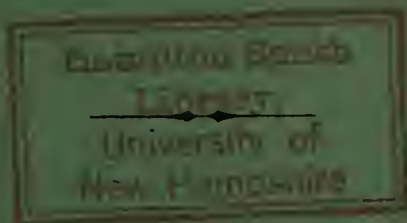

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

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The schools in town the past year have been as successful and prosperous as usual, with the usual amount of criticism. By the enumeration of last April, we found 41 boys and 36 girls, 77 in all, children of school age. While some families have moved from town, others have moved in, so that the whole number of scholars on the rolls is 81. All studies required by law have been taught, and still further we have endeavored to give the higher class in the Grammar school High school branches, but as usual, that class is so small in number, only three or four, it is practically impossible to furnish them with all the apparatus, now taught and used in the High schools in the towns where there are a sufficient number of scholars to maintain such a school. One fact, all must admit, that our schools do good work, which is shown by the age at which so many of our scholars become qualified to enter the High schools in the larger towns around us. Teachers have been employed, well qualified both intellectually and morally, as is shown by the fact that the larger towns get them away, with larger schools and higher salaries than we can afford. Miss Gutterson, being in Ashburnham, Mass., Miss Haines, at Littleton and Miss Gray, at Hyde Park, with longer and larger schools, and much more salary.

We have been obliged to curtail the number of weeks of school, on account of the failure of the selectmen to fully assess the amount of money required by law, being \$100 short. They afterward turned over for school purposes \$45, even with that we were obliged to cut the school year, which gave the Grammar schools 31 6-10 weeks, the Village Primary 25 3-10 weeks, the North 29 weeks.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE IN THE SUIT OF MARTIN A. ROCKWOOD VIZ. SCHOOL DISTRICT.

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Your committee on examining into the case found the following condition of affairs: The School Board, for the year 1894, consisted of Ella W. Tucker, O. D. Fessenden and George E. Stiles. At the annual district meeting in March 1894, there was no treasurer elected. Later on the School Board appointed George E. Stiles to that office, and allowed him to act in that capacity without giving any bonds, as the Statute requires should be done. During that year Stiles drew into his hands, the whole amount of the school fund. Feb. 15, 1895, the end of the financial year, Stiles made his report to the district, in which he showed that he had remaining on hand a cash balance of \$370.72, school money. On March 12, 1895, less than four weeks after making that report, Stiles died. Soon after, Martin A. Rockwood was appointed Administrator of the Stiles Estate. Mr. Rockwood claims, that in collecting and inventorying Stiles effects, he never found this \$370.72, which Stiles reported on hand, only four weeks before he died. That being public money, school money raised by taxation, the tax payers have an interest in knowing by what process that school money disappeared in so short a time. On Nov. 15, 1895, the School Board made a contract or agreement with Mr. Rockwood, in which they assumed the responsibility to bind the district, that if he would pay over to them this \$370.72 which Stiles reported on hand, school money, belonging to the district, then if he did not find Stiles Estate solvent, the district should pay back to him whatever might be required to make him even on a final settlement with Stiles creditors. By the Statute and former decisions of the courts, it appeared that such a contract was unlawful, not authorized by the Statute, neither did the School Board call a meeting of the district for instruction in the matter, but acted on their own responsibility. On April 27, more than a year and a half after Mr. Rockwood had paid this money, we find by the court records

that he rendered his account to the Probate Court of his doings as Administrator. In this he shows what had come into his possession, and also shows what he had paid out. One item in the account reads as follows: viz. Nov. 15, 1895, paid Board of Education money in George E. Stiles hands, belonging to the town of Brookline \$370.72. That payment was duly allowed by the Probate Court, as was the whole account, in the following language: "And the said account being examined and proven by oath of the accountant and the vouchers required, it is decreed that the same be and it hereby is allowed." We do not learn that there was any appeal taken by anyone from that decree. As the case then stood, that payment being decreed allowed by the Probate Court, wherein was the district indebted to the Stiles Estate.

After having made the several payments, presented in this account, Mr. Rockwood had left on hand a balance, in the hands of Administrator of \$344.64. May 18, 1897, three weeks after this account had been rendered and decreed, allowed by the court, the court issued another decree, distributing this balance of \$344.64 to the creditors of Stiles estate. In this decree, the school district of Brookline, is allowed \$98.16 more.

Later on Mr. Rockwood called on the School Board to pay back to him a portion of the \$370.72. As the matter then stood, Mr. Rockwood's account having been decreed, allowed by the court, under what law was the district indebted to the Stiles estate, and how could there be any debt at all under what appeared to be an unlawful contract. However August 23, 1898, about a year and four months, after his account had been allowed by the court, Mr. Rockwood brought a suit against the district.

Your committee were instructed to employ counsel in the matter, and laid the case both by letter and personal interview before Messrs. Burnham, Brown and Warren. By them we were encouraged in the opinion that the case would come in favor of the district, and still further they represented that of late years both in English courts, and courts in this country, it had been decided that trust funds should be paid in full, consequently this school money, money entrusted to the district treasurer for a special purpose, and by him to be paid out as the Statute specifically directs, not being money coming to him by way of general business transaction, but a trust fund, of which the district treasurer is simply a custodian, it appeared to us that the district had got what was honestly and law-

fully due them. January 3, 1900, the case was heard by Judge Peaslee of the Supreme court at Manchester, your committee attended.

Nothing more in particular concerning the case was heard by us until about the first of last August, when we received a letter from our counsel, a copy of which we present, as follows: "The full bench last Friday decided the case of Rockwood viz. School District of Brookline, in favor of Rockwood, we understand that there was at first a difference of opinion among the Judges in regard to this case, but they finally all agreed that Rockwood was entitled to recover upon the ground that the money of the district, in the hands of the Administrator, stood no differently from other money in his hands. The funds as trust funds could not be persued so far." Signed Burnham, Brown and Warren.

Your committee never was notified or consulted regarding the case being taken before the full bench.

The foregoing are the facts as we have found them, and every tax payer can form his own opinion of each and every one of them.
