TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sunapee in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to voted in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at I. O. O. F. Hall in said Sunapee on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect one Selectman for three years, and all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, and Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3,000.00 to pay Machinery Note, and \$1,300.00 for the interest on its notes, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise, \$5,000.00 for Town Officers Salaries, \$2,200.00 for Town Officers Expenses, \$200.00 for Election and Registration, \$150.00 for Municipal Court, \$2,000.00 for Repairs and Expenses of Town Property, \$3,400.00 for Police Department, \$40.00 for Vital Statistics, \$5,000.00 for the Fire Department, \$200.00 for the Health Department, \$2,000.00 for the Nurse Association, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$23,000.00 for Highway Summer Maintenance, \$1,200.00 for the Town Dump, \$18,000.00 for Highway Winter Maintenance, \$7,500.00 for Road Oil and General Expenses of the Department, \$4,500.00 Machinery Maintenance, \$4,500.00 for Street Lights, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$950.00 for the Library, \$4,000.00 for Town Poor and Aid to Soldiers and their families and Old Age Assistance, \$1,200.00 for the care of Cemeteries, \$9,900.00 for the Water Department, including Debt and Interest, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, and pass any vote relating thereto.

- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the years 1959-1960, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,050.00 for Band Concerts at Sunapee Harbor and Georges Mills during the summer season of 1959, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,500.00 for the collection of Garbage, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the observance of Memorial Day, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the Town vote to raise \$700.00 to maintain the Information Booth, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 to be paid the Newport Hospital in Newport and raise \$200.00 to be paid the New London Hospital, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$600.00 for the Board of Trade, and \$1,000.00 for the Lake Sunapee Fish and Game Club to assist in publicizing Lake Sunapee, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Sunapee Recreational Committee, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to assist the Doctor, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for printing an inventory of the Town in the 1959 Town Report, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for the purpose of erecting a suitable entrance sign on land of Sunapee Development Corp. and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to close the road from the so-called Elliott place (Belva Colby owner) to the Newport Town Line, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls will remain open until 7 P. M.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless itms which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be esaier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.

We wish to thank the townspeople and summer residents for their cooperation.



In September the children's book section was completely rearranged and for the convenience of the children there are now three sections of books: Easy, for pre-school and grades 1-3; Juvenile, for grades 4-6 and Youth, for grades 7, 8 and High School. This work was done with the advice and assitance of Mr. Charles Maurer, State Extension Librarian from Keene.

The State Aid Grant was given for adult non-fiction in recognition of the fact that an effort is being made to increase the scope of material in this section and to assist us in doing so. The amount of this grant is \$150.00 and the books were purchased by the State and given to our Library.

A vertical file has been given to the Library by Mr. William C. Lary and an oil painting was given by Harold Pickering of Ithaca, New York. This painting is the work of the late Ellen Knowlton who was a former Sunapee school teacher. Other paintings on display this year have been loaned by Mrs. Robert Hill of Sunapee and Mr. Kenneth Andler of Newport.

Magazines have been donated to the Library by Mrs. Raymond Hudson, Mrs. Robert Davies, Mrs. Harriet Stocker and Mrs. Constance Tallarico. We have a new magazine rack in which to keep current and back issues of peroidicals and the Indexed Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature is now available.

112 adult fiction, 117 non-fiction and 224 children's books

have been borrowed from the State Library Extension Service in Keene through the services of the Bookmobile. 244 adult nonfiction and 56 children's books have been borrowed from the State Library in Concord.

Our Library had Open House the evening of March 21st in observance of National Library Week and was open every evening from 6:30 to 8:00 during the week of November 2nd in observance of Book Week.

Starting in November there have been free movies for school children shown at the Library the first Saturday evening of each month at 7 and this schedule will continue through the balance of the school year. These films are available to our Library free of charge through the State Library from the Audio-Visual Service of the University of New Hampshire. In this connection I wish to express my appreciation to David Sherburne, Principal, for loaning me the movie projector and screen from the Central School and to the Fire Department for loaning chairs.

During the year there have been 32 class visits to the Library and bus students and High School students have been given Library privileges during school hours.

I have attended Library meetings at New London February 21st, at Bradford May 16th and at Sutton October 30th, with members of the Board of Trustees.

