SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Bethlehem:

The school year, July 1, 1925 to July 1, 1926 was characterized by usual happenings. I will mention in this report some of the outstanding events.

DATA

Schools were maintained for 36 weeks. This is a standard requirement. Schools were actually in session $174\frac{3}{8}$ days out of a possible 180 days. The average for the state was 175 days. We had a daily membership of 134.8 in the elementary schools and 23.5 in the high school. The percent of daily attendance for the year was 93.8. In consideration of remote homes, minor sicknesses, long rides over drifted roads, this percent of attendance was commendable. In some homes and in certain schools a notable improvement is being made this year.

TEACHERS

The teaching staff was good. One change only was made during the year. We employed but two teachers with less than a normal school training. This year all teachers have a complete normal or college training. This is a positive step the right way.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The actual work of the schools was intelligently directed. The measurable results showed that a larger number of children were above grade in all subjects than were below grade. In Stanford Achievement Tests results are measured in the educational ages of children. A good pupil may secure a result that would be an average achievement for a child months and sometimes years older than the pupil taking the test.

Thus among the children in town the following results were interesting. The children who in any subject, had an

educational age higher than their real age are termed "above." The children whose educational age was below their real age are called "below."

This indicates that the mental age of two-thirds of our children is above par, and that instruction and drill in arithmetic are better than in reading.

COSTS

The per capita cost of schooling in Bethlehem is relatively high. This is not because salaries are higher or auxiliary agencies more expensive.

The only available method to give schooling to our children who are so widely scattered is to transport them. The cost of transportation is not excessive per team or per miles. I think it is reasonable. But the aggregate is more than one-third the entire cost of elementary schools.

The pupil cost for average membership in our elementary schools was \$90.37. Seventy-five school districts in the state paid more.

HIGH SCHOOL

Our High School position is unique. The town has made a praiseworthy effort to maintain a good high school. The attendance is so small that the cost is high. The pupil cost for average membership for the year was \$341.56, the highest in the state. And again I will mention that the salaries of teachers, the large item, are lower than the average salaries in

the state. The average number of pupils per teacher in all the high schools of New Hampshire is 19. Here we maintain necessarily three teachers for 19 pupils.

In the last report of the State Board of Education we find this conclusion. "In any attempt to reduce the cost of schools, attention should be given the very small schools. An average of but 19 pupils to a high school teacher means that teachers are not fully employed by economic school boards." Yet we cannot apply this conclusion to a three teacher high school for many combinations of classes and full time teaching are necessary to maintain a standard school.

I mention these items in some detail for the information of all citizens. The question of transporting pupils to Littleton High School will undoubtedly come before the voters at the annual meeting. There are advantages and disadvantages to be thoughtfully considered.

Every year brings its measure of disappointment and reward. The friendship of homes and children, the cooperation of good citizens in maintaining good schools, the counsel and friendship of a School Board earnestly desirous of doing well the task at hand, the intelligent work of good teachers are all deeply appreciated.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my second report as Headmaster of Bethlehem High School.

The enrollment in Bethlehem High School this year is somewhat smaller than last year, twenty-three being enrolled.

Three courses are offered, Classical, General and Commercial. Of these courses the Commercial is the most popular. State requirements during the last year were exceeded in French and Latin.

Continuing the practice of last year, a considerable time each week is devoted to the study of fundamentals, e. g., Arithmetic, Spelling, Grammar, etc.

Graduates last year were three in number, of whom one, Florence Churchill, is attending Plymouth Normal. This year's class at present has three members.

During the last year two school plays were given, "Tommy's Wife," and "Daddy." At Hallowe'en the usual social was given. All entertainments were well attended and well received. The school paper, "The Bethlehem Star," was published as usual.

The school has sold candy throughout the year to obtain money for various expenses. Five magazines have been taken by the school, "The American," "Collier's," "National Geographic," "Popular Mechanics," and "The Literary Digest."

A joint assembly of the senior and junior high schools is held once a week at which subjects of general interest are taken up.

A debating club and dramatic club have been organized. No debates have been held with other schools but debates have been held on several occasions within the school.

The Twentieth Century Club of Bethlehem has very generously offered two prizes of \$5.00 and \$2.50 for a prize speaking contest. This will probably be held just before the Easter vacation.

The Lincoln Medal has been received and is on exhibition at Parker's Drug Store. This will be awarded to the student writing the best essay on Lincoln.

A few baseball games were played last spring with other schools of approximately our size.

The attendance has improved this year but still is not what it should be. Irregular attendance, especially in a small school, lowers the quality of the work done.

The attitude of the teachers in the building has been very helpful and cooperative. This is one of the most gratifying features of this year's work.
