The Public Schools

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Members of the Acworth School Board—

I have the honor to present herewith my first report to your board. It, of course, covers but the five months I have been associated with you.

With the opening of the schools in September, there was in Acworth an unusually capable group of teachers. I wish to commend both their success in teaching and their readiness to co-operate with the school board and superintendent in all attempts made for the welfare of the school system.

The school plants, themselves, are in good condition, and are incentives to study. The equipment might be improved by the purchase of a few maps and the replacement of the antiquated desks in South Acworth. The modern moveable desks with swivel chairs would add much to the attractiveness of the room and lend a business atmosphere which cannot but be reflected in the work of the school. These chairs are being placed in many schools at the present time. Money spent in this way is returned many fold in increased efficiency of the work. The school at East Acworth has been repaired and opened this year. The renovation of the window shades has added much to its attractiveness. The County school and Derry Hill school are now in fine condition. The school at the Center needs shingling. It must be done soon if it is to be done economically.

There is need of adequate ventilation in the South Acworth school. This need not be a heavy expense.

The work this year has emphasized the two fundamental subjects, arithmetic and reading. Each teacher is provided with arithmetic standard practice work which is studied daily. These are exercises training for speed and accuracy. By means of these we expect to graduate pupils who are able to do accurate work at a reasonable rate of speed. Three standard tests have been given in reading—the Burgess, Detroit and Monroe tests. In this way we have been able to locate exactly the source of poor reading. Now that the trouble is to a large degree located, we are making progress in developing good readers. We hope to report to you next year, in actual figures, the rate of improvement.

With the exception of the East Acworth school, where tardiness has been rather frequent, the attendance and tardiness record has been very good.

This year Acworth has secured the services of a school nurse. Her work has been thorough and effective. The follow-up work which she has done has resulted in actual benefits being derived where formerly only examination was possible. The results of this work are highly commended.

You have an accredited high school, giving eight units of standard work in a manner commended by the school authorities. The opportunities offered by this school are great. The spirit of diligent work and harmonious enterprise is evident to all who visit the school during its daily program. It stands as an open invitation to further education for all Acworth boys and girls. In cases where this would be a hardship, it offers two years of advanced work of which the children would otherwise be deprived. It furnishes an adequate and unquestioned preparation for the third year of any approved high school in the state. The

advantages of the small high school over the large are too well known to recall. Due to the increase in high school tuition rates, you are saving money by the establishment of this course. The expenses, including instruction, janitor service, fuel and repairs this year are \$1543.41, or a per pupil cost of \$73.49. This is in a year when all texts for a whole year must be bought new. As the state-approved tuition is now \$97.65, there is a per pupil saving of \$24.16, or a total of \$507.36.

I wish to thank the school board and the townspeople of Acworth for the cordiality which they have shown toward me and the spirit of helpfulness evidenced on all sides.
