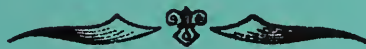

TOWN WARRANT

March 11, 1952

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon. Business meeting at 7:30 P. M. Polls not to close before 8:00 P. M. to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see what action the Town will take regarding allowing a 5 percent discount on taxes paid before a date which the Selectmen shall designate.

5. On petition of Carroll M. Fogg and twelve other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to lease the property known as Centennial Hall from the Congregational Christian Church in North Hampton, New Hampshire, for a period of not more than ninety-nine (99) years for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) and the lease to contain provisions whereby the Town will make any necessary alterations, maintain said Hall in a good state of repair,

to take whatever fire protective and safety measures are required by law, use said building only for Town, Community, and Municipal purposes, keep said building insured against loss by fire and other so-called extended coverage in an amount not less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to be payable to said church, to supply said church with a normal quantity of water free of charge at all times during the life of the lease, to protect the church from all liability during the life of the lease, to protect the Church from all liability in connection with said building during the life of the lease, any improvements, repairs, or additions made during the life of the lease to belong to the Church at the termination of the lease and upon the express provision that said lease can be terminated at any time by said Town giving said Church thirty days notice in writing.

6. On petition of Carroll M. Fogg and 12 others:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for the maintenance and operation of Centennial Hall for the ensuing year, in event the Town leases the same.

7. On petition of Carroll M. Fogg and 12 others:

To see if the Town will vote to make such repairs and alterations to said Centennial Hall as the Selectmen may deem necessary, in the event the Town leases the same, at a cost not exceeding \$5,000.00, said sum to be taken from capital reserve fund No. 1.

8. On petition of William E. Parker and nine other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to empower the Water Committee to negotiate with Hampton Water Works Co., The Public Utilities Commission, and others; to make all necessary contracts, and pay all necessary expenses to the extent of the Capital Reserve Fund, incurred in the extension of the new water main from the

new school building on Atlantic Avenue, westerly toward the Lafayette Road, in compliance with the votes taken at the Town Meeting of 1949, on Article 12 in the Town Warrant of that year.

9. On petition of R. A. Southworth and nine other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to maintain a flashing light at the intersection of the Post Road and Atlantic Avenue and the Exeter Road, (Routes 101D and 151), providing said flashing light is purchased and installed by some person or agency other than the Town of North Hampton. Said flashing light would flash amber on the principal road, and red on the Secondary road. Estimated cost of maintenance barring accidental collision is under \$12.00 a year.

10. On petition of Robert A. Southworth and nine other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to provide increased lighting for the public parking area at the beach south of Little Boar's Head by installing brighter lights on the five street lights now serving that area, and by adding six additional lights on the unlighted poles there, and to appropriate money for the same.

11. On petition of Doris G. Norton and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at the junction of Elm Road and Cow Lane.

12. On petition of Paul W. Hobbs and ten other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town favors or opposes the establishment of a military air base in Portsmouth-Newington area.

13. On petition of Paul W. Hobbs and ten others:

To see if the Town shall direct the Selectmen to communicate with the Secretary of Defense for Air in Wash-

ington, D. C., and record with him the vote taken by the voters in regard to the establishment of a military air base in the Portsmouth-Newington area. Said vote to be forwarded on or before March 15, 1952.

14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act, (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

15. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

16. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Chapter 53,, Sections 1-15 inclusive, Laws of New Hampshire (1942) as amended, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town's best development, the Board members to consist of one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in sections 1-15 inclusive, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire (1942) as amended.

17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway known as "Little Road" leading in a southerly direction from Atlantic Ave. to Mill Road over land of Wilbur H. and Eva G. Norton.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

March 11, 1952

A meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton qualified to vote in town affairs duly notified and holden in the Town Hall in said Town, the alphabetical list of voters having been posted and subscribed on the back thereof by the supervisors of the Check List, was called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator Wilbur S. Drew who declared the polls open for the election of Town Officers the business meeting to be held at 7:30 P. M. Polls not to close before 8:00 P. M.

At 7:30 Moderator Wilbur S. Drew read the warrant and the meeting was open.

James F. Leavitt moved, and it was so voted, that the Polls remain open long enough for everyone present to vote.

Article 1. Officers elected from the floor.

Assessors of Taxes.

William Fowler moved the Selectmen act as such.

