SCHOOL REPORT.

In presenting to the inhabitants of Dorchester my report for the past year, I would say that we have been unusually successful in obtaining good and experienced teachers. Consequently we have had, with one or two exceptions, what would necessarily follow—good and profitable schools. The amount of school money has been very small ; in some districts as short a term as five or six weeks has been the length of the school. It is to be hoped that parents will see the necessity of a more liberal amount being provided for the coming year. With our limited allowance and the constant change of teachers, it is not to be wondered at that we cannot compete with other towns that have more advantages. But we can with a little effort, and a small additional outlay, retain our former and experienced teachers, and secure good schools even with our slender means. The report of each school as I have learned from my visits and examinations, is as follows :

DISTRICT NO. 1.

Summer, taught by Miss Marie A. Dolloff, and was a pattern school in all respects. The scholars seemed to join with the teacher in making a successful term.

The winter term in this district was conducted by Mrs. Carrie J. Little. Although Mrs. L. was considered an efficient teacher, there seemed to be a lack of sympathy that is necessary between teacher and pupil, to make it a profitable school. As sickness obliged Mrs. Little to leave before the close of the term, am unable to report the progress made.

DISTRICTS NOS. 2 & 6.

Were taught by Mrs. R. W. Leavitt, with her usual good success. Let us by all means retain our former teachers, that have learned and know the capabilities of the different scholars, and can go to work understandingly to make the school a success.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

Both terms taught by Miss Emma Jewell of Groton. Although this was her first effort at teaching, her school showed evidence at the close of good improvement.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

Both terms conducted by Miss Jennie S. Clark, and although composed mostly of small scholars, I was perfectly satisfied with her patience and efforts to make a model school.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

Fall and only term taught by Miss Sadie R. Ash, of Plymouth. During my visits I found the school quiet and studious and the teacher doing her best to improve the school.

DISTRICT NO. 7.

The Fall term of eight weeks was taught by Miss Mary C. Clement, with a decided improvement on last year's school. She has done what has heretofore been a difficult thing to do. Kept the number of pupils good until the end of the term.

DISTRICTS NO. 8 & 10.

Taught by Miss Etta Leavitt. Although both small schools, they showed evidence at the close of diligent work and good results. No. 10 in particular, showed much interest, and very great improvement at the close of the term.

DISTRICT NO. 13.

Taught by Miss Minnie L. Brown of Plymouth. Miss Brown's earnest efforts, and pleasant methods of teaching were crowned with great success, and it is hoped her services will be secured

for the ensuing year. Where we have had good teachers for the past year, let us retain them by all means, as scholars will make more improvement with them than with strangers.
