# Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

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## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall on the 11th day of March, 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, and one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years and two auditors for the ensuing year.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the ensuing year.

3. To see if the Town will vote \$200.00 and appropriate the same for the use of the Laconia Hospital Association.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for care of cemeteries.

5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an ap-

proprietion to cover such an expense of such an audit.

6. To see if the Town will vote \$228.00 for the Lakes Region Assn. of N. H., for the issuance of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to resources and natural advantages of Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$157.16 to procure Town Road Aid from the State. The State to contribute the sum of \$628.25.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

9. To see if the Town will allow a discount on early paid taxes.

10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for all purposes for the ensuing year.

11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to reports of its officers and agents for the past year.

12. To choose any other officers or agents for the year ensuing.

13. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To transact any other business that may



legally come before said meeting.

## To the Citizens of Tilton and Northfield

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Our forest lands represent a substantial proportion of the town's valuation. They provide income to our citizens, from the sale of forest products and through employment to woods' workers. The protection of our forest lands is essential to the continued welfare of the town. Fire is the forests' worst enemy. It not only destroys the growing crop but leaves the land in such condition that nothing of value will grow for a long period of years. In addition it costs good tax money to extinguish forest fires.

An analysis of forest fire records indicate that 97 per cent are man-caused and consequently avoidable. Carelessness and failure to comply with reasonable regulations governing the building of fires in and near woodlands has been costly to both towns and individuals. Through elimination of the human equation, forest fire losses would be reduced to a minimum . This is possible if every citizen would be careful, familiarize himself with burning regulations, comply with them and then use proper discretion.

We have been particularly fortunate in Tilton and Northfield since the hurricane in not having had more serious fires. This is due in part to the strictness of our wardens in issuing permits and



splendid cooperation on the part of the public. Great care is needed because conditions in our blown-down areas are more critical with down material drying out and becoming more highly inflammable. The continued cooperation of every one is necessary.

We should all remember that:

1. Written permission of the local forest fire warden to burn brush, rubbish or other debris in or near woodlands or where fire may be communicated to woodlands is necessary when the ground is not covered with snow. Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable—

(a) To a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.

(b) To the town for expenses incurred by the warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.

(c) For damages to abutting owners if the fire runs onto the abutters' property.

2. It is a violation of the Forest Laws of the state to—

(a) Drop or throw any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire, from any vehicle while the same is upon a public highway or private way.

(b) Drop; throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire. Violation of these prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty by a fine of \$25.00.

3. You should promptly notify your local forest fire warden of any fires you see.

4. The forest laws are being more strictly enforced each year.

Your cooperation will save the warden considerable worry; you and your town much trouble and expense.

Mrs. Marguerite Tallman assisted with the district nursing 13½ days and Mrs. Clarice Fitzgerald 26½ days while the usual nurse was relieved for school nursing.

A Child Health Conference and Toxoid Clinic was held at Northfield Town Hall, July 10, 1940. Forty-two children had free physical examinations and 19 received toxoid treatments.

The usual Tuberculosis Clinic was replaced this year by a skin-testing clinic for the High School students and contact cases. Other patients were aided in attending the Tuberculosis Clinics in Franklin and Laconia. A more detailed report of the skin-testing clinic will be found in the School Nurse's report.

In co-operation with the State Board of Health and the local Woman's Club a series of 12 Mothercraft Classes were held in the Methodist Vestry with various speakers instructing in different phases of motherhood and health work.

The continued support of the members of the Association and the co-operation of the local, county and state officials have been of inestimable value and is gratefully acknowledged.

## CHANNING T. SANBORN

On Friday, October 11, 1940, Channing T. Sanborn, superintendent of schools in the supervisory district comprising the school districts of Tilton-Northfield, Belmont, Canterbury, Gilford, and Gilmanton, died at his home after an illness of a few hours. He was stricken at his office in the high school soon after his arrival in the morning and succumbed of shock in the afternoon. Services were conducted by the Rev. J. Osborne Crowe, in the Congregational church on Sunday afternoon. Burial took place in the Park Cemetery. Bearers were Arthur Bacon, Chester Worthen, Headmaster Willard H. Smith, Leon Lawrence, Myron Meserve and Robert McCook. Memorial services were held in the high school auditorium on Monday, Oct. 14.

Channing T. Sanborn was born in Concord, February 12, 1875, the son of Alfred L., and Elizabeth (Shallis) Sanborn. He attended schools there and was graduated from Dartmouth in 1900, starting a long career as an educator soon after. His record in educational work included:

- 1901-1905 Principal of grammar school, Wolfeboro
- 1905-1910 Superintendent of the supervisory district including the towns of Wakefield and Milton
- 1910-1915 Superintendent of schools, Pittsfield, Chichester, and Loudon
- 1915-1940 Superintendent of schools  
Tilton-Northfield 1915-1940

Belmont 25th year  
 Canterbury 7th year  
 Gilford 20th year  
 Gilmanton 7th year

He lived to see the realization of his dreams, the establishment of high schools in Belmont and in Tilton-Northfield, and a consolidated grade school in Gilford. He worked tirelessly for the modernization of buildings, transportation of pupils, higher standards for teachers, and enrichment of the curriculum. His greatest achievement was the final acceptance of the oft-rejected proposal to build a high school in Tilton-Northfield. He supervised its building, selected the staff, initiated the program, and supervised its activities for a year before his death.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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To the Members of the School Board, Parents, and  
Voters of the Tilton-Northfield Union School  
District:

In completing the interrupted term of the late Superintendent Channing T. Sanborn, I present this brief account for my first annual report as your superintendent of schools.

