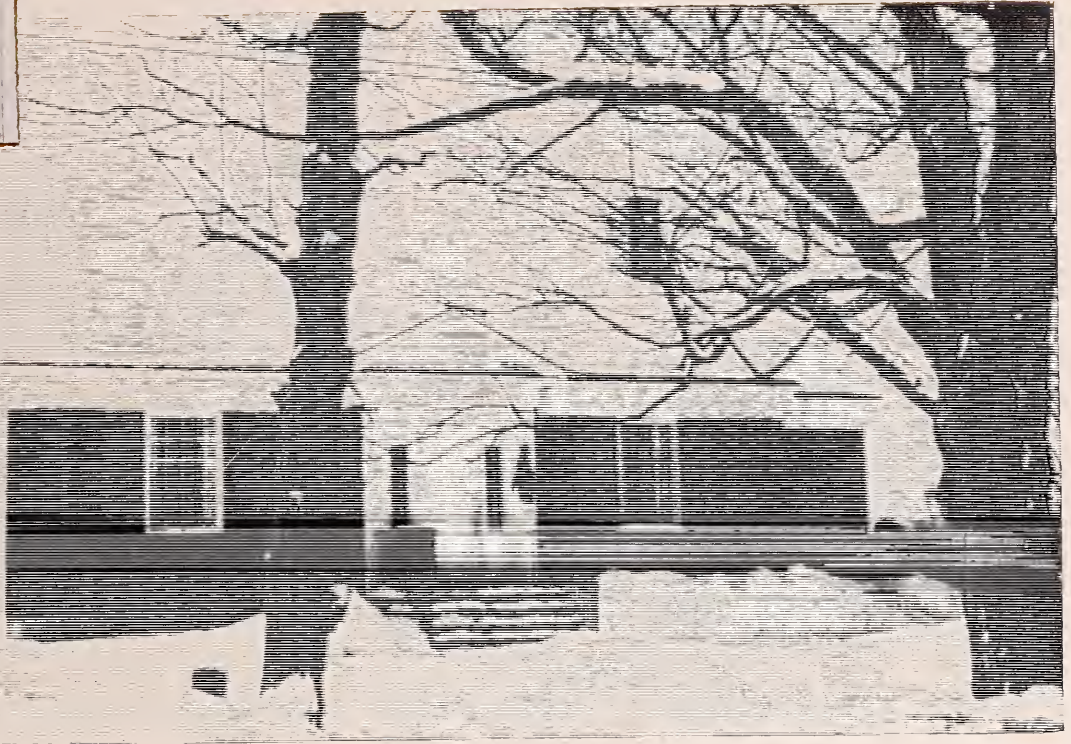

PLAINFIELD SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

The Tuberculin testing program, under the direction of Mrs. Velma Sullivan, R.N., of The N. H. Tuberculosis Assn., was held in October with 116 students taking part. Only 3 reactors were found and follow-up X-rays were taken with the cooperation of the parents.

The annual hearing tests have been completed and the vision tests are in progress. Notes will be sent to parents as problems arise. Physical examinations will begin the latter part of January. The Dental Clinic will soon be under way. In the meantime may I urge parents to schedule regular dental check-ups for their children.

The outbreak of several skin infections in the school has been brought under control, and I am sure it is due to the prompt action of the parents. I personally feel that immediate treatment for skin problems is a necessity to prevent it from becoming a school problem.

We are fortunate to have the aid of several State agencies to assist in carrying out some of health programs in our schools. The N. H. Services to the Blind has been of invaluable help with their materials and advice.

I wish to thank the teachers, parents, and School Board for their full cooperation in carrying out the school health program.

1.2 Mobile homes may be parked and occupied in the Town of Plainfield either pursuant to prior permit issued by the Board of Adjustment under Section 2 below or in a duly authorized mobile home park maintained pursuant to Section 3 below, but not otherwise.

2. Placing of units in locations other than at mobile home parks.

2.1 As a special exception hereunder, the Board of Adjustment shall issue its permit for the temporary location and occupancy of trailers, semi-dependent mobile homes, and mobile homes in the Town of Plainfield outside of authorized mobile home parks upon its finding of each of the following facts:

(a) The person in charge of the unit, is either the owner of the premises at which it is to be parked, or a relative or guest of the owner, or is employed at the premises, and no compensation is to be paid or received by any person for the privilege of parking;

(b) The use is a temporary expedient;

(c) Water supply and sanitary arrangements for any occupants of the unit are adequate to protect both their health and the health of the community;

(d) It is consistent with the spirit and intent of the Ordinance to permit the parking and use of the unit at the location proposed.

2.2 A permit for the parking and occupancy of any trailer, semi-dependent mobile home or mobile home under Section 2.1, above, shall be upon the following conditions:

(a) No permit shall be issued to locate any unit in the front yard of any occupied lot nor, in the case of a vacant lot, closer than 40 feet to the center-line of any public highway upon which such lot abuts;

(b) No unit shall be located closer than 10 feet to any side or rear property line of the parcel upon which it is parked;

(c) No permit shall be valid for a period longer than 90 days, with the exception of a permit issued to an owner of a house under construction, or to a person engaged in a construction project, in which event such permit may be for a period of time reasonably related to the expected construction period for the work.

(d) Such additional conditions as the Board of Adjustment may find necessary to insure that the unit shall not constitute an unreasonable inconvenience or detriment to the neighborhood, or a hazard to the public health, or otherwise as may be necessary in its judgment to protect and safeguard the purposes of the Ordinance.

2.3 Camping trailers, whether of the truck-mounted or towed varieties, when not in use, may be garaged or stored on premises in the Town of Plainfield which are occupied by the person in charge of the camping trailer without special permit hereunder. Other trailers, semi-dependent and dependent mobile homes, when such units are not occupied as residences, may be temporarily parked or stored in the Town of Plainfield only as a special exception hereunder pursuant to prior permit issued by the Board of Adjustment and subject to such terms and conditions as the Board of Adjustment may find necessary in order to safeguard the purposes of the Ordinance.

