## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF WESTMORELAND FREE LIBRARY.

It will be seen by reference to the librarian's report included herein that the interest and patronage of our library has been maintained the past year. We have hoped that when the increasing size and value of our library was more fully known, that the number of books taken out would largely increase, and would be appreciated in a commensurate degree. Some families have never taken out a volume, while many have been constant patrons from the beginning, and are today its staunchest friends.

*Unavailed opportunities, often prove life mistakes.*

Good books are the garners in which are stored the wisdom bought by toil and study; they are the messengers which the wise and good send to us, laden with treasures for every mental want and precepts for every duty. A well selected library, well patronized, is a volume of commendations for the citizenship of any town and a credential of its civilization. We have been fortunate in having an able and faithful librarian and assistant, who have labored for, and succeeded in performing their duty to the satisfaction of all. Not many free libraries are kept open to the public every day, and this privilege ought to be reciprocated. A supplement No. 2 containing all the volumes not before enumerated has been issued, and we desire that each family should be supplied and can be, by calling upon the librarian, free of charge.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

Our annual report is required by law to contain a record of all disbursements of the school funds, number of pupils attending school, and other minor details.

We shall endeavor to comply with the requirements of the law in a plain, straightforward manner: no attempt will be made to produce "a literary article with quotation marks omitted." People will judge our official acts by the efficiency of the schools we have provided for them, and not by any words of self-praise we may cause to be printed.

The district has been divided into eight divisions; in each division there has been three terms of school, of ten weeks each term, making a total of 240 weeks of schooling.

The whole number of pupils who have attended school is 171. Number of pupils over fifteen years of age is 20. The number of pupils over sixteen years is 13. The number of children reported by the selectmen is 124. The number of children between five and sixteen not attending school is 7. The cost per scholar for the year is \$10.34. The cost per scholar per week is 33 cents. This average is based upon the items of expenses required by the state board of education (teacher's salary and miscellaneous expenses.) The winter term in No. 10 was not a success, although the teacher was well qualified, and as a teacher, has previously been very successful. For a few years past this school has been taught by some of our best teachers, yet there has been considerable dissatisfaction. We hope in the future, the parents will visit this school often and work with the teacher for better results. Parental influence can make a good school with an ordinary teacher, or a very poor school with a good teacher. With the above exception our teachers have all been residents of our own town, and they have rendered very efficient work. They seem to have the ability to measure the pupils' capabilities and assign

all tasks and impart instruction accordingly. They have, also, more than in former years, received the hearty support and co-operation of the parents and citizens of the district. They have kept their schools on the up grade of progress. The youth of each generation should receive a broader and higher mental training as an adequate preparation for the requirements and demands of the future. The amount expended for text-books the past year has been considerable, yet by purchasing direct from the publishers we have been able to save fully 20 per cent. from the amount formerly paid for the same books.

As the apportionment of the state tax for the town of Westmoreland has been reduced from \$2.90 to \$2.66, the amount we are required by law to raise for educational purposes has also been reduced about \$100. It will therefore be necessary to raise about \$200 in addition to the amount required by law, if the same amount of schooling is to be maintained the coming year.

To the inhabitants of the town of Westmoreland in the county of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay town debt,
4. To see what action the town will take in relation to bills incurred on the highway over and above the appropriation for highways last year and act thereon.
5. To see if the town will vote to build the highway laid out by the County Commissioners near the house of Walter Pierce, and raise or appropriate money for the same.
6. To see what action the town will take in relation to assisting Mrs. Abbott in publishing a town history, and what sum or sums of money they will raise or appropriate for the same.
7. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising the town hall and fitting up rooms for town officers, library &c., and raise or appropriate money for the same.
8. To see if the town will vote to build a lockup, and raise or appropriate money for the same.
9. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen not to appoint an agent for the sale of spirituous liquors for the year ensuing.
10. To see what sum of money the town will raise or appropriate for town library.
11. To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine, and raise or appropriate money for the same.
12. To see if the town will vote to buy a safe for the use of the town, and raise or appropriate money for the same.
