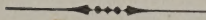

The weekly average number at the Almshouse the last year was 127 1-4. The present number is 140; 76 males and 64 females. Of this number there are 5 blind, 10 harmless insane, 16 idiots, and 18 children under 5 years of age. Most of the remaining 91 are aged and feeble, with impaired or broken constitutions, unable to perform much productive labor on the farm or about the premises; demanding diligent and constant care to attend to their legitimate wants, of which they have had the unwearied attention of C. E. Caswell, Esq., and his wife, who have had charge of the farm as Superintendent and Matron, for the last six years, and whose efforts to combine economy to the county and comfort to the inmates of this institution, have been very successful.

The whole number of deaths in the institution during the past year, as will be seen by the accompanying table, has been eleven. Six of these were persons brought there in the last stage of some fatal disease, and with expectation that they had but a few days or weeks at most to live.

So far as pertains to the management of our Almshouse and Farm, the year just ending has been one of continued prosperity and success. The institution has not been visited by any epidemic or contagious disease during the year, and our expectations were more than realized in the abundance of harvest. The farm is being greatly improved, and is more productive each year. Should the next season be favorable, we may confidently expect many tons more of hay will be raised on the farm than has been cut any prior year since the county has owned it. As the land is laid down to grass year by year, and enriched by a liberal supply of manure, which is made on the farm in large quantities from muck mixed with the contents of the vaults, and barn and hog manure, it must certainly increase the quantity of hay for many years to come, without any additional expenditure for labor over and above the usual number of hands now employed.

We have had a school consisting of from fifteen to twenty-five children at the Almshouse a large part of the year, taught by Miss Deland and Miss Brown. The progress in learning has been very commendable. The teacher, when not in the school-room, is constantly employed with her needle and sewing machine, making and mending the many garments required there.

Religious services are held at the Almshouse each week the most part of the year, on Sabbath afternoons, at which many clergymen of the county have kindly offered their services to be present, and interesting meetings were the result.

We desire again to express our confidence in Mr. Caswell, Superintendent, and Mrs. Caswell, Matron, of the Institution, for the faithful discharge of the peculiar and responsible duties devolving upon them, and to note their zeal and ability in the management of the specialities confided to their

charge, and for their kind and tender care constantly rendered to the unfortunate persons committed to their trust. Whenever we have had occasion to send persons to our Almshouse who could no longer support themselves, of all ages and conditions, from infancy to four score years or more, it has been a great relief for us to know that this unfortunate class of the poor were to have a home where ample provision is made for their comfort and welfare in sickness and health,—indeed a better home than most of them ever had before, where humane treatment and kind and tender care is ever predominant.

Mr. Caswell during the past year has sold swine, calves, lambs, produce, etc., from the farm, to the amount of \$715.11, which he has expended in supplies for the County House.

We are happy at all times to receive visitors to ascertain all the facts and particulars in regard to the comforts and conveniences enjoyed by the inmates of the institution, and the management and workings of the same. In every instance where such examination and investigation has been made, the investigator has been satisfied with the result.

We desire to express our obligations to those clergymen who have visited our institution Sabbath afternoons, and held meetings there. We sincerely hope that not only these, but others, will lay us under similar obligations in the future.

Trusting this report may satisfy all enquiries in regard to the operation of the institution, we respectfully submit it for your consideration.