3. Mobile home parks.

3.1 The Board of Adjustment shall issue its permit for the use of premises within the Town of Plainfield for not more than one mobile home park, in addition to such as exist on the date of adoption of this amendment, as a special exception hereunder, provided that it finds that the proposed park will comply with each of the following requirements:

(a) The total area available in the park shall be not less than five acres. Trees and shrubbery, if not already existing, shall be planted and maintained so as, in a reasonable time, to provide an effective screen between mobile home parking spaces and the public highway and between mobile home parking spaces and abutting properties. No mobile home parking location shall be closer than 150 feet to the center line of any State highway nor 100 feet to the center line of any Town highway, closer than 30 feet to any side or rear property line of the mobile park, nor closer than 300 feet measured in a straight line to any dwelling place existing, or under construction, at the time of consideration by the Board of Adjustment of the application for a mobile home park permit;

(b) There shall be provided for each mobile home an assigned location having an area of not less than 5,000 square feet which shall be plainly marked with suitable permanent boundaries at each corner. The maximum number of mobile home locations in a given mobile home park shall be thirty-five. There shall be a minimum distance of 25 feet between mobile homes as actually parked at their assigned locations.

(c) There shall be provided, in association with each mobile home space, a space not less than 8½ feet wide and 20 feet long for convenient off-street parking of at least one motor vehicle. Such off-street parking space shall be not closer than 20 feet to any mobile home other than the mobile home with which it is associated;

(a) Application shall be made in writing upon a form prescribed by the Board of Adjustment, stating the location and legal description of the mobile home park for which permit is sought, the approximate number of mobile homes to be accommodated, the proposed water supply, the proposed method of sewage, waste and garbage disposal, the proposed lighting system, and the names and addresses of the proprietors of the park.

(b) Every application for a mobile home park permit shall be accompanied by each of the following:

(1) An accurate plan of the proposed park showing roadways including highway entrances as well as drains and culverts, mobile home and vehicular off-street parking spaces, water and sewer lines and facilities, utility and street lighting poles, and all other material physical features and relevant improvements to be made at the site;

(2) Certificate of the Town Health officers addressed to the Board of Adjustment that they have examined the site and the plans and specifications for the project and that in their opinion the project, if developed as proposed, will comply with all applicable State and local laws, ordinances and regulations governing water supply, sewage and sanitary arrangements or otherwise governing the development and operation of such a project for the protection of the public health;

(3) Certificate of the Board of Selectmen that the plans for access to the public highway from the proposed park as well as roadways within the park have been examined by them and that the said entrance and roadways, as proposed, will be safe and convenient and in accordance with good standards of design and layout;

(4) Certified check of the applicant for permit fee payable to the order of the Town of Plainfield in the amount of \$100;

(c) Upon receipt of application for permit with all proper supporting documents, the Board of Adjustment shall review the same. In the event that it clearly appears that the application fails to comply with the standards of this Ordinance, it shall reject the same, setting forth its reasons in a written decision and shall return to the applicant the certified check deposited by him. In the event that it appears that the application may meet all requirements of the Ordinance, the Board of Adjustment shall hold a public hearing upon the matter at the Town Hall, at which all interested persons may be heard. Notice of the time, place and subject matter of such hearing shall be published in a newspaper having prominent circulation in the Town of Plainfield and shall be posted at three public places in the Town not later than ten days in advance of such hearing;

(d) If, after public hearing, the Board of Adjustment finds that all requirements and standards imposed by the Ordinance are met by the proposed application, it shall grant its preliminary permit for the construction or development of the proposed park area, and the applicant may thereupon commence the improvement of the proposed area as a mobile home park in accordance with the application submitted. Any such preliminary permit shall be valid for one year from the date of the decision authorizing it. Upon the issuance of an approved preliminary permit, all right of the applicant to the \$100 permit fee shall lapse. In the event that after hearing the Board of Adjustment shall find that the applicant is not entitled to a permit under this Ordinance, it shall record its decision, and the reasons therefor in writing, furnishing a copy to the applicant and returning to him with its decision the \$100 permit fee deposited;

(e) Upon the completion of development of a proposed mobile home park and when the same is ready for occupancy, the holder of a preliminary permit shall notify the Board of Adjustment which shall thereupon make such investigation of the completed project as it deems proper to ascertain that all requirements and standards of this Ordinance and all conditions of the preliminary permit have been met. Upon its finding that there is such compliance, the Board of Adjustment shall thereupon issue its definitive or final mobile home park permit embodying such permanent requirements and conditions as are hereinabove provided for. No mobile home units shall be occupied at any mobile home park until a final mobile home park permit has been issued for it;

(f) A final mobile home park permit shall be for a term of 10 years. It shall be subject to renewal for additional five-year terms upon application duly filed, but only in the event that after such investigation as the Board of Adjustment may deem proper to make, it finds that the park continues in all respects to meet all standards and requirements for a definitive permit hereunder. A renewal permit fee of \$50 shall be charged for each five-year renewal term;

(g) Any person operating a mobile home park at the time of adoption of this amendment shall be entitled to a special mobile home park permit upon the payment of an application fee of \$25. Such permit shall be effective to authorize the continuing operation of the subject park in substantially the same manner as existed at the date of adoption of this amendment, subject only to any overriding limitations of applicable State law, with respect to which this Ordinance does not control. A special mobile home park permit shall not entitle the holder to enlarge or substantially alter his manner of operation of such prior existing mobile home park without duly filing for a preliminary and thereafter final or definitive mobile home park permit as provided under this paragraph 4.2 above;

(h) No mobile home park permit shall be transferrable, and there shall be no refund if a permit is not used for its full term. Every person holding such a permit shall give notice in writing to the Board of Adjustment at least fifteen (15) days before any transfer of an interest in, or control of, a mobile home park, other than a transfer in mortgage as security for a bona fide loan. If, upon such a transfer of any interest in or control of a mobile home park, the Board of Adjustment is satisfied that the transferee is a proper person to hold a mobile home park permit, it may cause a new permit to be issued to said transferee for the unexpired term of the existing permit, upon payment of the sum of \$25. The transferee, however, must conduct the mobile home park at the same location at which it was originally licensed. This provision is not to be interpreted to allow new mobile home parks or the extension of any existing ones;

(i) Any mobile home park permit may be revoked by the Board of Adjustment at any time, if, after a due investigation, the Board of Adjustment finds that the holder thereof has violated any of the provisions of this Ordinance or that the mobile home park is being maintained in an unsanitary or unsafe manner or is a nuisance.

