TOWN WARRANT, 1929

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- Section A. Town officers' salaries.
 - B. Town officers' expenses.
 - C. Election and registration.
 - D. Municipal court.
 - E. Town Hall and office expense.
 - F. Police department.
 - G. Fire department.
 - H. White Pine blister rust.
 - I. Health department.
 - J. Vital statistics.
 - K. Trunk line maintenance.
 - L. Town maintenance.
 - M. Tarvia maintenance.
 - N. Breaking roads and snowing bridges.
 - O. Libraries.
 - P. Town poor.
 - Q. Memorial Day.
 - R. Parks and playgrounds.
 - S. Damage and legal expense.
 - T. Interest.
 - U. Auto permit expense.
 - V. Cranmore brook bridge.
 - W. Pay on Town debt.
 - X. State tax.
 - Y. County tax.

ART. 3. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discounting taxes.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town the sum of \$50,000, if needed.

- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to obtain State aid for the permanent improvement of its highways as provided by law.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to tarvia the road from near the police station to the Swift River bridge in Conway Village, a distance of 750 feet, and raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to carry this article into effect. Agreeably to a petition signed by E. F. Hurley and others.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to properly resurface such portions as are needed and to coat with tarvia, Pollard Street, Chase Avenue and Pleasant Street from the corner of Main Street to the culvert at Mr. Freehette's residence. Agreeably to a petition signed by C. R. Head and others.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to put in repair and tarvia Mechanic Street, so called, in the village of North Conway. Agreeably to a petition signed by Ezra Parke and others.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900 to repair and tarvia the road in East Conway, commencing at the State Line and residence of J. W. McIntire, up to the stone watering trough. Agreeably to a petition signed by J. W. McIntire and others.
- ART. I1. To see if the Town will vote to create a building commission to govern and inspect all building in said Town; and power to draw up a code of rules and regulations to govern same. Said rules and regulations to be approved by the Selectmen before being put into effect. Agreeably to a petition signed by C. R. Head and others.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on all three sides of the Park now owned by the Town and located near the Saco River Bridge and raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 to pay for same. Agreeably to a petition signed by A. L. Roberts and others.

- ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed twenty-eight hundred dollars to build a bridge to accommodate public travel at Conway Village across the East Branch of Pequawket Stream at the junction of land of Dr. C. M. Wiggin and Fred A. Towle and lay out a new street from the South side of Main Street along or near said junction across said bridge to the East side of Quint Street, so called. Agreeably to a petition signed by Fred E. White and others.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900 to buy a steam pressure scarifier to be attached to the steam roller.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100 to buy a grader to be used with the truck.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to demand an underpass or suitable protection at the Boston & Maine crossing in North Conway Village, known as the Whittaker Crossing and adequate protection at the Boston & Maine Albany Crossing and at the lower end of Conway Village, also the Maine Central crossing between Conway Center and the State Line and to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to carry this article into effect and appoint a committee to act for the Town. Agreeably to a petition signed by H. C. Blanchard and others.
- ART. 17. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regards to purchasing or leasing snow removal equipment and raise and appropriate or appropriate and hire a sufficient sum of money to carry the action into effect. Agreeably to the suggestion of the budget committee.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to engage in a program, the purpose being to widen the narrow roads in Town and to raise and appropriate or appropriate and hire a sufficient sum of money to carry this into effect. Agreeably to the suggestion of the budget committee.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be spent for improving

and beautifying the North Conway Park and a Park commission of three be appointed by the Selectmen to have full charge of said Park, said commissioners to serve for one dollar a year and to remain in power until successors are appointed. Agreeably to the suggestion of the budget committee.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be given for the support of Memorial Hospital. Agreeably to the suggestion of the budget committee.

ART. 21. To see what action the Town will take to establish an aviation field and raise and appropriate or appropriate and hire a sufficient sum of money to carry this article into effect. Agreeably to the suggestion of the budget committee.

