You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

2. To choose Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Burying Ground, Janitor of the Town Hall, Auditors, Highway Agents and a Library Trustee.

3. To choose Measurers of Wood, Surveyors of Lumber, Fence Viewers, Pound Keeper, Fish and Game Wardens, Police Officers, and all other necessary town officers.

4. To see what sum of money the town will raise for town expenses.

5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repairs of highways and bridges.

6. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Public Library.

7. To see what disposition the town will make of the town's land and buildings.

8. To see if the town will vote to cut wood on the town's land for the school, library, poor and meetings.

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## School Report.

*To the Citizens of Newington :*

The annual report of the Newington School Board for the year ending August 1st, 1899, is submitted with such suggestions as are judged appropriate and useful.

The last year has been an eventful one in the history of our school.

The plan of dividing our school-room has apparently met the approval of the people, and to us, who have watched the progress of the scholars, it seems a decided improvement in our school work.

The necessity of an entrance from the school yard to the primary room is felt by all interested in the condition of our schools.

We were fortunate in securing the service of teachers, who by training and natural ability, were eminently suited to the work.

Miss Hanscom, by her gentle tact and ready sympathy, won and held the love and interest of the younger children; and progress must inevitably follow work begun on such a foundation.

With the older pupils, Miss Lughton has accomplished much which has been attempted for the first time in our school; and by her ready comradeship and consistent treatment of them, has unconsciously raised the tone of the school while doing the purely routine book work.

For the first time, a class from our school has been admitted to the Portsmouth High School—we believe them far better fitted for the work at an earlier age than any who have previously entered.

Drawing was introduced into both schools in January—draw-

ing not merely as an ornamental study, but as an invaluable training for hand and eye, cultivating the habit and power of accurate observation, the foundation of all technical and industrial education; we hope that another year may see the advance in this study that has been made in music.

In the latter study, the progress under the tuition of Miss Hoyt has been most satisfactory—and the time has come when music may be looked upon, not only as an innocent sort of amusement, but as an important factor in civilization, tending toward the “progress of mankind onward and upward forever.”

An effort has been made on the part of the library to cooperate with the needs of the school, by uniting our efforts. We feel that good work may be accomplished.

The same difficult question of absence and tardiness still confronts us,—and we would again urge the parents to aid us: it is your money that is wasted, or used advantageously by your child—and what is more important, it is your child’s future character which is being moulded for good or bad.

The annual school meetings have much to do with the prosperity of our schools; every citizen is a stockholder in the schools, and should manifest his interest in their welfare by his presence.

With new furniture and the freshness of the remodeled rooms, most acceptable gifts for the walls of the rooms were Rosa Bonhur’s “Horse Fair” for the primary room, from Miss Florence Hoyt, and the “Angelus,” by Millais, for the grammar room, from the Shakespeare Club.

# Langdon Public Library.

## EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

In complying with the usual custom, the trustees of the Langdon Library herewith submit their report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1900. The success of our undertakings have been fairly satisfactory. The interest manifested by the townspeople has been very gratifying, and their hearty co-operation with the trustees in library work is kindly appreciated.

Since August 5, 1899, the library has been opened to the public one evening in each week for the benefit of those unable to attend in the afternoon, and we feel that it is an improvement over the old method. The generosity of the Shakespeare Club in presenting to the library a fine chandelier as a memorial to Mrs. Emma Beane Bhillips, the founder and first president of the club, has enabled us to introduce this new feature, and we hope through the generosity of all concerned we may be able to continue the present arrangements.

During the past year we have added to the furniture a cabinet for specimens for ores, minerals and curiosities. Also a suitable table for the exhibitions of natural history, and again we invite the attention of the patrons, especially the younger portion of them, to that corner of the library where each week is to be found specimens worthy of inspection and study.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

To the citizens of the Town of Newington and the friends of Langdon Library: I have the honor to herewith submit a report upon the present condition of the library and upon the work accomplished during the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1900.

The year has brought new and important questions to be acted upon. It is often difficult to decide just what is for the greatest good of the greatest number, and it is only with the earnest co-operation of our townspeople that it will be possible to, "Prove all things and hold fast to that which is good." One of the questions of the future is how can more wall space be devoted to pictures? Traveling art exhibits, for the benefit of small libraries, are loaned for weeks or months free of expense: one photographer has already given us an exhibition of pictures from his studio.

The extensive repairs, as stated in last year's report and which I need not restate, left little that need be done to the building during the present year, but several important additions to the

usefulness and attractiveness of the library have been made, among these: 1st, 114 new books, (57 of these are government reports.) 2d, a table especially for nature work, which it is hoped may be equipped with a compound microscope. 3d, a cabinet—this is the beginning of a museum of curios, antiquities, objects of historic value, and products of the present time. 4th, two books bearing the dates of 1618 and 1623, formerly owned by Joseph Adams, first pastor of Newington. 5th, two framed documents of historical interest. 6th, a bulletin board upon which are posted current events, book reviews, pictures, etc. 7th, a chandelier—this gift paved the way for the most important step of the year, the opening of the library in the evening, thus giving an opportunity for all to share in its benefits. To the success of this step facts will prove better than words, and I refer you to the average daily attendance—38 since August 5th (that being the time the library was first opened in the evening) as compared with that of last year for the same time, which was 23, a gain of 15.

The gift of magazines by a few after they have used them, has led to the thought that if more of the people would do this, the money now expended in current literature would enable us to place more new books upon the shelves.

During the past twelve months the library has been opened many times for the benefit of visitors, and by request it has been opened to the public on two special days, April 19th for the Seaside Union of Christian Endeavor, and on August 31st, Old Home Day.