5. Continuing supervision of mobile home parks.

5.1 The Board of Selectmen and Town Health Officers are hereby authorized and directed to make semi-annual inspections to determine the condition of mobile home parks in order that the health and safety of occupants and of the general public shall be properly safeguarded, and it shall be the duty of the owner of the mobile home park to afford to the Board of Selectmen and the Town Health Officers free access to such premises at reasonable times for the purpose of inspection.

5.2 Each mobile home park owner shall maintain a register for the registration of all mobile homes and the occupants thereof, which register shall include the following information, as well as any other facts that may be requested by the Board of Selectmen, who are the Town Assessors:

(a) Name and permanent address of the owner of the mobile home or of the occupant in charge of it;

(b) For each owner or person in charge of a mobile home:

(1) The make, serial number, year of manufacture, length and width of the mobile home which he owns or occupies

(2) The number of the parking location in the park assigned to the particular mobile home;

(3) The date of arrival of the mobile home at the park.

5.3 It shall be the duty of the owner of a mobile home park to notify the Board of Selectmen of the date of intended departure of a mobile home from his park as soon as he learns of the intent of the owner of a unit to remove it.

Section 3. Renumber Articles IV - XIII of the existing Ordinance so that the same shall be numbered V - XIV.

Section 4. Amend Article VII - Nonconforming Uses, as renumbered by Section 3, by inserting after Paragraph C the following additional paragraph:

D. Any trailer, semi-dependent mobile home or mobile home in the Town of Plainfield as a non-conforming use at the time of adoption of Article IV of this zoning ordinance may be continued as a non-conforming use thereafter and may be replaced by a different unit to which the right of non-conforming use shall thereafter attach, provided that the original non-conforming unit shall be removed incident to such replacement.

Section 5. Amend Article IX -- Board of Adjustment, as renumbered by Section 3, inserting after Paragraph 3 the following additional paragraph:

4. Exercise all powers conferred upon boards of adjustment by the law of the State of New Hampshire, including the power to hear appeals where error is alleged, to determine special exceptions as provided by this Ordinance, and to authorize, upon appeal, variances in specific cases from the terms of the Ordinance such as will not be contrary to the public interest and subject to such conditions and limitations as may be prescribed by law.

Section 6. Amend Article XI, Penalty, as renumbered by Section 3 above, by striking out the whole thereof and inserting in its place the following:

ARTICLE XI

Penalty

Any person who violates any of the terms of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine of \$5 for each and every violation thereof, to include each day's parking of a mobile home, trailer, or semi-dependent mobile home, and each day's maintenance of a mobile home park in violation of the provisions of this Ordinance as a separate offense.

Section 7. Amend Article XII, Definitions, as renumbered by Section 3 above, by adding the following additional paragraphs following Paragraph G.

H. Mobile Home. Any vehicle used or so originally constructed as to permit its being used as a conveyance and as a dwelling or sleeping place for one or more persons, and provided with lavatory, toilet, and bathtub or shower, whether or not such a vehicle is actually immobile because of temporary or permanent utilities, connections, foundations, or other features attached to a fixed site.

I. Trailer or House Trailer. A mobile home which does not have a toilet and a bathtub or shower.

J. Semi-dependent Mobile Home. A mobile home which is equipped with some but not all of the following: Running water, lavatory, toilet, bathtub or shower.

K. Mobile Home Park. Any parcel of land which is used or intended for the purpose of supplying to the public parking spaces for two or more mobile homes, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.

L. Owner. The person in charge of, apparently in charge of, the manager or the director of, any mobile home park, whether it be owned by an individual, corporation, partnership, or other person as defined herein.

M. Board of Adjustment. The Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Town of Plainfield.

N. Permit. A written authorization by the appropriate zoning authority under this Ordinance allowing a restricted or regulated activity or use of land subject to such conditions as the authority having jurisdiction may prescribe.

O. Preliminary Mobile Home Park Permit. A permit issued by the Board of Adjustment to construct, create, develop, enlarge or improve a mobile home park.

P. Final or Definitive Mobile Home Park Permit. A permit for the occupancy of a mobile home park after its development under a preliminary mobile home park permit.

Q. Special Mobile Home Park Permit. See Article IV, Section 4.2 (g).

R. **Front Yard.** Space between the public highway and any principal building located upon any parcel of land.

Section 8. This amendment shall take effect upon its passage.

Article V. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of highway equipment.

Article VI. To see if the Town will vote to allow a two percent discount on all 1966 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Article VII. To see what action the Town will take with regard to the reports of Town Officers.

Article VIII. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the road on Methodist Hill from the Slack place, so-called, southerly to the house on the Ouillette place, so-called, from its present classification of a Class VI road to a Class V road and to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to rebuild and improve said road.

Article IX. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road going southwesterly from the Westgate road near the residence of Gordon LaPan to its intersection with the Dodge Road.

Article X. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the Sullivan County Superior Court for a license to sell the parcel of land with the buildings thereon situated in Meriden and more particularly described in deed of John D. Bryant to the Town of Plainfield, dated February 11, 1911, recorded in Sullivan County Registry of Deeds in Volume 179, Page 176, and in the event of a sale to use the net proceeds for the establishment of a trust fund for the Meriden Library.

Article XI. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken by the Town at the annual town meeting held on March 10, 1959, whereby the Town voted to adopt and enact the Plainfield Building Construction and Zoning Ordinance.

Article XII. To see if the Town will vote to extend the street light system at Plainfield Village southerly along route 12A from the Atlantic Filling Station to the residence of George West, and raise and appropriate money therefor. (By request).

