be presented at the School meeting of 1919.

School Superintendent's Report

Gentlemen of the School Board of Littleton:

The schools have not escaped the influence of the war which we are waging. They have, I trust, risen to a new vision of what American education means. Our teachers are realizing that to them is given the great trust of passing on to the generation in their charge the heritage of American democracy.

The intense demand for a distinctively American education has led to the reorganization of the public school system that is now taking place everywhere in our country. For the old common school system of eight or nine grades which was brought to us almost bodily from aristocratic and autocratic Prussia we are substituting the elementary course of six years, designed to give all our children the working tools of education, followed by the junior and senior high school. Children reach the seventh grade at about

that time in life when the great changes that result in maturity are beginning to take place. The curricula of the junior high school are planned to meet these changes pedagogically and to offer our boys and girls the richest possible opportunity.

Our Littleton schools are proceeding quietly in the direction of this reorganization. Departmental teaching, begun last year in the seventh and eighth grades, has been continued and extended. Miss Bronson teaches algebra in the senior high school and Mr. Doody and Miss Osgood come down to the seventh and eighth grades respectively for French and Latin. The curricula have further been broadened by science designed to give an explanation and understanding of the main facts of daily life, and by a more vital and purposeful type of mathematics. Even greater stress is being laid upon essentials. The results have been an awakened interest in school and a more purposeful attitude on the part of the pupils.

The schools have responded directly to the challenge of the war. No less than ten of our high school boys are now in active service in the army or the navy. Many more are drilling in the State Guard or the company of high school cadets. The headmaster of the high school is also a member of Company G.

The causes and issues of the war have been made understandable to the children of the school. The events are being followed from day to day with intense interest. History and geography have been vitalized by the great happenings of our days. The literature of the war, particularly the wonderfully significant papers of state, are studied directly.

All the children were encouraged last spring to plant and care for gardens with good results, which were manifest at the excellent exhibition of products at the school fair held at the Opera House in the fall. A much more earnest attempt in the same direction,

under the leadership of the state department of public instruction, will be attempted this year. We hope that no less than three hundred children's gardens may result.

The manual arts departments have "done their bit" in the making of articles for the Red Cross, in food conservation, in canning, in sending Christmas boxes to the soldiers and in assistance in the Hoover pledge campaign. The music classes have learned to sing with new enthusiasm the songs of patriotic import. The school children have entered whole-heartedly into the thrift stamp contest.

One thing should be clear. The schools must as a measure of national preparedness be kept at their highest efficiency. It is our business to see that they are administered with rigid economy. That does not mean the curtailment of expenses for necessary things. Good teachers must be assured. The state department of public instruction advises the extension of our courses in domestic arts and manual arts. It is regrettable that it does not seem immediately feasible to establish a course in agriculture.

SUPERINTENDENT'S POLICY

The general policy of supervision and administration has not been essentially changed, but widened and strengthened. One teacher in each building has been made principal. She is thereby held responsible for the administration of the schools under her, with the support and direction of the superintendent. The headmaster has maintained an efficient management of the high school. Loyalty and cooperation have marked the relations of teachers and superintendent.

Constructive supervision is the aim. Faults are sought only that they may be remedied. Personal conferences, teachers' meetings, testing, intimate contact with the children are some of the means em-

ployed. The teachers have organized a study club, which meets once a month for the study of vital topics in education.

The loss during the year has been seventy. The pupils who have left the high school have done so because the demands of livelihood have been more insistent than the opportunities of school. Removals have caused most of the decreases in the grades, although a few have left school upon reaching sixteen. The severe weather has caused some loss in our first grades. Thirteen at least have left the Apthorp schools because of removal from town by reason of the closing of the old shoe shop.

Thus our membership has been somewhat affected by the conditions of the war. But the loss has been fairly insignificant. Certainly the establishment of some new industry now hoped for ought to restore our normal enrollment.

Attendance has been generally good. The truant officer has effectively administered his office.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

Dr. Page completed his examination of the children early in the year. Number of pupils examined, 935. Thirty-three card notices have been sent to parents. Forty-nine cases of treatment secured since last year's examination are reported. These results are gratifying. The inspector has kept a constant watch upon the health conditions of the children. His services to both teachers and pupils have been indispensable.

RURAL SCHOOLS

The renovation in the schoolhouses at West Littleton and Mann's Hill, where new heaters like the one at Pattenville have been installed, has put these two buildings into a satisfactory state. Three of our schoolhouses are thus in first class condition with resulting gain in the comfort and efficiency of the schools. The North Littleton school demands some sort of change in the heating plan. The rural schools deserve the

best that we can give them. It is especially imperative that a liberal policy in regard to securing and keeping expert teachers for them be maintained.

