8 To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid before July 1st, 1927.

9 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of ploughing the Mascoma Valley Road, so called, for the winter of 1927 and 1928.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Danbury :

I present herewith my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Danbury. It will deal with a survey of statistics, buildings and equipment, organization and instruction, and health supervision.

### SURVEY OF STATISTICS

The four schools indicated in the following Table have been maintained:

Compared with the previous year, the number of sessions lost by reason of holidays, institutes, bad weather and other causes has been reduced one half. The per cent. of promotion in each school was considerably

increased. The following class of four pupils was graduated from the eighth grade in June: Thelma Dicey, Harry Flanders, Maurice Ford, Ione Lawrence.

The two village schools improved their records in either attendance or punctuality or in both of these. In the two rural schools the small registration, low attendance record and excessive number of tardinesses add to the argument in favor of closing these schools and providing transportation to one or more of the village schools. This would without question represent a financial saving of several hundred dollars. An argument in favor of continuing these schools under efficient teachers is the fact that the average cost per elementary school pupil in Danbury last year was \$71.30 while the average cost per elementary school pupil in the state was \$73.83.

### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

In addition to the thorough cleaning of all school rooms in use, both the exterior and interior of the Elmwood building have been repainted. Improvement was also made in the heating facilities by an exchange of stoves.

In the South schoolroom the box stove has been jacketed in a manner similar to the stove at the Center. By this means, when the fresh-air intake and foul-air exit flues are open, the heat is distributed close to the floor of the room. The approach to the outside entrance of the building has been graded and a substantial fence built from the doorsteps along the brow of the steep hill.

Through the activities of the school children, the playground at the Center has been equipped with three seesaws, mounted on pipe frames set into concrete foundations.

A new mantel clock has been purchased and given to the North Road school by the teacher and pupils.

Unless the North Road school is soon to be closed and the schoolhouse disposed of, the outside of this

building should not go another season without at least one coat of paint.

### ORGANIZATION AND INSTRUCTION

Three of your teachers are, this year, graduates of New Hampshire Normal schools. Your fourth teacher has had training school courses in Massachusetts.

Miss Harriet D. Bergeron of Hinsdale, a 1924 graduate of Keene Normal school, was particularly successful in the North Road school last spring and later in the summer accepted a contract to teach the Elmwood school. In the meantime Mrs. Harriet G. Morrison had been granted contract to transfer from the Center to the North Road school.

Miss Elizabeth R. MacNutt of Walpole, a 1926 graduate of Keene, was elected teacher of the Center school. Miss MacNutt did her practice teaching in grade work in the Wheelock school of Keene and in rural school work in East Sullivan.

Soon after the close of school in June Mrs. Sadie M. Taylor, who for several years taught efficiently the South school, returned to her former work as a teacher in the schools of Tacoma, Washington. The vacancy was filled by the election of Miss Elizabeth J. Hounsell of Conway, a graduate of Plymouth Normal school in 1923. Miss Hounsell has also done post-graduate work in commercial courses. She has had previous teaching experience under one of the most efficient superintendents in the state.

Courses of instruction with all grades in physiology and hygiene have been made more practical by the introduction of the project text books, HEALTH HABITS. These emphasize problems requiring observation and judgment in the study of personal, home and community health rather than the mere memorizing of technical names of the various parts of the human anatomy. At the same time these avoid the danger of presenting a mere collection of interesting health stories.



In grades seven and eight there is being laid the foundation of a simple science course calculated to supplement the study of geography and to quicken the child's perception of natural phenomena amidst which he lives and to which he should intelligently adjust himself. OPEN DOORS TO SCIENCE by Caldwell and Meier is being used as a class textbook. To this the pupils add material secured from magazines and reference books at home. Each pupil keeps a notebook record of his observations and conclusions. A subscription to a standard farm journal for the use of each of the four schools would add much to the value of this work.

Textbooks, MODERN MATHEMATICS by Schorling and Clark, are used by the pupils of the two upper grades. This course provides for constant repetition and rapid drills in the fundamental processes taught in the fifth and sixth grades. The shorter methods of calculation, found in commercial arithmetics, are emphasized. Within the same texts sufficient concrete algebra and geometry are presented to enable the eighth grade pupil to pursue high school mathematics without the traditional break in type of work.

Systematic instruction in music is not receiving sufficient attention in our schools. We not only lack textbook material in music but also a uniform and progressive system of instruction. I hope the time is not far distant when by combining with other towns you may secure the services of a music supervisor of training and experience.

#### HEALTH SUPERVISION

You are fortunate in again securing the services of Miss Della V. Carr, R. N., as your school nurse. The majority of the children know Miss Carr and appreciate the value of her work with them. By having her own means of conveyance she is enabled to do the follow-up work more efficiently. By a special arrangement with a neighboring Union her three months of service in this Union come during the season of open roads.

The following table represents her activities in Danbury during September and October. She will return to this Union in May to complete the third month of her contract.

I wish again to emphasize the need of dental clinic service for many of your school children. The three dental clinics recently conducted in this Union gave, outside of school hours, the same opportunity to adults as to school children.

In connection with the health of the children I must mention the interest taken by teachers, parents and oth-



ers in the hot lunches, served at noon and during cold weather, in the North Road and South schools. At the request of the State Department in regard to the serving of hot lunches, I have recently had the pleasure of reporting your South school as one of the two outstanding one-room rural schools of this Union.

### CONCLUSION

I wish to take this opportunity to point out the necessity of sending the most promising of your local girls to normal school. To be assured of trained teachers there should be at least one girl from Danbury entering normal school each year with the understanding that she will, if needed, teach in her home town for at least two years after graduation. Your Grange renders a great service to students attending our State University. Why not render a similar service to those attending our state normal schools?

To the School Board I wish to commend the good work of your teachers and the increasingly cooperative spirit of your community. I thank the members of the Board for their patience and counsel by which they have assisted me in administrative duties.