Article XIII. To see if the Town will vote that the action of the Annual Town Meeting on March 11, 1958 whereby the following vote was adopted:

Voted in the Affirmative that the Selectmen appoint a Committee of four Citizens to serve with them as a Town Planning Board,"

and the subsequent practice and experience under the said vote whereby the Board of Selectmen has come to be represented by a single member who serves on the Planning Board, shall be construed to have contemplated the creation of a statutory five-member Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:4, one of whose members shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen who shall serve ex-officio and four of whom shall be persons appointed by the Board of Selectmen and further that henceforth appointments to the Planning Board shall be governed accordingly."

(By request).

Article XIV. To see if the Town will vote that the actions of the Town Meeting on March 11, 1958 whereby the following votes, among others, were taken under Article XIV of the Warrant for the said meeting, being the so-called "Any other business" article, namely:

"Voted in the Affirmative that the Selectmen appoint a Committee of four Citizens to serve with them as a Town Planning Board, and

"Voted in the Affirmative that the Selectmen be instructed to appoint a Sexton, to serve as such, for the Cemeteries within the Town."

Town Meeting, 1965

—MARCH 9—

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield, County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, held at the Town Hall on Plainfield Plain, in said Town, on March 8th, 1965, and at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon, the business of the day was disposed of in the following manner:

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator David Cassedy. Prayer was offered by the Town Clerk, Howard Zea. The ballot box was offered for inspection; and the Warrant for the meeting was read through Article I. The polls were then opened.

At one-thirty, the meeting was again called to order for the remaining Articles. Prayer was by the Rev. Miss Hazel Roper of Plainfield. The remaining Articlees of the Warrant were read and acted upon, as follows:

Article II. Resolved: That the Town vote to accept a Deed in proper form, as a gift from the Meriden Library Association, Inc., of a certain tract of land situated in Meriden, conveyed to the Meriden Library Association, Inc., by John F. and Florence McNamara, dated May 5, 1962, recorded in Volume 346, page 589 in Sullivan County Registry of Deeds, as a site for a proposed library building.

The above Resolution was seconded, and voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Article III. Be it Further Resolved: That the Town of Plainfield raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be used, with other funds obtained by public contributions and from Federal Library Funds, for the construction of said new public library in Meriden, said money to be expended by the Library Trustees of the East End of Town, with the advice and consent of the Building Committee of the Meriden Library Association, Inc., and

Be it Further Resolved: That the elected Library Trustees of the East End of Town are authorized and directed to apply to the State Library Commission of the State of New Hampshire for an allotment from the Federal Library Fund.

The above sections of the Resolution were seconded, and unanimously voted in the affirmative

Article IV. The following Resolution was offered for consideration:

Be it Resolved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,372.89 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year; and be it Further Resolved that the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized to incur debt in anticipation of the taxes to be collected for the financial year 1965, in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses, and to issue notes therefor.

The Resolution was seconded.

The following Amendment was offered:

I move to amend the motion on Article IV, by increasing the sum for damage and legal expenses by \$1,500 to cover legal expenses already incurred by the Town, making the total appropriation \$50,872.89.

Motion was seconded, and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IX. It was moved and seconded that the Town Planning Board serve as the committee to make a study of the possibility of providing a public swimming pool or pools in Town, agreeable to Article IX of the Warrant.

It was unanimously voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE X. Be it resolved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be added to the special appropriation made in 1964 to have the covered bridge at Meriden treated with a coat of preservative.

ARTICLE XI. Be it resolved that the Town vote to allow a 2% discount on all 1965 property taxes paid within 30 days following the day the Tax Warrant is delivered to the Tax Collector.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XII. It was moved and seconded that the Town vote to accept the report of Town officers as printed (or with corrections) and that the Town Clerk place a copy on file.

Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIII. It was moved and seconded that the Moderator be instructed to appoint a Finance Committee of six persons within 30 days following this meeting, and that a written report be made in the next Town report.

Voted in the affirmative.

It was moved and seconded that the Planning Committee give a general written report to the next year's annual meeting.

Voted in the affirmative.

It was moved and seconded that the Selectmen be instructed to consult with the Town Counsel as to the legality of placing an Article in next year's Warrant for a continuation of the allowance of 2% tax discount until it be rescinded.

TOWN OF PLAINFIELD

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee met on Thursday, January 27, at the Plain School to consider with the Selectmen the proposed budget for the forthcoming financial year.

Each item was given the most careful scrutiny in comparison with parallel figures for previous expenditures, and with regard to the merits of possible reductions, justified increases, eliminations, or continuaton at the same level.

Among matters receiving particular consideration were the following:

- A recommended and merited increase in the rates of pay for the town's highway-maintenance personnel.
- Contribution to Lebanon Airport, a facility used with increasing frequency by summer research-conference delegates.
- Investigation into the liability-insurance position of the town as regards certain of its officials.
- Contribution to the joint public-relations effort of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Association.
- Improvement, for reasons of safety, efficiency, and insurability, of the heating system in the Meriden Town Hall.

Even with some increases, a careful scrutiny of all items coupled with the elmination of some non-recurring expenses resulted in a budget for Town expenses materially lower than that of last year. That the total figure is, over-all, somewhat higher is attributable to increased school expense. The Committee recommends the proposed budget, as being constructively in keeping with the anticipated needs of the Town.

A balance of \$350.00 due from the 1965 town appropriation and trust funds of \$63.61 were received in 1966 ,so that salary and expenses of \$169.54 for the year 1965 included in the above expenditures were actually paid in 1966.

The major project for the Meriden Library this year has, of course, been the construction of its new building. In this connection the Librarian and Trustees have so many people to thank for cooperation and generosity, that it is impossible to name them individually. First of all, thanks are due to all the people of Plainfield Township for agreeing to accept the new building and for voting \$1,000 toward its construction. Acting for the Town, the Selectmen have been consistently helpful. Special mention is due Mr. John F. McNamara who, from the Library Association moneys furnished \$17,000 toward the Building Fund, and to Mr. Emil W. Allen, Jr., State Librarian, who was of inestimable assistance in obtaining for us \$7,366.65 of Federal building money. The fine work of Mr. Archer Hudson, the architect, and McGray and Nichols, the contractors, is much appreciated. Above all, we wish we could adequately express our deep gratitude to all the committees, organizations and individuals --- men, women, and children --- who gave so generously of their money and so tirelessly of their time to make a dream come true.

