ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The school year as now arranged by the State Superintendent begins with the fall term, and our annual school report of the district, to the state, is now for the year ending with the spring term; also a copy is lodged in the Selectmen's office.

Our annual town and school reports have been for the year ending February 15. As our schools are not generally closed at this time a complete report of the schools for the year cannot be given; also the financial school report is not for the full year.

We think it would be well to soon adopt, as far as can be, the State method, and consider our school year as beginning with the fall term.

ATTENDANCE.

At this time we cannot give the attendance for the year now ending, but will copy from the report made to the State Superintendent in August last for that year.

The Centre school reported an average daily attendance of fifteen pupils; the Upper village school reported ten pupils; the Peak reported five pupils.

Our teachers have been constant in their efforts, but the pupils need the stimulus that comes from numbers to obtain the best results. Our ex-Superintendent of Public Instruction, Fred Gowan, says: "If a rural school has twenty-five pupils, a competent teacher can be economically employed. In a good community such a school has the advantages not possessed by village or city schools." At the annual school meeting the action of the district will be taken as to forming a "Supervisory District," to employ a superintendent of schools. At the last session of the legislature an act was passed for the State to appropriate annually \$25,000 for school purposes, to be expended as follows: Twenty-five per cent of said sum, toward the salary of the said superintendent, the State to pay one-half and the towns that form the "Supervisory District" one-half. The remainder to be paid to those towns whose valuation is less than \$3000 for each child of the average attendance in the public schools during the school year. The result of this act in our vicinity, has been that our neighboring towns have been much more highly favored than we have been. The town of Seabrook receives upwards of \$700 and Newton receives some two or three hundred dollars, while nothing is received by our town.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES.

The appropriation for the use of the Library this year has been expended for the most part for current literature, the Trustees being of the opinion that this was the wisest course to pursue. With a larger sum at their disposal a larger amount of standard works and books of reference could be added, thereby increasing the value of the Library in the direction of permanent efficiency. There are two needed wants which the Trustees would call to the attention of the town. One is the need in the near future of the preparation of a suitable catalogue of books now in the library. The second is one which seems more difficult to obtain, viz., the more frequent opportunity for the public to avail themselves of the advantages of the institutions.

The fact of the limited time in which books can be taken out and returned to the Library, is, we believe, one of the most serious drawbacks to that general use of the books which is of course the end that is aimed at in the establishing of a free library.