ART. 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Budget Committee to study the system under which the town business is now run and to recommend to the Selectmen such changes in the accounting clerical work and minor supervision as seems advisable to a majority of that committee and raise and appropriate a sum of money to earry this article into effect.

ART. 23. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARIES To the Citizens of Conway:

It is a pleasure to state that the town libraries have had a successful year. The statistical reports show that more people are using the libraries and that the circulation of books has increased over ten per cent. The improvements worthy of mention are:—At Center Conway, new book cases and book shelves have been added, the floor has been painted, and new curtains have been hung at the windows. Mrs. Comstock again remembered this library with a generous check.

At the Conway Public Library, H. D. Robinson has refinished the floors in Reading Room, Main Hall and Curio Room and redecorated the walls and ceilings of the Main Hall and Curio Room. Similar repairs are needed in the Stack Room and Librarian's Office, also the outside woodwork needs painting. When these repairs are made, the Library will present a very attractive and well kept appearance.

The common drinking glass in the Main Hall has been replaced by an inexpensive, but satisfactory, drinking fountain.

In 1924, George E. Pitts, Commander of the Custer Post, No. 47, presented to the Library the G. A. R. Flag. This year there has been built in the Curio Room a cabinet to protect and display this beautiful flag.

Last year, Clarence E. Eastman of Minneapolis, Minn., gave to the Library an interesting and valuable collection of minerals. That this collection might be exhibited, the Conway Woman's Club had built in the Curio Room an oak cabinet of fine workmanship. This year Mr. Eastman again remembered Conway and sent a One Hundred Dollar Check for the purchase of books.

Especial mention should be made of the Reading Room. In it there are forty of the best periodicals, many of these are contributed by local townsmen. Complimentary subscriptions of the three county newspapers are given by their respective editors. These papers are kept on file and will furnish an interesting and authentic history of our town and county.

Considerably many times individuals and organizations have presented books to our Library. That these volumes might be attractively listed as books, Gordon Potter designed and gave to us a very distinctive book plate.

The Swift River Lodge of I. O. O. F., the Pine Hill Rebecca Lodge, the Chatague Tribe of Red Men, the Daughters of Pocahontas and the Elmwood Grange contributed to a special fund that amounted to \$58.29. This money was used to purchase books of history, travel and economics.

During the summer months, the Conway Woman's Club sponsored a Vacation Reading Course for the children of the grammar grades. Children's Book Week was observed by putting in circulation a good and rather generous collection of juvenile books. On four afternoons of this week a Story Hour was conducted for the children in the graded schools.

In 1904, Fifteen Hundred Dollars, known as the William W. Eastman Fund, was given to the Conway Public Library. It was the intention of the Trus-

tees to use each year the interest on this amount for the purchase of books. Because of inadequate appropriations the principal has been used until in 1922, there was left only \$477.69. It is the desire of the Trustees to let this money remain untouched until the original amount has accrued. And from that time on, to use yearly the interest on this \$1,500.00 for the purchase of books, these books to be designated as the gift of the William W. Eastman Fund.

By thoughtful selection of material, Miss Pollard, our Librarian, has accumulated modern authentic reference books, valuable magazines, some of the world's standard literature, a useful collection of history, science, books of travel, poetry, drama and fiction. Each year the Library is giving a bigger and better service. To make possible the continuance of this service it is necessary to have more money for books. In a town that is as progressive as ours, we trust that an adequate appropriation will be given to our Town Libraries, that their valuable service may not only be maintained, but creditably increased.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Schools opened in September with only five changes in the teaching staff. While changes are unavoidable, the annual turnover should not be over 20 per cent. for efficiency of administration.

An arrangement has been made with the Bartlett town district to divide equitably the expense of the Kearsarge school. The seventh and eighth grade pupils who formerly attended North Conway grammar school, are being taught at Kearsarge and this arrangement has appeared to be very acceptable to the patrons of the school.

The school building at Center Conway was painted and partially shingled during the summer. Roofing jobs were also done at Kearsarge and South Conway.

