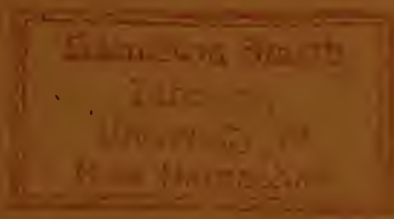

Town Meeting Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall and police court room in the Town building, on the 11th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for a term of three years, in place of Guy E. Speare, Arthur T. Downing and Harry M. Eaton, a Constable, and two Highway Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the Town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other Town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Trunk line construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance

with Chap. 155, Laws of 1909, or Chaps. 158, 162, or 168, Laws of 1913, or Chaps. 51 or 93, Laws of 1915,

Article 4. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Trunk line maintenance of highways in this Town in accordance with Chap. 133, Laws of 1911, Sec. 27.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars for a free hospital bed at the Littleton hospital for a period of one year.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in cooperation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for free, open-air band concerts, and pass any vote in relation thereto.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give to any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, passed January Session, 1917.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of freeing from toll charges the highway bridge crossing the Connecticut river from Littleton to Waterford, commonly known as the Waterford bridge.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to sell to the Glenwood Cemetery corporation a strip of land lying between the property formerly known as the driving park and the said Glenwood cemetery.

Article 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To choose any other necessary Town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

School Board's Report

The Board of Education submit to you the following report which covers only the business interests of the District, also with it the amount of money which we recommend for the different departments of the school for the ensuing year. For the accomplishments of the schools, we refer you to the report of the Superintendent.

We desire to call your attention to the statement in the last school report to the effect that, in accordance with an amendment of the public statutes, the school year now ends on August 31, so that our appropriations at the next meeting are for the time beginning September 1, 1919, to August 31, 1920.

In making our estimates for the money needed, at the last school meeting, we anticipated increased expenses, but they have been far greater than we thought. Owing to the war conditions, the price of supplies has advanced more than we had reason to expect. We have also been obliged to increase the salary of teachers in order to retain them. We wish you to know, however, that you have teachers rendering most efficient service who could have received larger salaries by going into other communities.

CONVEYANCE OF PUPILS

The expense here has also increased. The committee who have had this matter in charge have spent much time upon it, even going over the different routes at their own expense, so as to provide the most efficient and economical means for this work. At the beginning of the year, we tentatively fixed the limit of $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles within which pupils should not be conveyed. In no case have we provided conveyance where it was possible to open rural schools without a

much greater expense and in addition to this would be the difficulty of obtaining suitable teachers. At the present time, we are transporting 62 pupils. The total expense is \$18.60 a day, which makes a cost of 30 cents for each pupil.

REPAIRS

We have made only such repairs during the year as were necessary for the interests of the schools. New windows have been put in the assembly room at the high school, also improvements in the upper room at the Mitchell building. All the rural school buildings are in a good condition. New heaters have been installed in all of them at a saving of fuel and, at the same time, providing ventilation and distributing the heat over the rooms. Some of the buildings in the village will soon need painting and it is the idea of the School Board that some of this work should be done each year, rather than wait until they all have to be painted in a single year. The heating arrangement in the Kilburn building is very unsatisfactory and, in the near future it will need to be changed. One thing the Board recommends as an absolute necessity. That is, the shingling of the Kilburn building. It is leaking and carpenters who have examined it tell us that this is the only remedy. The school building in District No. 5, in accordance with the authority which you gave us, has been conveyed to Ellsworth Richardson for \$75.

In conclusion, we wish to say that our work in the Board has been very harmonious and we also wish to thank you for your forbearance with us.

Superintendent's Report

School Board of Littleton: Gentlemen:

In submitting my third annual report as superintendent of schools I believe that a summary of the statistics of enrolment and attendance for the school year ending August 31, 1918, will be of significant interest.

