## TOWN MEETING WARRANT

---

(as known February 17)

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges, for the year ensuing and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf library; for the salary of the Librarian; for the maintenance of highways and bridges; for oiling our roads, and for lighting our streets for the year ensuing.

Article 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day and to choose an agent to expend the same.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for state aid, and Trunk Line aid and maintenance, for our highways for the ensuing year; and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to allow a discount of 2% on early payment of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to eradicate the Pine Blister rust.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen, regarding the breaking out of our town roads, in winter, for automobile travel.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote for State Aid for highway bridge improvement and to raise money for the same.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to observe "Old Home Week" and to raise money for the same.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to acquire by purchase or otherwise a "Town Forest" and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 12. To see if the town will take any action re-

garding our village water supply and raise and appropriate money for the same, and appoint any committee regarding the same.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to widen and straighten the road opposite the lower iron bridge and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 14. To see if the town will take any action as to extending our street lights and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 15. To hear reports of committees and agents and to transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Franconia:

The curriculum for the high school was printed as part of my report last year. It has remained unchanged except for revisions in the content of the course in Domestic Arts. The entire Domestic Arts course for high schools of the state was revised by a committee of teachers about two years ago. As the new course seemed more practical for the average pupil, it has been adopted for use in your school. In a small school a curriculum has to be arranged with two objectives in view. 1. To prepare a small percentage of the school's pupils for college. 2. To provide as good general training as possible for those pupils who will not pursue advanced courses in schools of collegiate grade. It is not possible to offer all subjects that pupils might wish to study because of restricted teacher time. The selection of such subjects as are generally considered to have educational value and to be of practical importance in advanced study has governed the plan of this course. I should be glad to consider with the Headmaster of the Academy and with the school board any suggestions in regard to the curriculum that citizens may have to offer.

The course of study for elementary grades outlined by the State Board of Education is being followed quite closely in grades one to six in your school.

I feel confident in saying that you have this year good teaching in every department of school work. You have a corps of teachers of which any town may be proud. With one exception the staff of last year has been retained. Mr. Maurice Pickard replaced Miss Gordon as teacher of science and mathematics. Although Mr. Pickard came to Franconia with no previous teaching experience he has been very successful in the management of his pupils and in the teaching of his

subject matter. To have a man teacher coach the basketball team and take charge of the out-of-doors sports is undoubtedly a wise policy. Mr. Pickard has succeeded admirably in this work.

Standard educational tests given in different departments of high school work indicate that your pupils are receiving thorough instruction. The visit of the state inspector of secondary schools was followed by one of the best reports the school has ever received. In my visits to the school I have been strongly impressed with the splendid spirit of the pupils. The atmosphere throughout the building is that of a wholesome workshop with earnest workers.

A fairly permanent teaching staff is one of the fundamentals of a strong school. Continued changes do not contribute to progress. To retain a large percentage of its teachers is very difficult for a small school. Higher salaries and greater fields of opportunity in larger school systems are always beckoning to successful teachers. The pupils in small towns need the best available teachers just as truly as those in larger ones. To provide such teachers the small towns must offer salaries and living conditions that are attractive. Your present teachers should be retained as long as reasonable salaries will permit.

In my report of last year I suggested the provision of milk for pupils in the elementary grades as a means of better health conditions. The Red Cross has undertaken this work. Since the first of January milk from an accredited herd has been furnished to all underweight and needy children in the first six grades. Children suffering from malnutrition can not do the best work of which they are capable and they are more susceptible to disease than when properly nourished. The aid of the Red Cross will be of great value to these pupils in their future school life.

The School Board has recommended an appropriation of \$9,000. This is the same amount that was appropriated last

year, \$500.00 more than the amount of two years ago, and less than the appropriations for several years preceding. It is undoubtedly the smallest possible sum on which your school can be operated at the present standard of efficiency. Your school tax rate is not high in comparison with that in other school districts. The fact that the Academy Trustees provide the fuel and janitor service and maintain the building makes possible a smaller appropriation in Franconia than in most districts where a high school is operated. The expenditure of money for school purposes is an investment in future citizenship. At a time when other governmental units are having to expend larger sums, school costs can not be wisely reduced.
