REPORT OF THE TOWN AUDITOR

For the Year Ending December 31, 1949

This is to certify that I have examined the accounts and records of the Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Road Agent, Treasurer, Water Commission, Recreation Commission and Selectmen and find them correct as far as could be determined, to the best of my knowledge and belief.

I should like to make the following notes and recommendations concerning my audit.

Tax Collector's Accounts

A complete list of all taxes to be abated during the current year should be made up prior to December 31st of each year and signed by the selectmen. This list should then be incorporated in the records of the tax collector and the proper entries made in the tax books for each year, before the tax collector's records are submitted to the auditor.

Property sold to the town for 1945 taxes during a previous year was redeemed during 1949 and the amount of the redemption was credited in error to 1948 taxes collected during 1949. I have previously stressed the fact that amounts collected for redeemed tax sales must be kept separate from taxes collected. I would recommend that the use of Eastman's Cash Book Form E-64 (as attached with specimen entries) be instituted by the tax collector as this form provides space for the proper entries for tax sales as redeemed. I would also recommend that Eastman's Form CP-31904 (as attached) be submitted to the town treasurer with remittances for tax sales redeemed.

Road Agent's Accounts

Discount to be taken on the road agent's invoices for supplies should be deducted on the road agent's weekly statement to the selectmen and the selectmen's order should be made out for only the net amount of the invoices. If this is not possible a more adequate record must be kept by the road agent of the total amount of discounts and the amount refunded to the town on that account. I would recommend the use of National Blank Book Form 2782-2:6 (as attached with specimen entries) to provide an adequate reconciliation of the road agent's accounts.

The above mentioned form would also make provision for the entering of receipts and remittances to the treasurer on account of work done for individuals and other towns and for rental of town equipment. Remittances during 1949 totaled close to one thousand dollars and some thought should be given to the matter of separating the

billing and collection of these accounts between two officers as an added safeguard. A performance bond should be taken out on the person collecting this amount of money.

Town Clerk's Accounts

The town clerk was unable to locate the stubs for 1948 auto permits issued from January 1, 1949 until the 1949 permit blanks were received. The amounts had been entered in the town clerk's record book but the auditor should have access to both the used and unused stubs.

Water Commission

All town officers handling town funds are required to be bonded. I would recommend that immediate consideration be given to the matter of securing performance bonds covering the water commission and their collectors of water accounts.

General

Town officers making collection of money on account of the town are required by law to turn over all town funds in their possession once a month to the town treasurer. Some laxity has been noted in this respect and I would recommend that the selectmen call the attention of the officials concerned to this requirement.

It would save considerable time if expired performance bonds and insurance policies were filed away in a transfer file and current bonds and policies were kept in a designated place in the safe and made available on call for the inspection by the auditor.

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

At a special town meeting, authorized by the Court and held on August 16, 1948, the town voted to purchase the Marlboro Water Company. The selectmen received authorization at this meeting to borrow \$20,000.00, and \$16,000.00 of that sum was designated as the purchase price of the Water Company with the remainder, \$4,000.00, set aside for its betterment and improvement. This water-works system furnished the supply of water for approximately five hundred household residents of Marlboro in addition to most of the public buildings and mercantile establishments of the town.

A Board of Water Commissioners was duly elected at this meeting, and, thereby, vested according to law with the management, control, and direction of the newly-acquired water-works system. Upon assuming its responsibilities the Commission found that through the courtesy of the Fletcher Granite Company water had been siphoned from the Quarry Reservoir to augment the available water supply, and this method of operation in use since June 13, 1949, had resulted in drawing this supply down to a dangerously low level.

The Commission concentrated upon two problems (1) Finding and repairing a number of bad leaks which made it possible to remove the siphoning system from the

Quarry Reservoir on November 1; and springs have remained full since that time. (2) Exploring the Town for an underground water supply by the way of gravel-packed wells to alleviate, if possible, the dangerously low level of the supply. An extensive investigation was conducted including 23 individual explorations. With the exception of two test wells, none were productive of sufficient water. One of the two successful tests, while indicating sufficient quantity, showed high iron concentration which would be objectionable. The other well, located at the rear of the elementary school, was satisfactory so far as quality is concerned and a limited yield is available. The Commission proposed to the State Board of Health that this location could be used for an emergency or supplementary source, and the Board at its meeting on Friday, January 27, extended its approval to this proposal. This total project had a cost of \$2,097.71. These data are worthwhile in that the town is fully informed as to what can and cannot be done in the way of ground water in the vicinity of Marlboro, and the information will always be available when there is future need of reference.

The Commission at this time is not ready to make permanent recommendations. We are investigating the cost of other surface water supplies, including Stone Pond, and awaiting a possible development of the Fletcher Granite Company because of the reservoir located upon the Quarry property. Therefore, we recommend the issuing of notes over a twenty year period. The liquidation of these notes will be without additional taxes upon the town, and will not in any way prevent the future development of any financing or project which the town might adopt. At some future date, we will bring out recommendations to include an adequate supply of water not only for household and business purposes but for a complete hydrant, fire-protection system.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS January 1950

Member of the School Board and Citizens of Marlboro:

A superintendent in office only five months can hardly point to past achievements of any importance, for such things take time, and "speed slowly" is a good motto for one in a new position. Likewise it is best not to make too many promises for the future. Therefore, I will concentrate on those things of the present which concern our schools.