One will note that the attendance fell off appreciably during the year, largely because of removals. Yet there were many cases of absence that were avoid-

able. The efforts of the truant officer were untiring and efficient. But the cooperation of parents is needed in larger measure. School is the child's right as well as his duty. Every day of school attendance bears a direct relation to success in life. There are too many cases where this principle seems to be feebly understood. However, I find the majority of parents anxious to cooperate for the educational welfare of their children.

Eighty elementary pupils failed of promotion, twenty-four of whom were found in the first grade, where the children are all practically under eight years and therefore not subject to the compulsory attendance law. The relation between regular attendance and success in school work is obvious.

I am lead to the conclusion that it would be wise to adopt the by-law which makes compulsory the attendance of children who are at least six years of age. I respectfully recommend that it be acted upon at the school meeting.

PRESENT ENROLMENT

February, 1918, the total enrolment in the schools was 875; February 1, 1919, it was 825, distributed as follows:

The figures vary constantly. Just now there seems to be a pronounced tendency for a return to town of families who for war reasons recently moved away. There will probably be an increase in attendance during the rest of the year.

WAR WORK

The children did their part in the activities necessitated by our task of winning the war. The results

of their efforts in war gardening are to be especially commended. In spite of early and late frosts the pupils carried through to success more than 350 war gardens, with a total food value exceeding \$2,700.00.

This year they will have victory gardens for there is still need of food raising. Moreover the educational value of gardening is too great to be allowed to lapse. Henceforth it will be a part of the regular program of studies. The United States Bureau of Education and the New Hampshire Department of Public Instruction cooperate with the New Hampshire schools in organization and instruction. Already 500 of our Littleton children have enrolled in the United States School Garden Army.

COMMUNITY GARDENS

Grateful appreciation is due to Mr. James Remick of Concord for donating the use of his land on Oak Hill. Mr. Harry Heald of Littleton had charge of the allotment and cultivation of the plots, which were laid out for the children. More than fifty children's gardens resulted, all of which were under the supervision of the schools.

SCHOOL FAIR

The school fair, which has become an established event will, I trust, prove larger and more interesting next fall. I am very grateful to the public for the support given to this yearly effort to recognize the work of the children.

THE TEACHING FORCE

The decrease in enrolment made possible the employment of three less elementary teachers this year. The lower grades at Apthorp have grown too large to be adequately handled by the present force. While the employment of assistants is affording temporary

relief I am convinced that it will be sound educational policy to engage one or more additional teachers next year.

The teaching force of our system should be constantly improving in quality. This result is being sought by providing for the professional growth of teachers in service by means of constructive supervision. The policy adopted by your board of giving reasonable increases and raising the maximum salary enabled us to carry over the greater part of our staff. I earnestly recommend that you extend this policy this year. Furthermore all losses that occur in our teaching force must be recruited with teachers of approved worth and training.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

Our medical inspector, Dr. J. M. Page, left us for overseas service before he had time to do his work in the schools. It has not seemed possible to attempt to resume medical inspection this year. I hope that it may be taken up again next September. It would be highly desirable also to make some arrangement whereby the services of a school nurse might become available, for both the opportunity and the need are abundant.

SUPERVISION OF DRAWING

The plan followed this year for the supervision of drawing has developed satisfactorily. Miss Louise Roberts of Keene Normal school was engaged as Manual Training Instructor and Drawing Supervisor. She has laid out the course in the drawing, secured the loyal cooperation of the teachers, and followed up the class room accomplishments with definite periods given to supervision. The results have proven the value of the experiment.

THE HIGH SCHOOL

The organization and instruction of the high school are effectively administered by Headmaster Stephen A. Doody, with Miss Osgood as preceptress. A fine spirit of loyalty and cooperation exists among the teachers. The life of the school is actuated by earnestness and devotion to the interests that make high school worth while.

The statistics of attendance for the high school last year are interesting. The average membership was 165.86; the average attendance was 158.07; and the average absence was 7.79. The per cent of attendance was 95.3. There were only sixty-nine instances of tardiness. The superintendent was credited with 103 visits. The total number of pupils attending at least two weeks was 187.