The chemical toilets installled at Redstone, West Side, and Kearsarge two years ago have proved very satisfactory.

My recommendation for repairs and additions to equipment next year would include these items.

- 1. Installation of ventilation fans for the gymnasium at Kennett High School.
- 2. A modern ventilating stove for the school at West Side.
- 3. Purchase of adjustable seats for the primary room at North Conway.
- 4. Inside painting and renovation of grammar school buildings at Conway and North Conway.
- 5. Completion of shingling job at Center Conway.

Many of our schools still have obsolete and unhygienic seats. Some of these should be replaced every year until every pupil in town can have an adjustable seat and desk.

School work has been interrupted this winter by the prevalence of colds and epidemics. Most schools have had to close for a few days which of course throws the school calendar into confusion.

The school authorities have felt very strongly that the statutory requirement of thirty-six weeks of school should mean 36 weeks of five school days each or 180 days of actual teaching. Many states have 40 weeks in the school year and our pupils cannot stand up in competition if we close our school year seven to ten days short on account of holidays and fairs. The loss of two weeks each year means in the progress through the eight grades the loss of nearly a half-year of school work. It costs about \$250 a day to operate the schools and days lost are expensive

Miss Marjorie Buswell, our school nurse, left us after two years of faithful service, and her place has been acceptably filled by Miss Harriet Curren. My opinion based upon observation of pupils in school is that the employment of a school nurse has proved a valuable investment. I hope the campaign against diphtheria will be pressed until this section of New Hampshire is as safe as medical science can make it.

We have had a large high school this year and the teaching load became so heavy and the classes so large that beginning December 4 we engaged Miss Elinor Conant, a graduate of New Hampshire University, as an assistant.

We have given considerable thought to the problem of revising our high school curriculum. This involves the economical use of the teachers' time and the educational interests of the pupil. There is no doubt that great changes in the content of subject matter are imminent. All subjects now taught are probably of some use to some pupils but it is evident that many pupils are taking subjects which we have placed in the curriculum out of conformity to general usage and not through consideration of the child's more vital needs and ambitions.

I am very firmly convinced that the commercial course so-called, should be restricted to pupils of more than average scholarship who intend to become stenographers, and that many pupils who now attend classes in commerce should be studying biology, mechanical drawing and the social sciences.

Hot noon lunches have been served at the Conway Grammar School through the cooperation of the Conway Red Cross. Hot lunches are also served in some rural schools but many parents prefer to provide their children from home by the use of the vacuum bottle. A commendable activity of the senior class at Kennett is the sale of recess lunches and milk.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Superintendent John H. Fuler:

The following is a brief report of Kennett High School for the year now in progress.

School was opened on September 10 and we have had to date a registration of 190 which was divided as follows: 97 girls and 93 boys. Of this number there are 20 from other towns as follows: Albany 2, Bartlett 10, Eaton 44, Jackson 2, Tamworth 1, and Parsonsfield 1.

This number has taxed our school building to the limit, and has led to a serious teaching overload, even though an extra teacher was secured the first of December. From estimates at hand it seems probable that the school will fall off slightly in numbers next year. We shall probably graduate about 40 students

in June; we have lost ten pupils from various causes and it is to be expected that this loss will continue throughout the year; hence we should close the school in June with about 130 on our rolls. It is estimated that our entering class next fall will number about 50, so that the expected number of pupils in the fall should be between 170 and 185.

In order that building congestion may be relieved I suggest that laboratory accommodations be made in the old primary building on its present site near the Conway grade building. This would give us the benefit of another recitation room, as well as relieving the building of the unpleasant odors that nothing but forced ventilation can handle.

A survey of school records shows the following in regard to school attendance. We have had up to January 11, 13,316 days of aggregate attendance, 466 cases of absence and 88 cases of tardiness. This shows 95.5% attendance, a record that is not satisfactory but is in part explained by two epidemics, one of which was not ended at the time these figures were compiled, and the other of which had not assumed its full force.