TEACHING FORCE

Fortunately we carried over to this year the greater part of our teaching force. The changes that we were compelled to make have been, generally, satisfactory. It is noteworthy that Miss Osgood has returned to our high school, resuming a service that in length and devotion is scarcely to be excelled. In putting a man in charge of manual training we have done wisely. Mr. Edwards has made the work popular with the boys and has proved the value of the shop for much of the repair and construction work needed by the schools. Miss Richardson has vitalized the work of the domestic arts department. A larger number of high school girls than usual are taking the curriculum. Next year we shall graduate our first girls from this course. I have no hesitancy in saying that we should extend the work of our manual arts department.

MUSIC

Mrs. E. J. Cummings has demonstrated her ability in the position of music assistant made vacant by the resignation of Miss Hattie Richardson. As head of the department Mrs. Bingham continues her years of excellent service in this work. The victrola has been increasingly used for the teaching of musical appreciation. Our music courses are doing an indispensable work in furnishing our children with the means of harmless enjoyment for future years.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT

Last December Mr. H. C. Morrison closed his term of distinguished and significant leadership as State

Superintendent of Public Instruction to take a position as assistant secretary of the Connecticut State Board of Education. His place has been filled by the appointment of Deputy Superintendent Butterfield. Mr. Butterfield is like an old acquaintance to this community, as he served some time ago as principal of the Bethlehem schools. I believe that he will be a worthy successor of Mr. Morrison.

CONCLUSION

I can scarcely believe that I am on my eighth year of service in the schools of Littleton. Yet during that time I have seen your boys and girls growing from childhood to youth. It has been my good fortune to see many of them come to places of influence and worth. I count myself blessed to have been given so great an opportunity and I am grateful to you and to the public back of you for all the loyalty, good will and cooperation that have been shown me.

LIBRARIAN'S NOTES

A general survey of the library work, pertaining to the progress, from the viewpoint of efficiency in serving the demands of the public, is in keeping with those of the past few years, and our record in comparison with that of other libraries of like equipment is of a scheduled standard; but this does not imply that there is no chance for improvement, and that we are doing all we ought to do, or all that could be done.

Libraries throughout our country are no longer at a stand still, serving only those who know what they want and how to get it, but their duty now is to bring before the public, not only what they think they want but what they need, and this implies a cooperation with all phases of life, cooperation with the schools ranking of first importance, resulting in more efficiency for both teachers and scholars. This is followed

by cooperation in the social, business and home life; and as a result our record for the coming years, if we wish our library to be in the front ranks, must be a steady gain in order to meet the ever increasing demands.

This past year in library work has brought to the fore many new methods of cooperation, and these war time obligations have been met with an open mind toward the fulfillment of library ideals; though we have been unable to cope with the larger and better equipped library, we have been able in minor ways to do a little helpful work, so that we feel we do not merit the opprobrious term of being a slacker in the cause for which humanity is struggling.

As will be seen from the statistics, the past year was a record year for the library in point of circulation as there was an increase of nearly three thousand more books circulated than last year, the total circulation being thirty-two thousand eight hundred and fifteen volumes. The accession list has been increased by five hundred volumes, covering many classifications. Many of the popular current war books have from time to time been added, which have been in constant demand.

Many books have been given by friends interested, and much appreciation is extended to the donors.

The library allied itself as a member of the International Mind organization and by so doing has been the recipient of books relating to the standing of our country in international matters.

It was with many feelings of regret, that the library board found it necessary to close the library four evenings each week during the cold weather. While this has no doubt caused some inconvenience to the public and more especially to the schools, however, the arrangement has been thus far quite a satisfactory experiment, and has in no way affected the general

circulation, as the month of January records the average number of books circulated. Much inside library work has accumulated during the extreme weather which it has been impossible to do, and this must be added to the spring and summer work.

It was thought advisable by the library board, in accordance with the opinion of the selectmen to give up the printing in the town report of the list of books added the past year, as it was thought to be an expense not wholly of worth for the town to assume. It is expected that later some simple convenient catalog will be compiled to place before the public, and thus more efficiently serve those unable to come to the library and dependent on lists, also the summer guests who patronize the library, and are unfamiliar with its contents.

As, is always the outcome, with any institution rapidly growing and expanding, the library is unable to meet the ever increasing demands, and the thought must ever be in the minds of those bearing the burden of promoting the usefulness and upkeep of the library of what the future will exact.