In June, 1918, twenty-nine graduates received their diplomas. It is a source of gratification to know that these young people are now making good in normal school and college, in business offices, and in the work of the world. More than half of them have found positions in our own community.

The State Department of Public Instruction has in preparation a revised program of studies for the secondary schools. The readjustment of our curricula to meet the advised changes is already in progress. This year we have made household arts a required subject for all girls except those who are preparing for some definite college. We are doing this not primarily because this branch of study will be of practical use to girls, but because it is of immediate interest and sound educational value. The seventh and eighth grades are to all practical intents a part of the high school. They may be made legally so by the definite approval of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

CONCLUSION

The victory of democracy in the world war has made very clear the obligation that rests upon us as Americans to successfully solve the problems which our experience in the great conflict has revealed as existing. Among these is Americanization in its inclusive sense. The schools have their share in this great work and they must perceive their aims more surely. The schools of Littleton have been quickened to a purpose to make the school life of vital significance to the pupils and to give them an opportunity to participate in the events which are so rapidly making history. The teachers are trying to communicate the intangible things which make Americanism. A new spirit has come to our work as teachers, a spirit akin to that which sent our boys across the seas in the service of democracy.

I trust that Littleton may continue in a policy of liberal expenditure for her schools. I sincerely hope that we may not have to defer the building of a new high school more than another school year. I earnestly recommend that the matter be considered at the earliest opportunity.

My gratitude is due to you, gentlemen, and to the citizens of Littleton for the understanding cooperation that has attended my efforts in behalf of the schools.

LIBRARIAN'S NOTES

The annual report of the librarian to be satisfactory to the trustees, and the public, should each year present some phase of work which would be considered as an advance in library methods over the preceding year, and while there may be some years when it seems not quite possible to draw any pronounced line on any decided increase in activities, so this past year may in many ways seem somewhat of a repetition of last year, though the past year has presented new conditions owing to the closing of the library dur-

ing the month of October, that month usually being one of the busiest months in the year; and as a result the circulation did not reach the record of the year before, and it is necessary to record the annual circulation as 31,659 as compared with 32,815 the preceding year. The decrease is not as marked as would be expected, and under normal conditions there would no doubt have been a gain, and the 35,000 circulation, the goal for which we are striving, would not seem so far distant. There has been a slight increase in the circulation of non-fiction, but not as much of a gain as there should have been, when so many of the worth while current books have been added to the library accessions.

As a library keeping in accord with the times, there has been no diminution in the choice of good books, both fiction and non-fiction, by the committee having the selection in charge.

The library was most fortunate in being the recipient of the generous sum of one hundred dollars for the purchase of books, from the will of the late Harry A. Johnson, and on motion of the trustees the book committee was authorized to judge as to the best choice of using the money, and it was decided to use one-half for non-fiction books, and the other half for the current fiction, and the books have been accessioned and are now in circulation.

The Rev. J. E. Johnson, with his usual thoughtfulness for the welfare of the library, gave a generous collection of books from his own library, as well as some recently purchased; single books have been given by individuals, also magazines and periodicals, which have filled a pressing need, and much appreciation is extended to the donors.

While it has not been thought advisable to turn the library into a war centre as in many places, much war reading has been accessible to the public, which

with the posters exhibited has proved the library to be one of the cooperative libraries. The Red Cross have had the use of the lower floor in the library—an extra room being given the past year for the surgical dressing work. All extra expense of these rooms was met by the Red Cross except the extra heat used, which necessitated some extra expense to the library.

The financial situation from the viewpoint of the advance in all library supplies must be considered, and the advance has now reached such proportions that the sums of money formerly used for the different acquisitions no longer covers the old time purchases; and if it had not been for the gifts of money and books, there would have been a very limited supply of new books to meet the ever-increasing demand.

The catalog, or list of books added to the library for the past two years, has not yet materialized, owing to both lack of funds and time; but plans are being considered to soon have some list which will relieve the inconvenience. The library is fast growing, but there are many untried activities to be considered for the future, if we wish this library to keep pace with other libraries in towns of like progress, and which will work for more public usefulness.
