

The beautiful church shown on the cover was struck by lightning and completely destroyed by fire September 2, 1956. The sixty-four square rods of land on which the church stood were conveyed to the Trustees of Wakefield Academy for "an academy" and "for a house of religious worship" by Henry L. Wiggin and Joseph P. Wiggin of Wakefield in 1830. At that time an unfinished meetinghouse, raised in 1816, stood on the premises. Nearly a quarter of a century later, in 1854, the structure was completed by the raising of a spire. Thus, for nearly two generations, our forebears labored to complete their church. The main part of the building rested on a foundation fifty feet square. The distance from the foundation to the eaves was thirty feet. The foundation beneath the steeple was twenty feet square. It was a building of strength, of beauty and of simplicity. Its 119foot steeple was one of the highest ever erected on a country church. The completed building was considered to be the loveliest example of New England church architecture in New Hampshire. It represented more than a place of worship of a denomination. symbolized the deep religious faith and the courage and self-sacrifice that made our country great.

The Wakefield Congregational Church was an historic landmark. The many visitors to this section of the state and the thousands of motorists who traveled the White Mountain highway remembered Wakefield because of this lovely church. It was regarded as the Town's proudest and most cherished possession. From the nearby lakes and from the distant mountains one would see its spired steeple and say, "There is Wakefield!"

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield, on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,308.28 to defray Town charges, as submitted by the Town Budget Committee for the ensuing year as follows:

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$12,000.00 for a completely equipped truck, this to be raised by serial notes, or otherwise.

#### (By Selectmen)

This Article submitted WITHOUT RECOMMEN-DATION by the Budget Committee.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to finish building and tarring and removing ledges on the so-called Pigeon Hill Road in Union from the Boston and Maine right of way to the Ledges at the foot of the hill just below the Tanner property.

#### (By petition of 16 Voters)

This Article APPROVED by the Budget Committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to be used as salary to hire a Clerk to be known as Clerk of the Board

of Selectmen. The purpose of said clerk to be the assisting of the Selectmen with the bookkeeping, filing, correspondence, and other such duties as designated by them.

(By petition of 10 Voters)

This Article NOT APPROVED by the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for the re-appraisal of the taxable real estate property in the Town by the New Hampshire State Tax Commission.

(By petition of 16 Voters)

This Article NOT APPROVED by the Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for bathing beach facilities on Lovell Lake. Said sum of money to be raised by serial notes maturing in equal amounts for five years and also authorize the Park and Playground Commission to enter into an agreement with the Socony - Vacuum Oil Co. for the purchase of their land and filling station at the corner of Witchtrot Road and Route 16.

(By petition of 16 Voters)

This Article NOT APPROVED by the Budget Committee.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for Park and Playground purposes.

(By petition of 19 Voters)

Budget Committee Recommends \$1000.00 under this Article.

11. To see if Town of Wakefield will vote to put three street lights on Route 153 between Mr. Calvert's house down to Mr. Richard Anderson's house.

(By petition of 12 Voters)

This Article submitted without recommendation by Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue this small section of old road on Route 109 and have reverted to the abutters who is Mrs. Lillian Donahue.

#### (By Selectmen)

13. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify on Route 16 from Ed Brown place to the first place north of R. R. Crossing to Class 6. Road to be closed by Gates or Bars after the State of New Hampshire turns it over to the Town of Wakefield.

#### (By Selectmen)

14. We the undersigned property owners, at Province Lake, Wakefield, N. H. do hereby petition the Town of Wakefield, N. H. to close the present road running along lake shore of our property, properties. A road which was recently constructed at the rear of our properties by Mr. William Ames, will enable the Highway Department to maintain and plow the same, which has been impossible in the past. This will also eliminate bad curves and narrow sections which are in the present road.

The following undersigned are the entire list of property owners who would be affected at its removal.

(Recommended by Budget Committee)

15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the State pay scale for Highway employees and further to adopt the State pay rate for hiring trucks for Town use. This to become effective April 1, 1957.

(By petition of 15 Voters)

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## DETAILED REPORT OF THE PARKS AND PLAYGROUND COMMISSION

Continuing to believe a clean town is a well managed town, your Commission embarked on a program of beautification.

WEEK'S BEACH AND PICNIC AREA at Great East Lake became a mecca for visitors from all over the country, as attested to by the many names listed in our guest book. Here we spent over \$155.00, and more funds will be requested for further improvements.

VETERANS SQUARE, was acclaimed far and wide at a cost of \$175.00, which was kept at that figure by constant care by members of your Commission. We urgently recommend that this program be continued in that other town property may likewise be developed. The advertising from our summer visitors has been manifested by untold numbers of letters of congratulations and numbers of colored photos received from as far away as Cleveland, Ohio. This sort of advertising, in our opinion, cannot be measured in dollars and cents.

LOVELL LAKE, the installing of the two piers, was acclaimed by our summer residents, who used boat transportation to do their shopping in Sanborn-ville. This cost \$105.00 We urge the addition of at least two more sections for this facility.

BASEBALL FIELD, with the co-operation and joint assistance of the School Board, the woods adjacent to the Paul School was turned over to this Commission, who have spent so far \$355.00 in levelling the woods and bull-dozing about four acres, which

will eventually be made into a modern baseball field and recreation area. We hope to add this section of our town as another beauty spot within the near future.

PLAYGROUNDS. The Commission is of the opinion, for the present enough playground equipment has been installed at both the Taft playground in Union and the Garvin Playground in Sanbornville, and will therefore not install additional equipment at either place for the present. We spent \$413.00 for playground purposes this year, which included \$46.00 for transportation to Clows Beach in Wolfeboro, for children living in Union.

