

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the County of Coos and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote at Town Meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Pittsburg on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget and raise money for same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to meet any public funds that might be appropriated by the State or Federal Government for public work.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$250.00 for a water thawing outfit.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to complete the road running from the Camp Otter road to the C. V. & R. V. Merrill land.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Setectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

During the eighth year of the Pittsburg Public Health Nursing Association many patients have availed themselves of the nursing service. There have been 1,273 individual inspections of school children and 1,112 home calls. The nurse has assisted with 14 maternity cases, 8 operations, administered 12 anesthetics and attended 5 deaths. Many all day and all night calls have been answered and many patients have been transported to the hospital, doctors and dentists.

Results of the medical examinations of school children show a very good record. There have been many defects corrected during the past year, but the most serious problem that confronts us at the present time is the dental and throat work, for which there is urgent need. Clinical work is much less expense to each individual, but the lack of funds has made it impossible to conduct clinics.

Many handicaps of growth and development occur and are present during infancy and the preschool age, a semi-annual examinatoin in infancy and early childhood will eradicate and prevent defects at a time when they will cause less serious damage. Parents are realizing more and more each day that obstinacy and untoward actions of childhood very often are not due to a bad temper, but to disease or a physical defect and should receive medical treatment rather than punishment.

During the summer or early fall a Child Welfare and Toxoid Clinic are conducted at the town hall. All parents are welcome to bring their children for a thorough physical examination and receive Diphtheria immunization free of charge. Many parents have been reluctant to have their children immunized, but there is little or no reaction and is much to be desired. The age limit is from 6 months to 9 years for immunization.

The pre-natal work is free, expectant mothers may have regular urinalysis and blood pressure service as well as advice and literature as early in pregnancy as they may wish. An early check up is very important in safe guarding health and life during this period.

The bedside nursing has been conscientiously attended and as good as we could make it under existing conditions.

I wish to thank the Nursing Association, Superintendent of Schools, teachers and parents for their loyal cooperation in my work; it has been a real pleasure to work with them.

# Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

### General

The world goes to school. Perhaps nothing in the history of the world has ever been supported by a consensus of belief more universal than that which sustains education today. Social, economic, political, and religious interests are equally bound up in the educational system. It serves, not one interest, but all. The leading telic force within the state by which it may hope to perpetuate itself and direct the growth of society is education.

Through the schools of today, even more than ever before, an effort is being made to instill into the very nature of each boy and girl the ideals of fairplay, truthfulness, cooperation, and loyalty. A school should not be judged by its size or its complicated machinery. The criterion should be the services which the school renders to the pupils and the community of which they are a part. The facts are that that community prospers most whose boys and girls have received a comprehensive and well rounded education.

### **Buildings and Equipment**

The school buildings are for the most part in good condition. The High School building was weather stripped on the North and West sides, the water completely relayed at the Danforth School, a stove installed in the Home Economics room, as well as numerous other mnior repairs.

The interior of the High School building is quite badly in need of being redceorated. The upper room in the Danforth School should be completely remodelled.

### Enrollment and Attendance

The attendance records with the exception of the High School were much poorer than usual due largely to various epidemics. The enrollment in the grades and high school show a slight increase over the previous year. There are four tuition pupils, two from Clarksville and two from Stewartstown. The number of tardinesses showed a large increase. Absence is often unavoidable but tardiness can usually be prevented.

### **Teachers**

The following changes occurred in the teaching personnel; Louise Mallinson of Bates College was elected to teach English and French in the High School, Kate Fuller of Plymouth Normal School became teacher of the Intermediate Grades.

### Health

The following statistical report will give you some idea of the work that has been carried on by Mrs. Sturgis, the school nurse.

During the past year much corrective work has been accomplished among the school children and our health records show a decided improvement. There are many children needing dental work, but funds have not been available for clinics. Parents are realizing more than ever before the importance of corrective work and their cooperation in most instances is very gratifying.

### Notes on the Budget

The School Board has suggested for 1936-37 a budget which would require the district to raise \$18,360.00. For the school year 1935-36 \$19,306.88 was appropriated. That figure being larger than usual due to the special appropriation for relaying the water at the Danforth School. This year's estimates are almost identical with those of the past two years.

### Conclusion

I wish to thank the School Committee, teachers, parents and friends for the interest and support that they have given to the schools during the past year.