In charge of our local schools, we have a capable, hardworking headmaster whose first concern is the welfare of his pupils and teachers and whose last concern is an evening of rest at home.

Today when hundreds of thousands of pupils are being taught by under-trained, inexperienced teachers, the schools of Marlboro are staffed with well-trained, experienced, progressive, and capable teachers, to whom the community owes much and of whom it should be proud. It is my purpose to sustain the professional morale of our staff at a high level by offering them encouragement in their work and support in their efforts to maintain efficient classroom instruction and discipline.

First steps have already been taken toward the establishment of a guidance program for each pupil with an individual guidance folder containing a photograph of the pupil and a complete record of marks, results of intelligence tests, aptitude tests, the health record, activities record, and family data. This folder will follow the child from grades one through twelve and will be an important device in making school work meaningful and useful.

A problem which was successfully met this year but which will probably re-occur, is that of increased pupil enrollment. Our goal is to have one grade for each teacher. This year we have had to form a group consisting of pupils

from grades one to two. We have been fortunate in obtaining cadet-teachers from Keene Teachers College to assist with this arrangement. It is often asked whether the solution to our enrollment problem might not be to send our high school pupils to Keene, thus providing ample room for the elementary grades. Too many times this question is discussed on the basis of personal feelings or local pride rather than on the basis of sound educational principles. Size of enrollment is an important factor in determining the social and educational development of pupils. Keene High School is already too large to meet the needs of many of the pupils from small towns; and Marlboro High School is, on the other hand, too small to meet any of the needs of its pupils. Some school, smaller than Keene and larger than Marlboro, would provide the type of education needed at a more reasonable per pupil cost. Perhaps a new, modern Marlboro school structure, large enough to house our own increasing enrollment as well as to offer education to all the pupils of Roxbury and to the high school pupils of Harrisville, Nelson, and Sullivan, would prove to be the best solution.

The consolidation of school districts, often discussed as a solution to this problem, will probably hibernate until such time as the State or Federal governments offer funds for the building program, and the State Department of Education strongly motivate such consolidation.

Our immediate problem is to seek to maintain our educational program at its present level until such time as state support for schools is again made available; and to then apply a fair proportion of such aid to a building program, salary adjustments, and to the improvement of other educational facilities.

President Truman, in his State of the Union Message on January 3, 1950, said, "We must take immediate steps to strengthen our educational system. In many parts of the country, young people are being handicapped for life because of a poor education. The rapidly increasing number of children, coupled with the shortage of teachers, makes this problem more critical each year."

SCHOOL PLANT

The school building is in general good repair and has received the benefits of a sound maintenance program. Last year the toilet facilities were completely modernized, the roof was repaired, several ceilings replaced, and the building re-painted. At the present time several rooms need painting but almost complete loss of state aid will necessitate the postponement of all but essential repairs. The custodian, Mr. Granville Clark, has done a capable job in keeping the building clean and warm.

HEALTH PROGRAM

The health program has been somewhat handicapped by the resignation of Miss Helen Dufton in December. The union voted to purchase an audiometer and this scientific machine for determining the hearing difficulties of our

children will be available soon. Steps have been taken to obtain the Massachusetts visual testing equipment, so that accurate eye examinations will be possible. The Federal Government has made available through the State Dental Division, its team of technicians for administering fluorine treatments to all our pupils below grade eight. This treatment will consist of a thorough cleaning of the teeth followed by four treatments with fluorine, thus preserving the teeth from decay. The average cost of such private treatment is twelve to fifteen dollars.

Studies show that less than 2% of time lost from school by absences are justifiable. We do not want sick children in school, nor do we want well children at home. The community cannot afford this educational and financial loss. It can be prevented by parental awareness and cooperation.

CONCLUSION

I have found all with whom I have come in contact, whether school staff, school board, or townspeople, to be considerate and cooperative and sincerely concerned with maintaining our school at a high level of efficiency.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles L. Bowlby, Superintendent of Schools,
Marlboro, New Hampshire.

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as Headmaster of Marlboro High School.

ENROLLMENT

On the opening day of school in September there were 120 pupils enrolled in grades 7-12. Seventy-four of these were in grades 9-12 and 46 in grades 7 and 8. This shows practically no change from last year. There have been a few additions and about an equal number of discharges.

ATTENDANCE

We have had good attendance thus far this year. Several pupils have perfect records. We have a policy of requesting excuses when a pupil returns to school after being absent. Practically all parents are cooperative. In only two or three families is there any definite defiance to regulations. Again the same few pupils cause practically all our tardiness. Detention after the close of school seems to be the most effective method of combatting this situation.