SUMMARY, we must mention our gratitude and appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. George Rockwell of Brookfield for the generous donation of over \$50.00 worth of Yew trees which were set out around the monument at Veterans Square. We wish to thank Chuck Emmons for his assistance in auctioning so many of the old school desks, which report in detail will be found under receipts. Likewise, Marjory Hanson, for the use of her barn in storing the above and assisting in their sale. So many people have assisted us, space forbids our listing their names, but we do offer our grateful thanks to all and request your continued support of our over-all program.

#### FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

#### DANGER FROM FIRES IN WOODLANDS

Woodland litter, when dry, is highly inflammable and fires can quickly get out of control. We request your cooperation to control all fires so that lives and property may not be endangered or destroyed, and forests be kept green to furnish the natural beauty we all enjoy and to grow timber we will need.

#### WHAT IS "WOODLAND"?

The term "woodland" is defined by law to include, "cut-over land, slash and such other land as bears a sufficient amount of wood growth, wood, weeds, grass or other growth as to be likely to be burned over."

When in the woods, you are expected to exercise caution in the use of fire and to remember that

#### IT IS UNLAWFUL TO

Throw down lighted matches, cigarettes, or other burning substances from vehicles or otherwise.

Burn brush, rubbish, grass or other materials when the ground is not covered with snow, without written permission from the Forest Fire Warden.

Kindle a camp or cooking fire on land of another without permission from the owner or his agent.

Leave an open fire burning unattended.

Fail to report a forest or brush fire that is out of control.

## VIOLATORS ARE SUBJECT TO THESE PENALTIES

Anyone letting a fire escape from control, whether or not he has a permit to kindle the fire, is liable for the costs of extinguishing the fire.

Anyone found guilty of dropping inflammable

material in or near woodland shall be fined not more than \$25.

A person failing to report an uncontrolled brush or forest fire is liable to a fine of not more than \$10.

For kindling a fire in woodland of another without permission of the owner, or for kindling any fire without a permit when a permit is required, a person may be fined not more than \$200, or imprisoned 60 days.

#### DAMAGES

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay to the owner all damages done by such fire.

#### BE SURE—GET A PERMIT

Incinerators shoud be tight, with a close mesh screen, and be on clean ground.

Open fireplaces used to burn rubbish are classed as incinerators.

Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent its spread.

Never burn in dry, windy weather.

Have incinerators inspected by the Forest Fire Warden and get his written permission.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Wakefield, N. H. qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the nineteenth day of March 1957, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be

received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to defray the district's share of the cost thereof.
- 10. To see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
- 11. To see if the district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
- 12. If the plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the district will authorize the school board to execute on behalf of the district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the district will designate the treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and accept in the name of the school district for educational purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State or Federal Government or any department or agency thereof, or any other sources.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$130,000.00 for the construction, equipment, and furnishing an addition of five rooms and auditorium to the Paul School, and authorize the Treasurer of the District to pledge the full faith and credit of the District and issue bonds therefore, maturing in equal amounts for a period of twenty years, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bond Statute, N. H. Revised Laws, Chapter 72 and any amendments thereto, and a building committee of five citizens be appointed by the Moderator to assist in the supervision of construction of said building and the plans and specifications shall be finally be approved by the School Board.

(Dis-approved by the Budget Committee)

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# REPORT OF

# THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Wakefield:

During the year 1955-56 the teachers in the Sanbornville Schools were: Miss Abbie F. Tuttle, Grade 1; Mrs. Alma Gray, grade 2; Mrs. Margaret Doe, grades 3 and 4; Mrs. Mary Belliveau, grades 5 and 6; Mr. Gerard Belliveau grades 7 and 8. In the Union School were:—Mrs. Florence Gerrish, grades 1 to 4; and Mrs. Helen Abbott, grades 5 to 8, and in the East Wakefield School Mrs. Edith Horne, grades 1 to 8. All the teachers returned to their respective positions in September, 1956. We are fortunate to have such competent teachers who devote themselves wholly to the interests and welfare of the pupils in their care.

The total enrollment for 1955-56 was 206 pupils with an average membership of 181.7. The schools opened in September of the current year with an enrollment of 186.

Wakefield high school pupils were enrolled as follows:—Spaulding High School 21; Nute High School 20; Brewster Academy 4; and Kennebunk, Maine 1. Tuition rates were:—Spaulding High School \$256.50, Nute High School \$260.01, Brewster Academy \$275.00, and Kennebunk High School \$321.83. For the current year tuition rates for the above schools respectively; \$275.50, \$275.00, \$295.00, and \$325.00.

During the current year there are 43 pupils enrolled in high school with only two members of the senior class. There are 14 pupils in the 8th grade. This indicates a probable increase in high school enrollment of 12 pupils to bring a total of about 55 pupils.

At the annual district meeting of March 20, 1956 it was voted to contract for bus transportation of high school pupils from Sanbornville to Nute High School and Spaulding High School. This service went into effect at the opening of school in September.

Mrs. Rebecca Sanborn, R. N., served as School Nurse in a School Nursing Union consisting of Brookfield, Effingham, Freedom, Madison, and Wakefield. This union of districts made possible the employment of a qualified nurse resident a relatively short distance from the schools. This made a definite increase in the efficiency and amount of this vital service. Mrs. Sanborn continues in this position for the current year. Her tireless devotion to the welfare of the pupils in her care has earned her many well deserved compliments. The Salk Polio Innoculation Program initiated in 1954 was continued through the cooperative efforts of the State Department of Health, Mrs. Sanborn, the teachers, and interested citizens.

Wakefield received no state aid for operation of schools and will receive none this year. Under the present formular for distribution and amount of state appropriation Wakefield is not eligible for such aid. The district will receive \$750.00 from the state as aid on the annual payment of the debt for the Paul School.

The fine cooperation of the school board, teachers, parents, and pupils is sincerely appreciated.