The deed for the land having been turned over by the Meriden Library Association to the Selectmen, the construction was started on June 20th, and on November 23rd. the Library, though not complete, was ready for use. On that day an opening ceremony was held at which a new flag given by our U. S. Senator, Mr. Norris Cotton, was raised by the Boy Scouts, and addresses were made by Mr. Emil W. Allen, Jr., and by our U. S. Representative, Mr. James Cleveland. Both speeches were greatly appreciated.

Now that the new building is functioning its program has been considerably expanded. In addition to the regular 2:00 to 5:00 openings on Monday and Thursday, it is now open from 7:00 to 8:30 on Thursday evening and from 1:30 until 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday. Each grade from the White School will visit it for one period every week. The newly added hours are all manned by volunteer help.

During the past year the usual activities were carried on in the old library. There were two evening meetings of the Friends of the Library. One was centered about the life and books of Ernest Harold Baynes. At the other, Mr. David Bradley, the author of *Lion Among Roses*, spoke on his experiences in Finland. During the summer a very successful reading program for children was carried on. It was headed by Mrs. Ira Townsend, and Mrs. Elbert Barton, Mrs. Jack O'Leary, Mrs. William Franklin, and Mrs. Harlan Logan gave valuable assistance.

As always, certain Friends of the Library have put in many hours of routine volunteer work; still others have shown their interest by gifts of books. For all this thought and generosity, heartfelt thanks are due.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year, love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 800 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True, this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish, preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush ---
 - (a) Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - (b) Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 p.m.
 - (c) If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of the School District officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of said District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state and federal governments, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance; which balance is to be raised by taxation by the District:

- Article 5. To see if the District will vote to create an AREA school district planning committee, consisting of three members, at least one of whom shall be a member of the school board, and further to elect members of said committee or determine that they shall be appointed by the moderator.
- Article 6. To see if the District will authorize the school board to pay the tuition charges to the Windsor, Vt. school district, whose tuition rate exceeds the New Hampshire state average cost for high school pupils. (Windsor's tuition rate \$580.00—Lebanon's tuition rate \$509.00, including 2% rental charge; N. H. state average, \$521.00)
- Article 7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

Article 8. Resolved that the School Board be instructed to negotiate with the school boards of other school districts for the purpose of planning to obtain a school librarian to serve two or more school districts, the Plainfield School District's share of a school librarian's salary to be included in the budget to be presented to the 1967 School District meeting. (by petition)

Article 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Annual Meeting 1965

At a legal meeting of the voters of the School District of the Town of Plainfield qualified to vote in the District affairs, Moderator David S. Cassidy called the meeting to order at one thirty o'clock in the afternoon of Saturday, March 6, 1965 at the Town Hall in Plainfield. Prayer was offered by the Reverend Hazel Roper of the Plainfield Community Church.

The Moderator read the first article of the warrant and the remaining articles were omitted until the 2 p.m. meeting. The check list was charged and the polls opened for voting from 1:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. by the Non-Partisan ballot system.

Article 2. Mrs. Vera H. MacLeay offered the following resolution and moved its adoption. Resolved: That the reports of officers, agents, and auditors be accepted as printed in the annual report with a line in the Report of the Superintendent of Schools, page 80 pertaining to insurance on boilers, crossed out. The motion was seconded and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 3. Mr. Murray Stevens offered the following resolution and moved its adoption. Resolved: That the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120,142.58 for the support of Schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state and federal governments, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance, which balance is to be raised by taxation by the District. Mr. Winston F. Spencer offered an amendment: Moved Article 3 be reduced by \$600.00 which concerns high school tuition to Windsor. The original motion with the amendment was seconded and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 4. Mr. David Millar, Jr. offered the following resolution and moved its adoption. Resolved: That the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000 for the purchase of a new school bus, said money to be taken from Capital Reserve bus fund, \$2,000.00 by taxation and the balance of \$3,000.00 by issuance of serial notes on the credit of the District for a period of two years. The motion was seconded and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 5. Mr. Tracy M. Spalding offered the following resolution and moved its adoption. Resolved: That the Town Finance Committee act as the School District Finance Committee. The motion was sec-

ended and the vote was in the affirmative. Mrs. Vera H. MacLeay was recognized by the School Board, teachers and voters present with a hearty thank you for her work as a member of the School Board. Moderator Cassidy announced the District would return to the first article of the warrant.

The polls were officially closed by the Moderator at 6 p.m. and counting of the ballots followed.

Report from School Board on Area School Plan

Committees have been established for the past year or two to study the possibilities of setting up an AREA school organization for Plainfield, Lebanon and Grantham. Very little was done a year ago as the wording of the law made such an organization impractical. However, the law was amended during the past session of the General Court to make the organization pattern more flexible and attractive. Without taking too much space to outline the plan, the following are some of the advantages of the AREA concept:

- a. Districts sending tuition pupils to a high school are assured of space for an extended period.
- b. The sending districts have some "say" in school practices and policies.
- c. More significant programs are possible with the receiving districts knowing that the number of tuition students will be more stable and constant over the years.
- d. Last and probably most important from the financial point, lower tuition costs will be possible under this plan. (This will be explained below).

The plan appears to have two disadvantages, namely:

- a. All high school pupils in the district would be required to attend the AREA high school if the district is to pay the costs of tuition.
- b. The school day would be longer to some extent due to the class schedule in the Lebanon High School and the extra mileage for the students who live in the Plainfield village on Route 12A, south of the village.

If the plan is voted, students who might be attending another school other than Lebanon would be permitted to finish their education in that school.

From the financial standpoint, it is our feeling that Plainfield will realize significant savings. If the AREA plan is adopted, Lebanon will receive more construction aid money on the buildings used to house the AREA students. The Lebanon School Board has already gone on record to share on some mutually agreed basis the extra aid money. One possible means would be the elimination of the 2% rental charge that is included in the gross tuition rate. This action, as well as all other details, has to be approved by the planning committee and the voters of each district.