It was a vote.

Overseers of the Poor. — James F. Leavitt moved, and it was so voted that the Selectmen be Overseers of the Poor.

Fence Viewer — On motion of Forrest E. Knowles, Thomas B. Whenal was elected Fence Viewer.

Article 2. James F. Leavitt moved this Article be passed over until all other Articles were acted upon. Motion passed.

Article 3. Mr. Fowler moved this article be accepted. It was a vote.

Article 4. Mr. Fowler moved and it was so voted this Article pass as read.

Article 5. After much discussion a Yes and No ballot was called for, to settle the question tonight. Yes 87, No 92.

Articles 6 and 7 unnecessary to vote on as the hall was not accepted.

Article 8. This article was discussed at length. Herbert Georges moved article be adopted. A vote by raising of hands was taken with a result of 73 Yes and 62 No.

Article 9. Robert Southworth moved that the Town maintain a flashing light at the intersection of the Post Road and Atlantic Avenue, Route 151 and 101D provided that said light is provided and installed by some person or agency other than the Town of North Hampton. It was voted to do this.

Article 10. Robert Southworth moved that the Town install brighter lights at the five street lights at the State Parking Area at the beach and up to 6 additional 1,000 lumen light on the other poles in that area at an additional cost not to exceed \$168.50 per year for electricity. This article was voted in the affirmative.

Article 11. Austin Norton moved this Article be adopted as read. It was voted.

Article 12. Margaret E. Brown moved this article be tabled indefinitely. It was voted.

Article 13. William Fowler moved this article tabled the same as article 12. It was a vote.

Article 14. Vivian Brown moved this article be adopted. It was so voted.

Article 15. Forrest Knowles moved it be accepted. So voted.

Article 16. William Fowler moved the Planning Board be established. Yes vote.

Article 17. Carroll M. Fogg moved article be adopted as in the Warrant. It was so voted.

Article 18. Clinton E. Hendry recommended, by letter, that wages for Highway employees and cemetery employees be raised from the present 90 cents an hour to \$1.00 an hour. It was voted to do this.

Article 2. James F. Leavitt moved the Budget with additions of \$96.00 and \$168.50 for lighting. \$125.00 for Article 14. Making budget \$49,348.28.

The Moderator appointed the following Budget Committee:

Chairman of Board of Selectmen, Thomas B. Whenal, George G. Carter, Raymond O. Hobbs, D. Morris Lamprey, Russell D. Moulton, Ruth K. Leavitt, Margaret E. Brown.

On motion of Mr. Barteau it was voted the NEXT Town meeting to be held in the new school building.

Meeting adjourned at 9:50 P. M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New School Building in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next, at one of the clock in the afternoon. Business meeting at 7:00 P. M. Polls not to close before 7:30 P. M., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see what action the town will take regarding allowing five per cent discount on taxes paid before a date which the Selectmen shall designate.

5. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of five, including the Chairman of the Selectmen, to remodel and renovate the town hall and/or fire station including the installation of a central heating plant if found advisable, and to use Capital Reserve Fund No. 1 for said purpose, and to give said committee full authority to make all necessary contracts and to do all necessary acts for said purpose. (By petition).

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the use of

all or part of the balance of the principal and accumulated interest of Capital Reserve Fund No. 2, — as appropriated in 1945 and 1946 for the construction and acquisition of a water works system, and as partially used in 1950, pursuant to votes at the annual town meeting of 1949, for financing part of the cost of construction of the water main along Pine Road providing a supply of water to the new school building on Atlantic Avenue and for the five fire hydrants installed on said main on Pine Road and Atlantic Ave. — for the further purpose of financing part of the cost of the construction of an extension of said water main westerly from said school building along Atlantic Avenue to provide a supply of water to the town hall, town fire station, and town library, and for hydrants to provide fire protection to said town buildings and other buildings on Atlantic Avenue up to and as far beyond said town buildings as available funds will permit; and to empower the water committee (as appointed in 1949), including the Selectmen, to negotiate and make all necessary contracts with the Hampton Water Works Company, Public Utilities Commission, and others for aforesaid purpose, and to the extent of said Capital Reserve Fund; and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to make payments from said Fund pursuant to any contract so made by said committee; provided, however, that the use of such fund for such extension shall be lawful and in conformity with the opinion for declaratory judgment by the Trustees of Trust Funds now pending before it in relation to the foregoing matter. (By petition.)

