REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Friends and fellow citizens of Stoddard:

The duty of reporting the condition and progress of our schools during the past year having been assigned me by my associates and co-laborers on the Board of Education, I respectfully submit the following:—

The schools have been four in number, each having eighteen weeks. The school at the center of the town (formerly called No. 1,) was taught by MISS KATE A. BROWN of Marlow. The whole number of scholars registered the first term of eight weeks was thirty-six. Average daily attendance, thirty. They all studied Reading, twenty-five Spelling, seventeen Penmanship, twenty-one Arithmetic, twenty-one Geography, two History, two Physiology, one Bookkeeping, and one Algebra. Whole number of visitors twenty-six. Wages of the Teacher per month twenty-eight dollars.

The second term, whole number of scholars registered forty-three, average daily attendance thirty-five. Forty-one studied Reading, thirty-one Spelling, twelve Penmanship, thirty-two Arithmetic, twenty-three Geography, sixteen Grammar, six Physiology, three Algebra, and three Natural History. Whole number of visitors thirty. Wages of Teacher per month thirty-two dollars. Of this school very much might be said. The first term may truly be called a successful one, and the second was far from being a failure. The fact that it was not equally as successful as the first, cannot in our opinion be justly attributed to any fault in the Teacher. Her reputation as a faithful and efficient teacher is too well established to need any defense of ours, and if pupils under her instruction do not make good improvement it is their fault and not hers. Those who attended promptly and regularly, and manifested a desire to cooperate with the

Teacher in her efforts to assist them made commendable progress, as the register and closing examination clearly evinced. The exceptional cases seemed to consist mostly of that class who, it is feared, are accustomed to think of themselves, "more highly than they ought to think," instead of "thinking soberly." Selfreliance is, indeed, a noble quality of the mind, and one that should be encouraged; but when scholars become so self-reliant and self-conceited as to regard the Teacher as being wholly incompetent to instruct them, and especially if encouraged and sustained in that opinion by their parents, there seems to be but little reason to believe that they would be benefited in any school except the school of a life experience. For such there seems to be no other alternative but to "live and learn" by observation and self-culture. They may, indeed, be able to accomplish considerable in that way, but when obliged to assume the responsibilities and perform the practical of life, they will realize more fully than ever before the importance of a thorough education, and doubtless will have occsaion to regret that the time alloted them in their youthful days for obtaining it, was not more thoroughly improved.

School No. 2, (Jefts district,) — For several years past this school has held a position in the front rank among our schools, and it gives us pleasure to say there is no falling back, but that its course has been one of onward progress. The first term was taught by that well known and efficient Teacher, Miss F. Mabell Estabrooks of Hancock. Miss E. fully sustained her former reputation for keeping a good school, as the closing examination clearly proved. The whole number of scholars registered the first term was nineteen. Average daily attendance seventeen. Of these all attended to reading, spelling and vocal music. Fourteen studied penmanship and arithmetic, eight geography, Six grammar, four history, four physiology, and six composition. Whole number of visitors twenty-two. Wages of teacher per

month twenty-four dollars. The second term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Louise E. Dunsmoor of Bradford, Mass. Miss D. is a Normal School graduate, and possesses more than ordinary activity. These qualifications shone out most conspicuously in the school room during the whole term, and the result was a school rarely excelled. A class of small scholars in geography, and also a class in algebra deserve special commendation. The whole number of scholars registered was fifteen. Average daily attendance fourteen. They all studied reading, spelling, and arithmetic. Twelve studied penmanship, seven geography, five grammar, three history, thirteen composition, three physiology, and three algebra. Whole number of visitors twenty-five. Wages of teacher per month twenty-four dollars.

SCHOOL No. 5, (South Stoddard,):- Both terms of this school were taught by Miss Flora C. Farley of Marlow. Miss F. discharged her various duties as a teacher with fidelity, and so far as we know, gave entire satisfaction. The scholars comprising this school average the smallest of any in town, but according to the register, in deportment, it ranks the highest. In regard to that matter I can only say that in all of my visits (5 in number,) although when out of the school room, like most small children generally, they were somewhat noisy, yet, while in session in the school room, the order was most excellent. The whole number of scholars registered the first term was seventeen. Average daily attendance fifteen. Reading and spelling were taught as usual. Four studied arithmetic, ten penmanship, two geography, and one grammar. Whole number of visitors eighteen. Wages of teacher per month twenty dollars. The second term, whole number of scholars registered twentyfive. Average daily attendance twenty-two. In addition to reading and spelling, eight studied penmanship, six arithmetic, four geography, and one grammar. Whole number of visitors seventeen. Wages of teacher per month twenty-one dollars.

SCHOOL No. 8, (Rice district.)—By request of the parents this school was all embraced in one term of eighteen weeks after having. It was the smallest of any in town with only six registered scholars. The average daily attendance was not reported. It was taught by Miss Ella T. Keegan of Shrewsbury, Mass. Miss K. is a young lady of unusual ability, and though this was her first effort in teaching, she engaged in it with commendable zeal, which continued to the close without any abatement, making good use of all the time and doing all in her power to aid those under her instruction. Should she decide to make teaching her vocation, we confidently predict for her a most brilliant future. All of the scholars attended to reading, spelling, drawing, penmanship. arithmetic, and vocal music. Five studied grammar, two geography, and one physiology. The closing examination was entertaining and instructive, indicating a commendable degree of improvement.

Whole number of visitors twenty-five. Wages of teacher per month twenty dollars.