I sincerely appreciate the assistance and advice given me by the former Librarian, Mrs. Mary Haven and the assistance given me by the Trustees, Mrs. Harriet Stocker, Mrs. Guy Alexander and Mr. William C. Lary.

In the latter part of 1957 a planning program for Sunapee was undertaken by the planning Board. The funds for this program were appropriated by the Town in 1957 and, with the assistance of the New Hampshire Planning and Development Commission, these funds were matched by the Federal Government under the Urban Planning Assistance Program. Technical planning assistance was provided by Elliot G. Hansen, Area Planner, of the New Hampshire Planning and Development Commission. The following planning program was undertaken:

- 1. Preparation of Base Maps. These maps include a township base map at a scale of 1—1,000′; and two compact area maps at a scale of 1″—200′.
- 2. Land Use Survey.

Existing Land Use. A map and analysis of the distribution of existing land use.

Proposed Land Use. A plan for the development of proposed land use patterns.

- 3. Zoning Ordinance. Proposed zoning ordinance and maps based on the land use studies.
- 4. Preliminary Report on traffic circulation, off-street parking, and the conservation and rehabilitation of land and buildings

in Sunapee Harbor.

The Planning Board met with Mr. Hansen during 1958 eighteen times. The base maps, land use studies, and proposed zoning ordinance were completed and accepted by the members of the Board. The proposed zoning ordinance was not accepted at the 1958 Town Meeting. A report, "A Plan for the Improvement of Sunapee Harbor" was completed and will be available for review at the 1959 Town Meeting. Any ideas contained in this study are suggestions only, and any comments on them will be appreciated by your Planning Board.

Board members Caldwell, Lovejoy, and Gamsby and Selectman Colcord attended the N. H. State Planning Conference in Durham in May, 1958.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

CO-OPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY PROGRESS

The towns of New London, Springfield and Sunapee have voted to petition the State Board of Education to become members of a Co-operative School District. Andover, Bradford, Newbury and Wilmot have voted in favor of continuing the study for a Co-operative School District. There are meetings planned in the respective towns to take a definite vote on a Co-operative High School.

The Co-operative High School, as tentatively planned, would be located near New London. This should be as central as possible for the towns named above and would include provision for town water supply, sewage disposal and fire protection.

The cost for a school for 400 to 500 pupils, grades 9 through 12, would be approximately \$833,000. Sunapee's share of that cost would be 22.99% with all of the above-mentioned towns participating.

If Sunapee should decide to "go-it-alone", serious consideration should immediately be given to providing an adequate Auditorium-Gymnasium, an extensive renovation and enlargement of the Science Laboratory facilities, possibly the establishment of a Language Laboratory as well as the development of several other specialized areas. Without question, the next ten years will see many changes and innovations in high school education. If your young people are to compete on an equal basis with others, you must provide the up-to-date facilities for their training.

NATIONAL DEFENSE EDUCATION ACT OF 1958

Under Title III of the above Act, funds will be available on a matching basis to local school systems for the acquisition of laboratory or other special equipment for Science, Mathematics, or modern Foreign Language teaching.

Funds have been included in the Budget to take advantage of this dollar-for-dollar matching of Federal funds. It is hoped to use a portion of these funds to build up the equipment and materials for adequate science instruction in the elementary grades as well as the high school. The needs of our time dictate that children be introduced to the ideas of science and the scientific method at an early age.

EMERSON SCHOLARSHIP

The Trust under the will of John U. Emerson provides the funds for the establishment of the "John U. and Della M. Emerson Scholarship". This award is to be awarded annually "to a member of the Senior Class whom the School Committee may deem needy and worthy, to enable said scholar to attend a higher institution of learning". It is expected that the income from this fund should provide an award of approximately \$250.00.

STAFF

The problem of keeping a competent staff and obtaining qualified replacements is a continual one. Salary, warking conditions and attitude of the community toward teachers are all important factors. Several personnel policies were taken by the School Board this past year.

The maximum number of days of sick leave that may be accumulated was increased from 30 to 45 days. This builds up at the rate of 10 days per school year—when not actually used during the year. (This brings Sunapee in line with Newport and New London on this policy.)