In the law, there is also provision for incentive aid for tuition pupils who attend the AREA high school. For senior high school, the sum is \$75 per pupil and for junior high school an allowance of \$60 is made. While these incentive figures are part of the law, the General Court has not as yet voted funds to implement this aid. It is expected that this will be forthcoming at some future session of the legislature.

The difference in tuition rates for 1966-67 between Lebanon and Windsor will be \$71.00. If the twenty-seven students attending Windsor go to Lebanon, a saving of more than \$1900 would result in tuition alone. If the incentive aid were voted, and it had been agreed by vote of the district to share this aid equally, Plainfield would save \$3630. This is figured as follows:

31 9th graders at \$60—\$1860 72 Sr. High pupils at \$75—\$5400.
Total \$7260, half of which is \$3630. If the AREA plan is voted, and only Plainfield and Lebanon join, Lebanon will receive \$6000 in extra construction aid. With the extra construction aid funds, Lebanon would be able to eliminate the rental fees, which it is now charging, and figured at an average of \$29.67 per student, the saving would be \$3056. Adding all the savings together, \$1917 on tuition, \$3630 on incentive aid, and \$3056 if the rental charge is eliminated, Plainfield could save up to \$8603. Lebanon would gain \$6686, plus the extra tuition funds, approximately \$15,000. It would seem that the plan ought to be attractive to both Lebanon and Plainfield.

It appears at this time that Lebanon's tuition rate will increase more slowly due to the fact that its building requirements seem set for the next several years.

It is the recommendation of the School Board, after studying the plan through the past several months, that Plainfield should vote to establish a legal planning committee to draw up articles of agreement with Lebanon and Grantham. It is our opinion that the financial savings, plus other advantages mentioned earlier in this report, outweigh the disadvantages.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens and Voters of the Plainfield School District:

FOREWORD

In the report of the Teacher Consultant, Mr. William Merrill, he has outlined the project which has been adopted and approved for the district under P.L. 89-10. He has explained the purpose of the project, how it will function and told of the values to the district and its children.

There has been considerable discussion whether this law will eventually lead to a stronger federal control of education. Some districts in New Hampshire have turned the funds down because of certain attitudes towards this possibility. P.L. 89-10 was enacted by Congress to benefit the "educationally deprived" and funds were voted on the basis of economic inability of the districts. It is true that certain guidelines must be followed in obtaining the funds to carry out projects, and districts will receive money to improve the school programs now being offered. The money cannot be used to directly reduce the local effort, which I am sure is what some of us would like to do. I will also agree that some of the "red tape" is at times very frustrating, but the results should outweigh these "road-blocks".

It is true that the control of finances and programs can be a powerful whip in the hands of federal agents. With additional revenue needed to carry out improved programs of instruction in our schools, it might be easy for greater control to be levied in the future if constant vigil is not maintained. While our population is becoming more mobile and the programs of education becoming more common nation wide, it still is the duty and responsibility of the local officials to study, evaluate and create programs that will best suit the needs of the local students.

It is my personal opinion that the federal assistance should have been more general in scope and not aimed only at a small segment of the school population. It is true that all children will benefit directly or indirectly from the present intent of the federal money as we might use the saying that "by strengthening one link in the chain, the whole chain becomes stronger". However, it would be better to be able to use some of the money to devise programs that would enable districts to set up programs to help the students who are above average also.

Therefore, it is necessary that a cooperative plan be established

when designing new legislation to improve education. Local officials, school boards, state officials as well as the federal level, should play appropriate parts in formulating new programs. We certainly need the talents of the federal officials, but local and state leaders, knowing more in detail the local problems, should have a more significant part in the future planning of federal programs.

BUDGET

The proposed budget for the school year 1966-67 has been reviewed carefully by the school board to be sure that the children of Plainfield get the best education possible within the means of the district. The gross budget for the next school year will be \$142,651.64 if adopted. This is a budget increase of more than \$21,000; however, the actual tax increase will be approximately \$11,000, not counting any other sums voted in special articles at the district meeting. The additional revenue will be explained later in this report.

The increase in the budget is caused by four or five items; namely, increased cost of instruction, higher social security and retirement costs, the notes to pay for the school bus purchased last Spring, and tuition costs due to the number of students who are now going on to high school and staying in school. This is explained in the tuition section.

A salary schedule was adopted by the school board last Spring, which is commensurate with the ability of the district to finance. The schedule starts beginning teachers at a salary of \$4,500. The schedule makes adjustments for the older teachers on the staff so they will be receiving an amount equal to or greater than beginning teachers. Such a schedule also offers encouragement for a stability of staff, as a higher maximum salary is an incentive to remain in the system.

The average salary for New Hampshire teachers for this year, according to a study made by the National Educational Association, is \$5,650. Plainfield's average salary for this year is \$4,730. The average salary for teachers in elementary schools in towns, not including any cities, was \$5,068 for 1964-65. This is higher than the average salary our teachers are receiving for 1965-66. Graduates of Plymouth last June, 1965, received an average starting salary of \$4,687 for jobs taken within the State, and \$4,910 for jobs taken outside of New Hampshire. The need for higher teachers' salaries will be a continuing problem.

Increased salaries and higher social security taxes has caused this item in the budget to go up more than \$1,000. Additional insurance coverage, boiler protection and higher workmen's compensation insurance also add to the total in this budget item.

For your information, the social security rate for 1966 is 4.2% and in 1967 it will jump to 4.8%.

The board and finance committee have decided it would be wise to pay off the full \$3,000 borrowed last year for the bus rather than put any funds into a capital reserve fund this year. This action will save interest charges for one year, and a reserve fund can be started next year.