It was thought best from financial reasons to close school for one week during the very general prevalence of colds and grippe during January. Absence ran as high as 75, which meant that work must be repeated, or nearly half our student body subjected to a scholastic handicap nearly impossible to overcome because of our schedule and transportation problems. It costs nearly as much to run the school for a 50-60% attendance as for our normal 95-98% load, the saving coming only in rebates, if allowed, by the Boston & Maine R. R. Co.

The school has been without the services of Mrs. Butterfield, English teacher, for some 13 weeks during the past semester, but her place has been acceptably

filled by Mr. E. E. Weeks. We have been fortunate indeed to be able to secure one who could carry on the work in a way that has resulted in no loss of effort or time, beyond that incident to change of instructors.

Of our graduates of last June, two are in colleges, one in normal school, three in business schools. Others will go to various colleges, schools, or into training later in the year or in the fall.

The application for a renewal of our certificate privilege to the New England College Entrance Certificate Board will be acted upon in April, when favorable action may be expected, as I learn unofficially that the work of those using this privilege is satisfactory. We are now represented at Bates, Bowdoin, Boston University, Jackson, Dartmouth, University of New Hampshire and Springfield Y. M. C. A. College, Keene, Plymouth and Gorham Normal Schools, at two business schools and two hospitals. Hospital training offers a very attractive field to young ladies now, and is being urged in preference to normal training for the general run of high school graduates.

The efforts of the student body for the past year and a half have been directed toward the lowering of our school debt. We have retired the note of \$350 on the athletic field, and are meeting payments on our piano. Since the opening of school in September we have paid about \$275 on these accounts, and have financed our school affairs, with a fair prospect of closing our books balanced for the current year. The load of financing student activities is one that is exceedingly heavy, but probably worth while in the lessons learned. We have no doubt of the value of these activities and would engage in more could the financial end be met.

For the coming year I make the following suggestions:—I believe a survey should be made of parents and pupils to learn if the time has come for the

reestablishment of the domestic arts classes. I believe that some work in this department could well be required of all girls, especially in the lower classes.

I suggest the introduction of a course in mechanical drawing and elementary design for the boys. Mr. Stearns is well fitted for this work, and the need of ability in these lines either in construction or reading of blue prints is almost universal.

We must have another teacher to assist in Latin and French, or else revise our present teaching corps, our program of studies, or both.

We should make provision for a school library on a definite and budgeted basis.

Provision for athletic coaching and training for our girls should be made. Once again, it is generally accepted in the educational field that no man is adapted to this work.

I suggest that definite steps be made to encourage and require from all teachers professional work, either at summer schools, extension courses, or by approved reading. I believe this is necessary with old as well as young teachers because of the rapid growth and change in professional procedure and philosophy.

Lastly, I believe that the parents and townspeople should visit school more frequently. We should appreciate their first hand criticism. Educational practices are changing so rapidly that much misunderstanding might be avoided by closer contact.

In closing may I offer you, the school board, the townspeople, the teaching corps, and student body, my sincere appreciation of the fine cooperation I have received without which little or no progress is possible.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Mr. John H. Fuller, Superintendent of Schools.

The following is the report of the school work

done this year. Six hundred twenty-eight children have received the routine examination, which includes weighing and measuring, class room inspection of pupils for symptoms of communicable diseases, sore throats or other signs of illness.

In some of the schools the school physician had made his examination.

A great deal of dental work is necessary and efforts are now being made to arrange for a dental clinic to be held some time before the end of the school year.

The re-schicking to determine the result of the toxin-antitoxin will begin soon and I trust that the parents of those who have not had the Schick test or toxin-antitoxin will have the Schick test at this time to find out whether or not the child is naturally immune, and if not immune, that the toxin-antitoxin may be given, not only to protect the child but to do their share in helping control the dread disease, diphtheria, which until recently, has taken such heavy toll of child life each year.