## TEACHERS

Fortunately, there have been few changes in the teaching personnel during the period from February 1, 1940 to January 31, 1941. It is desirable educationally and economically to retain the services of competent teachers for in so doing, the pupils benefit and the District receives a fine value for each school dollar expended.

Miss Harriot Hood who taught in the first grade resigned in June to be married. Miss Thelma Wade was employed for that position at the Union School.

Miss Beatrice A. Pelletier was granted a leave of absence for one-half year because of illness. Miss Ruby A. Whittemore of West Andover, New Hampshire, substituted for her at the high school.

On account of the unusually large enrollment in the fifth grade, Miss Bertha M. McLoy of Concord was employed from November 25, 1940, to teach the pupils in one division of this grade.

I take pleasure in submitting to you this report covering the activities of Tilton-Northfield High School from February 26, 1940, to February 14, 1941.

## ENROLLMENT

In Table I will be found statistics regarding the enrollment of our school. A substantial increase in our enrollment is to be noted for this school year. This increase is in the senior high school, Grades X and XII. Grades VII and VIII show a loss of one pupil only.

## ATTENDANCE

### COURSES OF STUDY

Table IV gives an outline of the courses of study offered in our school this year. It should be noted that for the purpose of economy certain courses are alternated with other courses and are offered every other year. Thus, Chemistry alternates with Physics, Plane Geometry with Algebra II, Consumer Education I (Economics and Consumer Buying) with Consumer Education II (Sociology and Psychology). The Family and its Members with The Home and Its Care.

The principal change in our curriculum has been in the expansion of our shop program to include work in electric wiring, metal work and the manufacture of plastic jewelry. In our shop much equipment has been made for the school; at present, sixteen excellent drawing tables are nearing completion.

### EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Our varied program of extra-curricular activities has been continued with some changes and additions. Some of the rehearsals of the Treble Clef Club and the Orchestra are now scheduled within our regular school day. Our school has been admitted as a one-year member of the Pemigewasset League in varsity girls' and boys' basketball. These league games with Plymouth, Lincoln, Meredith, Ashland and Bristol have been well patronized and have created considerable interest. A strong inter-class athletic program with many boys and girls participating is worthy of mention. Additions to our extra-curricular activities this year are a recreational ski club and a Senior Girl Scout troop, with a Hi-Y club in process of formation.

The Student Council has assumed greater responsibilities this year in having supervision over the finances of our extra-curricular activities and in setting up a budget for these activities in our Student Activities Fund.

### CONCLUSION

After a year and a half of existence, we are still building our school, hoping and planning to

make a better institution each year. Among the problems needing solution, I wish to mention two on which we are working. The first is the improvement of our home room organization. We need a much stronger relationship between the home room teacher and his pupils. We need good practical home room programs which will include many important and valuable matters which pupils should know and which we cannot give them otherwise in the school day. The second problem is the establishment of a program of drill on spelling, grammar, handwriting, geography, and mathematics in Grades IX to XII for those needing this review.

I am deeply grateful for the good spirit and cooperation of the pupils, for the loyalty and untiring effort of our staff of teachers, for the inspiring leadership of Superintendent Sanborn and yourself, for the continued interest and support of parents and townspeople.

I could not conclude this report without expressing our deep sorrow in the loss last October of our Superintendent, Channing T. Sanborn. I like to think and hope that somewhere, somehow, he can watch the progress of this school of which he was so proud. May we not fail him!

## Report of School Nurse

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During the year 1940, the school nurse has routinely visited the Union Graded School three times a week, the High School twice a week and the rural schools as the occasion required. These visits help the teachers to detect minor illnesses, to prevent contagion and to care for minor wounds and emergencies. Assistance has been given the school physician while examining the school children, and parents have been notified of all defects which needed their attention. The school nurse has tested the vision and hearing of all school children and records have been kept of all these findings.

The following number of defects have been corrected:—underweight 8, defective vision 20, anemia 1, nervous conditon 1, teeth 16, tonsils 31, breathing 2.

Through the cooperation of the Crippled Children's Service of the State Board of Health it has been possible to have their physio-therapist, Mrs. Carrie Price, conduct a posture class in our schools. Each week she treats about six patients but by alternating, fourteen children have already had the benefit of her classes.

The N. H. Tuberculosis Association made it possible for us to have a skin testing clinic in schools. Dr. Robert Kerr was in charge and was assisted by Dr. Galloway of Pembroke Sanatorium and by

Miss Marion Garland and your school nurse. Nine of the 276 children tested from the High School building showed positive reactions and two of the 47 contact cases from Union Graded School reacted positively. These reactors also had their chests X-rayed. The financial support of the local post of the American Legion and Auxiliary helped to make this possible. Only 3 per cent of the total number of children showed positive X-ray findings and this should be considered a very favorable report.

The cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, of the Headmaster and of the teaching staff has been greatly appreciated. The interest of the parents and the financial aid of the Rotary Club, Tilton Trust Fund, the local Chapter of the American Red Cross and of the town and county officials has been an inspiration and very real help in carrying on this work.