REVENUE

The district is due to receive more outside revenue for the coming year. Our state aid should be in the vicinity of \$35,000, up more than \$10,000. This increase is due to the re-evaluation of property in the district a few years ago. The equalized valuation of property in Plainfield did not increase in the same proportion as that of other school districts this past year. This fact, coupled with more students, has given the district more funds. The money to be received from P.L. 89-10 will be anticipated revenue, approximately \$2,500. These funds will continue to finance the extra teaching costs for the remedial class at the White School. A slight increase has been planned for Sweepstakes revenue due to the greater interest in the sale of tickets this year. More money is expected for NDEA projects and part of the money will be used to improve the science program in the 7th and 8th grades. The tax assessment, \$96,801.64, is approximately 12-13 percent greater than the present year.

If the property owner is going to get some relief from the tax burden locally, the State has to assume more of the obligation for the education costs. The State has many fine aid programs to help the local districts, but it has failed to implement them, even to the extent which the laws have been written. While it will be a year before the General Court convenes again, I urge that you contact your representative to that body to see what he might do for added State aid. The State supports the total educational costs in New Hampshire approximately 8%, while in Vermont the state aid is nearer 25%.

TUITION

Ninety-five students are attending high school this year from the district; sixty-four in Lebanon, twenty-seven in Windsor, three in Hanover and one at Mascoma Regional. Next year it is anticipated that 104 students will be attending high school.

Tuition rates continue to go up each year due to higher costs of instruction. Lebanon's rate for next year will be \$530 for grades 10-12 and \$450 for grade nine.

The tuition rate in Windsor has been established at \$580 for 1966-67. This is an increase of \$71.00 over the current rate. Vermont law permits the establishment of the rate on the proposed budget, while in New Hampshire, the rate is based on the average costs for the preceding year. I hope that each of you has read the financial advantages if Plainfield were to join in the AREA plan with Lebanon and Grantham.

TEACHERS

Two changes have taken place on the teaching staff this year. Mrs. Ruth Cassedy resigned for personal reasons and her place has been taken by Mrs. Cynthia Burney, a graduate of Keene State College. Mrs. Burney, an English major, teaches all the language arts and English in grades 6, 7 and 8. Mrs. Beaupre has also resigned for personal reasons and her vacancy in grade 3 has been filled by Mrs. Carol Cook, also a graduate of Keene. The district is fortunate in being able to employ such capable replacements.

Our schools continue to be staffed by loyal and competent teachers. It is hoped that with a salary schedule, this trend will continue. Mr. Beaupre and Mrs. Spalding have administered and supervised their buildings in a fine manner in addition to a full-time teaching load. The activities program at the White School continues to be very popular and Mr. Clarke has done an outstanding job in coaching soccer and baseball, and basketball has been extremely successful under Mr. Beaupre.

WARRANT

THERE WILL BE at least two special articles in the warrant this year. One has to do with the formation of a planning committee for the AREA school plan. The second calls for an appropriation of \$1,000 to be raised immediately to cover overdrafts that will occur before June 30. Last year when the budget was prepared we planned on 89 tuition pupils and we have had as many as 97 in high school one time this fall. It appears that the tuition costs will exceed the amount appropriated by more than \$3,000, necessitating the deficiency appropriation. We have been able to save some money in other areas to make the sum needed much less.

CONCLUSION

I would like to thank the staff, teachers, custodians, and bus drivers for their work during the past year. Special thanks are extended to the P.T.A. members for their interest in the library program of the two schools, the special milk program and for the many ways the organization has helped the school. Appreciation is extended to Mrs. Snider for her interest in the libraries and especially for the work that she did on Title II project under P.L. 89-10. Mr. Merrill is to be commended for his work with the curriculum improvement in the grades and for the in-service work done with the teaching staff.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the school board for the conscientious manner in which they have carried out the duties of their office and for the aid given me during the year. Parents, voters, and taxpayers should be commended for the interest taken in and for the support of our schools.

Report of the Teacher Consultant

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

My report of last year noted the new mathematics and reading programs which were introduced in the schools. These programs continue to function very well. In addition, this year the reading program has been strengthened even more by the addition of a strong supplementary phonics program in grades 1 and 2. We are presently studying the science and language areas with the hope of making recommendations for improving the curriculum in these two important areas.

I will take this opportunity to point out the educational advantages, as I see them, for reorganization of the primary grades. It is my firm belief that the primary grades are the most important years of a child's educational experience. It is during these years that a child needs more of the teacher's time and attention than at any other level. Children at this level are not yet mature enough to work for any length of time independently. Each lesson has to be teacher directed and when a teacher has an undue number of groups no one group will get much time. Another factor to consider is the increased time it takes to teach the new programs with the emphasis on not only the "how" but also the "why". In addition, content subjects are introduced in the primary grades much earlier than formerly. For example, much more is being done in the first and second grades in science, language, spelling, and social studies than was done five years ago. However, we believe that the basic program of reading, writing, and arithmetic must come first and in a double grade situation there is not enough time to do much more than the basic 3R program. Please give this matter your most thoughtful consideration for it is an important step for a better educational program for the children of Plainfield.

This year increased federal aid came to the School District under the new Elementary and Secondary Education Act commonly referred to as PL 89-10. Public Law 89-10 has many titles to it, however, the ones which affect Plainfield most directly are Titles I and II. Title I deals with improving the educational program for the children who are working below the level which could normally be expected of them. We have submitted a project under this title which proposes to set up a ½ day remedial program for students in grades 6, 7, and

8. The project will enable the District to equip and furnish a remedial room and hire a part time teacher who will, hopefully, upgrade the skills of those children who need it.

Title II of PL 89-10, referered to as the library act, is set up to be administered on a Supervisory Union basis. A Title II committee was given the task of handling this project on a Union basis. The first task of this committee was a thorough inventory of library materials in each of the schools. The inventories were used as a basis for determining what the most critical needs were in the area of library materials. Each school submitted individual school projects and from these a final project was submitted to the New Hamshshire State Department of Education. The materials purchased under Title II which could amount to approximately \$7,000 will be loaned out to individuil teachers from the Supervisory Union Office in Lebanon. The Library committee did a most outstanding job. Congratulations to all who worked on this committee.