7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate fifty per cent of its unincumbered and unexpended surplus to help secure the further extension of the Hampton Water Works main along Atlantic Avenue, as far as the funds will permit, for fire protection purposes and for the installation of fire hydrants thereon not over 1000 feet a-

part as determined by the water committee, and to give the water committee full authority to make all necessary contracts for said purpose — provided, that this section shall appear legal in the light of the decision of the Supreme Court in respect to the pending petition of the Trustees of Trust Funds in reference to the extension of said main. (By petition).

8. To see if the town will vote to install, for fire protection purposes, one fire hydrant near the town hall, fire station and library, and not over two other fire hydrants, at the discretion of the Selectmen and Fire Chief, at least 500 feet apart, on such extension as shall be constructed of the Hampton Water Works Company's main westerly on Atlantic Avenue from the new school building; and to appropriate the necessary funds for the same. (By petition.)

9. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

10. To see if the town will vote to install two street lights on Chapel Road, one in front of the residence of Mr. James A. Eastman, the other in front of the residence of Mr. Arthur W. Brown. (By petition).

11. To see if the town will vote to install a street light on Lafayette road in front of Slumber Manor. (By petition).

12. To see if the town will vote to install a street light near the residence of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Starbird, on Woodland Road. (By petition).

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PLANNING COMMITTEE

At the first meeting of this Committee, on April 23rd, it was organized with Wilbur Drew as chairman and Mrs. Barbara Luther as secretary.

After a general discussion of the various angles of the situation it was decided, that inasmuch as we were instructed to investigate the consolidation of certain grades with other towns, that we should first acquire more complete information of that subject.

Through the courtesy of Supt. Gilmore a meeting was arranged for May 20th at the Hampton Center School. On that date this committee met with like committees from Hampton and Hampton Falls. Dr. Buley, Commissioner of Education of the State, was present and explained the procedure and mechanics of establishing a School District. We learned at that meeting that consolidation of the grades which we would be most interested in, namely the seventh and eighth, would be prohibited by the Statutes as they now stand.

A later contact with the committees of Hampton and Hampton Falls brought out the fact that neither committee was interested in consolidation, and did not intend to consider the matter further. In view of this fact, there seemed no object in this committee making any further study of consolidation at the present time.

An analysis of the enrollment situation shows, that while we are able to get along with six teachers by splitting and combining grades from the 5th up, this is only possible because there are two small grades, this year's 6th and 7th having 14 pupils each.

By September, 1953, with only the pupils now registered, all grades up to, and including the 6th will have

from 24 to 27 pupils, each one therefore requiring a teacher full time. For the next three years, including this year, the 7th and 8th grades may be able to be combined under one teacher due to the small enrollments in the grades that will be entering that room. As it appears now we will have need of seven teachers starting September 1953, by the fall of 1955 we will require eight. This will only be possible with the present enrollment, any substantial increase will entirely change the picture.

In the next five years, counting only those now enrolled, 96 will graduate, while a survey covering about 90 percent of the town shows that 93 will become of school age during the same period. From 1942 to 1947 the school population increased by about 23 percent and from 1947 to 1952 there was an increase of about 38 percent. If we allow, and it seems fair to do so with the prospects of the air base, an increase of 25 percent over the next five years, we will have an enrollment of about 210, and because of the irregularity of the size of the classes, we will, with little doubt, need eight teachers, which will require two more rooms. Any increase in enrollment to 240 or more will indicate the need of rooms beyond the capacity of the present building, even though the two rooms are added in the basement.

On the basis of these figures this committee is of the opinion that the unfinished space in the basement of the present building should be completed, which will provide for the immediate needs. We also recommend that a committee be appointed at the next annual meeting, this committee to be provided with funds and authority to secure plans, prices, etc., for an addition to the present school building, which the percentages of increase indicate will be needed in three years.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of North Hampton:

I herewith submit to you my twenty-third report as Superintendent of your schools.

The schools of North Hampton began September 3, 1952 with an enrollment of 163. The number of pupils as of February 2, 1953 is 170. This compares with 163 of the previous year and 145 of the year 1950-51. The average teacher-pupil load is 28.3. The recommended figure is 25 pupils per teacher with each teacher in charge of one grade. Two of our rooms now house two grades each. Because of the large enrollment in grades five and six, it became necessary to divide grade five. Since an additional teacher will be needed next year, it is recommended that the school be organized with grades one through six in single rooms.

