REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

It was a true saying, applicable to all and all circumstances, uttered by General Jackson in the early days of American Nationality that Eternal Vigilance is the Price of Liberty, and where does this principle of vigilance apply with greater force than in connection with our common school system. It must have its full share of attention, in appropriations, in system, in moral character, and in the cordial support from all intelligent, right-minded progressive people. By what simple, comprehensive method shall this be accomplished. The answer to this question involves a theme we would bring before the minds of the citizens of this town, in this annual report. With slight variations, from year to year our total number of pupils scarcely reaches seventy, less than half the number enrolled prior to three decades ago. These seventy are (with the exception of one family) brought into three schools, where with the best teachers that can be procured with our limited means, the foundation is laid for a good practical education, for all who will be vigilant and persevering. We wish to speak of one very important item in addition to the selection of suitable teachers, which is a great help to the success of any school, namely — encouragement, and support of good teachers in their work, by parents and citizens, especially the former, when a parent exclaims in the presence of a child, "Our school is good for nothing!" "I wish we could have such schools as

we had when I was young," and many such expressions. They perhaps do not fully realize how they are aiming a cruel blow against one of our very best institutions, and at the same time wounding the feelings of a sensitive, conscientious person, while seeds of distrust and disregard for the teacher are being sown in the mind of the child; sure hindrances to his progress. We hope our citizens will endeavor to guard against this uncharitable habit. We have an unanswerable argument in favor of our educational system of the present time in the lofty attainments reached by the men and women of our present generation. How pleasant the thought that our common school system is the acorn from which has grown to its gigantic proportions the tree of intellectual attainments and wisdom bearing branches, the tallest and most widespreading of all civilized times. How careful ought every citizen to be in their efforts to promote, encourage and defend this fundamental principle of all greatness. Two terms of eight weeks in Summer and ten in the Fall exhausted our resources for the year. Teachers for the Summer term were paid six dollars per week, including board, and seven for the Fall term. Amount expended for each scholar a little more than four dollars. The free book system, while unsatisfactory to some, is not in reality as expensive as might be supposed, the cost for the past two years being less than fifty cents per year for each scholar. One male and five female teachers have been employed during the year. Each did good faithful work, and merited the success that attended their effort.