SCHOLARSHIP

With the exception of a few pupils who are poorly adjusted the work being done is generally satisfactory. Parents are urged to cooperate in helping to improve the quality of work done by the pupils. Some do not realize the quality of competition which the students face when they go away to school. Improved study habits at home are a necessity for many of our pupils.

PERSONNEL

Miss Isabel Emmond who replaced Miss Griffin, resigned, is doing creditable work in our school. The arrangement, whereby Francis Wilson, a cadet from Keene Teachers' College, gives instructions in the shop and handles junior high athletics is working well. Miss Knight also of KTC is doing physical education work with the junior high school girls.

LUNCH PROGRAM

Decrease in funds from the USDA made it necessary to increase the price of our meals at the beginning of the year. The high school recess lunch program consisting of a la carte items is working well and fills a long existing need.

We are faced with a further reduction in funds beginning March 1 and steps will have to be taken to acquire further revenue on the local level if we are to continue operation.

The Parent Teacher Association presented an automatic potato peeler to the program. This has proved to be a very time saving piece of equipment.

SPECIAL GROUP ACTIVITIES

Since my last report several events have been held in which various groups have participated. Some members of our school went to Concord in March to take part in the State Music Festival. In April, Mr. George Wilson, director of music, presented a very successful concert featuring his high school glee club. An operetta including junior high

pupils was a feature of the program. This was one of the outstanding events of last year.

The annual Junior Prom was held in the Community House and was well attended. This affair was under the direction of Miss Griffin, junior class advisor. It was nicely done and certainly contributed to the social education of our pupils.

The usual events of the Fall, including Freshman Reception, Harvest Dance, and Senior Play have been held.

CLASS OF 1949

Twelve pupils composed the Class of 1949 and of the twelve, four are continuing their education, one girl is married and the other seven are employed in offices and factories in Marlboro and Keene. Of the four continuing their education, one is attending business school, two are in college, and one girl is training to be a nurse.

The annual five day trip to Washington and New York City was taken during the April vacation. This trip was financed by various group money raising projects and by individual assessment. It appears that the trip is worthwhile and the continuance of the custom is probably justified.

ATHLETICS

The athletic teams which are representing the school this year and others which have done so since my last report face steadily improving competition. Our league teams all represent larger schools, all with improved facilities and in most cases a full time physical education program directed by the coaches who have few or no other class room or administrative obligations. One or two of our non-league opponents have similar set-ups. On the face of this, the records of our teams while not impressive, probably are satisfactory.

The present boys' basketball team has a record of 5 wins and 8 losses, three of which were by one and two point margins. The team should break even for the season. Prospects are fair in baseball.

Some of our neighboring schools are deemphasizing girls' basketball and have adopted the practice of playing those games in the afternoon. No attempt has been made to do this here because of the added expense.

The junior high school physical education and athletic program is progressing well under the direction of Francis Wilson and Charlotte Knight, students at KTC.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It may be that this proposal is untimely and should await more favorable conditions but it seems to me that some plans should be considered for improving our facilities at the Town Hall. From the health standpoint conditions are definitely not good. Improved sanitary facilities are a necessity and some arrangement for showers is very desirable.

I believe that the cadet teacher arrangement in industrial arts is working satisfactorily and might well be continued.

Because of the increasing use of automobiles by our youth, we should be making some plans for instituting a driving course. It might be worked out in conjunction with a neighboring school.

CONCLUSION

In closing, I wish to repeat my statements previously made that I believe our staff is doing a good job with the facilities available. I find every teacher ready to cooperate for the advancement of our program.

I extend my thanks to you as Superintendent of Schools and to all members of our school system for the support given me in administrating our program and ask for your continued trust in me.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Electric Lights.

6. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$1,800.00 to aid the Community Nursing Association or act in any manner relating thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Memorial Day.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the purchase of tar for highways or act in any manner relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid on Class V roads, raise and appropriate the sum of \$518.38 the State to give \$2,073.50.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to recondition and tar Cottage street.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the sanitary conditions in the Town Hall.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be paid to the Federated church of Marlboro for the cost of heating and janitor service for the Youth Center when utilized by the following youth groups, under adult supervision, in our community: Boy and Girl Scouts, Cub and Brownie Scouts, Catholic Youth Organization, and 4-H Groups.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 to help maintain the Frost Free Library or act in any manner relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00 for the purpose of defraying the cost of purchase of the Town Water Works, by authorizing and instructing the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00 on the credit of the Town and issue the Town's notes or bonds therefor all in com-

pliance with the Municipal Bond Statute. Revised Laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 72 as amended.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to paint the fire station.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to aid the Elliot Community Hospital.

18. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to continue covering Library Brook.

19. To see if the Town will vote to have printed an invoice and tax inventory of all taxable property within the Town for the year 1950.

20. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing of games of beano or act in any manner relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sums for perpetual care of Cemetery lots received since January 1, 1949.

22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through Collector's deeds.

24. To hear reports of Town Agents or Committees or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed and pass any vote relating thereto.

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fires but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste".

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- (1) Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- (2) Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (3) Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- (4) Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