A policy adopted relative to In-Service Traning should further help to hold competent staff members interested in professional advancement. The policy is as follows:

Each teacher—not holding a Master's degree—is required to obtain at least four (4) semester hours of credit through an accredited post-secondary institution every five (5) years. (Approved travel may be substituted to fulfill a part of this requirement.) (Teachers holding a Master's degree are required to obtain at least two (2) semester hours of credit every five years.)

By State regulation, teachers who become certified after July 1, 1948, are required to earn six semester hours of credit every five years.

The School District will allow each teacher \$25.00 a credit, toward the cost of summer school attendance to meet the above requirements or to assist them in obtaining credits for an advanced degree, provided the teacher continues to teach in the Sunapee schools during the entire school year following attendance at summer school. (This allowance shall not apply toward approved travel.) (Requests for such summer school financial assistance must be presented to the Superintendent in writing prior to budgetary preparation for the ensuing year.)

CONCLUSION

The work of the School touches many phases of community activity. It is my hope that our accomplishments will be such as to merit the continued interest and support of the citizens of Sunapee.

REPORT OF HELPING TEACHER

Now in the fifth year of providing services throughout the five towns of this supervisory union, I wish to express my deep appreciation to all in the schools and communities served for the cooperation and encouragement extended to me toward the fulfillment of the objectives and responsibilities outlined below.

- 1. OBJECTIVES—Directed by the Superintendent of Schools and as established by law, the work of Helping Teacher has aimed toward the giving of "....helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils, and parents of a school system as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children; solving pupil problems of retardation and malajustment; bringing resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, and community; and in general acting as consultant to the entire staff and community in recognition of educational needs."
- 2. REPORTING PUPIL PROGRESS—This year some revision was made in the report card used for reporting pupil progress in the elementary grades 1-8. This revision makes the report in both scholarship and citizenship more practical and positive for teachers, parents, and pupils.
- 3. TESTING PROGRAM—As in other years, this program includes (a) achievement tests in all grade levels for the entire school system; (b) mental ability tests administered to pupils in grades 1, 4, and 7; (c) the arrangemen for individual or small group tests as needs arise. Every attempt is made to use the results of these tests, together with teacher-made devices for pupil evaluation, as a means of determining and guiding the educational growth of children. These tests often serve as the basis for grouping of children, either by seperate divisions or within the classroom, and provide valuable information for parent-teacher conferences.
- 4. CLASSROOM VISITS—These visits make it possible to share the physical emotional, and educational atmosphere of the classroom. Follow-up conferences with teachers are intended to exchange ideas, review of lessons taught, and to promote instructional improvement.
- 5. RESOURCES AND MATERIALS—These are essential in providing for enrichment in teaching and for individual pupil

needs. Special texts, references, book lists, and other memoranda bring to the teachers a variety of teaching aids to help strengthen the overall curriculum. Science has already received considerable emphasis throughout the elementary grades. Steps are now being taken to provide better materials for teaching various phases of language in these grades.

- 6. MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES—Whether a formal staff meeting, an informal chat with a teacher, conference with a parent, participation in P-TA discussions, or attending educational meetings, a wide variety of topics are covered—all aimed at providing the best education for all.
- 7. AUDIO-VISUAL AIDS—The filmstrips are still the most useful and practical teaching aids in this field, primarily because they are more readily available when needed then sound motion picture films. With the addition of new filmstrips each year, our library has become more valuable, and revised listings are being prepared in all curriculum fields.

The work of Helping Teacher shares in many other services and responsibilities of education, including conferences with parents, individual testing of pupils, arranging for special testing, assisting teachers with problems of keeping the school register, and assisting the Superintendent of Schools in any administrative details as they effect the improvement of instruction throughout the school system.

The realization of the purposeful goals and responsibilities of the Helping Teacher would not be possible without the cooperative spirit of all teachers and principals and the mutual interest in the best education for all

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Sunapee qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the I. O. O. F. Hall in said District on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, 1959, at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3, to choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$105,981.77 as recommended by the School Board in its annual report, for the support of schools, for the salaries of District Officers, and for the payment of the statuatory obligations of the District; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund and other state sources, together with other income estimated at \$3,791.00, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

Article 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or ofiers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

Article 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
