TOWN WARRANT

(L.S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the town of Croydon qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year.

- Art. 2. To elect a member of the board of selectmen for the ensuing three years.
 - Art. 3. To elect a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To elect one or more, not to exceed three, highway agents.
 - Art. 5. To elect a collector of taxes.
- Art. 6. To elect a trustee of the trust funds for three years, a library trustee for three years, two auditors, fence viewers, measurers of wood, surveyors of lumber, sextons, and such other officers and agents as the town may judge necessary to be chosen.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,050.00, the State to give \$6,150.00, for the maintenance of the Dartmouth College Road.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for the maintenance of State Aid Highways, the State to give the same sum.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to ask for State Aid for highways.

- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of highways and bridges.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for keeping the roads open during the winter.
- Art. 12. To raise all necessay sums of money for defraying other town charges.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for its use during the year in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the suppression of the "White Pine Blister Rust."
- Art. 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to scraping the State Road, and erecting snow fences.
- Art. 16. To see what action the town will take in regard to snow rollers.
- Art. 17. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Croydon:

I am offering for your consideration my seventh annual report.

The fall term of schools began on September 8. In the East Village school Mrs. Muzzey began her seventh year of service in the district. During this entire period her school room and school yard have been models of tidiness and cleanliness. Her pupils have ever been orderly and diligently working at their school tasks. She herself has constantly, tirelessly and wholeheartedly sought the pupils' welfare and scholarly progress. The schools at the Flat and Ryder's Corner have new teachers this year. These teachers are energetic, loyal and diligent, and in consideration of their limited training and experience are doing superior work.

The name of the teacher and the fall term registration of the respective schools are as follows:

East Village, 20 Mrs. Sadie E. Muzzey Croydon Flat, 17 Miss Helen P. Bailey Ryder's Corner, 9 Miss Hazel G. Barton

Clinton Barton is attending the Newport high school and Luceba Sherman is in attendance at Kimball Union Academy.

GENERAL STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1925

Fifty-eight pupils were registered, five of whom had been previously registered during the year elsewhere in the state. The schools were actually in session 348 half days. There were six no-school days.

The average membership was 46.8, average attendance 43.5, per cent of attendance 93. Madeleine Ellingwood was not absent or tardy for the entire year. Three . Croydon children attended secondary schools. The registers record seven visits by board members, fifty visits by the superintendent, and one hundred thirty-eight visits by citizens.

The usual physical examination of the school children was made by Dr. A. S. Marden of Newport.

A MEMORIAL

During the last year the District received a gift of a bell for the East Village schoolhouse.

The bell was given to this school by Mr. Edwin B. Osgood of Claremont, in memory of his mother, Eliza F. (Smart) Osgood, born in Croydon July 16, 1831 and died Oct. 21, 1909, and attended this school.

The dedication exercises were held in connection with a Columbus Day program by the school, Oct. 12, 1925. Mr. Osgood presented the bell to the school with a story of its history. The bell was used for many years at Ashley's Ferry, between Claremont Junction and Weathersfield Bow, Vt. It was, undoubtedly, in use more than seventy-five years ago.

The gift was accepted for the District by the Superintendent, Andrew P. Averill.
