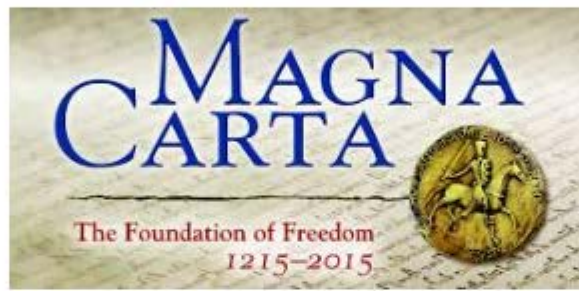

“Magna Carta: Enduring Legacy 1215-2015” Traveling Exhibit to Display at UNH School of Law from April 11 through April 22nd, 201

CONCORD – The American Bar Association’s Standing Committee on the Law and the Library of Congress’s Law Library have selected Concord and UNH Law as a location on the national tour of a travelling exhibition honoring the 800th anniversary of the Magna Carta, the charter sealed by King John of England that is acknowledged as the basis for the rule of law in modern democracies.



The University of New Hampshire School of Law will host the “Magna Carta: Enduring Legacy 1215-2015” from April 11-22, 2016 in the UNH School of Law Library (located on the 2nd floor, 2 White St., Concord, NH 03301.) The exhibit will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, for individuals. Groups larger than 10 interested in viewing the exhibit should contact Sue Zago, Law Library Director, for an appointment. There is no charge for admission.

Included in the exhibit are images of objects from the Library of Congress collections, an interpretive video and other artifacts highlighting the impact the Magna Carta had on forming modern democracy. The exhibition provides visitors the opportunity to appreciate how the Magna Carta’s significance has endured through several centuries.

The exhibit is sponsored by the American Bar Association, Library of Congress, Law Library of Congress.

In celebration of this visit, the law school’s chapters of the Federalist Society and the American Constitution Society will be hosting a symposium on Tuesday, April, 12th at 6 p.m. at the law school in room 204. This event will begin with a reception at 5:15 p.m. in the IP Library on the 3rd Floor of the UNH Law Library.