Fifty-nine pupils are registered in Hampton High School as of September 1952 with one pupil attending Portsmouth High. North Hampton is therefore educating 230 pupils at the present time.

The federal government by the passage of Public Law 874 has recognized its obligation for assisting local districts in the cost of educating children of its employees. The district received aid during the previous year but legal interpretation in Washington declared that the naval base was situated wholly in Maine. Since Public Law 874 declared that aid was restricted to districts in the state where federal activities were located, no New Hampshire school district was eligible — unless the family of the pupil actually lived on federal property. Our representatives and senators in Washington are to intro-

duce a bill in Congress to correct this injustice. If this new bill shall become a law, North Hampton will again be entitled to this aid. At the present time it is not so entitled.

I believe North Hampton has an outstanding teaching staff. Mr. Poland has brought to the school a spirit of cooperative effort which has resulted in an efficiently administered school. He has enriched the curriculum by added use of visual aids and by definite time allotted to physical education. He has freely given of his own time in order that our children might have the benefits obtained from athletic teams. The staff as a whole is working thoughtfully and intelligently for the welfare of the children of North Hampton.

Supervisory Union 21 at its meeting held last November, authorized funds for further purchases of film strips. By this provision the Union will have eleven groups of films to be used as teaching aids for Arithmetic, Reading, Geography, Health and History. Included, also, are films on Courtesy and safety as well as fables for the younger children.

As an aid toward more efficient use of these, Supervisory Union 21 is offering a course for its teachers in Visual Aids. The course starts February 16, 1953 in the Hampton Centre School. This work is under the direction of the Harvard-Boston University Extension division and carries full collegiate credit. It is the same course as offered at the University and it is brought here as a convenience to these teachers wishing to secure the most approved methods of using visual auditory aids.

The Motor Vehicle Department of the state has offered to spend several days in this Union bringing to the pupils of our schools the rules of safety as adopted by the department. This section of New Hampshire has heavily travelled roads. It is important that children

know the rules of the road, whether they are walking, riding bicycles or driving automobiles. I am particularly pleased that the Motor Vehicle department is offering us this service.

The North Hampton School Board has definitely increased its service to the pupils by employing a teacher for remedial work. It is the belief of educators, after numerous investigations, that ten or fifteen per cent of the pupils in school should have the opportunity of remedial work. While at present, the teacher of this department is with us only during the morning sessions, I believe results will prove the advantage of using her services full time. Some pupils need the extra incentive of individual attention which may be given in a small group. Some pupils need time for extra drill. To some pupils, certain subjects are easily mastered while other subjects require added motivation. It may be illness or absence or change of school which present problems. In some cases the pupil misses a certain process in class. With a remedial teacher available, this point is cleared and thereafter the pupil progresses with his class. All in all such a teacher is valuable, because she brings encouragement to a troubled pupil, allows the grade teacher to devote her time to the pupils who have had no interruptions in class progress and clears away difficulties before they become serious.

The lunch program continues a valuable activity of the district. The meals are complete and attractive. The records are accurately kept. By moving the lunch facilities to the lower floor, a larger and more efficient kitchen was received. This move also freed the gymnasium for use during the noon hour. Federal commodities have been received regularly. These commodities, together with the federal subsidy, allow school to service meals well below cost. The worth of a hot lunch program is well proven.

North Hampton has an active Parent-Teacher Association. Like its State and National Organization, it is interested in the welfare of the schools. Particularly at this time when there seems to be a vicious attack upon the public schools, the great power of "its membership is needed." As the Parent-Teacher Association is strong by so much, will the portion of the schools be strengthened.

North Hampton is facing a problem of housing for a larger enrollment. Different plans have been suggested. Each of these has been considered carefully by the School Board and will be presented to the people for their decision. There is an immediate necessity for one more room. Aside from this, plans for future expansion should be considered. Both of these problems will be considered in the district meeting.

Your school board has spent a great deal of time considering means of improving our service to the children. The problems of a board are complex. With the present group, the parents may be certain that our schools are alert to the most approved services. For their work, I am most grateful. The teachers have been uniformly cooperative. In their hand, our pupils are well cared for.
