To the inhabitants of the Town of Gilsum, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at town hall in said Gilsum, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

ART. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

ART. 3. To see if the town will appoint a committee to look after the observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 4. To see if the town will take any action in regard to observing Old Home Week and appropriate money for same.

ART. 5. To see if the town will take any action in regard to state aid construction and trunk line maintenance road and appropriate money for same.

ART. 6. To see if the town will take any action in regard to street lights.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of town officers.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money.

ART. 9. To see if the town will take any action in regard to repairing barn and engine house and appropriate money for same.

ART. 10. To see if the town will take any action in regard to painting iron bridges and appropriate money for same.

ART. 11. To see if the town will lay out a new street from the northeast corner of land owned by Nona Britton to an iron stake on the land of Ralph Proctor, 2 rods wide, and appropriate \$100 for same, and discontinue a portion of road now used between the two bounds now mentioned.

ART. 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to better water supply and repairing the tank at the watering trough, and appropriate money for same.

ART. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to better fire protection and appropriate money for same.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of Gilsum :

I herein submit my third annual report as superintendent of your schools.

Horace Mann said: "Whatever ground of confidence there may be for the perpetuation of our civil and religious liberties; whatever prospect of the elevation of our posterity; whatever faith in the general Christianization of the world—these aspirations and this faith depend upon teachers, more than upon any, more than upon all other human instrumentalities united."

Whether we accept this statement in its entirety or not, we can not deny the fact that millions of children now have a better chance in life because of the work of Horace Mann.

Our democracy is surer, our ideas of living and serving are higher because of his leadership.

Our system of free public schools owes to him a debt larger than to any other man.

But, as is the teacher so is the school, is a common maxim of American life.

We trust that the accomplishments of your children during the past year will compensate the taxpayer for his labor, the parents for their sacrifices and the boys and girls of Gilsum may have a better chance in life because of these opportunities.

VILLAGE SCHOOLS

Primary Grades, Miss Mildred Pitcher, Teacher.

Grammar Grades, Miss Marion Gee, Teacher.

The following standard tests were given in both schools: Ayres Spelling, Charter's English, Woody McCall Arithmetic and Stanford's Achievement.

The results indicated that the schools were well graded.

Judging from inspections, standard tests, teacher's rank book and the teacher's recommendations, promotions were made from the following grades: Grade I, 9; Grade II, 9; Grade III, 6; Grade IV, 6; Grade V, 7; Grade VI, 4; Grade VII, 3; Grade VIII, 1.

Schools, having the number of grades and scholars that the above mentioned schools have, demand of their teachers the strictest economy of time in school, much time for preparation outside of school hours and conformity to modern types of teaching.

Both Miss Gee and Miss Pitcher fulfilled these requirements and by maintaining good discipline, efficient instruction and thorough drill work, completed a successful year's work.

WEST SCHOOL

Mrs. B. E. Carter, Teacher.

The high respect that the pupils of this school maintained for their teacher was evidence of the community loyalty to and hearty co-operation of parents with the school.

The standard tests given were the same as at the Village school.

The results showed a normal year's work.

Promotions were made from the following grades: Grade I; Grade II, 3; Grade III, 1; Grade IV, 3; Grade V, 2; Grade VI, 1; Grade VII, 1.

Mrs. Carter maintained excellent discipline, gave efficient instruction and completed a successful year.

BELVEDERE SCHOOL

This school was placed under the cadet teachers from the Keene Normal.

CHANGE IN HIGH SCHOOL TUITION LAW

The last legislature made a radical change in high school tuition.

That all may become familiar with its basic principles, I herein insert an excerpt of the law: **Chapter 120, section 26.**

"Any district not maintaining a high school or school of corresponding grade shall pay for the tuition of any child who with parents or guardian resides in said district and who attends high school or academy in another district in this state, and the parent or guardian of such child shall notify the school board of the district in which he resides of the high school or academy which he has determined to attend; provided, however, except as in section 21, that no district shall be liable for tuition of a child in any school, in excess of the average cost per child of instruction for the regularly employed teachers of that school or of all the public high schools of the state, and the cost of textbooks, supplies and apparatus during the school year preceding, and in senior high school work only."

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the co-operation of parents and teachers and hearty support of the School Board.