I wish to express my appreciation to the personnel of the two schools who have been most cooperative in carrying out the various requests and tasks asked of them. It has been a pleasure working with Superintendent Gordon Tate and the members of the Plainfield School Board who are constantly striving to improve the educational program for the youth of Plainfield.

Report of Principal

WHITE SCHOOL, MERIDEN

With the passage of the several grants under the Federal Aid to Education Bill, Meriden School has received additional funds and equipment not before provided under the budget.

Because we have not previously been able to offer a special class, as has Plainfield, it was decided that the funds procured under Title I be used to equip a classroom and to provide a teacher for such a purpose. It is hoped that by the time this report is published, that this plan will be in effect. This class will operate daily each morning, skills in reading, English, and mathematics to be stressed. Those students requiring more individual help in these subjects will meet regularly and thus benefit by specialized work.

Much time and planning has preceded the organizing and setting up of a school district library. This library, operating under Title II, will house books, texts, audio and visual materials for use in the public and private schools of our school district. This material, when available, will supplement the school curriculum. The various media will thus provide a further source from which the faculty can draw to help with many concept developments.

With the completion of the Meriden Town Library, a new program has been initiated involving all White School students. Volunteers are helping pupils in the proper use of a library and in selecting books for class work and individual interest. Special enrichment programs are also being planned to benefit the children.

Our own school library has been functioning very successfully this year. It is utilized daily during study halls and during certain classes when it will aid the curriculum. Many new books, non-fiction and fiction, have been purchased from funds made available through the school district, Ward's Fund, and the P.T.A.

Much discussion has evolved around the idea of transferring the fifth grade to the White School, and the first and second to Plainfield. It is the feeling of most involved that this particular change to one grade per teacher system would strengthen the curriculum for both pupil and teacher. The younger children would all be together, as would also the four upper grades. Duplication of various graded teaching materials would not be necessary as it is now.

We again thank K.U.A. for its generous assistance and the use of the various facilities, all of which have enabled us to offer our students a more rounded co-curricular program.

Many interested townspeople have become involved in our school activities. All are thanked for their many and varying endeavors.

A special thanks is given to the faculty, each of whom has co-operated fully in making an effective school program.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

PLAIN SCHOOL

In my report of last year the new reading and new math programs were briefly outlined. The reading program is progressing well and the teachers anticipate that this year will show decided improvement. We have reading tests that are issued by ABC for the reading program as well as the achievement tests. These tests and the teachers' observations should help confirm our anticipation.

The first and second grade has been working with the Economy Phonetic Plan. From all that we can judge at this point, this plan is giving the children an excellent foundation in phonics which is so important in reading.

Teachers and pupils are still working with the new math and are beginning to adjust to the new way of teaching and learning. We have acquired new material that the pupils can handle to give them a better understanding of the concept being presented. The books this year for grades four through six, although only semi-permanent copies, are in a coordinated series that when taught will prepare the pupils thoroughly for junior high math.

The science program has been evaluated and new materials or books are expected for our grades. The books now used need to be supplemented in some way.

Last fall teachers and librarians were asked for an inventory on some school supplies. Books, filmstrips, recordings, encyclopedias, globes, maps, and reference books were inventoried and sent to the office. This was necessary so that the schools could benefit from the new Public Law 89-10. We hope to receive maps, globes, and filmstrips as our allotment. The filmstrips for the fifth grade will be particularly beneficial as they follow closely the history and geography texts now used.

Action upon this article shall be by ballot vote. Copy of the proposed amendment is attached at the foot of this Warrant for Town Meeting and is incorporated into this Article by reference."

Final form of amendment of Zoning Ordinance of Town of Plainfield as proposed by Town Planning Board for consideration by the Town at Town Meeting March 2, 1966.

Section I. Amend Article III, Residences, paragraph 6, by striking out the whole thereof and inserting the following:

6. Trailers, semi-dependent mobile homes and mobile homes may be parked, used and occupied in the Town of Plainfield as provided in Article IV below and not otherwise.

Section 2. Insert a new Article IV, as follows:

ARTICLE IV

Trailers and Mobile Homes

1. General: Permits required.

1.1 Trailers and semi-dependent mobile homes may be parked and occupied in the Town of Plainfield only pursuant to prior permit issued by the Board of Adjustment under Section 2 of this Article below.

(d) Roadways in mobile home parks shall be of a minimum width of 40 feet. All roadways shall be well drained, gravelled or paved, and shall be maintained in good and safe condition at all times. All park roads as well as any common parking areas provided in parks for groups of two or more mobile homes shall be lighted at night.

(e) The water supply, sewage and all other sanitary and public health arrangements at the park shall conform with all applicable regulations and standards for trailer and mobile home parks as promulgated by the State of New Hampshire Department of Health and Welfare, or any other State agency having jurisdiction in the premises;

(f) All spaces beneath mobile homes shall, upon the responsibility of the owners, be closed off with skirting or other appropriate means, such as lattice-work;

(g) No permit shall be issued for a mobile home park unless the Board of Adjustment shall find that the specific premises proposed for the park are well adapted to such use, that a mobile home park will not be detrimental to the neighborhood, or to the community at large, and that it is consistent with the spirit of the Ordinance to grant the permit sought.

3.2 Any permit granted for the development of a mobile home park shall be upon the following conditions:

(a) The applicant shall undertake and agree to abide by all provisions of the Ordinance, and further to supply a copy of this Ordinance to any person in charge of a mobile home prior to permitting him to locate such a unit at a park existing pursuant to permit granted hereunder;

(b) Failure to comply diligently with any provision of the Ordinance, either by the proprietor of a park or by persons in charge of mobile homes located at any park shall constitute a ground for termination of the permit for the park;

(c) A true copy of any permit for development or operation of a mobile home park shall be kept prominently posted at the park at all times.

4. Procedure upon applications for permits.

4.1 Applications for temporary permits for trailers, semi-dependent mobile homes and mobile homes shall be in writing upon forms to be provided by the Board of Adjustment and pursuant to such reasonable rules of procedure as it may prescribe.

4.2 The following procedure shall govern all applications for permits for the use of premises for a mobile home park.
